Lynx Undefeated District Champs

The Spearman Lynx finished their regular season play with a perfect 10-0 record. This is the first time that the Lynx have accomplished this since 1977.

Last week's win was a hard fought victory over the Stratford Elks. The first half was close and many Lynx fans were anxious when the half ended with the Lynx only up by three, 19-16, but once again, the Spearman team demonstrated an outstanding second half rally. (Ric Smith should patent whatever he tells those boys at halftime.)

When the game ended, the scoreboard read Lynx 41, Stratford 16.

Michael Lusby was forced to watch from the sidelines due to an ankle injury in last week's battle with Canadian. But even injury could not keep him from jumping up and down in celebration of the outstanding play by his team mates.

The Lynx rushed for 267 yards and passed for 120, for a total of 387 yards. Stratford rushed for 72 yards, passed for 164, for a total of 236 yards.

Lynx Players of the Week were Aaron Witten and Aaron Winegarner, offense, and Clancy Vanderburg and Kelsey Henton, defense. Witten and Winegarner both graded 92% on the film.

Aaron Witten had a very strong night, rushing for 186 yards on 23 carries. He caught one pass for a 42-yard touchdown, rushed for one 42-yard touchdown, kicked three extra-points, and passed for one two-point conversion.

Aaron Winegarner had an outstanding night, passing for 117 yards. He completed five of seven attempts, two of which were touchdown passes. He had 29 yards on six carries, scoring a touchdown on one.

Clancy Vanderburg had three unassisted and 11 assisted tackles. Henton had four unassisted tackles, seven assisted tackles, and knocked down one pass.

Carlos Hernandez had three carries for one yard and Dusty Barber had nine carries for 51 yards, and one touchdown.

Landon Miller had two receptions for 38 yards. Brian Black had two receptions for 16 yards, one touchdown and one two-point conversion. Dusty Barber had one reception for 24 yards.

Aaron Witten scored on one rushing touchdown, had one touchdown reception, and scored three extra-point kicks, for 15 points. Carlos Hernandez scored one kick-off return for six points. Dusty Barber scored one rushing touchdown for six points. Brian Black scored one touchdown reception and one two-point reception for eight points. Aaron

Winegarner scored one rushing touchdown for six points.

The Lynx ended their regular season with a total of 3130 rushing yards and 773 passing yards for a total of 3903. They only gave up 556 rushing yards and 613 passing yards, for a total of 1169 to their opponents.

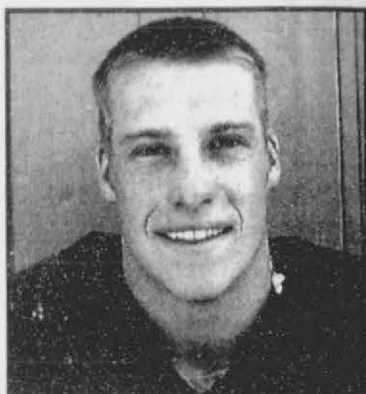
Michael Lusby ended the regular season with 175 carries for 1538 yards; Aaron Witten had 111 carries for 743 yards; Carlos Hernandez had 28 carries for 246 yards; Dusty Barber had 30 carries for 192 yards; Aaron Winegarner had 47 carries for 124 yards; Jordan Brock had eight carries for 12 yards; Casey Villines had 32 carries for 205 yards; and Chuck Grayson had 11 carries for 70 yards.

Aaron Winegarner completed 34 passes on 70 attempts for 796 yards, five interceptions, and 12 touchdowns; Jordan Brock completed two passes on three attempts for 34 yards; and Aaron Witten completed one pass of two attempts for three yards.

