Meeting to hold special election for tax proposals to be held

A meeting of interested Spearman Voters will be held at the O'Loughlin Center on Friday, June 16th, beginning at 7:45 a.m.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the possibility of calling a special city election in November of 1995 to vote on the two following propositions.

Proposition 1: The adoption of a sales and use tax within the city for the promotion and development of new and expanded business enterprises at the rate of one-half of one percent.

Proposition 2: The adoption of a sales and use tax within the city for the reduction of ad valorem property taxes at the rate of one-half of one percent.

The proposal is to increase sales

tax within the city of Spearman from the current 7.25% to 8.25%. Of the 1% increase, .5% would be used for economic development and would be allocated by a special committee controlled by the City Council. The other .5% would be used to decrease the city property tax rate.

It is estimated, based on current sales tax collections, that a 1% increase in sales tax will generate revenues of approximately \$160,000 per year. This means that there would be \$80,000 to be used to decrease city property taxes.

Currently the city generates about \$290,000 per year from property taxes using a tax rate of 65 cents per \$100 of property valuation. Based on property tax revenue of \$4,000 per 1 cent of tax, the

\$80,000 generated by the new sales tax should result in a decrease of about 20 cents in the property tax rate, or roughly 30%.

According to Mr. Bill Pittman, Spearman is one of the few cities in the panhandle that has not approved the sales tax increase. When our citizens shop in those cities that have the tax, they are helping to pay for economic development for those cities. Among those cities that have already approved the tax and have a current rate of 8.5% are Amarillo, Borger, Perryton, Gruver, and Dalhart. Guymon, Oklahoma also has a rate of 8.5%.

"I doubt that anyone is shopping in Spearman as opposed to the other cities because of the 1% lower sales tax," said Mr. Pittman.

Gruver ISD meets in regular session

The Gruver ISD Board of Trustees met on June 7, 1995 in regular session.

The board discussed the vacancy on the teaching staff created by the retirement of Mrs. Georgia Davidson. Mr. Lloyd Looper, high school principal, explained the Tracy Bevell has requested reassignment to English I and English III from English II and Speech. He asked the board to allow him to make that reassignment. He then recommended to the board that Melissa Guynes be employed as an English and Speech teacher for the district. Mrs. Guynes has recently graduated from Oklahoma Panhandle State University, and she completed her student teaching assignment in Guymon. Mrs. Guynes's husband teaches art at OPSU. The board voted to offer a contract to Mrs. Melissa Guynes to teach in Gruver ISD during the

1995-96 school year.

The members of the board of education voted to change the day of the week and the time of the regular monthly meeting. Beginning next month (July), the regular meetings of the Gruver ISD board of education will be held on the first Tuesday after the fourth day of the month at 6:00 in the evening. Meetings will continue to be held in the board room located in the high school building. The regular July monthly meeting will be held on July 11, 1995, at 6:00 p.m. in the board room.

Upon the recommendation of Barry Haenisch, Superintendent of Schools, the 1995-96 calendar was revised. Mr. Haenisch asked that February 16, 1996, be changed from a staff development day to a school day. This is a Friday that will be needed to prepare students for TAAS tests. The board voted to

make this change in the 1995-96 calendar.

The school board opened athletic bids for purchases to be made in 1995-96. They voted to award the bids to Bucks Sporting Goods in Amarillo and High Plains Sports Center in Guymon.

