

Alternative plan suggested...

Water treatment discussed

Spearman's wastewater treatment plant was the subject of one agenda item at the Spearman City Council's Jan. 15 meeting.

Dwight Brandt of Brandt Engineers Inc. from Amarillo attended the meeting and gave the council an update summary of the plans and specifications for a temporary wastewater treatment plant. He said the Water Commission rules have changed since the preliminary plans were originated, and suggested an alternative plan.

Jim Murray, city manager, told council members that due to the pending rate case with Texas-New Mexico Power Co., electrical rates could rise dramatically. He explained that power costs to the city could make operation of the city's present wastewater treatment system too expensive. Murray said it could be economically feasible to change to a lagoon-type system for treatment of the city's wastewater.

He suggested the council take a "wait and see" approach before making a decision on the final plans and specifications for a wastewater treatment system. He also suggested that the council consider having Brandt perform a feasibility study for Spearman to have a lagoon system type of wastewater plant.

After discussion, the council voted to table the item until a later date.

In other business, the council awarded a contract to Brandt Engineers to perform engineering services to design and inspect the 1991 sealcoat of city streets. The contract is in the amount of \$3,960. It was noted Brandt was the only firm which submitted a bid. Proposals were sent to three other firms, with no response.

The council voted to award a purchase contract totaling \$5,425.95 to

Motorola Communications of Amarillo. The contract is for the purchase and installation of a base station and seven pagers for the H&S EMS. The purchase of portable radios for the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department and the H&S EMS, along with repair services, was awarded to G&G Electronics of Guymon, Okla. Amount of that contract is \$2,614.80.

The decision to award those purchase contracts for communications equipment and service was made upon recommendation from Joe Raper, director of public safety. It was noted proposals had been sent to five other firms with no response.

Consideration of awarding a purchase contract for a public works software package resulted in a vote to purchase the software from Burke & Associates of Aurora, Colo. at a cost of \$11,850. Proposals were sent to 12 vendors, with six responding.

Jim McWilliams, director of public works, gave a basic explanation of how the system would work and Frank Sayre, a consulting systems analyst, was contracted to evaluate the proposals with McWilliams. Their recommendation was that the software be purchased from Burke.

Mayor Burl Buchanan was authorized to order the city election, for three positions for Alderman for two-year terms, to be held May 4.

The council went into executive session for discussion of litigation against the firm of McMorries & Givier Inc. and Industrial Sandblasting & Painting. Buchanan said the closed meeting was for discussion only, and no action was taken by the council.

Murray was authorized by the council to solicit bids for the 1991

sealcoat project, a rotary mower and a used tractor. Approval was given to the annual fire, police, ambulance, municipal court and animal control reports for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1990.

Regular council business included approval of the minutes of the Dec. 18 council meeting, approval of fire, ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports for December 1990, approval of monthly bills payable in the amount of \$208,386.81, and approval of the city's current cash position.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Burl Buchanan; Aldermen Bob Boxwell, Wilson McClellan, Mike Cudd, Don Reed and Ed Garner; City Manager Jim Murray; City Secretary Cheryl Gibson; Director of Public Safety Joe Raper; Director of Public Works Jim McWilliams; and visitors Bruce Duncan with G&G Electronics, Doug Baker with Motorola and Dwight L. Brandt with Brandt Engineers Inc.

Drilling permits, well completions decrease

AUSTIN - A total of 1,258 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in December, according to RRC Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent. In November, the total was 1,511. December 1989's total was 1,115.

For the entire year of 1990, the Commission issued 15,653 drilling permits, a 9 percent increase from the 14,273 issued during 1989.

The December total included 702 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 49 to re-enter existing well bores, 33 to deepen existing holes, 154 to plugback existing holes, and 127 for other wells. Operators were also issued 193 amended drilling permits.

Nugent said permits issued for new oil and gas holes in December included 35 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 51 in the Refugio area (District 2), 49 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 47 in deep South Texas (District 4), 15 in East Central Texas (District 5), 36 in East Texas (District 6), one in the East Texas Field (District 6E), 89 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 71 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 127 in the Midland area (District 8), 64 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 90 in North Texas (District 9), and 27 in the Panhandle (District 10).