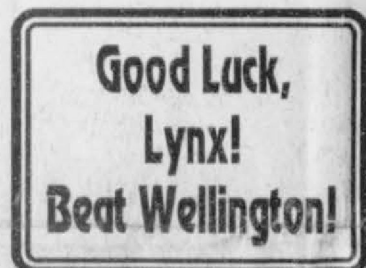
Landon Miller had 10 receptions for 130 yards, three touchdowns, and one extra-point conversion; Aaron Witten had 11 receptions for 247 yards, four touchdowns; Brian Black had six receptions for 145 yards, four touchdowns; Carlos Hernandez had three receptions for 137 yards, one touchdown; Michael Lusby had three receptions for 44 yards; Casey Villines had one reception for 20 yards; Jordan Brock had one reception for 12 yards; and Dusty Barber had one reception for 24 yards.

The Lynx scored a total of 397 points for the year. Michael Lusby scored on 24 running touchdowns, 38 extra-point kicks, one field goal, and one fumble return for 191 points. Aaron Winegarner scored six running touchdowns for 36 points; Brian Black scored on four touchdown receptions and one two-point conversion for 26 points; Aaron Witten scored four extra-point kicks, four touchdown receptions, and five running touchdowns for 58 points; Landon Miller had three touchdown receptions, one two-point conversion, and one fumble return for 26 points; Chuck Grayson scored three running touchdowns and one touchdown interception return for 24 points; Carlos Hernandez scored on one touchdown reception, one running touchdown, and one kick-off return for 18 points; and Casey Villines, Dusty Barber and Jordan Brock each scored on one running touchdown for six points each.

The Lynx will play the Wellington Skyrockets at Canyon High School on Friday, November 13th at 7:30 p.m. in the Bi-District game.

"Nature Tourism" Workshop

Development of "nature tourism" as a sustainable economic approach will be the focus of a November 17-18 workshop in Canadian, hosted by that community's Economic Development Council. Community leaders and business people from surrounding counties in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles are invited to attend and to join in this effort to diversify local economies by taking advantage of the area's natural resources and unique scenic beauty.

Austin consultant Ted Lee Eubanks will lead the two-day workshop, which will be held from 1-5 p.m. on Tuesday and from 9 a.m.-2 p.m. on Wednesday at Canadian's River Valley Pioneer Museum.

Eubanks is the recipient of numerous honors for his achievements in protecting and promoting wildlife opportunities in Texas.

Fermata, Inc., Eubanks' Austin-based firm, coordinates the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail - a \$1.5 million project which ties together 12 different locations over a 500 mile coastal highway trail. Fermata has been involved in assessing the economic impact of outdoor recreation throughout the United States, and is preparing an economic and marketing feasibility study for the proposed World Birding Center in South Texas.

Internationally, Fermata has completed projects in Mexico, Belize and Panama. As a result, Eubanks frequently speaks and conducts workshops on nature-based tourism and its economic potential.

Eubanks has served as a member of the Governor's Task Force on

Texas Nature Tourism and is a founding member of the board of directors of the Texas Nature Tourism Association. He has been recently named to serve as a member of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Landowner Incentive Program Steering Committee, a program to help support landowners who wish to enhance their properties for endangered or threatened species.

"By the year 2000, the largest industry in Texas is expected to be tourism - already a \$23 billion per year industry and rapidly expanding," said Canadian's Community Development Director Remelle Farrar. "Nature tourism is the fastest growing segment of the tourist industry, averaging a 30% annual increase each year since 1987.

"On a local scale, that breaks down to \$50 per day per visitor on food, lodging and travel items, with an additional \$200 spent for 'shopping' on a typical two-day visit," she concluded.

"Nature tourists are mostly from the city, mostly well-educated and well-off, and are tired of stress and traffic and just want to get away," Eubanks explained. Ms. Farrar said that several studies of nature tourists support her belief that the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles offer "exactly what they are looking for: to experience nature, to be physically active, and to meet people who live in the area."

Among the top attractions for those travelers are pretty scenery, wilderness, birds and wildlife, trees and wildflowers, streams and rural areas. "Wildlife management areas, such as the one we have at Gene Howe," Farrar said, "offer some of

the best birding and wildlife viewing in the world."

The November 17-18 workshop will be aimed at teaching business people, landholders, community leaders and agency employees how to build on those assets to attract visitors to this area. This will not be a theory-only seminar. Eubanks will lead a working session, presenting his research and then help interested parties develop a working plan with specific guidelines and goals.

