

Texas Crop & Weather

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: The northwest portion of the region received another 6 to 8 inches of wet snow, bringing their winter total to 40 to 45 inches. Soil moisture levels in most of the region were better than in previous years. Some field work was done on wheat that dried out some. Only light insect activity was reported. Some cattle were removed from wheat fields and placed on other grazing fields and pastures. Rangeland cool-season grasses emerged, and it was expected that warmer grasses should coming out of dormancy soon. Until then, most producers were still feeding from hay stocks, which were becoming very low. Cattle were generally in good condition.



75th Anniversary of Black Sunday to be Remembered at Symposium

On Sunday afternoon, April 14, 1935, a black blizzard that blotted out the sun hit the Great Plains with the biggest impact being felt in the Oklahoma Panhandle. Find out what that was like by attending the Dust Bowl Symposium planned for Guymon, Ok Friday and Saturday, April 9-10.

When that storm hit people scrambled indoors or into their storm cellars. Many thought it was the end of the world. Cars were stranded on the roads due to poor visibility or dust smothering the engines. People caught outside became disoriented and day turned to night; the event has become known as Black Sunday.

The day after Black Sunday, an Associated Press reporter used the term "Dust Bowl" for the first time. "Three little words achingly familiar on the Western farmer's tongue, rule life in the dust bowl of the continent - if it rains." The term stuck and was used by radio reporters and writers, in private letters and public

Seventy-five years later, the memories of the Dust Bowl still define the Panhandle area, and to commemorate the event planners are bringing to Guymon "Drought, Displacement and Determination: A Dust Bowl Symposium." The two-day event will allow survivors to re-

call what it was like and others to hear speakers who talk about the major impact the Dust Bowl had on area residents. Generous funding for the event has been provided by the Oklahoma Humanities

The movie "The Grapes of Wrath" and the documentary "The Plow that Broke the Plains" will be presented at the Northridge 8 Cinema in Guymon at 3 p.m. for the Depression-era price of 35-cents in order for everyone to see the portrayal of "Okies" by Hollywood and learn how plowing up the Great Plains led to an ecological disaster.

Saturday events will take place at Draper Farms west of Guymon. Signs along Highway 54 will direct attendees to the site. Events will take place all day and there is no admission charge. Attendees may come for all or part of the events. At 8:30 a.m. everyone is invited to gather and enjoy Dust Bowl images and memories. Major funding for this event is provided by the Oklahoma Humanities

There will be an open microphone during periods throughout the day facilitated by Dr. Sara Jane Richter, head of the humanities department at OPSU. Richter will give her well-researched talk, "Down and Dirty, But Not Out: Women of the High Plains During the Dust Bowl" at 11

a.m. This talk has been well-received at venues such as the Kansas Library Convention and involved hundreds of interviews with women who survived the Dust Bowl in Oklahoma, Kansas and Col-


Richter is also the author of a readers' theatre production to be presented at 3:45 p.m., If Only It'd Rain . Cast will include Dr. Wayne Stewart of Goodwell, Dr. Brad Duren of Guymon, Kevin and Debbie Richter of Hennessey and the author herself. Dr. Matthew Saunders of OPSU has composed a musical score that will accompany the production.

The Saturday events will kick off at 9 a.m. when former Guymon mayor Jess Nelson will give the welcome and introduce Dr. Paul Bonnifield, author of The Dust Bowl: Men, Dirt and Depression. Bonnifeld will speak on the topic "The Days of the Dust Bowl" at 9:10 a.m.

Food will be available for purchase at noon catered by a local church followed by activities for school-age children arranged by the Texas County 4-Hers and Girl Scouts.

Other speakers for the day include Gary McManus of the Oklahoma Climatological Survey, Steve Drillette of the National Weather Service, Rod Wanger, Oklahoma CRP Program Director, Dr. Pauline Hodges and Mark Harrison, Oklahoma Conservation Commission. A free soup line supper will be held at 5:30 p.m. followed by a talk by Dr. Guy Logsdon on "Music in Oklahoma in the 1930s." Logsdon will also lead a gospel sing-along. The evening will end with dancing at 8 p.m.