The 1,258 permits issued in December included 577 oil permits, 162 gas permits, 453 oil and gas permits, 32 injection permits, 20 disposal permits and 14 other permits.

Texas oil and gas operators reported 201 gas and 448 oil completions in December, according to Nugent. In November the total was 208 gas and 536 oil completions. December 1989's total was 251 gas and 330 oil completions.

For the entire year of 1990, the Commission recorded a total of 9,082 well completions, a 9 percent increase from the 8,294 completions recorded in 1989.

Gas completions in December included four in the San Antonio area (District 1), 20 in the Refugio area (District 2), 35 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 64 in deep South Texas (District 4), three in East Central Texas (District 5), 20 in East Texas (District 6), five in West Central Texas (District 7B), 23 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), four in the Midland area (District 8), five in North Texas (District 9), and 18 in the Panhandle (District 10), according to Nugent.

Oil completions included 62 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 11 in the Refugio area (District 2), 36 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 18 in deep South Texas (District 4), four in East Central Texas (District 5), nine in East Texas (District 6), two in the East Texas Field (District 6E), 59 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 41 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 93 in the Midland area (District 8), 44 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 48 in North Texas (District 9), and 21 in the Panhandle (District 10).

Total completions reported in December included 448 oil, 208 gas, and 30 service completions. In December 1989, operators filed 330 oil, 251 gas, and 42 service completion reports.

Nugent said operators reported 800 holes plugged in December, compared to 794 in November. A total of 247 dry holes were reported in December, compared to 196 in November.

November 1990 city sales tax returned

Retail business in Hansford County was down in November 1990 as compared with November 1989, according to the January disbursement of city sales tax rebates from the State Comptroller's office.

The City of Spearman received a check for \$9,478.12, while the City of Gruver received a check for \$2,936.02 as its January payment.

Spearman's local sales tax rebate reflected a 20.65 percent decrease from the \$11,945.30 received in January 1990, and Gruver's rebate showed a 0.5 percent decrease from the \$2,950.87 which was received in January 1990.

The January rebate checks reflect taxes collected on November sales and reported in December by businesses filing monthly returns. December rebate checks, encompassing the Christmas shopping season, will be mailed to Texas cities and counties

next month.

Merchants collect the state and local sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state retains its share and sends cities and counties the local portion of the sales tax each month.

All city and county sales taxes must be approved by area voters. Most areas put the money in their general fund and use it for local operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

Statewide sales tax rebates increased 15 percent over the January 1990 figures, according to Comptroller John Sharp.

"A good portion of that increase is due to Texas' stronger economy, but some of the rise is because more cities collect sales tax this year than did last year. A few other cities have also increased their local tax rates which makes for higher rebate checks from the state," Sharp said.

