### **Barnhart Honored For Employee Safety**

Ms. Linda Kay Barnhart, Superintendent of the Pringle-Morse Independent School District was recently honored for outstanding employee safety by the North Texas Educational Insurance Association at its annual meeting conducted in Austin, Texas. The Association consists of 121 participating school districts located throughout northern and central Texas. The district is a member of a uniquely designed partially self-funded workers' compensation program developed by Hibbs-Hallmark & Company and administrated by Claims Administrative Services, Inc., both located in Tyler. Hibbs-Hallmark & Company currently provides workers' compensation programs to over 26 percent of all schools in Texas. The purpose of the meeting was to recognize those districts that have held both the number and severity of employee accidents to a very low level. The combined savings during the 1994-95 school year, for all participating districts, was over \$2.5 million dollars when compared to the costs of fully insured programs. The total savings for all districts since inception of the programs in 1991 exceed \$28 million dollars.

The Pringle-Morse Independent School District was a Diamond

Star award recipient with the actual losses from employee accidents equaling less than 10 percent of the fund set aside by the district for claims expenses. The actual savings to the school district was \$9,338. "Our self insurance program was designed to provide the highest level of safety and offer the greatest potential for premium savings to the districts," said Billy Hibbs, President of Hibbs-Hallmark & Company. "We have a team of safety professionals who help the districts to implement a strict set of safety policies and procedures."

Claims Administrative Services, Inc. President, Barry Jones, stated "Member districts' commitment to safety is one of the key reasons for the Association's success. Their participation in HHC/CAS's program sets the standard for all schools across the state to reduce on the job injuries and save taxpayer dollars. The taxpayers should also be pleased to know that the Board of Trustees and the administrative staff of the Pringle-Morse Independent School District is doing everything possible to insure a safe working environment for its employees while reducing the cost of workers' compensation insurance," continued Jones.

Ladies, aren't we glad we don't have to cook like the pioneer ladies did! The cookstove at Fort Zulu was owned by Clementine Renner's parents, Joe and Hattie Venneman. The stove was donated to the museum by Clementine Renner and John

It wasn't just a push-of-thebutton" or "the twist-of-the-knob" in those days. The stove had to be "fed." The fuel in a box by the stove - cowchips. I asked Clementine, "Didn't your house smell awful when you were cooking?" She assured me that it had no odor from the cowchips.

The cowchips were gathered from the field, stacked in small piles, and left to dry. Later they would be picked up for use at the house. They were put in the stove through one of the small doors on the other side. The "chips" would turn white while burning, but would never lose their shape until touched with something. They would then fall apart into ashes. That's right girls, you had to empty ashes.

Men help a lot more in the kitchen these days. (Probably all the women of our generation taught their sons to help.) Anyway, I never remember, having seen a man help when there was cookstove. Pioneer men had too many chores outside to

The stoves had a flue for 11:00 a.m.

controlled by a draft, a device to regulate the air supply to the fire in the stove. I remember one time at my grandparents, the wall caught on fire around the flue of the heating stove. At that time, the farmers kept a slop bucket to feed pigs. That's what ended up on the wall to put the fire out,

Stoves are much safer today. I still have a scar on my left hand that I got as a one-year old. I touched the side of a stove. The stoves of today do not get so hot on the outside.

There are several cooking utensils on top of the stove at Fort Zulu. The most interesting to me was the waffer iron and the bread pan. Coffee pots and a tea kettle are also on display. The tea kettle belonged to Walter and Bertie McNabb.

Irons for clothing were also heated on the cookstove. They had a detachable handle. There is an iron like that on display and also one that is all metal for ironing small ruffles.

This particular stove has warming closets at the top, a place to keep food hot while the men were late in the field. Come on by and see this stove.

### **Extension News**

Eating out has become a national pastime. Americans eat out an average of five times per week and spend approximately 43 cents of every food dollar on food away from home. Even if you have learned to control your intake of fat, sodium and sugar at home, eating out can still be a challenge.

