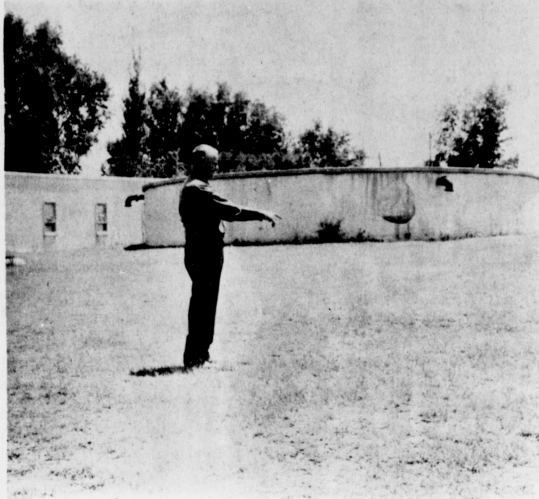

Noted Church Leader

Mrs. Verney Towns Services Held in First Baptist Church

Mrs. Verney Towns, prominent citizen and dedicated worker in the First Baptist Church died at 1:15 p.m. Thursday in Lubbock Methodist Hospital following an extended illness.

Funeral services were held at 4:30 p.m. Saturday, July 29 in the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Don Murray, pastor, officiating. Interment was in Bailey County Memorial Park under direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

Mrs. Towns, 49, was born August 21, 1917. She and Towns were married December 24, 1932 in Lamesa as moveshere from Lamesa in 1949.

In addition to her church work on the local level, she was active and well-known for services rendered on the state and national level.

She was member of the board of trustees of Wayland Baptist College. She was named to

the board to serve this two-year term at the General Convention of Texas Baptists held at Corpus Christi.

In 1963, she and her husband participated in the "New Life Movement" in Japan, as representatives of the First Baptist Church. She has served as president of the First Baptist Women's Missionary Union, president of the District Nine WMU for three years and served three years as vice president of the Texas WMU and president of Llanos Altos Association. After their trip to the Orient, the Towns sponsored an international student from Nigeria at Wayland. She was also chairman of the hospitality committee for "Women for Wayland."

In 1963, an outstanding tribute was paid to Mrs. Towns as the women who compose District Nine named their newly constructed lodge near Floydada Baptist Encampment the "Mona Towns Lodge." In the bestowing of this tribute the honor read: "This is an outstanding tribute to a great christian woman and is rather

unusual to receive such an honor after one year of leadership as president of the District WMU. But to those who know her and worked with her recognize her as an unusual person.

Of the tribute, the local First Baptist Church officials said "Mrs. Towns, you have brought honor to our church through your outstanding leadership here as well as in the district and around the world. Your consecration and dedication to the Master's Work is a constant inspiration to all of us."

Survivors are her husband, Verney; one daughter, Mrs. Marion Inman, Clovis; one son, Jim, Nacogdoches; her mother, Mrs. Mallie Hancock, Lamesa; five sisters, Mrs. Loretta Linguist, Arlington, Va. Mrs. Gilbert Holladay, Lamesa, Mrs. Dayle Rasberry, Washington, D.C., Mrs. William Scoggin, San Antonio and Mrs. Herschel Pruitt, Lubbock; four brothers, Hazel Hancock, Marton; J.A. Seventeen cases have been heard in County Court.

Rayford Fred Wilkerson plead guilty to a charge of driving while intoxicated, was fined \$200, plus court costs, and given 20 days in jail.

All Schools Registration Slated

There is always fewer summer jobs for youths in town than there are youths for summer jobs... thus the youths who need or want a job for either money, experience or a desire to be busy and useful can find them here in the Muleshoe area.

Oh yes, the work is hard and the weather hot, but the self satisfaction of knowing one has done something constructive for themselves is all important toward building a future.

Impress to work is one thing always sought by employers in the future.

The area around Harlingen is an example of how the youths combined their united work effort, enjoyed themselves while doing so, made money for themselves and helped to keep tomatoes on the market and on the road to canning companies.

In Harlingen, workmen were desperately needed for this work and two Kiwanis Clubs banded together and started a "Workarama." Teenagers called in to list their names as willing workers, farmers furnished transportation and soon there was no problem.

Tomatoes is not the problem here, but cucumber picking and impress to work is one thing always sought by employers in the future.

Farmers Warned to Watch Fields as Midge Increases

Sorghum midge emergence from Johnsongrass has increased once more during the past week and farmers in the immediate area surrounding Muleshoe are strongly advised to watch for this small damaging insect continuously.

Nearly Lamb County is reporting 36 midge in 25-head Johnsongrass samples which shows the sorghum midge on a very active increase. Several samples have been taken from the grain sorghum, as well as Johnsongrass, and an increase has also been noted among the crop samples.

Adult midge activity has not been noted in the field, however with the emergence in the samples increasing, all fields of grain sorghum which are blooming now or will soon be blooming should be inspected for midge activity.

Lyn county leads in midge activity in grain sorghum with 27 midge per 25-head sample and that county is followed by Lubbock with 26 and Floyd with 24.

This testing data includes Monday's records of increased activity of the midge.

Other insect populations have increased over the past few days in several counties, however the only others which show an increase is the Fleabopper. Light infestations are showing in Bailey County as well as Yoakum, Lamb, Garza, Lynn, Gaines, Cottle, Hale, Lubbock, and Terry counties.

Playday Set By Saddle Club

The Cochran County 4-H Saddle Club will sponsor an area playday on August 5, 1967, beginning at 10 a.m. at the Morton Rodeo Grounds. Events will include Barrels Flag Race, Ribbon Race, Pole Bending and Keyhole.

There will be three different age groups: PeeWees, 11 years or younger, Juniors, 12 through 14, and Seniors, 15 through 18. Boys and Girls will be separated.

There will be six high point individual trophies given, two in each age group. Ribbons will be given through fourth place, high point club trophy will also be given.

Entry fee will be two dollars for all events or fifty cents per event. Entries will be taken until 10 a.m. on August 5.

In the Flag Race only one flag will be used. The rider will ride to the end of the arena, pick up his flag and ride back.

Poles will be run around six poles, twenty-one feet apart.

The women play each Tuesday and Thursday and the small girls Wednesday and Friday.



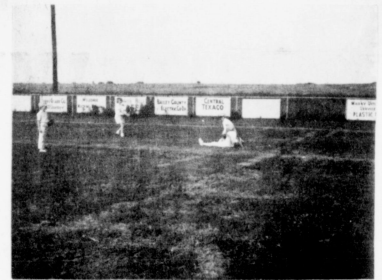