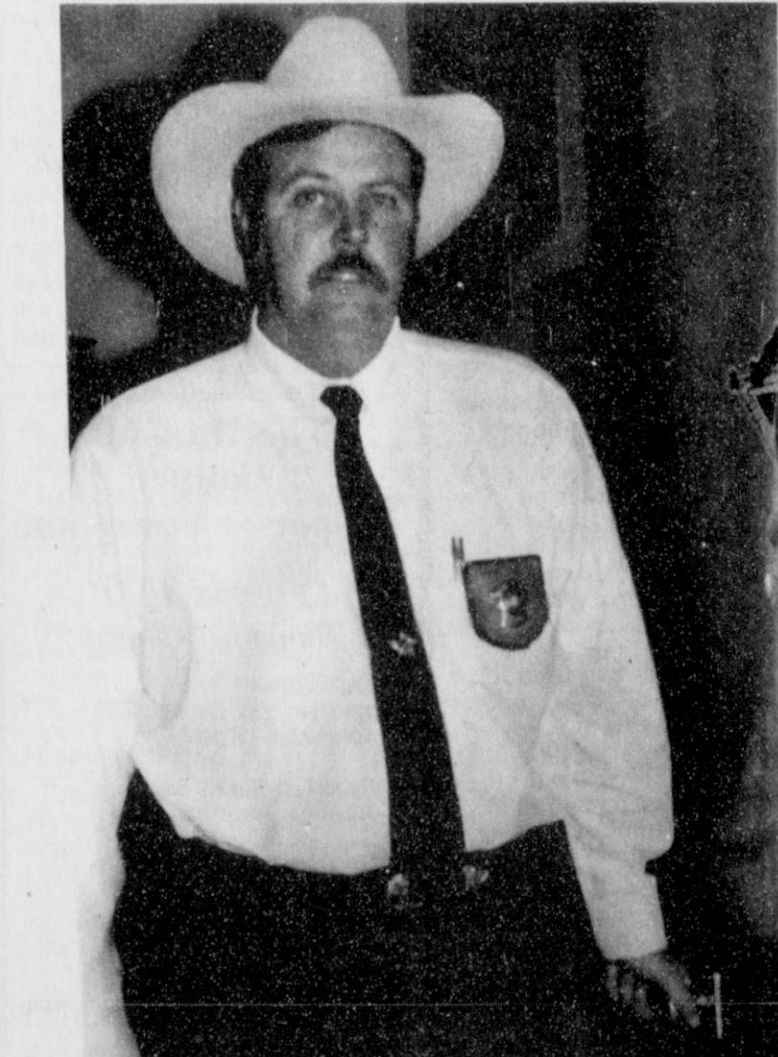

Sheriff's department has new deputy

After working in the agricultural and ranching world for 16 years in Hansford County, Spearman resident Dennis Cline recently got out of the field and into the courthouse.

Cline is the Hansford County Sheriff's Department's new deputy, replacing Jim Brown, who took office as county judge Jan. 1.

Just a few weeks into his career change, Cline says the biggest difference between law enforcement and farming/ranching is "as a deputy, I am dealing with the public every day." He asserts, in fact, that the people he works with and sees through his new job are his favorite aspect of law enforcement work.

Cline completed most of his train-

ing at Amarillo College's Panhandle Regional Police Academy, a three-month school, last year. At the time, Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin was needing to hire another part-time deputy. This has minimized the amount of training Cline has had to acquire since stepping into Brown's vacated, full-time position. Cline also got some valuable on-the-job training when he worked part-time for the sheriff's office last year.

Earlier this month, he trained at the Department of Public Safety in Austin, learning everything from civil process to handling domestic violence cases, and earning 40-some hours' credit at the same time. (This training is required by the State of

Texas.) Cline also had to "qualify" with the use of his on-duty weapon.

A 1966 Tahoka High School graduate, Cline joined the U.S. Army in 1967 and completed jump school to become a member of the 173rd Airborne Brigade. He served two-and-a-half tours in Vietnam during that conflict, during which time he was wounded twice.

Cline was still in the Army when he met and married Marilyn Blodgett of Spearman, who was studying at Lubbock's Texas Tech campus. His last Army assignment was at Fort Bragg, N.C. with the 82nd Airborne Division.

Upon Dennis's honorable discharge, the Clines returned to Hansford County where he has work-

ed in farming and ranching and Marilyn owns Country Stitches, a fabric and craft shop. The couple has two children, Grady, 14, a high school freshman, and Bethany, 10, a fourth grader.

"I had been thinking about getting into law enforcement for a while," Cline says today. As a deputy with the sheriff's office, he reports most of his duties involve civil processing, such as serving divorce and foreclosure papers, and patrolling the 900-square-mile county.

"All the crimes and motor vehicle accidents that happen outside the city limits are our responsibility," he adds, "so I do end up working

Plans underway for teen program

First there was "thirtysomething," a 30-hour discipleship event for Spearman's teens. That was the 1989 brainchild of three local churches' youth ministers. "Thirtysomething II" followed one year later and currently, plans are underway for "Thirty-Something: The Third Generation."

Two of the original program's creators have since moved on to new churches in other places, but First Christian Church's Gary Ellsworth remains, and with the help of youth ministers from Canadian and Perryton, this Christian education program for seventh through twelfth graders will once more be offered.

Steve Donnell, former youth minister in Spearman, is also coordinating this event and will, along with his wife Denise, lead a group of teens.

"It is all set for Friday and Saturday, May 3-4," reported Ellsworth at a planning meeting on Thursday, Jan. 24. He, David Walker and Kris Riggs were present to give representatives from Spearman churches a rundown on the planned event.