Spearman City Secretary, Cheryl Gibson-Salgado reported that Brain Gillispie had filed for re-election as Mayor, and Aldermen Charles Elliott and Jon Garnett filed for re-election as well. Since they have no opposition, there

will be no need for a city election. Gruver School Board members, Jeff Purvines, Jeff Graves and Curt Fitzgearld filed for their positions. Since no others filed, there will be no need

Incumbents Bob Boxwell, Dr. Mark Garnett and Will Jarvis were the only indidates to file for the Spearman School Board.

All of these candidates will be installed for their new term in May. Since Morse is not an incorporated city, Pringle-Morse CISD will hold their elections in the fall with the county.



I hope that each of you will join the Spearman Ministerial Alliance as we present Holy Week Services at the First Baptist Church Family Living Center at noon each day of Holy Week. Soup, Sandwiches, Dessert and Gospel!

We prepare to celebrate the Season of Easter by studying, Isaiah 65: 17-25, Psalm 118: 1-2,14-24, Acts 10: 34-43, and John 20: 1-18.

Isaiah brings hope to the people as he announces that the Lord is creating a new heaven and a new earth. God's new creation is similar to his creation of Eden; peace shall reign. No more shall the sound of weeping or the cry of distress be heard. God promises to answer the peoples' prayers before they ask! Man is once again in a right relationship with God and is blessed.

We repeat last week's psalm with a different emphasis. The Psalmist praises God's steadfast love, God's salvation. The Psalmist has been punished severely, but God has sustained him. The Psalmist sings, "This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Peter is visiting the house of the Roman centurion, Cornelius. Peter's sermon outline is: 1) Jesus was sent by God, because of God's love for us; 2) Jesus worked a healing ministry while on earth; 3) Jesus was crucified because of the sins of others; 4) Jesus rose again from the dead; 5) Peter the preacher and the teacher is a witness of the Resurrection. In this early sermon, we learn that through God's grace we achieve faith in Christ Jesus; we learn that we become a part of his church through baptism; we experience that Jesus Christ has forgiven our sins.

John shows us the resurrection of our Lord. The miracle is not the empty tomb, but the encounter of Mary Magdalene with the Living Lord! It was a custom in Palestine for mourners to visit the tomb of a loved one for three days after the body had been placed in tomb. In the fourth watch of the night (3 a.m. to 6 a.m.) Mary Magdalene goes to the tomb of Jesus. Mary is distressed believing that someone has stolen Jesus' body. She runs to inform Peter and John. John reaches the tomb first, bends down and observes the linen body wrappings just lying there. Peter on his arrival, enters the tomb and also sees the linen wrappings lying there with the head cloth rolled up in a place by itself. John then entered the tomb and believed in the resurrection. Peter and John return home. Mary Magdalene stays, weeping outside the tomb. She looks in and sees two angels who ask her why she is weeping. She says, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him. Jesus then asks her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" Mary at first does not recognize Jesus, she is crying and expected to see his dead body. Jesus says, "Mary!" Mary then recognizes Jesus. Jesus tells her not to be afraid and to go and inform his disciples. Mary returns to the disciples saying, "I have seen the Lord!" Dear Christian, we who believe are those who have seen the Lord. It is wonderful that the first to see the risen Lord was one who was marginalized in her society. The first evangelist was a woman!

May the Holy Spirit enable you to 'see the Risen Lord'



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

How We Are Managing Water In The Northern Panhandle

By Danny Krienke. President of the North Plains Groundwater Conservation District Board of Directors

North Plains Groundwater Conservation District is all about depletion management. What does that mean? Basically, it means that the Ogallala is a mined aquifer; more water is taken out than is being replaced by rainfall recharge. Does that mean that the aquifer is going to completely dry up? The answer is no. Does that mean that we can continue to have irrigation agriculture as it is today? The an-

swer is no. At some time in the future the 95-percent of the water currently being used today by irrigation agriculture will have to slow down, either by groundwater policy and regulation, or if we do nothing, by the aquifer itself. Our job is depletion management. We have to balance the management of current use against future needs, while not by putting people out of business today. If irrigation were to stop completely, we could have aquifer sustainability, because we would eliminate 95-percent of the usage. The remaining 5-percent is less than the amount the aquifer recharges annually, but some estimates put the economic impact of irrigation in the Panhandle-Plains region at more than \$2 billion annually. So, you see the job is not easy. serve, whereby unused It is a delicate balancing

So how do we do it?

