

What to do if you smell gas: * Do not smoke. Do not use ighters or matches

Do not turn on/off any switches or appliances.

* Do not use your phone to call in a possible leak, go to a neighbors house, the voltage from a phone could ignite the natural gas.

* Our personnel are available 24 hours a day to respond to any emergency call.







very educational forum and many questions were answered and some were not.

A question I thought was very important, and will literally effect everyone in the Panhandle, not just the rural people, is the "clean technology' issue. We were told that they will continue to use the technology that they are using now. Updating you on this technology is open lagoons, hydrogen sulfides, ammonia, and fecal matter (which can cause all kinds of respiratory and neurological disorders) in the air and a high concentration of

nitrates in the water. Also, we learned at this meeting that they will be processing two million hogs (original information was one million) throughout the Panhandle. From 20,000 up to 40,000 hogs per section.

Were you aware of the fact that one hog excretes 2.5 times the amount of one human? You do the math. If we allow this to happen it will be like living in a graveyard of sewers.





Master Marketer Program

The Texas Cooperative Extension's popular Master Marketer education program will be returning to the Texas panhandle in January, according to Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension farm management economist

"We're looking for a few good marketers who wish to update their own skills, and individuals who will help their neighbors do the same, ne said

Now, nationally recognized, the Texas marketing training is an indepth, intensive risk management education programs. Instructors teach participants how to develop marketing plans, evaluate marketing alternatives, manage production and price risk in addition to the skills and discipline necessary to execute the plan.

The 64 hour curriculum is offered as four, two-day sessions held every two weeks. It is the most intensive marketing and risk management training provided by Extension anywhere in the United States, say Texas Extension economists.

The instructors are top professionals from industry and universities around the country. A wide range of topics are covered to enhance mareting and risk management skills.

"We use case study examples and simulation exercises are used wher-ever possible," said Amosson. Students are able to gain experience using real tools that they will put into action on their own farm and anch operations.

The Amarillo session will focus on the principle commodities of the area; wheat, feed grains and cattle. Results of a two year post surveys of the first five classes of participants suggests that using what they have learned has increased their gross revenues approximately 3-1 percent or over \$30,000) on average, annually.

Statewide demand for the program continues to grow. The winter program slated for Amarillo will be held at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center. The first two-day session will begin on January 6-1 7, 2002 with the following sessions on January 30-31, February 3-14 and February 27-28

The registration fee is \$250. Participants must maintain a commitment to work with their county agent to try to start or revitalize an existing marketing club.

Program costs primarily are met by grants from sponsors including the Texas Corn Producers Board, Texas Wheat Producers Association. Texas Farm Bureau, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and the Cotton State Support Committee. Fortunately, there is federal legislation under consideration to close the digital divide by guaranteeing high-speed access to millions more Americans: H.R. 1542, the Internet Freedom and Broadband Deployment Act of 2001. Authored by Congressmen Billy Tauzin and John Dingell, H.R. 1542 requires local telephone companies to upgrade 100 percent of their central office facilities to provide high-speed service - so inner-city and small-town residents aren t left behind as we race into the Information Age.

Equally as important, the measure creates fair competition among all high-speed service providers - cable, Digital Subscriber Line, satellite and wireless alike - by establishing one consistent set of rules for them to follow. And fair competition means greater choice, better service and lower prices for consumers.

The Internet Freedom and Broadband Deployment Act of 2001 is moving quickly through the U.S. House of Representatives; a vote is expected soon. Congress should do the right thing, giving us all the speed we need and the access we deserve.



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
