## Hanford County voters go to polls, 39% cast ballots in election

After the last ballot was cast at 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 1, Hansford County officials reported that 1,205 (39 percent) of the 3,053 registered voters had went to the polls to vote in the U.S. Senator race and for or against the proposed constitutional amendments.

Kay Bailey Hutchison received the most votes for U.S. Senator with 426. Jack Fields had 292 vote, while Joe Barton received 212. Other ballots cast for U.S. Senator were: Robert (Bob) Krueger, 124; Richard Fisher, 50; Stephen

## report decreases in rebate checks

Both Gruver and Spearman reported decreases in the sales tax rebate checks received in April 1993, according to a recent release from the Texas State Comptroller's office.

The release reports that Spearman businesses received \$7,803.15 in rebate checks for April 1993. This is down 41.59 percent from the \$13,358.13 mailed in April

According to the release, Spearman's payments to date for 1993 are also down from those mailed in 1992. Checks mailed to date in 1993 total \$56,639.95, which is down 5.77 percent from the

riod of April 1993 are also down. According to the release, \$3,185.32 in checks was mailed in April 1993. This is a decrease of 20.20 percent from the \$3,991.85 mailed in April

Although Gruver's payments for April are down, they are reporting that their payments to date for 1993 are up. In the release it is reported that Gruver's rebate checks to-date total \$5,716.95 in 1993, as compared to the \$5,563.15 for the same time period in 1992. This is an increase of 4.22 percent

According to the release, State Comptroller John Sharp sent a total of \$99 million in April sales tax rebates to 971 Texas cities and 109 counties, which is virtually unchanged from their payments of one year ago.

For April 1993 Texas cities received \$89.3 million. This is down 0.04 percent from the \$89.4 million received last April. Counties received a total of \$9.6 million for their April rebates, dropping 2.43 percent from their April 1992 payment of \$9.9 million.

"Despite the slight decrease in sales tax allocations to Texas cities and counties in April, Texas has exhibited modest economic growth during the past 12 months ...., Sharp said.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on February sales and reported to the Comptroller in March by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Hansford County's crude oil production was 25,966 barrels, while their total gas production was 3,125,843 mcf for January 1993, according to a recent release from the Texas Railroad Commission.

In March, the commission issued a total of 1,045 drilling permits, compared to 1,019 in March 1992. The March total included 577 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 36 to reenter existing well bores, 46 to deepen existing holes,

168 to plugback existing holes and 77 for other wells. There were 141 amended drilling permits in March.

The total number of drilling permits issued to-date in 1993 is 2,761, a two percent decrease from the 2,815 issued during the same period of 1992. These permits issued in March included 466 oil, 168 gas, 370 oil and gas, 16 injection, 14 disposal and 11 other permits.

For the month of March operators reported 323 gas, 459 oil, and 39 service completions. This is compared to 198 gas, 388 oil and 35 service completions in the same period of 1992.

The total of well completions recorded for 1993 year-to-date is 2,232, a 15 percent increase from the 1,903 recorded in 1992 year-to-

Operators reported 930 holes plugged and 192 dry holes in March, compared to 1,119 holes plugged and 274 dry holes reported during the same period last year.

### A FATHER'S RESPONSIBILITY Ephesians 6:4

The great desire I have for my children is that they know God thoroughly and love Him completely. I don't much care how much money they make or where they go to college, although they will surely have preferences.

What can a father do to insure that his children embrace faith for themselves? I'm no expert, but I do have an opinion, having been a father for over 17 years now.

First and foremost, dad, you need to verbalize your unconditional love for your children-often. Don't expect them to infer that love because you provide them with necessities and luxuries. Tell them, "No matter what, I'll always love you."

Discipline your children. God is love, and He disciplines His children. Children who aren't trained will become a disgrace to their parents, and to God. Draw boundaries for guidance, communicate those "laws", punish disobedience consistently and forgive transgressions.

Take your children to church. Don't send them. Take them. If you don't seek God, they won't either. Only a fool neglects God.

"You raise kids on your face," says a friend of mine. Pray for your children, and surrender them to God-often and thoroughly. It's hard, but they came from God and they belong to Him.

Finally, talk to your kids about your dreams and concerns for them. Honest communication builds trust and deepens relation-

Does all of the guarantee steady maturation without difficulty? Probably not. I seem to remember that God's first children had a mind of their ann. But He continues to exercise His Fatherly prerogatives. So must we earthly fathers.

Ba...Ba...Backseat I have the hardest time keeping the back seat of my car clean. At any given moment you might find an Allsup's cup or the last sticky remains of a strawberry Cheesecake Cream Murmurs, or maybe its just the front page of the paper. Once I found a mummified french fry that I imagine had been lurking under the seat since the Punic Wars.

