Electric Service Quality Standards For SPS To Take Effect March 28

New quality standards for electric service take effect tomorrow (March 28) under a progressive ordinance adopted by the Spearman City Council.

"The electric utility industry is on the verge of being restructured, and service standards should be in place now to protect customers," said Spearman Mayor Burl Buchanan. He said if the Texas Legislature opens up competition between electric utilities, the companies' main concern will be having a low price rather than providing good service. The ordinance not only applies to Southwestern Public Service (SPS), Spearman's current provider, but any future electric provider in the city.

"Our electric service must be reliable, overhead lines and poles are in good condition and safe, and customers get prompt attention when there are problems," Buchanan added. He said SPS has cut its staff during

the last few years, so the Council has reason to be worried about service quality. Electric customers shouldn't suffer because the company has downsized.

The Spearman City Council also is concerned about the upcoming merger of SPS with Public Service Company of Colorado. "We've seen what's happened in other parts of Texas when electric companies merged and cut staff," Buchanan added. "After an ice storm in East Texas, some people were without electricity for up to a week, rotten poles snapped all over town, and live wires were on the ground for hours. That's not going to happen in Spearman."

The new standards requires SPS to submit an annual service quality report with information on the number of electric service interruptions in Spearman and length of those interruptions. In addition, preventive maintenance plan is required yearly. The

maintenance plan must include information on:

- Preventive maintenance and replacement for overhead and underground lines, poles, substations, and related equipment within the city;
- Inspection guidelines for determining the condition of a facility or piece of equipment;
- Corrective actions to be taken if facilities are in poor condition;

• Training requirements for utility employees, vendors and contractors.

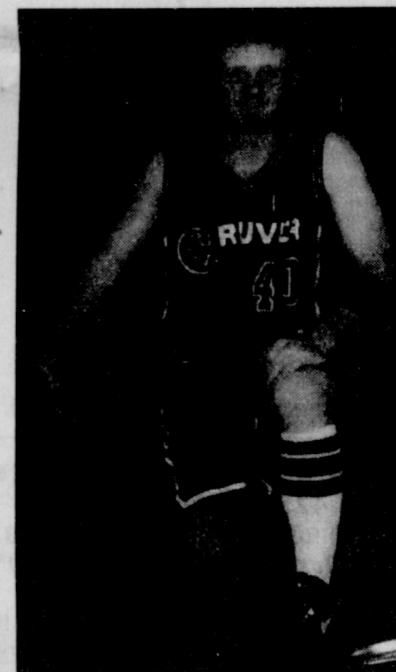
Spearman also is requiring SPS to offer a customer complaint hotline, and to maintain a log of calls to the hotline and a narrative about how each complaint is resolved.

Power Point Presentation Held

On Wednesday, March 26, Dan Smith, of the Texas Department of Agriculture, gave a Power Point Presentation at IV's Hungry Cowboy. The Young Farmer Program was created to provide financial assistance in the form of loan guarantees to applicants between the ages of

18-39, who are establishing their first farm or ranch operation. The Farm and Ranch Program provides financing for the purchase of land for agricultural use. Captain M.R. Strobl of the United States Marine Corps, Aaron Shawn Moore's commanding officer at Camp Lejune, recently nominated Moore

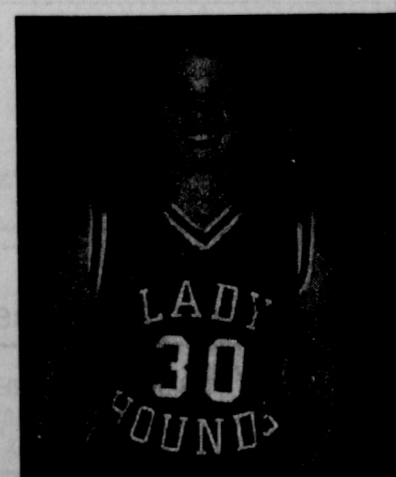
to receive a meritorious promotion to the rank of Lance Corporal. Strobl's recommendation was based on his "superior motivation and devotion to duty."
