

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: Topsoils dried out because of lack of rain and strong winds. Growers started to cut some wheat for hay. Dryland wheat needed moisture, and some irrigated wheat showed signs of disease, but most wheat was in fair to good condition. Corn was 65 percent to 100 percent planted and about 50 percent emerged. Producers started planting sorghum, cotton, peanuts and silage. Rangeland grasses were emerged and growing, providing good grazing for cattle.



Several weeks ago, a by Benton W. story Phillips told to EJ Phillips appeared in the Booker News about a swimming hole outside of Darrouzett. This story was enjoyed and discussed by a lot of Lipscomb County people bringing up stories of their own about old swimming holes in the county.

Harry Zollars recorded one such pond in his column "Memories of the Old Home Town" which he wrote for the Higgins News. In this column, he told of a pond constructed by E.C. Gray about a mile from Higgins 'in a small canyon below a fine spring of sweet water'. Mr. Gray constructed a dam of clay earth thickly faced with native stones and when the spillway was flowing, the water at the dam was about six or eight feet deep. This became a favorite for swimming, diving, float-

ing, etc. for all the children in and around Higgins. The pond also provided a winter skating rink, and the frozen water flowing down from the large spring afforded a coasting area which carried the skaters across the ice to the far side.

On May 3, Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said his office would assist in the oil spill cleanup effort on the Louisiana coast.

"This could be a serious environmental challenge for the Gulf Coast," Patter-son said. The General Land Office sent wildlife rescue specialists and two trailers, one for cleaning oil-soaked wildlife, the other to shelter animals while recovering after they are cleaned.

Oil is gushing from a damaged well head a mile deep in the Gulf of Mexico about 50 miles from the Louisiana shore.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott on May 6 resolved the state's legal acagainst Houston-area wholesale drug distributor that improperly purchased and distributed "misbranded" prescription drugs.

Medical Discount Pharmacy L.P., a state-licensed wholesale drug distributor that warehouses and distributes prescription drugs, under an agreed final judgment negotiated by the Texas Attorney General's Office, must adopt procedures to prevent misbranded or counterfeit pharmaceutical products from being unlawfully distributed to their Texas retail pharmacies.

Funding for school bus

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality on May 3 announced school districts may apply for funds to retrofit older school buses to in order to

reduce air pollution.
About \$1.7 million is available on a first-come, first-served basis. Application deadline is May 31. The funding comes from the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act and is administered through the Texas Clean School Bus program which provides reimbursement to Texas school districts that install pollution-control devices on diesel school buses.

The devices reduce particulate-matter emissions that can aggravate respiratory problems, asthma, and allergies in children who ride the buses.

Senior 4H Livestock Team Completes Spring Season




The February Students of the Month at Spearman High School are seniors, Andi Travis and Dakota Cator.





My Field Check List on Birds of the Texas Panhandle shows the colorful wading bird as abundant in the spring and fall and common in the summer when many nest here. Despite that, I never saw this bird until several years after I married, and then only rarely. Its nice to know they can be seen at the Lake.

With spring, activity has picked up. Jim reported 3 RVs and some tent campers behind the dam, as well as 2 RVs on the office side. The shelter was used for a birthday party

on Sunday. Spearman's first grade had a nice day on Thursday for their annual wellorganized trip out to the Lake. Perryton sent a

group on Friday. David Sloan of Skellytown caught two blue catfish weighing 10.5 and 5 pounds this week. He needed to get to a grandson's ball game and didn't have time to pose for a pic-

Indians of the Pit and Stone Houses

The Indians that lived in our area in their stone and pit houses about A.D. 1200--1400 are known as the Plains Villagers. Archaeologists have learned several things about them, but they still seem in disagreement about where they came from. The people in the pit houses could be different to the ones in the stone houses, but as they seemed to be living side by side at the same period, I will mention things they probably had in com-

mon. When I think of Indians on the Plains, they are magnificent riders on colorful horses, but these In-

806-882-4401 pdra@dishmail.net dians were here before horses had been reintroduced by the Spanish conquistadors. These Indians traveled on foot. Some Indians at this time used dogs as pack animal, but I found nothing to confirm this for these Plains Villagers.

From their arrow points, Washita and Harrell, we know they used bows and arrows to hunt instead of the atlatls of their ancestors. They were able to kill buffalo, deer, and antelope.

They could make cordmarked pottery for storage and cooking. If you check how to make cord-marked pottery on the internet, you can see what an achievement that was.

They had learned to use the wild fruits, seeds, and flowers. Along with the bigger game, they ate fish, shellfish, mussels, frogs, and turtles. There is evidence that they grew corn. We speculate that they also grew squash and peppers. Plum pits were broken open for the seed inside. They ate the tiny seeds from the wild sunflowers. It doesn't sound as if obesity would have been a problem.

Their tools were made mainly from bone and flint, but they included stone metates and manos. For anyone interested, the internet has pictures of the tools and jewelry that have been found in these digs. Two good sources are Courson Archaeological Research and Texas Beyond History.
