Spearman I.S.D. Board hires new principals

Spearman I.S.D. Board of Trustees have hired two principals and two teachers during the special meetings held the past two weeks.

During the Wednesday, July 28, special meeting Sam Atwood of Magnolia, Texas, was hired as the high school principal, Allen Alford, interim superintendent said. He added that Mr. Atwood's wife, Shirley, was also hired. She is an elementary teacher.

At the special meeting held Mon-

day, Aug. 2, Larry Morris was hired to the junior high principal position, Alford stated. Susan Morris, Larry's wife, was also hired by the board. She will be a teacher at the high school. The couple comes to Spearman from Andrews.

In other business on Monday, the board entered into a contract with Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. for the purchase of attendance credits.

During the Wednesday, July 4, meeting the board interviewed applicants for the superintendent position. The applicants have been narrowed to three, Alford reported.

Gruver I.S.D. Board of Trustees hears report regarding Senate Bill 7

Gruver School Board of Trustees received a report regarding Senate Bill 7 from Pringle-Morse Superintendent Beryl Sears during a special meeting held Wednesday, July 28.

In the report, Sears explained that Pringle-Morse is one of the 109 school districts required by the new legislation to return tax dollars to the state or to share with neighbors. It was indicated that the Pringle-Morse School board would prefer to share the money with other schools in the county than send it to the state.

A discussion was held and then the Gruver board voted 6-0 to enter into a contract with the Pringle-Morse district. In this contract Pringle-Morse is allowed to purchase some ADA from the Gruver

district. According to the report, Gruver's state payment will be reduced, but the district's overall income will increase.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Betty Chisum, the fifth and seventh grade reading teacher. Kay Hobbs, a Gruver kindergarten teacher, was appointed to the reading position on a 6-0 vote. According to a report from Superintendent Barry Haenisch, the board voted not to employ another kindergarten teacher at this time because of the low pre-enrollment and a recommendation from Principal Bob Burgoon.

Alice Peady presented the audit of the Hansford County Appraisal District from 1991-92 and the board approved it 6-0. She then presented a check to the group for \$7,532.07. This was Gruver I.S.D.'s portion of

District Plans to Contract with Gruver and Spearman

The voters of the Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District will be asked to approve the board's decision to send approximately \$354,000 to Gruver I.S.D. and Spearman I.S.D. The election will be September 18th.

Pringle-Morse is one of about 100 property-wealthy school districts in Texas that must reduce its wealth to meet the new finance

requirements of Senate Bill 7 as passed by the 73rd Texas Legislature. The Senate Bill 7 gives the district five options to reduce the district's wealth: consolidate with a poor district, detach commercial property to another district, purchase attendance credits from the state, contract with another district, or consolidate tax bases with other districts.

Senate Bill 7 requires school district with property wealth above \$280,000 per weighted average daily attendance (WADA) to reduce the district's wealth. Pringle-Morse's property wealth per WADA is \$492,249.

The Pringle-Morse plan was approved by the trustees at a special meeting July 27th. Gruver I.S.D. trustees approved participation in the plan July 28th, and the Spearman I.S.D. trustees approved it August 2nd. It is now up to the Commissioner of Education and the voters of the Pringle-Morse district for final approval of the plan.

Under Chapter 36 of the Texas Education Code as amended by Senate Bill 7, a district's WADA

includes students residing in the district but attending school in another district and excludes non-resident students who attend school in the district. Chapter 36 pertains only to determining the property wealth of the district. Each district still receives funding for students actually attending school in the district under Chapter 16 of the Education Code.

At a community meeting July 8th, the members of the Pringle-Morse community expressed their desire to distribute the district's excess wealth to the schools in Hansford County. According to program participation counts supplied by the Texas Education Agency currently estimated for Pringle-Morse, the district will need to purchase 110 attendance credits to reduce the district's property wealth to the \$280,000 per WADA required by Senate Bill 7.

The Pringle-Morse plan for reducing wealth includes three agreements. The first agreement with Spearman I.S.D. will allow Pringle-Morse to include 13 students transferring from Spearman I.S.D. as Pringle-Morse students. The weighted count for those students will be approximately 26. That will leave Pringle-Morse needing to purchase 84 WADA credits. The other two agreements allow Pringle-Morse to purchase 54 WADA credits from Spearman and 30 credits from Gruver.

