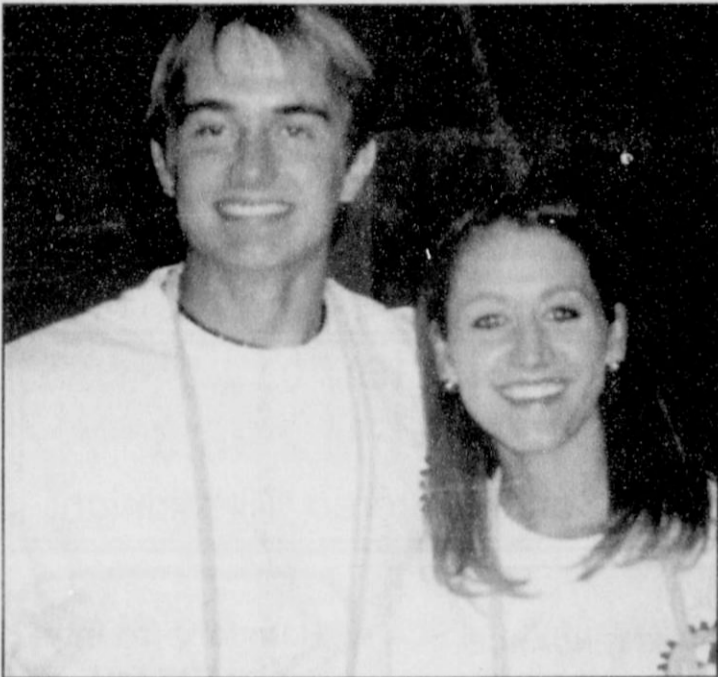

2002 Streetball Challenge Set For July 13-14

Amarillo's original 3-on-3 streetball event returns for the 11th consecutive year as Kids, Incorporated brings the ultimate in basketball back to downtown Amarillo. Tip-off for the 2002 Streetball Challenge is scheduled for Saturday, July 13, and Sunday, July 14. Held in the downtown area for the seventh year in a row, the 2002 Streetball Challenge will be played on the 3rd, 4th and 5th blocks of Polk and Tyler streets.

The tournament is open to male and female players. Divisions begin at the 10 & Under age group, and progress through the adult Supreme Court division. Teams will be grouped into divisions with teams of similar height, age and playing ability. Last year's event consisted of 292 teams competing in 41 divisions.

Entry fees are set at \$92 per team with an entry deadline of Wednesday, July 10, 5 pm. Entry forms are to be turned in to Kids, Incorporated located at 27th and Osage. Each player will receive an official event t-shirt, and each team is guaranteed a minimum of three games. Prizes will be awarded to the first and second place winners in each division. All proceeds from the 2002 Streetball Challenge will support the athletic programs offered by Kids, Incorporated. Approximately 13,000 children participate annually in Kids, Incorporated activities. The mission of Kids, Incorporated is to provide every child who desires to play the opportunity to do just that.

Special events for this year's events include the traditional 10' Slam Dunk contest and 3-Point contests sponsored by Buck's Sporting Goods. The 10' Slam Dunk contest will be held on Saturday, July 13, at 1:15 pm; the 3-Point contest is held all day Saturday, July 13. Post Masters, Rates To Change at Local Offices

New postal rates will arrive while two post masters will make their departure at local offices this weekend.

Randy Pilcher, a fifteen year employee of the United States Postal Service (USPS) who has served as Spearman Postmaster for four years, and Mike Floyd, a 24 USPS veteran who has served the Gruver Post Office for nine years, will mark their final day in those positions on Friday, June 28.

Pilcher will be taking over the helm of the Perryton Post Office while Floyd will be filling the postmaster's role at Valley View, Texas on Saturday, June 29.

Charilyn Larson, former Spearman resident, will serve as the officer in charge at the Spearman Post Office and Penny Kruse, current Gruver USPS employee, will serve in the interim period at the Gruver Post Office.

The position of post master will be filled in each city within 60-90 days.

Postal rates increases will begin on Sunday, June 30, 2002 with the price of a first class letters, flats and parcels to be 37¢ for the first ounce and 23¢ for each additional ounce.

Post cards will be 23¢. Other increased rates will be Priority Mail, up to one pound and flat rate envelope - \$3.85, Express Mail, up to 1/2 pound and flat rate envelope - \$13.65 with 1/2 pound and up to two pounds now costing \$17.85.

Special services rates are certified mail - \$2.30, restricted delivery - \$3.50, domestic money orders of 1¢-\$500. - 90¢, and money orders of \$500-\$1,000 - \$1.25.

Return receipts will be \$1.75, return receipts for merchandise - \$3.00, delivery confirmation with

priority mail - 45¢, with first-class mail parcels and package services - 55¢, and signature confirmation - \$1.80.

Insured mail rates for up to \$50 will be \$1.30, from \$50.01 - \$100 - \$2.25, and from \$100.01 - \$5,000 - \$2.20 plus \$1.00 per each \$100.