Here are some things you can do to help manage eating out.

Ask for smaller portions or half-orders. An appetizer can be a good substitute for an entree.

Go easy at fast food restaurants. Meals can easily range from 900 to 1800 calories. Fat accounts for over 50 percent of the calories in most traditional items.

\*Be selective at salad bars. You can build a 100-calorie or a 1000calorie salad depending on the types of toppings, dressings and specialty salads like pasta salad, potato salad and coleslaw that you add.

\*Limit breaded and fried items. \*Ask for dressings, sauces and gravies to be served on the side so you can control the amounts you

\*Use lowfat products, like lowfat milk.

\*Avoid croissants and biscuits. They are high-fat items. A restaurant biscuit has twice the fat of one that's homemade and can contain as many as 275 and fruits when available





Jim Derrington has been marking down the date of the first buzzard sightings for three years now. The last two years they came on March 24 and March 25. This year the first vanguard came on March 22. He noticed that each date fell on a Friday.

Jim is also keeping tabs on our swallows to see if they are as predictable as the swallows of Capistrano. They are April arrivers.

If you are interested in learning more about cormorants, Jim invites you to stop at the office and view them through the scope that is set up. The double crested and the neotropic are the two species of cormorants found in Texas. I think we have the double-crested ones at the Lake, but I hope someone else will confirm that.

In the 1970s and early 1980s bird watchers were concerned by the dwindling populations of

these fishing birds. They thought they might follow the passenger pigeons and dodos into extinction, but instead the birds are now on the increase.

The cormorants are called double-crested because of two small tufts of feathers that curve back from the eyes during breeding season. The tufts are white on western birds and darker and less noticeable on eastern birds. The tufts are usually not present while the birds are in

The neat part about these birds is their wonderful fishing ability. They take the fish by diving from the air or by swimming and submerging. My generation learned about cormorants from our geography books and studies on Asia. We learned how clever fishermen tethered these birds to their boats. The birds would dive off and bring up fish that they were prevented from swallowing by a ring the handler had placed on their necks.

Soon these birds will fly north to their summer breeding grounds on the lakes of the central and northern Great Plains and the prairie provinces of Canada.

Federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 city official around the country took a deep breath. They have yet to exhale. The impact on cities of deregulating the telephone, cable and other "telecommunication" providers has yet to be determined. If, as those in favor of deregulation say, deregulation will bring more services at a cheaper cost then the impact will be good. However, if the opponents are right and the "big providers will eat the little providers," then we could see rural towns get stuck with higher prices and fewer services.

When Congress passed, and the

One feature of deregulation may be of special importance to cities: franchises. The new law allows cities to continue to manage the rights-of-way (where most of the telephone poles, telephone wires and cable wires are located) and charge the utilities a fee for using these rights-of-way. However, the new law says that the cities have to "require fair and reasonable compensation from telecommunications provides, on a competitively natural and nondiscriminatory basis..." In other words, the city cannot charge one utility a certain fee and charge a competitor another fee. Seems simple enough. However, it becomes complicated when cities have to determine what is "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory." Does that mean that any telephone company/cable company/computer network can put up telephone poles in the streets and alleys if they want to? I would hate to see the streets and alleys lined with telephone pole after telephone pole.

The issue of "competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory" also comes into play when we consider franchise fees. Currently, we charge the telephone company, the electric company and the cable company a percentage of their total sales in Spearman. But, what happens when another telephone company, for instance, wants to provide services over the telephone lines owned by GTE and charges the residential customer for the service? I'm sure that the second telephone company would say that GTE is paying the City the franchise fee for having their telephone poles and wires in the city's rights-of-way and therefore, the second telephone company doesn't owe the city a dime. The city would argue that the second telephone company is still using the city's rights-ofway and that the second telephone company should pay the city a percentage of its revenues from Spearman

The issue of franchises hasn't been completely worked out yet. It is very possible that the City of Spearman will have to re-do its telephone and cable TV franchise ordinances to allow for more telecommunication services by more companies.