Walker is music and youth minister at First Baptist Church in Canadian and Riggs is youth minister at First Baptist Church in Perryton. Both will be involved in "Thirty-Something: The Third Generation" from the planning stages through the entire event.

During "Thirty-Something," 14 small-group leaders will meet with young people from Spearman and outside areas in homes to conduct approximately 30 hours of discipleship training, which is interspersed with recreation time, a picnic and the Main Event, a convocation including speakers and live music held in the Lyric Theater.

This year's special guest at the Main Event will be Vickie Gibbs, a former Miss South Carolina, model and Christian singer/entertainer who has appeared on television's The 700 Club and ABC's Good Morning America.

The curriculum, about which more will be written in subsequent articles, is a non-denominational study written by Billy Beachum, who plans to visit Spearman in person during "Thirty-Something."

According to Ellsworth, this year's emphasis will be on family relation-

ships and will include such topics as a teenager's role in his family and conflict resolution.

Ellsworth's goal is to have 200 area youth enroll in "Thirty-Something: The Third Generation." In 1989, there were 117 participants and 127 enrolled in the discipleship event in 1990.

"But if this event is to perpetuate

itself, it's going to take others learning how to put it all together," Ellsworth cautioned. He and his committee are seeking volunteers for heading up food teams, offering homes where the teens will spend Friday night, and helping with a fundraiser or two. He also hopes to recruit a treasurer for 1991's

"Thirty-Something."

"With a budget of \$6,950, we're looking at having to raise about \$3,000," he reported. (Approximately \$4,000 of the total budget is covered by the students' registration fees, which pay for their Bibles, t-shirt and other supplies.)

"Thirty-Something has gained both popularity and respect," Ellsworth said. "Many, many people really see the difference it can make in a teenager's life. That's why we want this year's event to be a big success."

HOW COMMON IS HIGH CHOLESTEROL?

According to the second National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey for 1976-1980, an estimated 41 percent of adults have a total blood cholesterol level that is either 240 or above (high), or in the range of 200-239 mg/dL (borderline-high) with a history of coronary heart disease (CHD) or at least two risk factors. Risk factors are high blood pressure, cigarette smoking, diabetes mellitus, severe obesity, male sex, history of cerebrovascular disease, and family history of early onset of CHD.

The National Cholesterol Education Program guidelines indicate that these individuals should have another test-lipoprotein analysis. This test reveals the level of one of the carrier systems of fat and cholesterol—low density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol in the person's blood. Once the level of LDL-cholesterol is known, the doctor can recommend a cholesterol-lowering treatment program.

The 36 percent of adults who should have lipoprotein analysis and need medical intervention is virtually the same in blacks and whites. However, a higher percentage of men need both lipoprotein analysis and intervention because being a male is considered a risk factor for CHD.

The number of people requiring lipoprotein analysis increases with age because both the levels of total blood cholesterol and the presence of CHD and other CHD risk factors increase with age.

Most people with high blood cholesterol have cardiovascular disease (CVD) or another CHD risk factor that should already have brought them into the health care system. Overall, over 50 percent of persons 20-74 years of age who are candidates for intervention also have high blood pressure, and about 80 percent have one or more CHD risk factors. Among persons 60-74 years of age, the proportion is even higher (88 percent for males and 83 percent for females).

Automobile Behavior of Children

The behavior of children when riding in automobiles can even affect their safety.

A recent study in North Carolina has shown that hundreds of crashes in that state each year are caused when unrestrained child passengers distract their drivers. Think for a moment: How much attention do you pay to your driving when your child falls off the seat, hangs out the window, pulls your hair, or tries to open the door? With your children buckled up, you can concentrate on your driving without having to worry about them being hurt. You also will be calmer and more relaxed, as will your children, when you arrive at your destination.

Tips to help your child accept the safety restraint as a way of life are:

- Buckle up from the start (from the first ride home from the hospital).
- Set the example of being buckled up.
- Require safety restraints for all passengers in the vehicle.
- Make sure the child is comfortable.
- Plan ahead for the child's physical needs.
- Help entertain the child in the car.
- Provide positive reinforcement for good behavior.
- Buckle up every time the child is in the car (even in granddad's and grandmother's car).

