Mental Health Forum Scheduled

The Texas Panhandle Mental Health Mental Retardation (TPMHMR) will be holding a public forum on Monday, November 13 at 7 p.m. at the Perryton TPMHMR located at 1701 S. Jefferson.

The purpose of this public forum is to inform community members of the services currently being offered by the agency, as well as to gather feedback regarding satisfaction with these services and to address any unmet needs identified by the residents of Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemphill and Hansford Counties.

Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority merged with the Amarillo State Center on September 1, 2000, resulting in the newly formed Texas panhandle Mental Health Mental Retardation. Residents of Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemphill and Hansford Counties are served by a regional satellite office that offers mental services, as well as the Perryton workshop, which provides services to individuals with mental retardation.

The local outpatient psychiatric clinic offers mental health services to adults who suffer from severe mental health illness and to children and adolescents in need of mental health intervention. This clinic has helped to stabilize the emotional and behavioral functioning of people with severe mental illness, reducing homelessness, harmful behavior, court commitments and hospitalization that are costly to the community.

Services in the Perryton Workshop include vocational training at the workshop and job coaching in community jobs. Support is also provided in the area of nursing, psychology, and service coordination. All of the above services listed aid in building self-esteem and improving the quality of life for individuals with mental retardation.

Texas Panhandle Mental Health Retardation would like to encourage all citizens with an interest in the issues of mental health and mental retardation to attend this one-hour forum.

The mission of PTMHR is "to respond to the diverse needs of all persons with mental illness and mental retardation by creating an accessible system of services which supports individual choices and results in lives of dignity and independence.

The goal of hospice care is to control pain and address other symptoms occurring during a terminal illness. Pain can be social, emotional, spiritual and physical, therefore hospice care involves many disciplines. The family and patient remain in control of the situation and plan of care.

Volunteers are a very important part of this care. Volunteers can be involved in caring for needs of patients and families in the home or in the Hospice unit. Volunteers can sit with patients, run errands, prepare food for families, assist with administrative duties, be a listening, assist with fund raising and other things that might be needed to carry on the hospice program.

Hansford County Hospice is involved in bringing hospice care to our communities. We have volunteers who are very involved in the hospice program. We are always needing additional volunteers to help carry out this program. There will be a new class for volunteers soon. We are doing our best to be mean parents just like Mom was. I think that's what's wrong with the world today. It just doesn't have enough mean moms anymore.

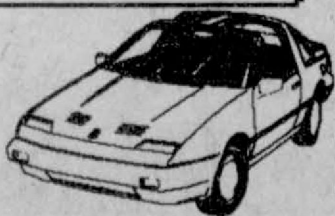

An Old Tool Can Be Your New Front Door

Question: What's more common than a cell phone ringing in an important meeting?

Answer: Only the words "uh" and "ah" occur more often than a ringing phone in most meetings.

The idea for this column came in a recent meeting. I was surrounded by a former U.S. Ambassador, a college president, nationally known advertising executive, a bank president, a few PhDs and a vice-president or two. Suddenly one of the heavy hitter's phones erupted.

Now I'm not good at "Name that Tune" but this phone chirped a 94-decibel version of "When the Saints Go Marching In" combined with the "William Tell Overture." And, that was just the first ring.

He quickly excused himself and slipped out of the room while his phone chimed the closing bars of "Stardust." Several of us sitting around the room unobtrusively checked our phones to see for certain that they were off.

In just a few seconds, the phone answerer returned. The speaker paused as the gentleman returned to his seat. All eyes were on him, so the phone answerer said with just a tinge of embarrassment, "Wrong number."

We all had a good laugh and most returned to the speaker's remarks. My mind went back to the phone.

How did people do business without phones? The phone is an easy-to-access front door for all business-

es. It's versatile, portable and accessible worldwide.

Some day the Internet may be the most popular business "front door," but now the phone is number one. And because it is so common, it is often taken for granted. It shouldn't be, because using it correctly can boost your business image, bring in new business and help you satisfy more customers.

Most of us feel pretty comfortable with the phone, and probably feel we are good at using it. However, in reality, many of us could use a little help with our telephone skills. And we're not alone. SkillPath seminars generate annual revenue in excess of \$2 million from teaching customer service and telephone skills alone.

This week we will get started on our list of 17 telephone tips to build your business or career. Remember, the telephone is like your front door; it should be easy to open and offer a friendly atmosphere from the first word.