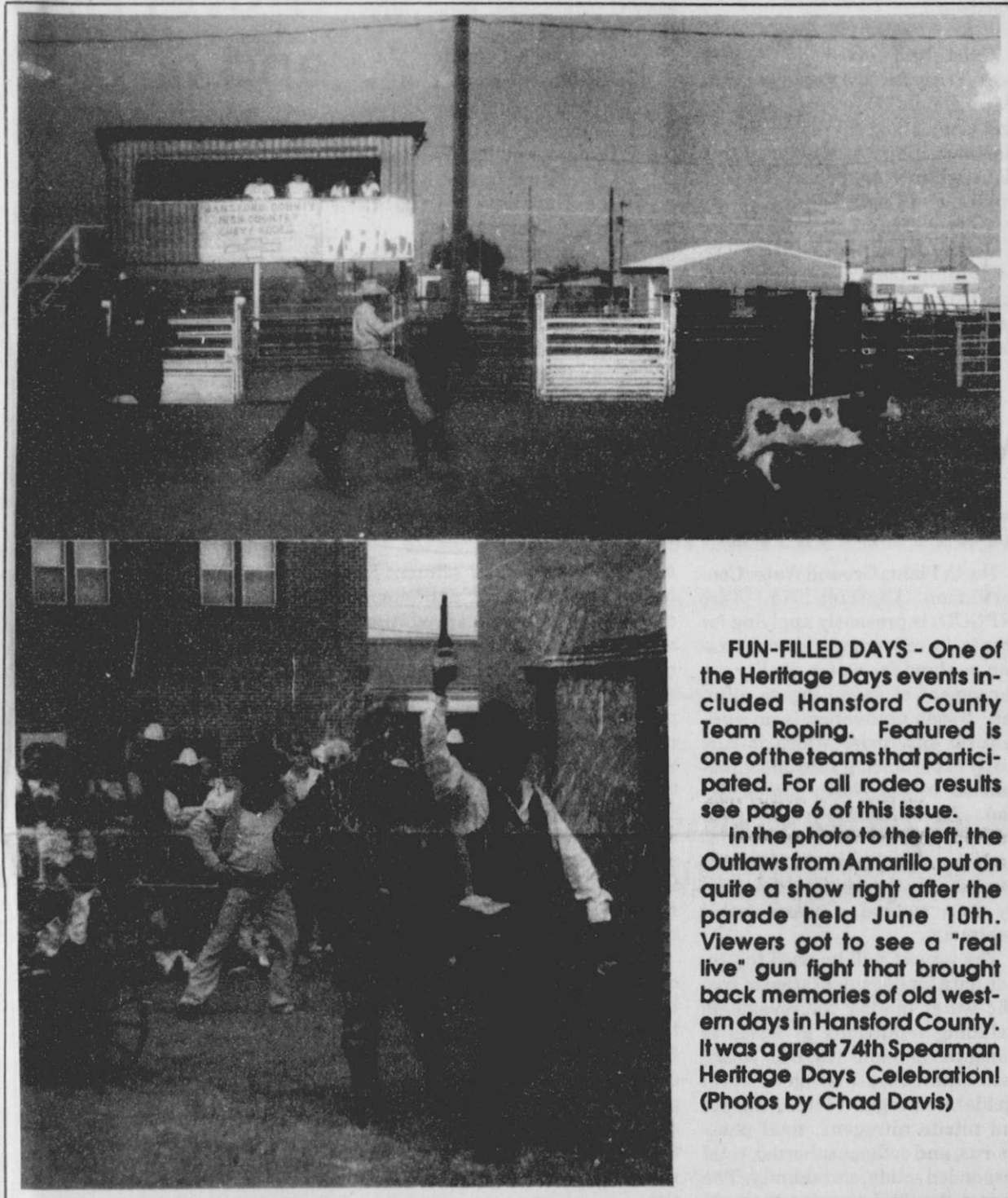
Marguerite Nelson was selected to represent the Gruver board in the delegate assembly of the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) during its annual convention. The delegate assembly will meet on September 30, 1995. At that time, the assembly will debate and decide the official position of TASB will take on issues that affect education. Buddy Lowe was selected as the alternate to serve if Mrs. Nelson cannot attend.

The Government Services Administration (GSA) is the purchasing agent for supplies to be used in offices of the state of Texas. The GSA will allow other nonprofit groups to join the GSA for \$150 per year. This agreement allows the non-profit group to enjoy savings on many purchases by taking advantage of the purchasing volume of the state of Texas. The school board adopted a resolution to join the GSA for the purchase of some supplies that will be used by our schools.

After the first reading and discussion of policy DBBA (local), which deals with the testing for drug and alcohol in school bus drivers, the board met with Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District, to discuss the appraisal district's proposed 1995-96 budget. The board then received the technology committee's report of the district's computer needs for the next few years and the district's ESL report.

In the Superintendent's report, Barry Haenisch gave the trustees an update of the recent legislation that affects school districts, and he reported on the need for repairing the roof on the varsity gym. A quote for the completion of this work had been received and the board gave its approval to begin the work.

Before adjourning at 5:00 p.m., the board voted to pay bills totaling \$79,198.83.

DPS makes plans for concealed handguns

Texans interested in obtaining a license to carry a concealed handgun will be able to start the required firearms training program as soon as the law goes into effect on September 1, DPS Director James R. Wilson said today.

"We have an internal task force up and running to do what needs to be done to make this new law work," Wilson said. "We anticipate that we will start training firearms instructors this summer and our goal is to have these instructors licensed and able to start training interested citizens after September 1."

Wilson said the Department is currently developing forms, procedures, and rules in order to begin accepting applications for concealed handgun licenses on September 1.

"Texans need to remember that the current weapons laws remain in effect until January 1, 1996," Wilson said.