The Economic Development Council has invited residents of Hansford, Lipscomb, Wheeler, Roberts, Ochiltree and Gray

counties in the Texas Panhandle, and residents of Ellis, Rogers, Mills and Harper counties in Oklahoma.

In addition to the Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning sessions, an informal dinner and discussion will be held at Paula's Restaurant on Tuesday evening. There is no charge for attendance at the workshop for dinner, but those who are interested in attending are asked to contact the Canadian-Hemphill County Chamber of Commerce office at (806) 323-6234 to reserve a spot, or to obtain more information.

Homestead Windbreaks

On a farm or ranch, homestead windbreaks determine where the production land ends and the homestead or "yard" begins. For Hansford County landowners, such windbreaks establish more than a living boundary, they also provide protection for the residence.

Seedlings to create windbreaks, produced by the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery in Lubbock, are now available for order through the Hansford County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD). Stock is limited and landowners are encouraged to order trees as soon as possible, says a Texas Forest Service official.

Farmstead windbreaks, when planted 100 feet from a homestead or ranch headquarter, block hot, dry summer winds and in the winter,

cold and possibly snow-driven gusts, depending on the region. "As a result, windbreaks increase a residence's heating and cooling efficiency," says Robert Fewin, Texas Forest Service forester in Lubbock. Multiple row breaks also add natural beauty, privacy and value to a homestead, and act as a sound barrier to highway or farm road traffic, he adds.

To ensure maximum performance Fewin recommends a four-row farmstead windbreak: an outside shrub row, providing low density protection; two interior evergreen rows, supplying year round security; and an inside tall deciduous row, extending the zone of protection.

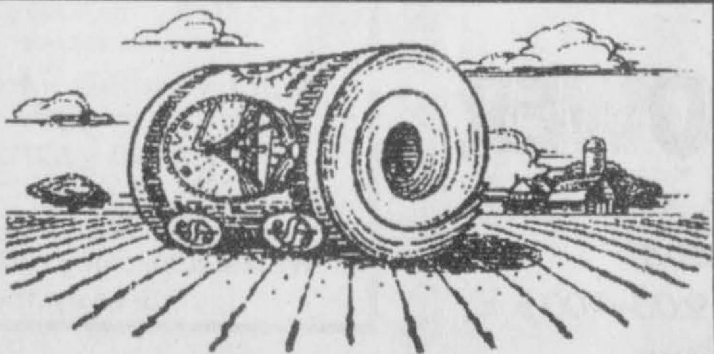

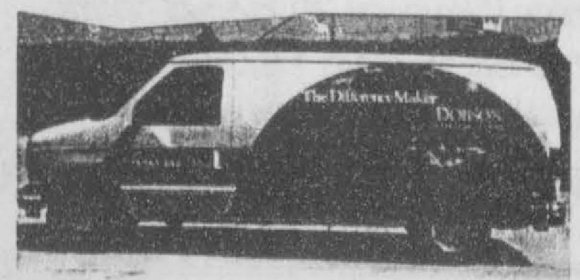

Each tree row within a homestead windbreak plays a unique and yet concerted role in the life and effectiveness of the break.

The interior evergreen rows, which are the backbone of windbreaks, create year-round surveillance and foliage for up to seventy-five years or more. Fewin says. The deciduous tree row, which produces a tall barrier quicker than the evergreens, provides earlier protection and also extends the maximum zone of protection of the lee side. And for landowners desiring wildlife, the shrubs produce fruit, cover and browse habitat.

In regions where heavy snow fall is a threat a north-side shrub row

planted 40 feet from the main windbreak will prevent snow build-up against the house and along the entry-way leading up to the house or headquarter.

To create a farmstead windbreak this spring, order windbreak seedlings through the Hansford County SWCD at 909 W 9th Street in Spearman or call (806) 659-2330.

The SWCD will have "Earth Mat" available for 1999 plantings. This fabric will help control weeds, conserve the needed moisture for the tree seedlings, greatly decrease maintenance and helps the survival rate of the trees. It will be available in 6 foot width in 100 foot lengths. Ask about this material, when ordering your trees.

