

Feedlots and quick-to-sell producers rarely see eye to eye, like trucks passing in the night. If they talk, phases like "retained ownership" and 'check in hand" mix like motor oil and radiator water. Yet, quality feeders find common ground and devoted customers.

Flint Rock Feeders, LTD, a Certified Angus Beef LLC (CAB) partner feedlot near Gruver, Texas, and manager Frank Winters are bridging the gap. The main tool is a philosophy that easing producers into the realities of the post-weaning world can make everyone more successful.

The feedlot was named CAB Runner-up Feedlot Partner of the Year for those with less than 15,000 capacity, for building profitable partnerships with quality-minded producers. Winters accepted the award August 19th at the CAB annual conference in Baltimore, Md.

The differences between feedlot and farm rest in marketing strategy, Winter says. Feedlots take a long-term view, while many cow-calf producers only look at the markets at weaning time.


"It's like getting on a freeway," he says. "Everyone is driving 80 mph and you are on the frontage road doing 40 mph getting ready to merge with traffic- you're gonna get run over, but that's what happens to producers when they only look at markets in the short-term."

When the dust clears, feedlots advance with the flow of traffic, leaving the hapless producer in a bind. Winters says markets can be a hit and run, but regular interaction with a feedlot can help producers stay up to speed.

Helping producers market their cattle requires constant feedback, and some need more coaching than others. A lot of them don't have a clue about what it takes to make cattle work in a feed yard," Winter says. They may think they are producing the best calves, but for them to have feedlot value, we need to work together."

He tells ranchers the feedlot represents an opportunity to lock in higher profits and alleviate the risk of marketing.

"In business, you are not just messing with someone's extra money, you are messing with a producer's livelihood," he says. "That's why it is challenging to sell guys on retained ownership. They think it's a risky deal, but I tell them sending your entire calf crop to a sale barn one day a year is one of the riskiest things a guy could do. CAB feedlot specialist Gary Fike says Flint Rock's CAB acceptance rate of nearly 21 percent is evidence of its commitment to building a better program. "That's an amazing number considering the region," he says. "Frank has a quality mindset and a can-do attitude that help bring in the kind of Angus-influenced genetics he can feed to target the CAB brand. His good old 'cowboy try' has led to success, and that provides value to his customers." That has been the key to excellence for Flint Rock Feeders, Customer focus has given the feedlot an opportunity to build lasting relationships with producers who find the road to higher profits. There was no suicide note at either scene and it is still a mystery why he rabbits took their own lives.





Words from Faith & Grace

"Owe no one anything, except to love one another." Our lessons this week are found in Psalm 119:33-40, Ezekiel 33: 7-11, Romans 13:8-14 and Matthew 18:15-20. What are we to do about discord, anger, wrong within the faith community?

The Psalmist prays that the Lord will open his ears to the Law and trengthen him so that he can walk in the Lord's way, so that he will be aved

Ezekiel as a prophet is charged with giving the Word of the Lord to the people. God charges him with giving the word, and reminds Ezekiel that if the people do not heed His word, their blood is on their own hands, but if Ezekiel fails to pass on God's Word, then the blood of the people is on Ezekiel's hands. So we need to pray for understanding and strength to follow Christ's law of love. We need to share our faith and His love with others through act and deed.

Paul hears that some in the faith community are refusing to pay their bills; they seem to say,' since the Lord is coming soon, why pay?' Paul commands them to 'owe no one anything, except to love one another'. All of the commandments can be summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself". It then follows that when you act in love, you cannot steal, covet, or in any other manner harm another. Paul reminds the believers that for each of us the day of salvation is nearer for each day that passes; hence, we should put on Christ like a coat and live in His name by His law of Love.

Matthew offers a means of settling disagreement within the faith community. Yet, taken out of context of the entire chapter, this scripture does not ring true to Christ's approach to tax collectors and Gentiles in His earlier statements and as recorded in the other gospels; however, it does offer practical advice for resolving conflict. Study this passage carefully Remember that Christ told Peter that he must forgive "seventy times seven", in an unlimited fashion. Altogether, Chapter 18 offers a path of reconciliation and recovery of a wayward member of the faith communi-

If we gather to pray for God's assistance, God is with us, but our prayers need to be "self-less" and in love for others. For example, "O Lord, Please buy me a Mercedes-Benz" may not result in us driving any time soon even if more than one utters the prayer.