"In the meantime, we ask the public's patience as we get this program set up," Wilson said. "We will make an announcement to the public when our training classes have been set, with instructions on how to enroll. But the Department is not currently accepting fees or application requests for instructors or licenses."

When application requests cards for licenses are available, which is expected to be mid-August, they will be distributed to all areas of the state, Wilson said. Applicants who meet the basic qualifications will be able to submit these requests forms to the DPS at that

time.

"A complete application packet will be furnished to those who request it," Wilson said. "That application, with required forms and fees, may be submitted to the Department after September 1. The validity of the information provided in the application will be verified by a background investigation conducted by the Department."

TFB endorses property bill

The president of Texas Farm Bureau Tuesday, called the adoption of a private property rights bill by the Texas Legislature "probably the strongest measure passed on behalf of property owners by any state in the nation."

TFB President Bob Stallman, a Columbus rice farmer, commended proponents of SB 14, which Texas Farm Bureau targeted as its No. 1 priority during the 74th session of the Texas Legislature that concluded Monday.

The bill which is expected to be signed into law by Governor George W. Bush, will become effective September 1, of this year for all state agencies and other political subdivisions with the exception of municipalities and county governments. County governments come under the new law on September 1, 1997.

"A major part of the bill requires a governmental entity to prepare a takings-impact assessment in advance of any proposed rule or regu-

lation that might constitute a taking of an individual's property rights," Stallman said. This provision is effective January 1, 1996.

According to the new law, if a property is devalued by 25% or more, the property owner may bring a lawsuit against the governmental entity to invalidate that action as it applies to that person's property.

Once the suit has been filed and the property owner has sustained at least 25% or more in damages, in accordance with the law, the governmental entity may either invalidate the takings action or pay damages to the property owner from its current budget.

"This is not only the greatest victory of this just-completed session of the Legislature, but one of the finest achievements ever by the Texas Legislature on behalf of Texas property owners," the president of the state's largest general farm organization said.

NPGCD proposes demonstration wetland

North Plains Ground Water Conservation District No. Two (NPGCD) is presently applying for grants to construct a demonstration wetland for water quality enhancement of swine lagoon effluent. Swine production is an agricultural enterprise which is currently experiencing substantial expansion in the North Plains region. As an alternative to direct land application, constructed wetlands have received considerable attention in other areas of the country as a method of waste water treatment.

The project will be used to provide data for documentation of specific water quality improvements including reductions in levels of biological demand (BOD5), nutrients (ammonia-nitrogen, total Kjeldahl nitrogen (TKN), nitrate and nitrite nitrogens, total phosphorus, and orthophosphorus), total suspended solids, and salinity. The project should determine the suitability of waste water effluent for use in production of marketable crops including possible production of halophyte crops for uptake and removal of salts. The wetland will also serve as a water conservation practice. This demonstration project within the North Plains area will produce technical documentation of potential treatment efficiency of swine facility waste water utilizing constructed wetland systems while addressing site-specific issues regarding operation of constructed wetland systems in an arid climate.

NPGCD is also cooperating with one of the concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFO) in the area, to install a monitoring well. The CAFO has tentatively agreed to donate a well and pump. This proactive will greatly enhance the gathering and monitoring of data for ground water in the immediate area surrounding the CAFO operation.

Extension News

Many today are looking for healthy snacks. Banana chips are not as healthy as you would expect. They are closer to potato chips than to bananas or dried fruit. One ounce of the dried chips has about 150 calories, nearly 10 grams of fat, and often lots of sugar. The fat is usually saturated coming from the coconut oil in which they were deep fried. Sugar is usually added, since they are made from green bananas before the starch turns to sugar. Banana chips do have a modest amount of potassium and a few other minerals but nothing to brag about. Bananas are the only dried fruits that are fried so other dried fruits can be a low fat snack.

Did You Know?

The average American drank 547 12 oz. cans of soft drinks last year. If you figure that at 150 calories per can that adds up to 82,050 calories over the course of a year and 23 extra pounds. Every extra pound is 3,500 calories. At 10 teaspoons of sugar a can that would be 114 pounds of sugar. How many soft drinks did you have? How many are you going to drink this year?