Tips for Telephone Success
Tip #1 - If your objective is to get business, get a business line. It doesn't matter how good you are on the phone if no one can find your number in the business pages.

Tip #2 - Have enough lines. Your front door has to handle traffic. You may need two or more lines and a "hold" gesture is essential.

Tip #3 - Don't abuse the "hold" feature. Many businesses abuse customers by making them listen to company commercials, CNN headline news or elevator music. They spend time and money each month to do this. Instead of entertaining your callers, focus on getting them connected to the person they want to need to speak to.

Tip #4 - Get a toll free number. This only applies to folks who expect customers to call from outside the local area. However, if you are trying to lure customers from

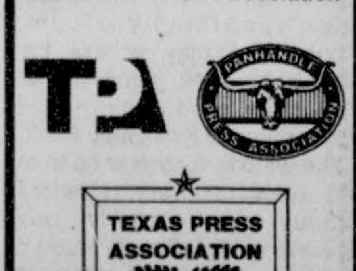

 During the week there were some brief times that the level was over 49 feet, but not enough rain fell to keep it there.
 The most activity this week took place just outside the Park area as deer season started last Saturday. One deer was taken just 20 feet outside the Park fence. Remember that

On close examination, I found it was the big stone house that the Adairs or Cornelia Adair had built for living quarters when they came to the ranch. Leon Bagwell thinks the stone masons for it were brought from England. The ranch site, now a national historic landmark, is about 25 miles south of Claude.

Charles Goodnight and Mrs. Adair split their ranch properties in 1887 after John Adair had died May 14, 1885. Unlike many of the old ranches, this one is still owned by descendants of Mrs. Adair.

I was disappointed, but it is nice to know where the pictures were made, and they are still a part of Panhandle history.

The Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association is busy restoring windmills, but in the back of the members' minds is that Spearman hosts the International Windmills' Trade Fair in June of 2002.

Lubbock hosted the trade fair in 2000 and Comstock, Nebraska, will host it in 2001. The first, second, and third trade fairs were in Portales, New Mexico, and the next two in Lamar, Colorado, and in 1998 in Shattuck, Oklahoma. Most of the trade fairs have been held in the Midwestern states and many in this region so it is easy to see that windmill collecting is an important hobby in the area.

What happens at a trade fair? Primary focus is a swap meet. There will be many windmills, pumps and windmill parts that will be for sale

or trade. The public will be invited to come to the fair and buy and trade windmills.

Past trade fairs have demonstrated restoration techniques such as pouring babbitt bearings, building wooden wheel rims and other areas of windmill restoration. There will be a concession stand and banquet with probably a speaker on the subject of the history of wind power. Plans are still being made for the Spearman Trade Fair.

Of course, the central focus of the International Windmills' Trade Fair will be the spectacular, as T. Lindsay Baker termed it, J. B. Buchanan windmill collection. It is the SPWA's goal to have all the mills in the park and restored as Mr. Buchanan had them restored before the passage of time and storms necessitated their re-restoration.

There is always a windmill in the

SPWA barn being restored. There are others in various stages awaiting the SPWA's attention. If you have an interest in being part of restoring windmills, contact Orville Latham, Roger Buchanan or Gina Gillaspie. You can be of great help as carpenter, painter, mechanic or whatever other skill you may possess.

Windmills still need to be adopted. SPWA is urging businesses, organizations, families or individuals to adopt a mill. SPWA receives no support other than donations or income from adoption of its mills. Also, if you have old mills, especially Aermotor, the SPWA wants them.

In the past year, the SPWA has erected a Dempster, an Eli, the cable tower with Woodmanse head a Hummer, a Dempster No. 4, and the OK. Coming soon are a Leade and a Star. So much has been done but there is much more to do.

Superintendent's Corner

Over the past two years I have had the opportunity to write over 30 articles for the local newspaper. As you can tell by reading these articles, I don't profess to be a journalist. On the contrary, I have a simplistic style of writing as if I were speaking to you in person. Probably not journalistically correct, however I hope that I am able to communicate my message to you in an understandable way. I wonder what my freshmen English teacher at Texas Tech would say about me today. Oh well, he would probably get out the red ink pen and tear up my articles or as he would say give me some constructive criticism. I think that is what English teachers do best (just kidding).

