

HIS RECORD OF CRIMES

A List of Worst Items of Crime Confessed to by Harry Orchard.

Here is the self-confessed record of Harry Orchard, on the strength of whose testimony the State of Idaho expects to send to the gallows William D. Haywood, Chas. A. Moyer and George A. Pettibone, leaders of the Western Federation of Miners:

Killed Charles McCormick and Melbeck with a bomb at Vindicator mine in Cripple Creek.

Killed a dozen men by blowing up the depot at Independence.

Shot Deputy Sheriff Gregory in Denver when the victim was helplessly drunk.

Killed Tom Wally with a bomb intended for Judge Gabbert of Colorado Supreme Court.

Killed former Gov. Frank Stenning of Idaho New Year's evening, 1905.

Made unsuccessful attempts to kill Gov. Peabody of Colorado, Judges Gabbert and Goddard of the Colorado Supreme Court; Gen. Sherman Bell, Millionaire David Moffatt, Frank Hearne and dozens of other Colorado men and Frank C. Bradley in San Francisco.

Born in Canada, from whence he eloped with another man's wife, abandoning his own wife and baby.

Later he deserted the second woman and committed bigamy.

Been an ore thief, powder thief, firebug, and stood ready at all times to commit any crime or betray any one for money with which to gratify his passion for gambling.

No Raise Made.

The county commissioners in session last week as a board of equalization spent much time in the perusal of the rolls and discussing the question of the necessity of a raise in valuations, as per Tom Campbell and Bill McDonald. They left valuations at about the same figures as last year, after deliberating the matter carefully, and except in certain cases no raises were made, these exceptions being property where improvements of various kinds justified a higher valuation. The new rolls will show a considerable increase in valuation over last year, owing to natural advances and recent improvements, but generally speaking the valuations of Donley county property will remain the same as heretofore.

No Race Suicide in Donley County. Scholastic Census Shows Big Increase.

In taking the census it was ascertained that there are 12 sets of twins in the county within the scholastic age, while the showing in its entirety indicates that race suicide has no standing in this county. The figures:

The above figures indicate an increased enrollment over last year of 120. The Clarendon Independent District increase is 66, (as previously stated in these columns), making a total increase for the county of 186. The entire number of scholastics in the county is 1150.

The Summer Normal.

The summer normal, which is to open here June the 25th, gives promise of being the largest ever held here. Prof. Silvey and the other members of the faculty are receiving inquiries by nearly every mail, and many of them from a distance, indicating the fact that a great many expect to attend.

The local patronage will be large. The law requires all classes of teachers to attend these normals once in every two years in order to perpetuate their certificates.

Clarendon's school facilities are becoming proverbial in the Panhandle. Her summer normals have always been the best and the largest ever held in the Panhandle.

These gatherings of teachers for the summer are of great advantage to the schools of the town in which they are held. This fact is so generally recognized that every college or university of the state of any prominence is using its best efforts to induce the teachers to meet with them.

The present educational prominence of Clarendon is due largely to the advertisement given her by the teachers who have come here from summer to summer to attend these schools, and to the students they have returned to us. Whether Clarendon is to maintain her prestige or not is to be determined by her gratitude to such gatherings as these.

The present session is to be entertained in private families of the town, and generous indeed have been the offers so far for their accommodation. We sincerely hope that those who undertake to board the teachers will use all reasonable efforts to make the summer pleasant and profitable to them.

The board of trustees of the public school has kindly tendered the use of the school building to the faculty for the session. A more suitable building for the purpose cannot be found in this section of the country. One hundred new seats have been ordered and will probably be in use during the session.