Biggers announced as new Girl Scout President

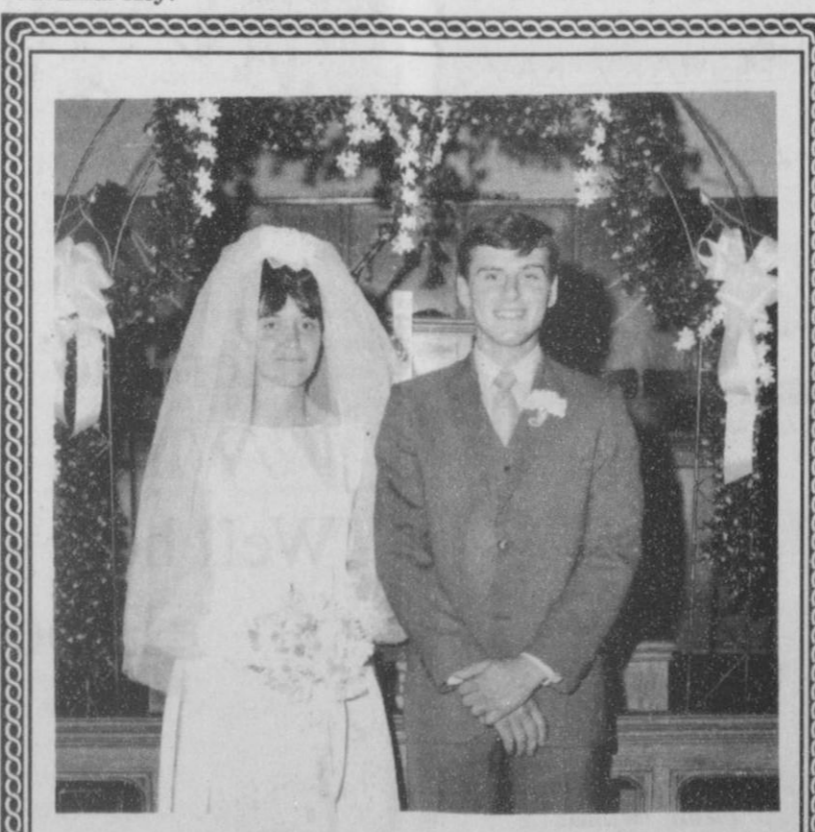

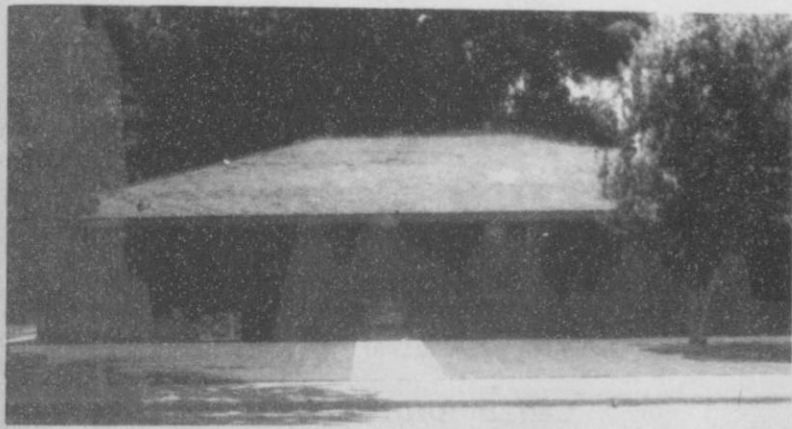

Oil recycling stations opened for you convenience

The Panhandle Environmental Partnership is setting up a network of used oil collection sites in the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle.

The Partnership is a program of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) and the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission (TNRCC), which made the program possible with a grant of almost \$300,000.

The Partnership is opening the sites in cooperation with the region's local governments, giving "do-it-yourself" convenient locations to dump used motor oil.

Dumping used oil in unauthorized places is illegal. Oil can seep into soil and contaminate underground supplies of water, thus endangering the health of thousands of area residents who depend on underground water for drinking and agriculture.

While some area residents already have access to used oil recycling centers, others do not. Until now, many residents in small communities have had to carry used oil to distant or inconvenient recycling stations.

"Rural residents are no less environmentally conscious than urban dwellers, but recycling has been slow in coming to many rural communities because of the high cost of implementing programs," said Gary Pitner, PRPC executive director. "But through cooperative efforts, we can offer rural communities the same convenient oil-recycling facilities found in larger areas."

The recycling stations consist of one, 465-gallon fiberglass tank that

sits inside a small fenced area. "Do it yourselfers" can pour oil directly into the tank and deposit used oil filters in a nearby container.

Borger based CEG Industries will collect the oil and filters when containers are full. CEG will then deliver the waste oil to the Phillips 66 Co. refinery in Borger, where it will be re-refined and recycled back into the petroleum products. All this is free-of-charge to residents.

The network will consist of more than 100 stations in the 26 county area, all within easy access of almost every Panhandle community. In some towns, the Partnership is setting up stations at community recycling centers. The hours the stations will be available will be set by local governments and posted at the sites.