One of the strategies that works for me and my neighbors in our water conservation district is communication. We go out to the public and hold stakeholder town hall meetings across the District. The staff provides background information and technical analysis. Board members participate by answering questions, discussing any proposed rules and regulations and discussing how these proposals will affect the regulated public, including the board mem-

bers themselves. It is a two-way street. During these town hall meetings we also receive input back from stakeholders. We don't have all the answers. The livelihood of these producers depends on this water, so they understand the need for conservation. We are in this together. The producers understand the need for regulations and rules. They simply ask us to treat everyone equally. Our job is not to pick winners and losers. It doesn't matter if they are agricultural, municipal, industry, or exporters for that matter; everyone desires and deserves to be treated the

So how do we do that?

In 2005, after town hall meetings across the District and over two years of discussion, the Board set the first allowable production at two acre-feet per acre. We told the public at that time that we thought it was a reasonable requirement for a period of time, not less than five years.

Then along came HB

1763, joint planning, Desired Future Conditions (DFC's), Groundwater Availability Model (GAM) Runs and Managed Available Groundwater (MAG 's). We started another round of town hall meetings in 2008, 7 meetings across the District in total. Over 350 people attended including farmers, ranchers, businessmen, professionals, city managers and people representing a wide range of interests across the District. We explained the DFC process and listened to what people had to say. What came out of those discussions was an understanding that we needed more conservation and a possible cutback from the initial allowable production of 2 acre-feet per acre to 1.5 acre-feet.

The public asked us to give them time to make changes and flexibility in the way the new allowable production would be implemented. The resulting plan will cut the allowable production by 25-percent to 1.5 acre-feet by 2012, and will set up a water rewater may be saved for use within the following

two-year period. What is the next step? I call it irrigate to policy. What does that mean? Irrigation to policy simply means using irrigation practices that meet the current rules and requirements you operate under. For example, in our District, 80% of the irrigated water is used on a corn and wheat rotation. Remember earlier I told you that it is not our desire to pick winners and losers by regulation. So, what if the policy was one acre-foot? What can a producer do with that and still farm the crop he wants to raise and still remain profitable? We have directors on our board who believe a realistic goal for us is to grow 200 bushels of corn on twelve inches of applied

irrigation water. We need some answers. So beginning with the 2010 crop year, our board has directed staff to set up whole field demonstrations to find out if that goal is achievable and profitable. Leon New, irrigation consultant and retired irrigation specialist with AgriLife Extension, has agreed to work with our staff and Board to complete this important task. While the staff is pursuing funding to reimburse cooperating producers for reduced yields, myself and other members of the Board have committed our own acres to the project, without guaranteed reimbursement for losses. We believe in this project and what it could mean for the people of our area.

In addition to the field demonstrations, the District is also cooperating with Texas AgriLife Research to conduct reduced irrigation research at the North Plains Research Farm near Etter. The research project will test a range of irrigation levels, hybrids and seed populations to provide important data related to reduced irrigation and corn. We will be keeping the public informed of the progress and will probably be asking some of you for your help and guidance as we move forward with these imporments.

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Census Vital to Farmers, Ranchers and Rural America

Rick Hargrove, Executive Director for USDA's Farm Service Agency in Hansford County, announced today that FSA has teamed up with the U.S. Census Bureau to encourage all farmers and ranchers to complete the 2010 census.

"I believe rural America is the heart and the soul and the guts of America. And, I believe that we have to start paying real attention to our farm families and to those who live in rural America if we want to preserve that value system," said Hargrove. "So, it's important for us to figure out new strategies and different strategies and expanded strategies for bringing prosperity back to the farm, prosperity back to the ranch, and prosperity back to rural communities.'

These strategies begin with the completion of the census forms, which were mailed in March to all residents in the United States and Puerto Rico. The among the 50 states. forms are comprised of 10 questions and take only 10 minutes to complete and mail back in the postagepaid envelope. The questions include names of residents, ages, sex, date. of birth, race, relationship to the head of the household, whether the resident rents or owns and a telephone number should the Census Bureau have any questions.

Having everyone counted is critical to the security of rural communities and will ensure that the more than \$400 billion in federal funding will be allocated to these communities annually to support schools, broadband initiatives, hospitals, emergency services and public works projects.