Check Frozen Dinners

Watch out for frozen dinners and other prepared foods. They often

contain large amounts of salt. Make your own dinners using herbs in place of salt. Package and freeze these dinners individually. They will be ready to pop into the oven or microwave when you need a meal in a hurry.

For snacks with a low-salt crunch, use bread sticks coated with sesame seeds, popcorn lightly sprinkled with parmesan cheese or unsalted nuts.

One Billion Credit Cards

According to the Nilson Report, a credit card research company, 110 million Americans hold 1 billion credit cards. Americans hold an average of nine cards apiece and charge an average of \$4,268 a year on the cards. This equals total spending by credit cards of \$469.5 billion. These totals are predicted to double by the year 2000.

Automobile Operation Cost Up

Owning and operating a new car costs \$4,954 per year in 1990, up about 8 percent from 1989, according to the American Automobile Association. However, these figures were published before the climb in gasoline prices began in August 1990. On a mileage basis, the cost to motorists is 33 cents per mile this year, up 2.4 cents over the prior year. These data are based on a composite national average for operating three domestically-built passenger cars: a subcompact Ford Escort LX, a mid-sized Ford Taurus L and a full-sized Chevrolet Caprice. Total insurance costs average \$657 this year.

Chamber Organized in 1921

Editor's note: Since the theme for this year's Spearman Chamber of Commerce annual banquet is "Pieces of the Past," the Reporter-Statesman would like to provide a brief account of the long and distinguished history of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce. Following are some Spearman C of C "Pieces of the Past."

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce was organized in 1921. The group's first project was to dig a well to supply water for the town. Chamber members went door-to-door collecting \$2.00 from each resident who would pay to keep the well

in operation. There is no record as to the identity of the chamber's president.

Jot Horton was the first chamber president on record, in 1928. However, no information about chamber activities is available for that year.

John R. Collard was one of the first chamber presidents whose term left a history. Under his leadership the chamber sponsored its first goodwill tour to neighboring cities. Road signs were placed on the outskirts of town identifying Spearman. In a five-week membership drive \$6,636 was raised

for operating funds.

In 1930 C.A. "Clay" Gibner was the president and his major project was to bring trees to Spearman for planting. Trees were given to those who could not afford to buy them.

W.W. Merritt was president of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce in 1931, the last year until 1939 for which there is a record.

Under the leadership of Ray Platt in 1939, the chamber was instrumental in having a bandstand built. The chamber also worked for a star mail route, and plans were made for a manmade lake, to be called Lake Marvin. Platt was among the first Spearman representatives to attend a meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in Abilene.

The Lake Marvin project was of prime importance in 1940, when Hobbs Heard was chamber president. The chamber sent Bill Miller to Washington to meet with congressmen and senators to urge support for that project.

The chamber sponsored the 1941 rodeo in Spearman during the presidency of T.R. Shirley. There is no more recorded chamber history until 1947.

William E. McClellan was president in 1947. During his term of office and through the efforts of the chamber, Hansford County sent an exhibit to the Texas State Fair in Dallas.

During Marvin Chambers' presidency in 1948, the chamber and the Veterans of Foreign Wars conducted a concerted effort to complete the Memorial Building by raising money through public subscription. In December 1948 there is the first record of a chamber of commerce sponsored Christmas lighting contest, with prizes awarded.

The Memorial Building was completed in 1949, during Roy Wilmeth's term as chamber president. In April 1949, new street markers were installed. Paving, curbs and gutters were finished on Spearman streets. The new swimming pool opened this year. Chamber members made several booster trips to other cities to publicize the Hansford County Celebration and the opening of the new rodeo grounds. Membership totaled 165. The Spearman Chamber of Commerce was incorporated in 1949.

C. Ralph Blodgett's term of office as chamber president, in 1960, saw

the utilization of irrigation for the improvement of farmlands. Also during this period the local oil boom began, resulting in a housing boom for Spearman. The chamber of commerce was instrumental in interesting home builders to provide new houses for the growing city. Major improvements were made to the Spearman airport in 1960.

In 1961 Roy L. McClellan was chamber president. That year, Hansford County residents voted to convert the co-op membership hospital located in Spearman to a county tax-supported facility. An attempt was made in 1961 to complete payment on the project begun earlier, improving the Community Building.