State-aid for Spearman and Gruver will be reduced according to the WADA purchased by Pringle-Morse. Spearman's revenue per WADA is approximately \$3,000, while Gruver's is approximately \$3,185. Pringle-Morse will pay the two districts approximately \$4,083 for each WADA credit purchased. Pringle-Morse will pay Spearman I.S.D. approximately \$216,399, which will net the Spearman district a \$57,399 increase over the amount it would have received. Gruver will receive approximately \$122,490 giving the district an additional \$26,940 in funding.

The additional funds realized from the agreements must be used for programs that will enhance student performance. The funds cannot be used to lower either district's tax rates. Use of the additional funds will have to be reported to the Commissioner of Education by the districts.

Another option allowing the Pringle-Morse district to purchase attendance credits directly from the state will also be included on

P.D. River Authority authorizes contracting

The Palo Duro River Authority authorized construction managers James & Huseman, Inc. to contract for both the office building and the tenant house during the special meeting held Wednesday, July 28.

According to General Manager Johnnie C. Lee, the project will cost approximately \$500,000.

In other business, the board review the applications for assistant manager. Seven applications were received for the position and the

board has narrowed it down to two, Lee said. He added, "These two are invited to the next meeting."

The members then went to the lake where they reviewed the sites for the tenant house and office building. The sites are located on the east side of the lake, southwest of the intake system. Lee explained that the tenants house will be located just south of the office building.

In regular business, the board approved the minutes from the previous meeting.

In closing Lee reported that the approximate depth of the lake is 25.5 ft.

THE BIG PICTURE

A few weeks ago "Calvin and Hobbes", my favorite cartoon strip, had Calvin in math class. Having raised his hand, Calvin was called on. The dialogue went something like this:

"Teacher, why do we have to learn this stuff since we are all going to die?" asked Calvin.

"Class, turn to page 432," said the teacher.

Calvin turns to readers and deadpans, "No one appreciates us big picture guys."

Jesus and Paul were big picture guys, and few people appreciated them. Instead of promoting ignorance since everyone dies, they encouraged people to learn the truth. Rather than the philosophy so prevalent today of, "let us eat and drink for tomorrow we die," they expounded, "Do not be deceived: Bad company corrupts good morals."

Both of these men were convinced that unseen things were more real than seen things, and to be preferred. Having seen heaven, they lived in hope of things eternal.

Here's the big picture they saw and spoke of. This present world is out of round. Texas Railroad Commission releases oil & gas stats

The Railroad Commission of Texas reports oil and gas production for the month of April 1993. In Hansford County total gas production was 3,071,594 mcf (1,000 cubic feet). Crude oil production in Hansford County totaled 27,178 barrels.

According to a July 8 news release, the Commission issued, statewide a total of 1,149 drilling permits in June compared to 968 in June of 1992. The June total included 714 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 44 to re-enter existing well bores, 39 to deepen existing holes, 139 to plug back existing holes, and 78 for other wells. June amended drilling permits totaled 135.

Total drilling permits issued in 1993 year-to-date is 6,011, a five percent increase from the 5,734 issued during the same period of 1992.

Hoels to host Brazilian student

When Andy Hoel of Gruver, Texas, heard Brazil had the best soccer teams in the world, he thought maybe he had found a field goal kicker for Gruver's football coach.

Andy and his family, wife Phyllis, son Jarrod, 14, and daughter Lauren, 9, have opened their home to Fernando Friblatt Tarre de Oliveira, 15, of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Fernando will attend Gruver High School for one semester, going

home around Christmas.

Jarrod, an avid school and AAU basketball player is looking forward to having a member of the 1992 Brazilian National champion basketball team in his home. He also looks forward to playing football with his Brazilian brother, something Fernando hoped to learn during his stay in the United States.

Fernando, the son of Cesar Tarre Carvalho de Oliveira, an engineer and Gilsa Friblatt Tarre de Oliveira, a psycho-analyst and university teacher, has a 14 year old brother that once spent three months in the United States. He also had a friend attend school in the U.S. two years ago.

He says he hopes to gain a "new experience...live in a place where I don't know anybody, with a different language and where I'll have to take care of myself and have new responsibilities. I also want to bring up my English in the American high school..." This will not be his first time in the U.S. Previously, with his family, Fernando has traveled to Florida in 1989.

Although basketball is his fa-

vorite sport and football is one he wants to learn, Fernando is also a mountain biker and surfer. He considers himself a busy person...during the week I study a lot, I have English course two days and basketball training four times a week. I play basketball in Flamengo...one of the best in Brazil. We have won the state championship six times and the only national championship that we played we won it.