Reading Tips

Studies have shown that children who get support at home in reading and learning perform better in school than those who do not.

J. David Cooper, author of Houghton Mifflin reading programs and adjunct professor of education at Ball State University offers these tips for increasing your child's vocabulary and understanding during reading and beyond:

Prayer and action for hurricane victims

During hurricanes, floods and other natural disasters, those who have the least to lose are often those who lose the most. Why?

First, the dwellings in which poor people live are not as sturdy, stable, or safe as others. "Shotgun" shacks, mobile homes, and poorly constructed apartment buildings don't do well in hurricane-force winds and tidal surges.

Second, the places where poor people live are also the most vulnerable. The rich often live at the tops of hills, the poor in the valleys and plains that are the first to flood. The living conditions in these neighborhoods are also usually the most dense and overcrowded.

Third, it is much harder for the poor to evacuate. They don't own cars, can't afford to rent them, and often can't even afford a tank of gas - especially at today's prices. They can't afford an airplane, train, or even bus ticket. And, as one low-income person told a New Orleans reporter, they have no place to go. People in poverty can't afford motel or hotel rooms. and often don't have friends or family in other places with space to spare. In New Orleans, there were many people who desperately wanted to leave but couldn't.

Fourth, low-income people are the least likely to have insurance on their homes and belongings, and the least likely to have health insurance. If jobs are lost because of natural disasters, theirs are the first to go. Poverty makes long-term recovery after a disaster more difficult - the communities that are the weakest to begin with usually recover the slowest. The lack of a living family income for most people in those communities leaves no reserve for emergencies.

New Orleans has a poverty rate of 28% - more than twice the national rate. Life is always hard for poor people - living on the edge is insecure and full of risk. Natural disasters make it worse. Yet even in normal times, poverty is hidden and not reported by the media. In times of disaster, there continues to be little coverage of the excessive impact on the poor. Devastated luxury homes and hotels, drifting yachts and battered casinos make far more compelling photographs.

The final irony of New Orleans is that the people who normally fill the



you're not very quicksy, but, oh! you're so fixy! Guess what everybody? He just turned sixty!

* Talk about the meaning of words. As you read together, help your child understand any words he may not know. Since words and illustrations in children's books are usually closely related, you can sometimes point to a picture on the page to explain the meaning of a word. Or you can show your child the meaning of a word yourself: for example, you can explain that nibble means "to eat with very small bites" and pretend to nibble on your child's finger!

* Use new words to describe objects, places, and actions. When your child comes across a new word in a book, be sure to use it again after he is done reading. For example, "Here are some carrots for you to nibble on!" Or "Look, there's a pigeon. Remember reading about that kind of bird in your book last night?" Of course, you don't have to stick with story words. Use all sorts of new words whenever possible. Try to be specific instead of using general words. For example, if your child says, "Look how big that building is!" you might say, "That's a big skyscraper!"

* Play story games with your child. Make up stories using new words your child has come across while reading, or simply introduce interesting words that he doesn't know yet. Don't worry if you're a brilliant storyteller, try simply looking around and describing what you see. For example, if you see someone with a suitcase getting into a taxi, talk about where that person might be going and why, let your imagination run wild. Use lots of descriptive words, and invite your child to join in!


* Talk about your day. As you go about your daily routine, cooking din-ner or fixing a leaky faucet, describe and demonstrate your activities to your child. You'll be surprised at how many great vocabulary-building words you can use, and how easily you can turn a simple chore into a fun learning opportunity! For example, you can say, "Now I'm going to mash the potatoes with a splash of milk." (Rhyming is a great vocabulary-learning tool, by the way!) Or say, "I'm going to use this wrench to tighten up this nozzle," pointing to each item as you name it.

* Talk about the way things look, feel, taste, smell, and sound. For example, use words such as rough, squishy, bumpy, and smooth to describe objects you need look no further than the produce aisle of your grocery store! Although children can learn concrete words such as cat, dog, or house by relating them to pictures in a book, sense-related words are much easier to learn in a real-life context.

* Choose a "word a day." Write one new word in the kitchen calendar for each day of the week, and then see how many times you and your child can use it in the course of the day. (Yes, you'll be plenty sick of it by bedtime!)


* Have fun with words! If you enjoy language, your child will too. Instilling a love of language in your child is one of the greatest gifts you can give him or her as a learner, a reader, and a person.