The chamber's Highway Committee worked with other cities and towns in seeking the improvement of Highway 15 during R.C. "Pete" Fisher's term as president in 1962. It was at this time the Highway 15 Association began activity to promote Highway 15 as an Interstate Highway from Tulsa to the West Coast. The chamber also completed raising funds to pay for improvements to the Community Building.

In 1963 under Joe Trayler, the chamber negotiated with the Holly Sugar Company in an effort to locate a sugar refining plant in Spearman.

The chamber continued activity in influencing oil companies to come to the area for drilling and exploration in 1964, under the leadership of Gene Cline.

E.H. "Jimmy" Hester was chamber president in 1965, when the Retail Credit Bureau was established to protect both the consumer and businesses in Spearman.

In 1966, during the presidency of E.J. Copeland, the chamber aided in getting the largest bond issue to date passed, for paving Spearman streets. In 1966 Spearman paved more miles of city streets than ever before. The city also purchased, and sold to consumers at cost, natural gas lights which were placed at street corners where electric lights were not in operation. The new water well and ground storage facilities, with an automatic pumping device, were completed in the east part of Spearman. The Spearman Chamber of Commerce sponsored the Hansford County Celebration and the Hansford County Fair in 1966.

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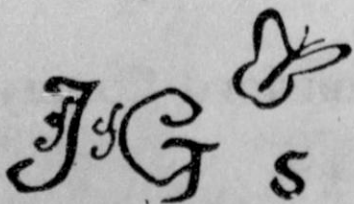
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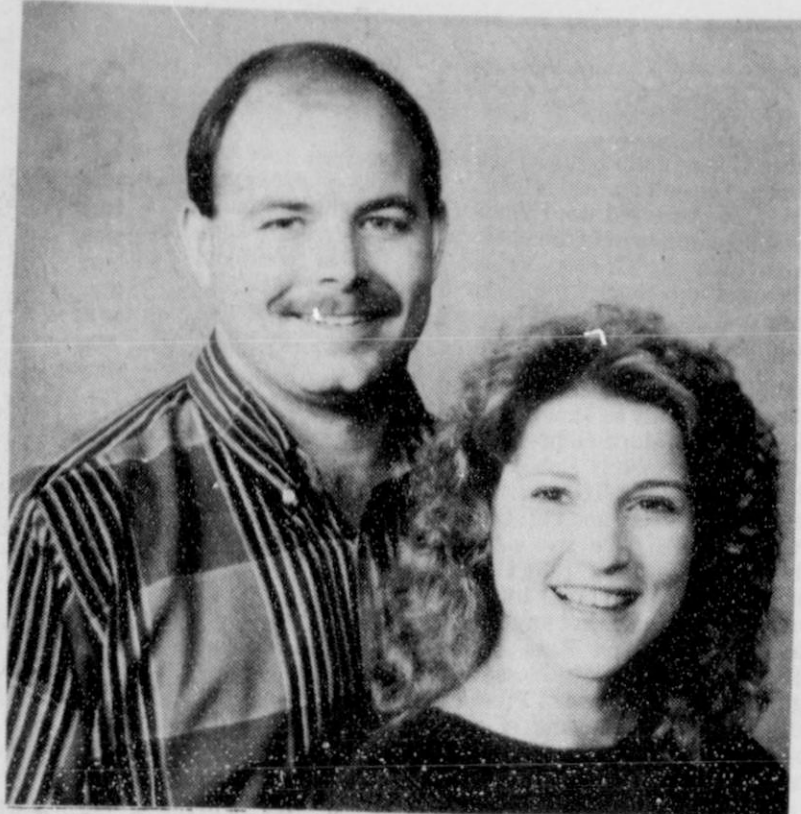

GHS students uneasy about war

While friends and loved ones in the Middle East prepare to defend themselves and our future as a nation, an uneasy feeling surrounds the students of Gruver High School.

The majority of the student body has taken a large interest in the war and everyone has their own opinion. "This action was our only option," said one junior, "but the American public shouldn't expect it to be quick or easy."

Many students seem to feel that the attack on Iraq was inevitable. Results of a poll taken Friday, Jan. 18 showed that 96 percent believed President Bush would actually attack. The same 96 percent said they were behind the President in his action. "I think Bush is doing the right thing by going in there and taking control of the situation," said junior Ryan Mathews.