Occasionally I find scraps of paper I have written important notes on, only to have lost the note and the idea. I also think that the drawer full of unmatched socks might be liberated from their confinement if I would check closer (where do those socks go to?).

Now I'm sure that this 'true confession' will disappoint some of you. It seems like every year in January I resolve to do better, and in fact it is much better than it has been, but I have not yet achieved that Dick Gillaspie, "Its been driven by a little old lady from Gruver (excuse me not politically correct — Chronologically advantaged person from Gruver) appearance.

So what does it matter that I have a cluttered back seat? Not much unless you need to thumb a ride, but it points out one of the real problems our society is facing. Who is to blame? Who is to blame for the mess we are in? Why is the government seemingly inept at governing, or solving problems that must be solved? Why do we seem to be working harder for less?

A review of Charles Sykes book A Nation of Victims said it so well Today, individuals and groups define themselves not by a shared culture, but by their status as victims. Victims of parents, of families, of men, of women, of the work place, of sex, of drugs, of food, of college reading lists, of personal physical characteristics — these and a host of other groups are engaged in and ever-escalating fight for attention, sympathy, money, and legal or governmental protection. This fundamental denial of personal responsibility at a national level has not only crippled secular business and society in general, it has infected the Church...Christians must begin to take personal responsibility for the way things are, and to be a Kingdom counter-culture, rather than a group of bystanders exclaiming, "It's not my problem.

Ouch! See, the thing about a back seat is that I don't have to look at it. Knowing it is my responsibility I just look ahead and ignore it. So we all do. The problem our culture is facing is that we are blaming everyone, but ourselves. We figure it is someone else's job, I've given my part, I'm too busy, or the long litany of excuses we develop to avoid esponsibility.

Here it is straight from a review of a great sermon once preached a long way from Spearman, but right to us, "You are the light of the word (Matthew 5:14). There is no way out of our responsibility. We must







"Although the UIL is more often associated with athletic competition, more students compete in the academic contest," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director. "In fact, the League began as a debating league in 1910 and then later merged with a track and field association to form the basis for the current organization. Each year, more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contests.'

Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. "Long before the development of other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in writing, speaking, mathematics and science," Marshall

UIL academic contests cover several subject areas including math, science, business, language arts, journalism, speech and theatre.

& events and computer science were added.

The purpose of the UIL academic program is to use competition to develop students' higher order thinking skills. "A primary objective for League directors is to maintain a high correlation between what is taught in the classroom and what is required of students involved in extracurricular competition," said Janet Wiman, UIL academic director. "Consequently, as much emphasis is placed on the educational context of the contests as is placed on the contests themselves.

Students who compete at the UIL State Meet also qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. This year, the TILF is awarding more than \$700,000 scholarship grants to 534 college students who compete at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1993-94, the TILF expects to award an estimated 550 new and renewed grants, valued at more than \$700,000. The

Spearman High School students Recently, contests in current issues TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The TILF receives over \$500,000 in annual donations and has over \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.





These dumpsters are for recyclable materials (glass, paper, aluminum) and are in response to citizens wanting recycling dumpsters in the city. The Panhandle Regional Planning Commission is working with us to develop markets to take the recyclable materials from us. I think the initial efforts are promising that we will be able to find markets for

Within the next few weeks we will have the basketball court and volleyball court completed on the parking lot west of City Hall. These courts should provide the youth (and those of us who think we're young) something to do this summer. Once the goals and nets have been put up, you will need to bring

The swimming pool will open the Saturday after school is out (May 29). The pool manager will be Francis Pipkin and Mendy Lasater will be the assistant pool manager. We are busy monitoring the status of Senate Bill 498 that was passed by the State Senate and is being debated by the House of Representatives. This bill would require only customers of Texas-New Mexico Power Company to have phantom income taxes added to their electric bill. Phantom income taxes are simply the amount of income taxes TNP would have had to pay (but didn't actually pay) if they were not part of a larger holding company. It sounds complicated and it is. Let us just say that TNP customers would have to pay for something that wasn't actually paid by TNP and no customers of any other electric company would have to pay for these phony expenses.

We are starting the annual budget preparation process for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993. This may be the most difficult budget we have ever put together since the expenses are increasing and the revenues are decreasing. However, we will do the best we can to keep the level of services that Spearman residents want.

### Farmers Home Administration... has loan funds available

The Farmers Home Administra- Native Americans, African Amerition (FmHA) has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Hansford, Ochiltree and Lipscomb Counties which the Perryton FmHA Office services.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged populations groups are Hispanics,

cans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease, to those who are eligible, a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration County Office in their area. 