The hear more about the network, area residents with touch-tone service are encouraged to call 800 SAVE OIL, a toll-free number that accesses a 24 hour, computer based hotline. Residents with rotary service should call that number between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Recycling Words

The emphasis on recycling in our community has been on individuals. But businesses discard a high proportion of waste and most of it is recyclable.

There are some very good reasons for recycling in the workplace. Businesses that discard a large proportion of recyclable waste may be able to cut disposal costs. It may not be a significant figure, but Benjamin Franklin once said something to the effect of "If you take care of the pennies, the dollars will take care of themselves." The very act of recycling makes workers more aware of the solid waste they generate and they often make a greater effort not to waste. Solid waste is something most of us never think of till someone pops it on our desk.

For the greater environment, workplace recycling conserves landfill space, saves energy and conserves natural resources. Businesses can assist our community in our participation in the Clean Cities 2000 program designed to reduce solid waste by 50% by the year 2000.

It wouldn't make sense to recycle if it would cause an economic burden on the company. A cost effective method of separation

should be developed. Sorting at the source is the best solution. Put a small box of two near the trash can at each work station. The bins could then be emptied into a conveniently placed central collection site.

Perhaps the most important ingredient in a successful workplace recycling is THE BOSS. If management provides strong support for the program, the employees will follow suit. Management must set a good example! I know it isn't easy to always be the good example. (My twelve year old son wearies of being the good example for the younger siblings...too much pressure.)

Select an employee to be the program coordinator and provide effective education and publicity about the new program. I am available to any business to provide programs and information. Call Perryton City Hall at 435-4014, Spearman City Hall at 659-2524, or Gruver City Hall at 733-2424.

The following is a list of recyclable products commonly used in the workplace. Plastics, steel cans, and glass are also recyclable. CEG will pick up quantities of white paper (even shredded) at area businesses at no charge. Spearman's cardboard can and should be taken

to hanger #15 at the airport and all other materials are recycled at the community recycling center next to city hall. Gruver's cardboard is accepted at the recycling center.

Recyclable

White Paper-Green and blue bar computer paper, plain computer paper, copy and typing paper, letter head, adding machine tape, plain paper fax, loose-leaf paper, receipts, inter office memos, and letters.

Mixed Paper-Brochures, advertisements, posters, magazines, catalogs, pamphlets, colored sheets fax and telex sheets, envelopes, booklets, accounting ledgers, tabulating and time cards, NCR (no carbon required) forms, and carbonless forms.

Corrugated Cardboard and Newsprint-Newspaper, colored newsprint advertisements, news inserts and filters, and gray cartons.

Non-Recyclable

Carbon paper, candy wrappers, blue prints, waxed paper, computer paper binders, copy paper wrappers, paper and cups with food contamination, and binders.

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Out at the Lake

This past weekend found 12 R.V.'s and 6 tents at the Lake. There were quite a few fishermen, and Jim Derington snapped a picture of an 8 pound catfish that we hope to have next week.

Margaret Evans of Spearman took this photograph of the Lambert Loco Weed two or three weeks ago when many of us not so knowledgeable about wild flowers were wondering what this beautiful purple flower so plentiful this year on hilly roadsides was called. At first glance, I thought someone had planted bluebonnet seeds. Jean Ann Behney had the same reaction, but she quickly noted the little white tip flower was not there. These flowers were especially numerous on the road from Fritch to Amarillo.

When I see Loco Weed, I always think of Gid Nobles, because he

identified the plant for me. It was one of the low growing ones with white flowers. Since then I have learned that we have more varieties in the county. The white one Gid showed me has a twin with purple flowers. One called wooly loco, a larger, more sprawling plant with purple flowers, is also in the pasture. Then this year we have the showy Lambert Loco Weed which can either have purple or white flowers.

All of these poisonous plants belong to the pea or legume family. They have cousins called milk vetches that look some what similar but are not harmful. In some parts of the country these weeds are called crazy weeds.

Horses, cattle, sheep, and goats are often poisoned by eating Loco Weeds. Usually they don't eat the plants unless food is scarce, but it is addictive, and if they start, they may continue to search it out when good forage is available. All parts



of the plant are toxic, and it is poisonous in all stages of growth, even when dried.

Abortion frequently occurs in cattle and sheep from acute Loco Weeds poisoning. Other symptoms are loss of flesh, irregularity of gait,

loss of sense of direction, nervousness, weakness, staying away from other animals, and lack of muscular control. Ordinarily an animal must eat considerable quantities of the weeds for 2 to 5 weeks before death occurs.
