Spearman reports two automobile accidents

The Spearman Police Department responded to two automobile accidents which occurred within eight minutes of each other on Friday, Aug. 27.

The first report was received at 4:26 p.m. According to Raper, a 1985 Chevrolet pickup, driven by Jose Torrez of Spearman, was traveling north on Hazelwood when it struck a parked 1980 Pontiac two-door. As a result of the collision the Pontiac caught on fire, Raper stated. Spearman Volunteer Firemen were dispatched to the scene and put the fire out. No injuries were reported, but one citation was issued.

Eight minutes later, 4:34 p.m., the second accident was reported. Raper reported that a 1981 Chevrolet was traveling east on Highway 15 when the driver lost control of the vehicle due to a distraction inside. The vehicle struck an auger, Raper said. No injuries were reported and no citations were issued.

Other calls during the reporting period from Monday, Aug. 23, through Sunday, Aug. 29, were 13 miscellaneous calls, one suspicion,

three lockouts and one domestic disturbance.

On Monday, the Spearman Department filed a report on harassing telephone calls in the 600 block of Archer. It was reported that the calls started two weeks ago. Officers located a suspect and issued a warning.

On Tuesday, officers responded to a traffic complaint in the 300 block of E. Kenneth, but were unable to locate the vehicle.

On Thursday a suspicion call was received from Fifth and Barkley. Officers located the suspects and everything was found to be fine.

The City of Spearman approved the plans and specifications for the construction of the new community center during the special meeting held Tuesday, Aug. 24.

City Manager Kelvin Knauf explained that the city traded land located at S. Brandt and Fifth to the Spearhead Corporation. In exchange the city received land located on Cotter Dr. between 11th and the county road. Knauf stated, "Under state law, when a municipality exchanges land for other land, the land the city traded must be developed according to the city's specifications."

The final plans and specifications of the new community center were presented to the city council by Bob Pearson. The council reviewed the materials and a discussion was held before the council approved the resolution.

In other business, Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District, answered questions on the Appraisal

District's proposed budget. It was approved as presented.

Gary Ellsworth was appointed by the council as the Associate Municipal Court Judge.

A workshop on the 1993-94 proposed budget was held, but no action was taken.

This service will be deployed statewide on a staggered, city-by-city basis, over a period of years in Texas in association with residence, business single and multiline services, but not PBX, Centrex or Plexar services, where facilities are available. Caller ID is an optional service which allows a subscriber to see date, time, and the phone number (Calling Number Delivery) and/or name associated with the number (Calling Name Delivery) of most direct dialed local calls and some select long distance calls before the telephone is answered. Anonymous Call Rejection is a Caller ID service which permits a subscriber to automatically reject calls from callers who have blocked their number/name. Per-call and per-line blocking will be available when the service is deployed. Detailed information on Caller ID service and how to block will be sent to each customer in their telephone bill during the next few weeks.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in this proceeding should notify the PUC before October 6, 1993. PDRA sets 1993-94 tax rate

The Palo Duro River Authority set their 1993-94 tax rate during their special meeting held Monday, Aug. 30.

According to General Manager Johnnie C. Lee, the effective tax rate was set at .131620. This is an increase from the .12030 tax rate set for 1992-93. Lee reported that the debt service rate is .122400, and the maintenance and operation tax is .009220, which remained the same as the 1992-93 rate.

Lee said that the tax rate increased approximately 3 percent and with the increase in the values it figures to a .0021 per \$100 increase.

Lee explains, "It's just a fraction of a percent more than last year, but this tax rate will get the Palo Duro River Authority the same amount of money as last year."

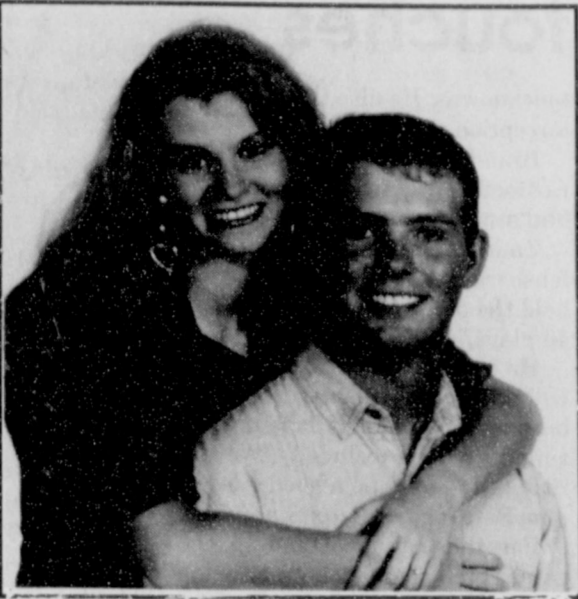

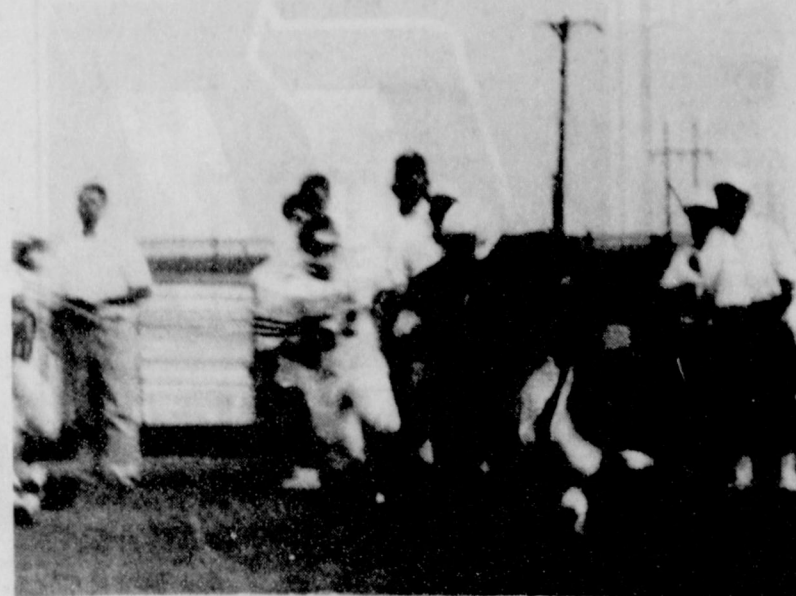

Frick also commented on the opponent in this week's season opener - the Wheeler Mustangs. "They have good size. In addition Dunnam may be one of the better running backs we face," continued Frick.

