Spearman I.S.D. Board of Trustees awarded the contract for band equipment to Jent's House of Music of Lubbock during the regular meeting held Monday, Sept. 13.

According to Hansford County Clerk Amelia Johnson, an agreement has to be signed and in place every year before the County Clerk's office can be partially reimbursed on cases filed by the Attorney Gen-

As for the court cost item on the agenda, Johnson explained, this is a prospective security fee that will be put in a special fund for court house security. This item has been tabled until the October 11 meet-





DANGER HIGH VOLTAGE

I'm not much of an electrician. Once when newly married I called my dad several times for instructions as I wired a rented house for 240v. I've melted my share of knives and screwdriver tips. One thing I know: Don't plug a 120v blender into a 240v outlet. It might blend rapidly, but only for a very limited time.

Down Spearman alleys run power lines carrying 2400v. There's nothing in my house that can use that kind of voltage. Periodically, the power company has placed transformers on the ultility poles. Somehow -- I don't know how (see the first paragraph) -- those transormers change the voltage that arrives in my house to 240v, which is further reduced to 110v at most outlets. That way a blender

John and his family came to Hansford County two years ago from Bovina, Texas. He was reared in Bovina and learn many skills from working with his father.