The census, which is taken every 10 years, is also used to determine the number of seats a state has in the House of Representatives and to apportion representatives equally

The need for rural America to be counted in the census has grown since it was first implemented in 1790. Back then, the 13 original states had a population of 3.6 million, with 94.9 percent living in rural areas. By 1990, that number significantly decreased to 24 percent of the population living in rural areas.

Yet, according to Hargrove it is the farmers and ranchers who are the backbone of rural America and provide the food, fiber and water that is essential to all Americans, whether they live in rural, urban or sub-

"This prosperity starts by each farmer and rancher completing the 2010 Census," said Hargrove. It's not only the law, but an avenue used to help revive America's farm, food and values. Everyone needs to be

counted."

Food-borne illnesses affecting an establishment are estimated to cost thousands of dollars in lost wages, insurance and medical bills, Redwine said.



Anderson, Willimon Participate in 21st Annual Bataan Memorial Death March

On Sunday, March 21, 2010, Taos Anderson and Connor Willimon of Boy Scout Troop 551 of Spearman, along with their adult leaders, Kimberly Anderson and Mikal Willimon, participated in the 21st an-Death March at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico.

The Bataan Memorial Death March honors a special group of World War II heroes. These brave soldiers were responsible for the defense of the islands of Luzon, Corregidor and the harbor defense forts of the Philippines.

The conditions they encountered and the aftermath of the battle were unique. They fought in a malaria-infested region, surviving on half or quarter rations with little or no medical help. They fought with outdated equipment and virtually no air power.

On April 9, 1942, tens of thousands of American and Filipino soldiers were surrendered to Japanese forces. The Americans were Army, Army Air Corps, Navy and Marines. Among those seized were members of the 200th Coast Artillery, New Mexico National Guard. The Texas Panhandle area was also represented in the Death March. Leroy Sheets, a native of Spearman, died in a prisoner of war camp in the Phillipines after enduring the Houston Death March.

They were marched for Meet, Bushland days in the scorching heat through the Philippine jungles. Thousands died due to the horrific conditions that included extreme heat and humidity, malaria, malnutrition, thirst and atrocities inflicted by their Japanese captors. Many were simply bayoneted and left to suffer and die. Those who survived faced the hardships of a prisoner of war camp. Others were wounded or killed when unmarked enemy ships transporting prisoners of war to Japan were sunk by U.S. air and naval forces.

The Bataan Memorial Death March is a challenging march through the high desert terrain of White Sands Missile Range, N.M., conducted in honor of the heroic service members who defended the Philippine Islands during World War II, sacrific-

ing their freedom, health and, in many cases, their very lives.

The Spearman Scouts and Scouters completed the 26.2 mile course in about nine hours. They were among just over nual Bataan Memorial 5,700 participants repre-

senting all fifty states and eight foreign countries. Approximately 85% of the participants are members of the military. The start of the race is marked by an opening ceremony that includes a roll call of Bataan survivors present at the race and Bataan survivors who have died since the last race was held. Taps was played at the end of the roll call. This year there were three Bataan survivors present at the race and the Scouts were able to shake their hands and express their gratitude for the sacrifice they made. The opening ceremony concluded with a cannon shot and a fly over of two United States Air Force, F-22 Raptors.

Cougar Kills Calf After a suggestion that I should call Gary Woolley for a "big cat story", I did. His story follows.

Three weeks ago, Gary checked his cows on his farm, which lies east of the Park and on the Hansford-Ochiltree line. When he saw a dead baby calf with

its shoulder torn into on down to the rib cage, he knew immediately what had happened. It didn't take the lion tracks to tell him. He had been there before. Three years ago he had lost 3 baby calves to a cougar. Last year he has lost 2. The losses usually happened when there was snow or the ground was muddy. Tracks were clear and big.

Gary had called a government trapper for help, but the man said he would be unable to help. The lion would be gone and probably not back in the area for 22 days. It was impossible to bait a trap and catch one that way. Cougars prefer to make a fresh kill, although at times they will eat on a fresh deer kill from a road accident.

Gary has yet to see a cougar. From their home on the Palo Duro Creek, north of the golf course, he has twice heard the hairraising scream of a female cougar.
