Hansford Hospice To Offer Training Course

Pringle-Morse

CISD Recognized

Ms. Linda Barnhart, Superintendent of the Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District, was recently honored for outstanding employee safety by the North Texas Educational Insurance Association at its annual meeting conducted in Austin, Texas.

The district is a member of a uniquely designed partially self-funded workers' compensation program developed by Hibbs-Hallmark & Company and administrated by Claims Administrative Services, Inc., both located in Tyler.

The Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. was a Diamond Star Performer award recipient with the actual losses from employee accidents equaling less than 10 percent of the fund set aside by the district for claims

expenses. The actual savings to the school district was \$8,734. "Our self insurance program was designed to provide the highest level of safety and offer the greatest potential for premium savings to our members," said Billy Hibbs, CEO of Hibbs-Hallmark & Company. "We have a team of safety professionals to help the districts to implement a strict set of safety policies and procedures."

The taxpayers should also be pleased to know that the Board of Trustees and the administrative staff of the Pringle-Morse C.I.S.D. is doing everything possible to insure a safe working environment for its employees, while reducing the cost of workers' compensation insurance.

Gruver ISD Receives Refund

The Gruver Independent School District was recently awarded a refund of \$5,491.07 from the Texas Public Worker's Compensation Program.

The Texas Public Worker's Compensation Program is a cooperative that was formed with twenty-one similar school districts in 1992, during a time of high worker's compensation premiums.

At the time the cooperative was formed, Gruver ISD paid 75% of what they would have paid in

their former program, thus enjoying a 25% savings up front.

Barry Haenisch, Gruver ISD Superintendent, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Texas Public Worker's Compensation Program, accepted the refund on behalf of Gruver I.S.D.

The refund, which relates to over a 40% savings, was possible through an aggressive loss prevention and claims administration program, and the safety awareness practiced by Gruver I.S.D.'s employees.

Kathy Stedje Memorial Scholarship Established

The Kathy Stedje Memorial Livestock Judging Scholarship has been endowed at Oklahoma Panhandle State University. The scholarship, in an as yet to be determined amount, is named in honor of the late Mary Katheryn Stedje of Gruver.

The scholarship, to be administered by the Panhandle State Foundation, will be awarded to a deserving OPSU agriculture student who is also a participant in the livestock judging program at the university.

Kathy Stedje was a lifelong Gruver resident who passed away

on January 6 of this year. She was a graduate of Gruver High School. Following high school, she received her elementary education degree from OPSU. She taught in the Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District for nine years, twice receiving the Pringle-Morse Teacher of the Year award.

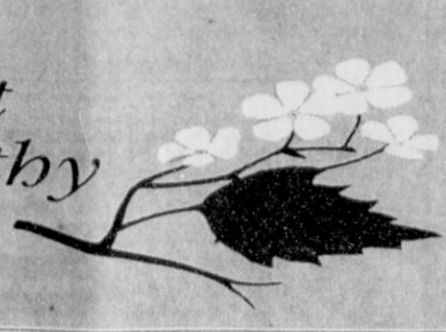

Focus On The Family

QUESTION: You place great stress on the child being taught to respect the authority of the parents. But does that coin have two sides? Don't parents have an equal responsibility to show respect for their children?

DR. DOBSON: They certainly do! A mother cannot require her children to treat her with dignity if she will not do the same for them. She should be gentle with their egos, never belittling them or embarrassing them in front of their friends.

That's why children should not be laughed at unmercifully. Their strong feelings and requests, even if foolish, should be given an honest appraisal by Mom and Dad. They should feel that their parents "really do care about me."

Self-esteem is the most fragile attribute in human nature; it can be damaged by very minor incidents and its reconstruction is often difficult to engineer. A father who is sarcastic and biting in his criticism of children cannot expect to receive genuine respect in return. His offspring might fear him enough to conceal their contempt, but revenge will often erupt in late adolescence.