"But I also like to stay in my own room, listening to my CDs...talking at the telephone with my friends while I'm resting in my bed in front of the window" and the view is probably spectacular. The Oliveira family lives in a apartment in Copacabana, where there is one of the most famous beaches in the world. This makes surfing a natural pastime.

All Jarrod is worried about is how soon the first game of one-on-one will be. Andy wants to see if he will have the field goal kicker at his home. Phyllis is planning to rearrange Fernando's room before he arrives Aug. 12. The family has previously hosted a three week student from Japan through World Learning.

Through World Learning, more than 80,000 international participants have been welcomed into the homes of host families across the United States.

Host families are rural, suburban and urban families that might be young couple with or without children, single parent, retirees, business people, blue-collar workers, teaching professionals and homemakers.

It is not necessary to have special accommodations or even an extra bedroom for your international student. Simply provide your new family member with a bed, a quiet place to study, and two meals a day (breakfast and dinner). Full health and accident insurance is provided and each student brings his or her own spending money for personal expenses.

Six Hansford County residents attend literacy training workshop

Thirteen individuals from Hansford and Hutchinson counties participated in the literacy training workshop held at the Hansford County Courthouse July 14-16.

Those attending the workshop from Gruver were Angie Lopez, Donna Williams, Kay Hobbs and

Lavon Reid. Individuals from Spearman at the workshop were Pauline McGee and Elaine Morris.

According to Elaine, the sessions were designed to teach techniques for the participants to use on individuals ranging from non-readers to low-level readers. During the workshop, the group saw videos, performed role playing and heard examples from instructor Eileen Turner and assistant Barbara Perdue.

Elaine described one of the instructional activities. Questionnaires were handed out and the participants were asked to answer them. Well, the questionnaires were written in a foreign language (Arabic). "It gave the group a sense of what it would be like if you could not read," she stated.

In the role playing exercise Elaine found it difficult to play the part. "For me it was real difficult. Some of the others had already had illiterate training and were just diversifying their program. But for me it was hard to comprehend (not being able to read) after being able to read for so long. For a lot of us it was difficult to comprehend and maintain the role."

Two different techniques were addressed in the videos; however, the emphasis was on language experience stories. Using this method the learner tells a story and the instructor writes it down word-for-word, Elaine said. She continued, "Then you use sight words to help increase word recognition."

The other method addressed on the video, was phonics, which emphasizes sounding out words.

When asked why she had gotten involved in the program and what was the most beneficial to her in the workshop she replied, "I was interested in helping other people learn to read." As for the workshop all of the material was "pretty fresh, but the language experience technique was the most beneficial. I would have gotten the phonetics, but the language experience is probably more beneficial as a teaching technique."

According to Elaine the computers at the courthouse are available for the literature program. She added, "The computer was purchased with funds from the performance reward program from the Texas Department of Criminal

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
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Among The Neighbors



In compliance with Section 10.03 of the Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act the Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District has adopted the following rules and procedures for the Hansford County Hospital District Indigent Health Care Program:

Application for Indigent Health Care can be requested from Hansford Hospital between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday. Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact the Hospital Business Office for assistance.

Hansford County Hospital District will use rules and procedures established in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services.

In summary these rules are as follows:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of Income, Termination of Income, Residence Household composition, and Resources is required, if questionable.
3. Net income cannot exceed the Maximum Income Standards listed in the Income Standards listed in the Income Standards chart below.
4. Liquid resources assets cannot exceed \$1500. The equity value of a car greater than \$1500 is counted against the \$1500 limit. Personal property and homestead are exempt assets.
5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Hansford County.
6. Applicants must provide requested information and documentation requested or application will be denied.
7. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.

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


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Four Gruver baseball players heading to Regional Tournament

On Friday, August 6, the adventure begins, as the Texas County Oklahoma Babe Ruth All-Stars open the Babe Ruth Southwest Regionals with a game against the Jefferson Parish Louisiana Babe Ruth All-Stars, the host team, at Mike Miley Stadium in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Present in New Orleans will be eight teams, comprising the Southwest Regional Tournament Group. They are Oklahoma (Texas County), Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, East Texas, South Texas, West Texas and the host team, Jefferson Parish, La. Texas County will play

the host team in their first game.

