Hansford County Junior Livestock Show & Premium Sale Entries up for Feb. 11 and 12 show

Exhibitors are putting the finishing touches on their show animals as everyone gets ready for the Hansford County Junior Livestock Show and Premium Sale February 11 and 12 at the Gruver County Barn.

According to the extension office the number of exhibitors in each of the categories is up. They are expecting 115 pigs, 70 lambs and 23 steers to be shown in the various classes. This is up from the 100 pigs, 56 lambs and 22 steers exhibited in the show last year.

Clubs and chapters participating in the livestock show include Gruver FFA, Gruver 4-H, Spearman FFA, Spearman 4-H and Morse 4-H.

Weigh-in for steers, lambs and companion lambs is scheduled from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Friday, Feb. 11. Swine will be weighing at 6 p.m. or immediately following the lamb show.

The show schedule begins at 12 noon with the grand opening. At this time all directors, ag teachers, county agents, FFA chapter presidents, 4-H club chairman and FFA sweethearts are to report to the arena.

Judging will begin with the steer show at noon. The lamb show is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m. or immediately following the steer show.

Activities for Saturday kickoff with the swine show at 8 a.m. At 1 p.m. the judging contest will be held. The show will be concluded at 6:30 p.m. with floor prices being auctioned.

An awards presentation is scheduled. Immediately following the presentation of awards the auction sale of lambs, swine and steers will be held. Livestock will be sold in order of one lamb, one swine, one steer, etc.

County financial institutions urge caution when claiming prizes

Editors Note: This is a public service announcement from your area financial institutions, First National Bank, First State Bank, Interstate Savings & Loan, all of Spearman, and Gruver State Bank of Gruver.

It has been brought to the banks attention that some of their customers have been contacted by different companies and are being told they have won a prize. The company then asks the customer for their checking account number and the bank's routing number in order

to charge their account for a certain amount to insure the receipt of the prize.

These people may also ask for a credit card number to charge. The financial institutions of Hansford County urge everyone to please be aware and very cautious to NEVER give your account number or credit card number to anyone over the phone under these circumstances.

Banking officials explain that if you have won a legitimate prize you will NEVER be required to send any money or have the need to give them your account number or credit

card number. On occasions you might be contacted by mail and either be requested to call the company to claim your prize or they may call you at a later date. Here again you are cautioned to be extremely careful not to reveal any of your account numbers to them.

"We want to protect our customers by issuing this urgent message to all the people in our area," bank officials stated. If you have any questions concerning this announcement please contact your financial institution.

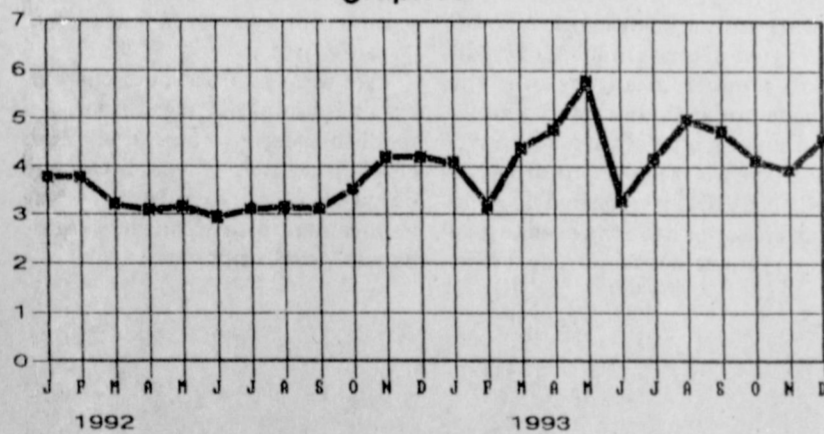

Gas Bills

This time of year, many Spearman residents get a big increase in their utility bills, particularly their gas bill. Much of this increase is because residents use more gas to keep their homes warm and because of increases in the price of gas. When the weather turns cold, gas furnaces work harder to keep homes at the desired temperature. Even though thermostats are set at a constant temperature, when the outside temperature goes down the furnace needs to use more gas to make the same amount of heat.

Gas prices have a big impact on your utility bill. The increase in gas prices is because of increased demands for natural gas. As the chart shows, gas prices have increased over the past couple of years:

In January, we charged \$4.58 per thousand cubic feet of gas. Out of the amount, \$3.58 went to the City's gas supplier and \$1.00 went to the City. By comparison, in January, 1993 we charged \$4.20 for each located at the courthouse and at the landfill. The recycling centers thousand cubic feet of gas.

There are several ways to lower your gas bill. The following ideas may help: clean or replace the filter on your gas furnace; oil or grease the motors, blowers and other movable parts of your furnace; remove dirt or objects from around the radiator and/or vents; lower the thermostat to 55 degrees at night and 65 degrees during the day; let the sun help heat your home by opening curtains on sun-facing windows (close the curtains at night); use extra blankets on your bed and wear sweaters or sweatshirts around the house; close the doors to rooms that you do not go into very often; and, insulate your wa-

ter heater (there are a variety of water heater blankets at different stores).

Recycling

The city has contracted with C.E.G. Industries of Borger to start picking up items at the recycling centers. The recycling centers are will take the following items: plastic soda bottles and plastic milk bottles (with the tops removed); aluminum drink cans; and, glass food containers. We can also take paper such as:

white : such as typing paper, computer, notebook (without the binder), adding machine tape, plain envelopes (without windows or labels), and copy paper.

colored : such as bond/ledger paper, typing, computer, copy or adding machine paper. We cannot take fluorescent paper.

newspapers and anything that comes with the newspaper.

