Winter Storm **Preparedness** and Planning

Hard freezes and icy conditions can strike suddenly and with little warning. That's why officials with the Texas Division of Emergency Management and the National Weather Service urge Texans to prepare their cars and homes now for dangerous winter weather.

The following simple steps are recom-

 Insulate outside faucets and pipes near outer walls to prevent them from

freezing and bursting.

· Make sure that furnaces, heaters, fireplaces and wood stoves are clean, wellventilated and in good working condition. Stock up on firewood and supplies, including canned goods and bottled

· If you will be away from home for a long period of time, set your thermostat to 55 degrees or higher and open cabinets under sinks.

 Winterize your vehicle by checking the battery, windshield wipers, tire pressure and fluid levels, and lubricate door and trunk locks to prevent freezing.

 Prepare an emergency supply kit for your car or truck, containing food, drinking water, blankets, rain gear, extra clothing, flashlights with extra batteries, jumper cables and a first aid kit.

 Avoid traveling when sleet, freezing rain or snow is predicted.

· Check on friends and family members whose health or age may put them at greater risk from cold weather. Make arrangements for proper shel-

ter and an emergency supply of food and water for your pets and livestock. Monitor weather reports regularly for

the latest information on storms and changes in weather conditions.

By winterizing your home and vehicle now, and paying careful attention to weather and road conditions, Texans can enjoy a safe winter. For more information, go to the following links:





in Texas have fallen 3.8 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.10/g yesterday. This compares with the national average that has fallen 4.1 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.32/g, according to gasoline price website TexasGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 47.8 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 15.9 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average

has decreased 14.4 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 46.3 cents per gallon higher than this day one "The national average in the U.S. is at its lowest since February 25, but remains at record highs for this time of year," according to GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan. "While the downtrend in gasoline prices has certainly been welcome news for mo-

torists, I see the trend short lived, and believe we may see continued volatility in the days ahead, but even with said volatility I do expect many Americans will see average prices between \$3.25-\$3.50 for the rest of 2011, he added. Isaiah gives a ray of hope to the exiles. God says, 'Comfort, O comfort my people. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid..." Then a voice (angelic?) cries out, "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God." A promise of redemption. We, dear Christian, hear that the Lord God comes not with judgment but with comfort for his people! Comfort for all his people, not just his people of Israel.

The Psalmist sings a liturgy. The people pay thanks for God's deliverance in the past; they ask for a renewed deliverance in the present; and ask for God's Word to be revealed. The people receive the promise of God's deliverance! Consider, dear Christian, that God's attributessteadfast love, faithfulness, righteousness and peace--are real! They are incarnate! We do not receive


God only once but every day of our lives.

Peter addresses two problems in the first century church. There is doubt that Jesus The Christ shall return The faith community is drawn toward immoral living. Peter doubts not that the righteousness of God and Christ will prevail and that sin and wickedness shall end. He urges the faith community to live in purity for Christ's return. He reminds them that 'time' for God is not our time'. A day with the Lord is a thousand of our years Peter felt that the Lord delayed to allow time for more to repent and be saved. Dear Christian, it is difficult for us to wait for we live in human time. Yet, we are assured that what 'is' will not last, Christ is coming again! We must live the disciple life until Christ's return.

The first words of Mark are not a sentence, but a title: The Beginning of the Good News of Jesus Christ, Son of God". Mark quotes Malachi 3: 1 and Isaiah 40: 3. God is sending a messenger to prepare the Way of the Lord! Mark then gives us the beginning of the story of John the Baptist. A man who dressed crudely and simply. A man who ate the simplest of foods. A man who cried in the wilderness "Repent!" A man who proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

The rabbis had a saying that "It is the sin of the people that prevents the coming of the Messiah. If the people of Israel would genuinely repent for one day, the Messiah would come!'

May the Holy Spirit enable you to "wait" actively by preparing the "Way of the Lord". Maranatha.