As I thought about what to write this week, I am reminded how "education" has been a central theme in the presidential election and along with the challenge by the candidates of doing business as usual or whether or not to bring change to Washington D.C.

With that thought in mind and as part of my own professional development, I recently read a book called *Who Moved My Cheese* by Dr. Spencer Johnson. If you have not read this book, I would highly recommend that you read it. The book describes how some people face and deal with change(s) in their lives. With this book in mind my article this week will focus on the topic of CHANGE.

Board of Trustees (and should you too) is that they are progressive in their thinking. They understand that times are changing and the population that we serve is not the same as it was 20 years ago. They are constantly asking the most important question as we do facing many difficult decisions - "why?" They don't accept the rational that just because we have always done it a certain way that we always have to do it that way!

At our last board meeting the board identified some instructional areas that they want more information on. Some included topics they have heard from their constituents. They have asked the administration and teachers to research and make presentations on some of these topics. Included in these reports are questions like, "Why are we doing what we are doing and what are the results?" We are not doing this process to change everything that we are doing but rather making a conscious effort to stop and look at what we are doing and ask the ques-

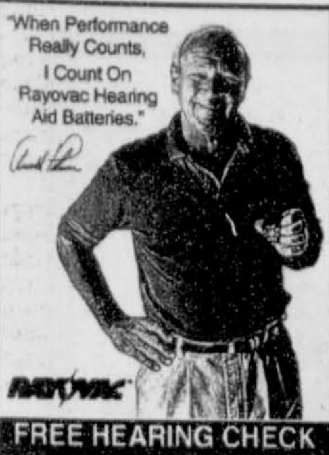
tion is it doing what we thought and want it to do. We may not change anything, but on the other hand we might find that what we are doing needs to be changed. Progressive or just good business, they want the BEST for the students in Spearman!

They are looking at the school climate and trying to make the school a better place for kids. To determine what they need to do, they will be asking parents, students and teachers through a survey, to respond to how we are currently doing business. The end results should be a better consensus on the direction that the school takes in the future. I applaud this campus for looking to see if they are being effective and if not, looking at what can they do to meet the ever changing needs of the students they serve. I don't know what the results of the surveys might show or even what will be done with

the information, but the first step in improvement and change is to realize that "just because" may not be the only way to do things! I look forward to the months ahead and to dream about what might be.

In the book, *Who Moved My Cheese*, there are characters that I think you can easily identify with. Read the book and see who you are as you face change(s) in your life. As stated earlier, change is inevitable; however, I don't believe that we change just for the sake of change. We change because we start asking why and realize that there many be other solutions.

All this is forcing me to ask the question, "Can we continue to do business as usual in the education business?" My personal opinion is NO! There will be many obstacles and challenges that face education in the next four years and in the future. We can either get left behind or be on the cutting edge. I think that most of you agree that we want to be on the cutting edge. Change, we don't need to fear it, we just need to accept and understand it. With this in mind, I can close my eyes and dream of what it may be like. I am excited about what I see.