Though many students agreed that our country was taking the best possible action, very few agreed on the reason we are at war. About 47 percent said, simply, that the invasion of Kuwait by Iraq was the explanation. Twenty-two percent of the

students polled said President Bush attacked to keep Saddam Hussein from gaining too much power. "I think we need to get Hussein out of there," said junior Susana Salazar, "if we don't do anything he'll just start taking over other countries."

A smaller 11 percent claimed that ending aggression was the reason for the attack. "We're not over there just to show off," said senior Geronimo Ortega. "We're only trying to keep peace." Only 6 percent said oil was the reason.

With so many friends and family in the Middle East, students are taking the fighting very seriously and to them, the war is hitting much too close to home. About 33 percent of the students have a close friend or relative in the gulf. To them, the war is not just a news report on television, but a reality.

Although many students are behind the President, the small number who disagree are voicing their opinions eagerly. "I'm proud of what they're doing and what they're standing up for," said sophomore Angela Sistrunk, "but is it worth risking Americans' lives for just land and

oil?" Though there are conflicting opinions of the war in the gulf, everyone seems to be taking the fighting seriously and everyone hopes to see the American troops back at home again soon.



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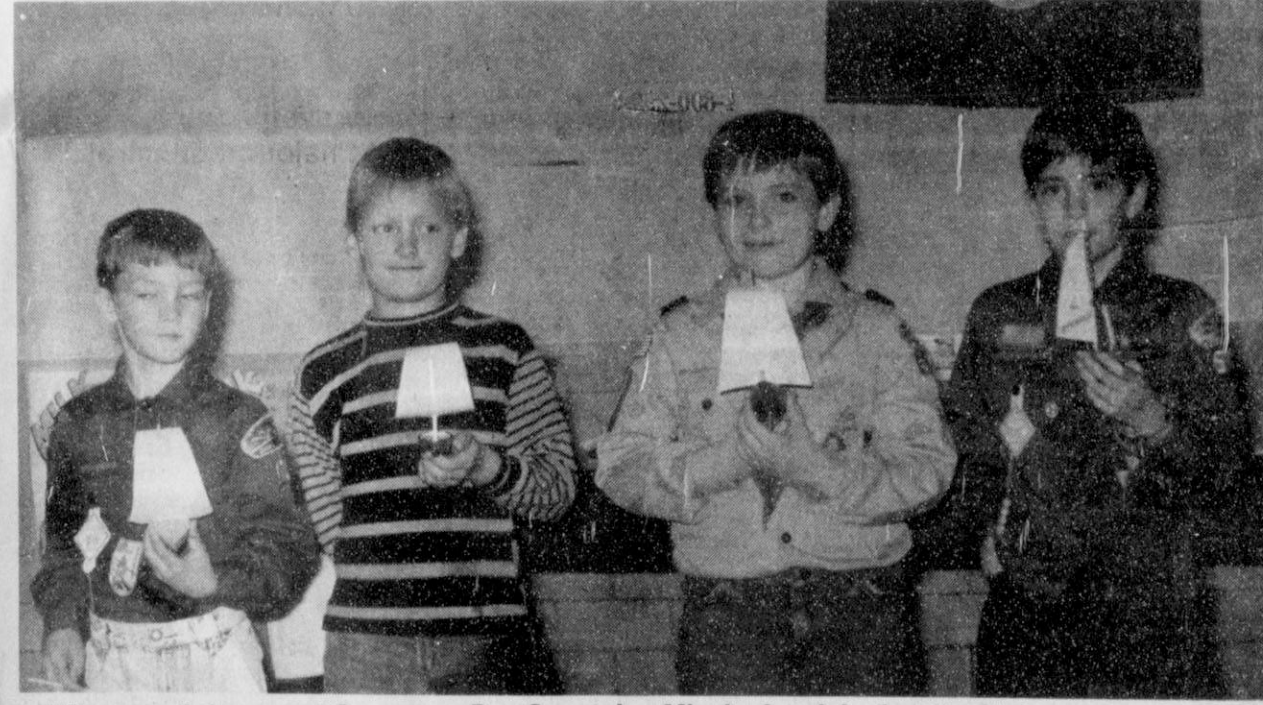