The recycling centers cannot take the following items: any plastics other than soda bottles or milk jugs that have the tops removed; petroleum products such as used oil, oil filters, etc.; paint; and, household chemicals. We cannot take the following kinds of paper: sticky notes, wax paper, wallpaper, binders, adhesive labels, envelopes with windows or labels, grocery bags, cardboard, boxes, cereal boxes, blueprints, copy paper wrappers, carbon paper or any paper that has been touched by food.

I hope every citizen and business will begin a recycling program and make recycling in Spearman a success.

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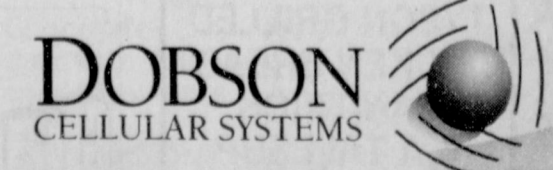

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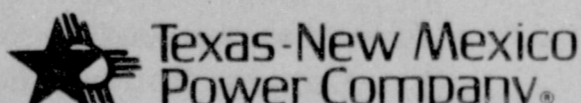
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Lynxettes clinch playoff spot; Lynx hopes of playoff spot fading

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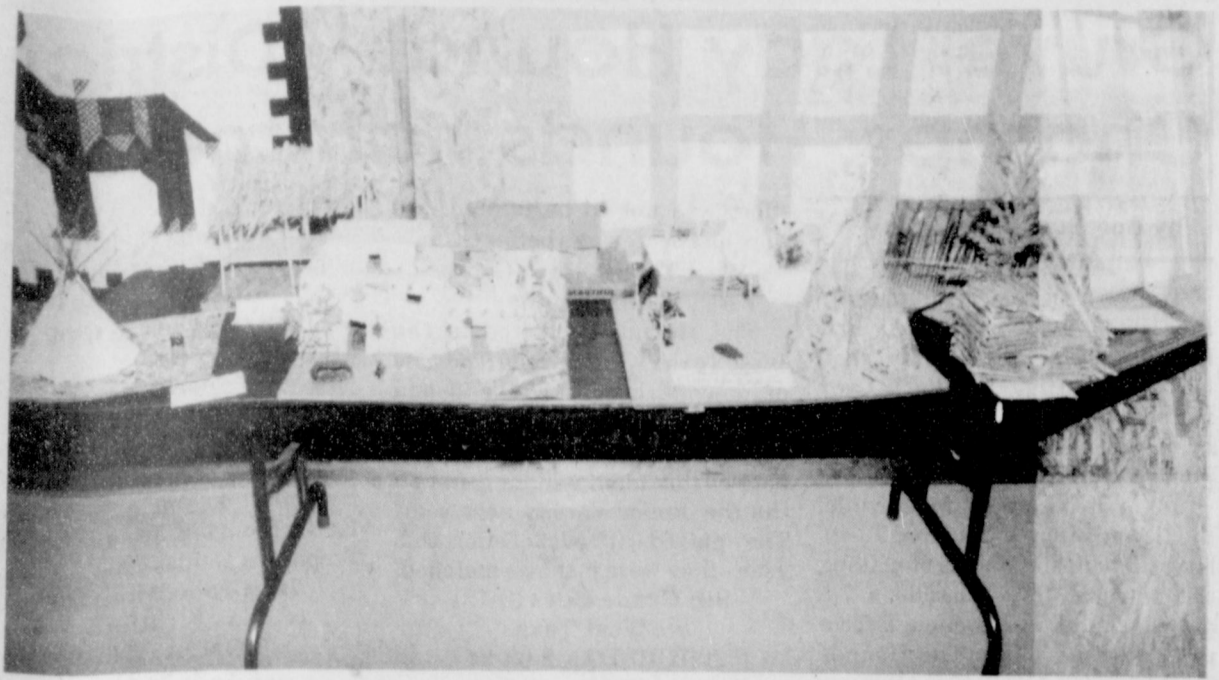

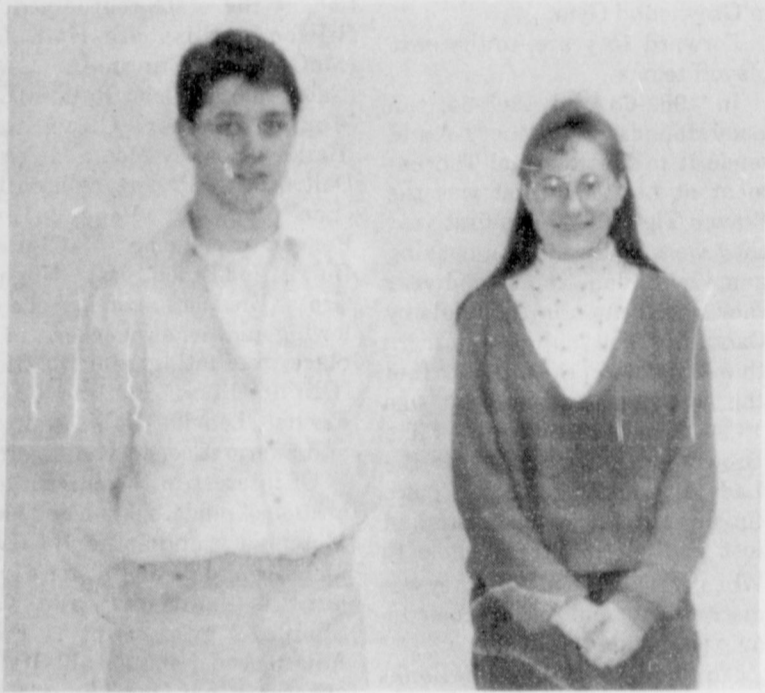

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
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