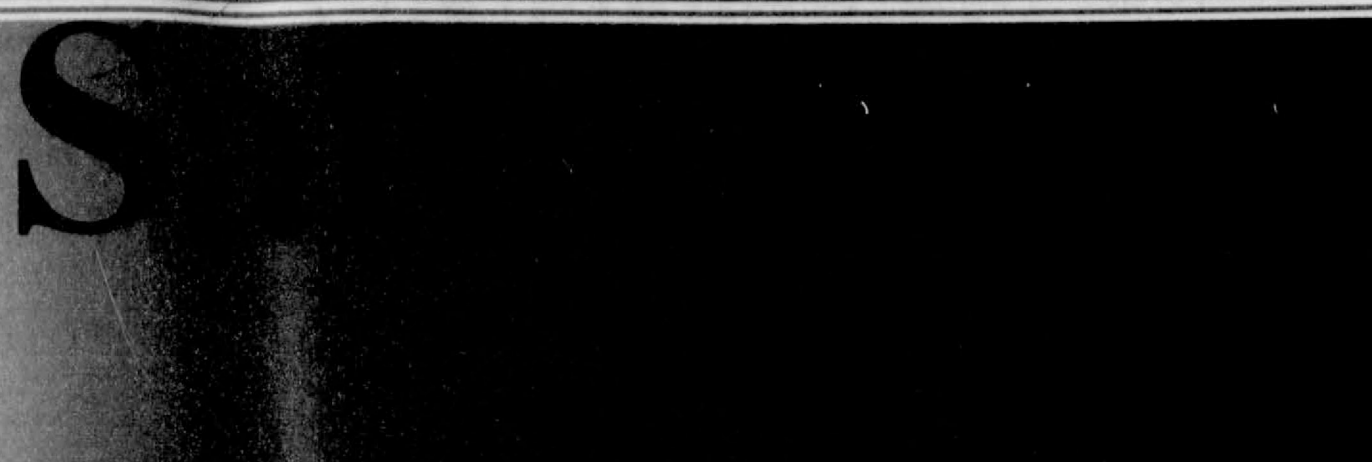

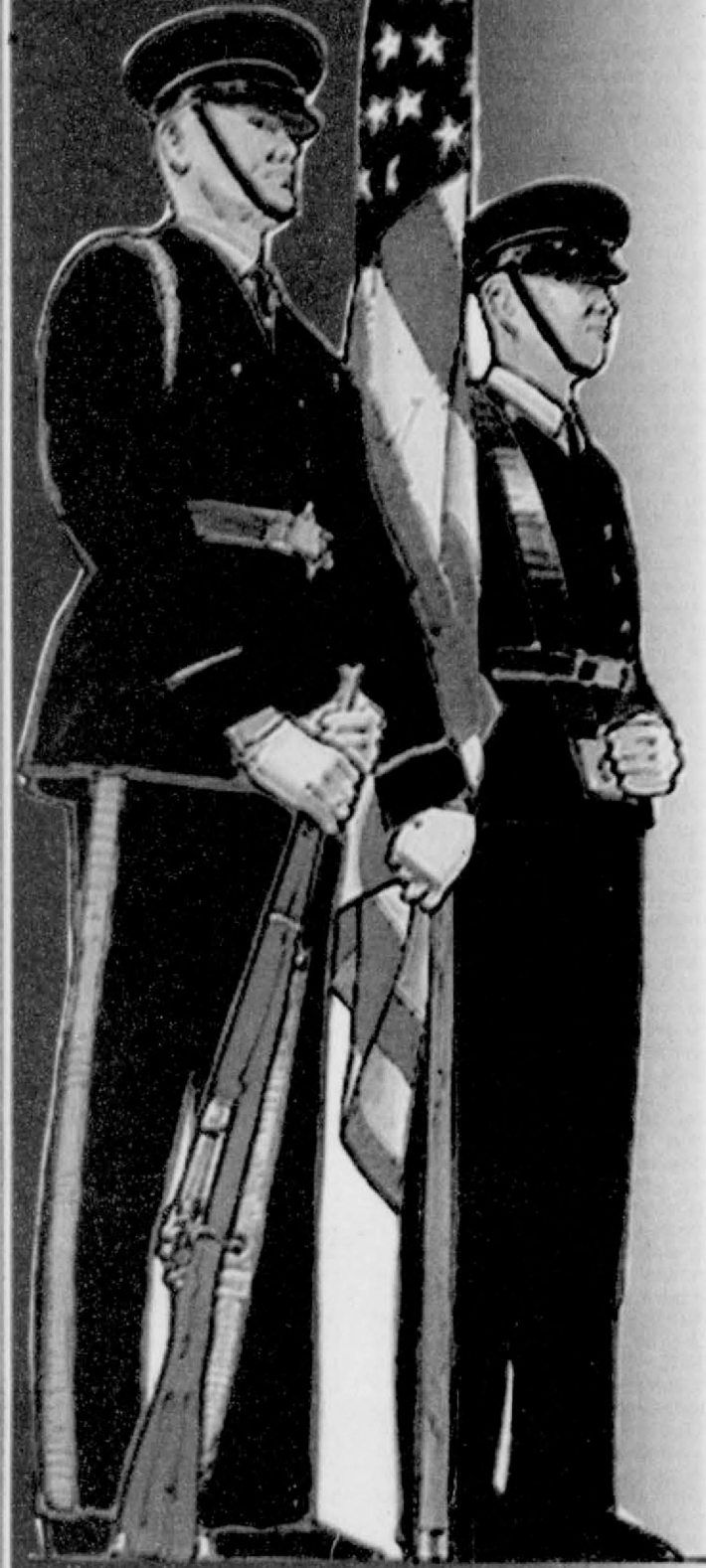