Coach Frick continues, "They are more of a running team than a passing team. They love to run the sweep and the lead. Their fullback is not bad either - Ashley Brownfield (6-1, 225). In addition, Sabbe, the quarterback, can throw the ball well when the occasion arises."

Yellow perch caught at Palo Duro Reservoir Hoyle "lands" Texas state record

Sidney Hoyle of Gruver recently caught a state record yellow perch while fishing at Palo Duro Reservoir.

Hoyle, the first person to enter a yellow perch for state record status, reeled in a yellow perch which measured 8.5 inch in length and weighed 0.21 pounds.

According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, yellow perch are relatively new to the Panhandle. It was reported that during the 1980's, the fish were collected by Charette Lake in New Mexico and stocked into Meredith and Greenbelt Reservoirs in hopes of establishing an additional forage fish for walleye, white bass and black bass. In addition the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department hoped that the fish would supplement panfish fishing.

In 1991 and 1992 yellow perch were stocked in Palo Duro Reservoir and several small lakes across the Panhandle.

Joe Kraai, district biologist, reported that their fisheries surveys have shown that yellow perch have established reproducing populations in Meredith, Greenbelt and Palo Duro Reservoirs and in Pampa City Lake. He continued, Anglers have caught them from each lake, however, Hoyle was the first to take the time to fill out forms to certify his fish as a state record.

State record fish must be weight on scales having a current Texas Department of Agriculture certification number, Kraai reported. He continued that Larry's Marine at Lake Meredith and Don's Place at Lake Greenbelt have certified scales and applications. The Palo Duro River Authority in Spearman has the necessary information for certifying fish from their lake, he added.

He explained that Fish Record Application Forms can be obtained from Texas Parks and Wildlife Offices. If a possible state record fish is caught and a certified scale is needed, certified supermarket meat scales are usually available. It is stressed that all state record fish must be caught by legal means and methods.

According to the report yellow perch grow 12 to 14 inches in length and reach weights of over one pound. Many anglers consider yellow perch to be the best eating of all freshwater fish.

Kraai reports live bait is effective for catching these fish, especially earthworms and small minnows, but small spinnerbaits, small

jigs and artificial flies also work. He recommends using small hooks, light line and just a split shot or two. The bait should be fished just off the bottom using a float or cast and retrieved very slowly. Kraai said. He added, Yellow perch can be caught during the summer by fishing the edges of thick aquatic vegetation.

In his report Kraai concludes that it is still too early to determine if yellow perch will make a large contribution to the fishing in area lakes, but anglers report that yellow perch are being caught more regularly. He hopes that the New Mexico transplant will ultimately become as popular as crappie across the Panhandle.

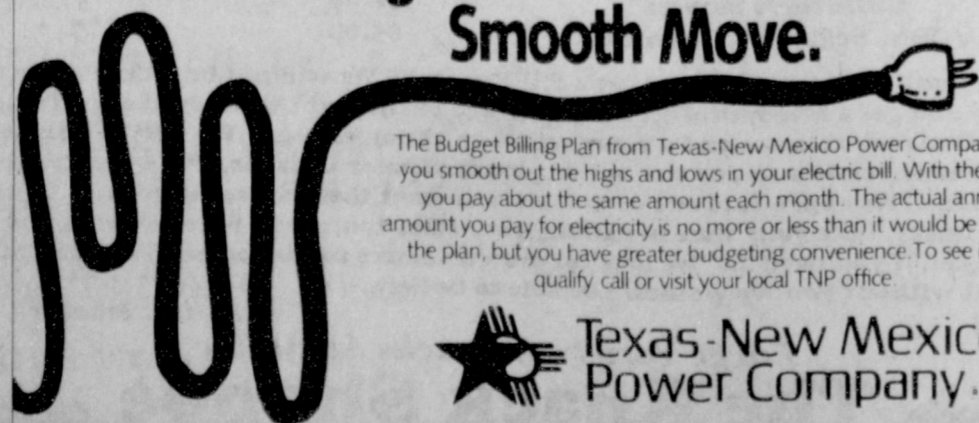

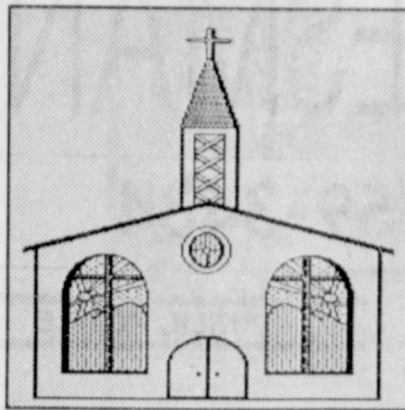

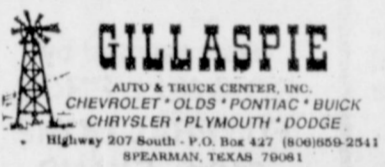