Spearman City Council Met

In the regular monthly meeting of the Spearman City Council, consideration was given to a joint dispatch system between Hansford and Moore County Sheriffs Departments. Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and Moore County Sheriff Ted Montgomery were present to answer council questions, but no action was taken.

Patrick, who stated this policy has been abused, proposed changing the wording to read "If the Traveler does not turn in a meal receipt, then the \$5 meal allowance will only be allowed at the discretion of the City Manager."

Another proposed amendment concerned the expenditure accounting. In order to receive reports of expenditures in a reasonable time, Patrick proposed adding "Expense reports are to be submitted to City Hall within five days of return, unless an extension is approved by the City Manager."

During executive session, a motion made by Ron Antalek was passed unanimously that the City Manager's salary be increased by 5% and his car allowance be increased by fifty dollars (\$50) per month.

The meeting adjourned at 9:19 p.m.





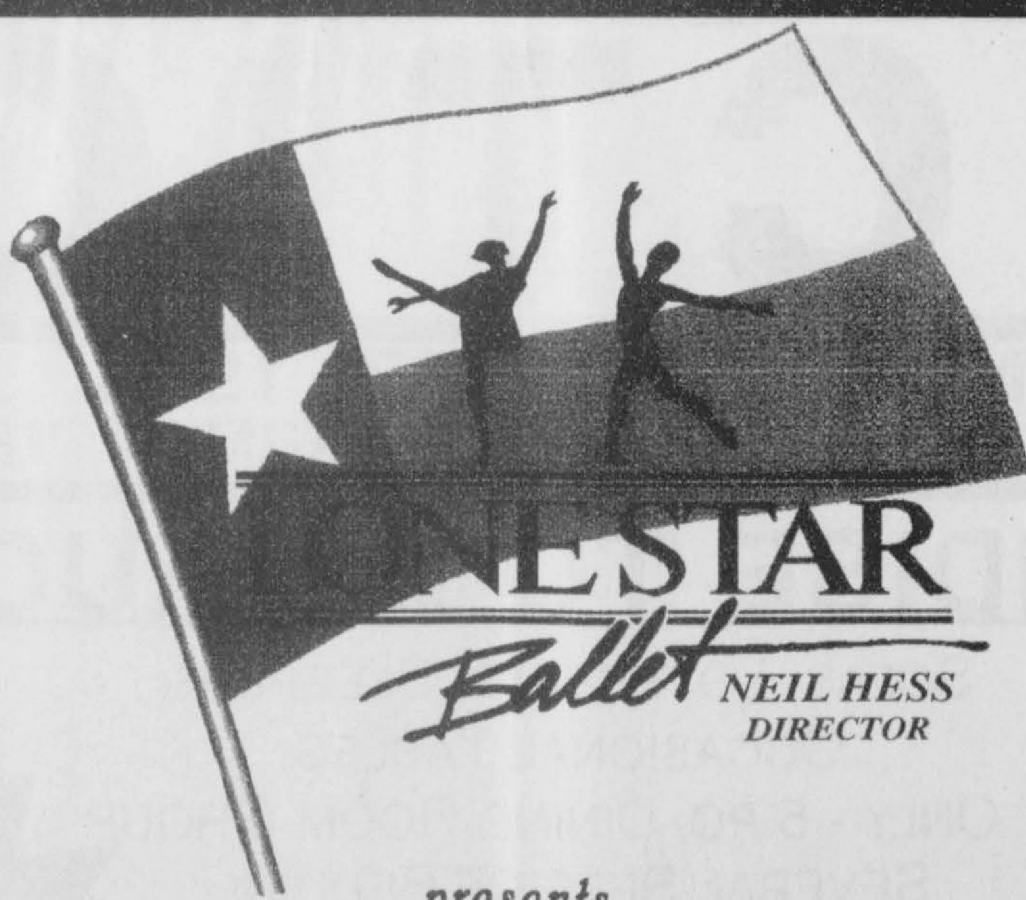