The Texas County All-Stars won the right to compete in the Babe Ruth Southwest Regionals by winning the Oklahoma Babe Ruth State Championship July 23-26 in Fairfax, Oklahoma. Texas County defeated Ponca City 6-1, then Choctaw County 14-4, the Le Flore County 8-3, the Choctaw County again in the championship game 3-2. If anything, Texas County proved they have outstanding pitching in the State Playoffs.

Other members of the team are the manager Don Merwin from Guymon; Mitch Merwin, Matt Costner, Nick Merwin, Albert Marquez and Clint Talcott from Guymon; Leland Lem (an outstanding pitcher), and A.J. Howard from Tyrone; Jess Loepp and Matt McVay from Turpin; and David Ray from Hooker. Of the four Gruver boys, Frick Renteria and Bort are 15 years old - sophomores at GHS; and Hoel is 14 years old - a freshman at GHS.

Win or lose, these four baseballers have achieved more in that sport than any other Gruver athletes in history.

Amarillo bank returns to local ownership

Local ownership has returned to an Amarillo bank. The former Texas Commerce Bank-Amarillo officially became FirstBank Southwest when contracts transferring ownership were signed in Houston July 1, according to bank chairman George Sell.

The bank was purchased by FirstPerryton Bancorp, Inc., which also owns banks in Perryton, Pampa and Hereford, with a branch in Booker. With the addition of FirstBank Southwest, FirstPerryton Bancorp became the third largest banking organization headquartered in the Texas Panhandle.

The holding company has assets exceeding \$400 million.

Dean Cluck of Gruver is on the board of directors at FirstBank Southwest.

FirstBank Southwest opened in 1955 at First State Bank. The bank changed owners several times before it was purchased by Texas Commerce Bancshares in 1981.

Under its new ownership, management and employees of the bank will not change, according to Sell. Sell will continue to serve as chairman and chief executive officer, with Stan Morris as president and chief operating officer.

the September 18th ballot in case the agreements with the two districts are not approved by the Commissioner. Attendance credit purchased from the state would cost the Pringle-Morse district over \$490,000. If the agreements with Gruver and Spearman are approved by the Commissioner of Education and by the voters of the Pringle-Morse district, the cost to the district will be approximately \$340,000.

Most of the property-wealthy districts in the state have indicated that they are either going to send their excess money to the state, or make arrangements with other districts like Pringle-Morse has done.

Forty-five of the school districts affected by Senate Bill 7 have de-

cidied to seek voter approval to purchase attendance credits from the state, according to a poll by the Texas Association of School Boards.

Only one district in the state has chosen to detach property from its tax base. Tulo-Midway Independent School District will give Corpus Christi some of its taxable property.

Pringle-Morse can turn to another option if the plans do not get voter approval. If Pringle-Morse did not choose one of the five options, the Commissioner will then transfer some commercial property for the district. If that didn't get the district's wealth below \$280,000, the district will be forced to consolidate with another school. Two area schools have already

won voter approval to send money to the state. The proposal passed 385-8 in Canadian I.S.D. and 128-10 in Miami. Allison I.S.D. and Plemons-Stinnett-Phillips I.S.D. are developing plans similar to the Pringle-Morse plan. Allison will

send money to Shamrock and Wheeler, and P-S-P will send money to Borger and Fritch. Highland Park I.S.D. already gained the commissioner's approval to send money to Amarillo I.S.D. and Canyon I.S.D.

Permits issued in June included 508 oil, 189 gas, 382 oil and gas, 41 injection, eight disposal, and 21 other permits.

OIL AND GAS COMPLETIONS--In June operators reported 252 gas, 386 oil, and 36 service completions, compared to 177 gas,

396 oil, and 72 service completions during the same period of last year.

The total of well completions recorded for 1993 year-to-date is 4,255, up ten percent from the 3,852 recorded in 1992 year-to-date.

Operators reported 809 holes plugged and 171 dry holes in June, compared to 1,249 holes plugged and 226 dry holes reported during the same period last year.

APRIL CRUDE OIL PRODUC-

TION--Texas preliminary April crude oil production averaged 1,569,167 barrels daily, down from the 1,665,853 barrels daily average of April 1992.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for April is 47,075,015 barrels, down from the 49,975,586 barrels reported in April 1992.

APRIL NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION--Texas oil and gas wells produced 453,239,435 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in preliminary production for April, up 5.03 percent compared to April 1992's gas production total of 430,399,124 Mcf.

Texas gas production in April came from 174,821 oil, and 45,345 gas wells.