I had a dream come true this week. I had the amazing opportunity to interview Barry Manilow on Wednesday morning by telephone. He has been my favorite musician for as long as I can remember. (I had a little difficulty at the beginning of the interview. When I answered the phone and he said, "Hi, this is Barry Manilow." I didn't know what to say. I managed, "Hello," then said, "I don't know what to say." He kindly responded, "Well, just jump right in there.")

The rest of the twenty-minute interview went better. He was extremely gracious to me, as I have NO experience interviewing anyone of his stature. His kindness only reinforced his place in my heart.

Just the mention of his name brings to mind images for people of all ages. Fan or not, odds are you can name several of his 38 top 40 hits from among his 32 albums.

At 58, the singer/songwriter is in the middle of the "LIVE2002!" tour, launched on December 31, 2001 as the opening act for the Kodak Theatre in Los Angeles. "Live 2002!" features songs from his new Concord Records release "Here At The Mayflower," as well as songs from "Ultimate Manilow" (Arista Records).

"Ultimate Manilow" debuted in February 2001 at #3 on the Billboard 200 Album chart and #1 on the Billboard Top Internet chart. Manilow has the distinction of earning Arista's very first #1 pop and AC single, Mandy, in 1975; and now, 27 years later, he wins the highest album chart debut of his career, setting a personal all-time record Soundscan sales figure of 113,365 units.

"Here at the Mayflower," his 31st album, is a concept disc and song cycle filled with creative, thoughtful and emotionally compelling music. Set within the context of an apartment building in his native Brooklyn, the disc features songs about people and their lives. "It was everything I wanted it to be," he enthuses. "It's enabled my collaborators and me to write songs about people of all ages and walks of life. This album is about people and friendships, and the cycle in life that we all go through."

The National Academy of Popular Music inducted Manilow into the Songwriters Hall of Fame earlier this month. As the Number One Adult Contemporary Artist of All Time (Radio & Records Magazine), he has received Grammy, Emmy, Tony awards and has been nominated for an Academy Award. In addition to his own recordings, every album Manilow has produced for other artists, including Bette Midler, Nancy Wilson and Dionne Warwick, has been nominated for Grammy Awards.

Mr. Manilow will perform at the Smirnoff Music Center in Dallas on July 5th. (Tickets are available through Ticketmaster, 214-373-8000.)

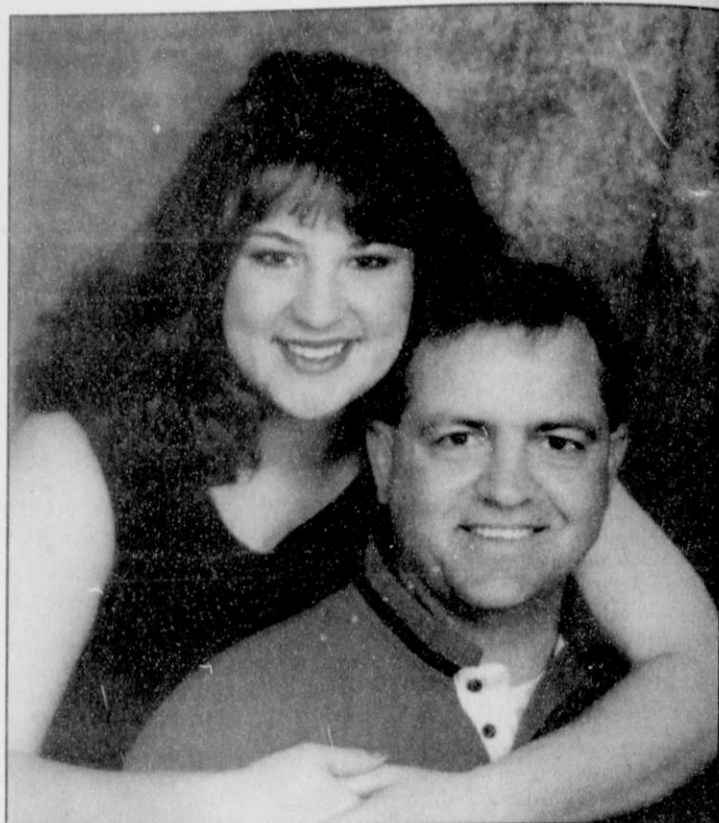

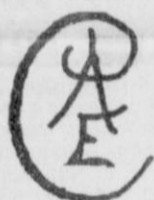

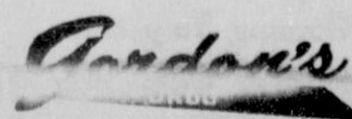

Manor Residents Tour Alligator Ranch

On Wednesday, June 12th, several residents of Hansford Manor and staff took a road trip out to the local alligator ranch located west of Spearman on the Gruver highway about a half of a mile. Dean Coates, master alligator handler at the alligator ranch, was very hospitable to our crew. The first bus load that we took out included his mother, who resides at Hansford Manor, Marie Coates.

When you pull up out front, you encounter a big yellow nose cone off of an airplane, it has the alligator ranch logo painted on the side. At first glance at the front of the building there are not many clues at the work that has gone on inside. Once inside the first welcoming room, you enter into the alligator habitat. It is impressive! The walls have been painted by Donna Hendrickson with scenery to look like a zoo. There are several tanks inside. Some are empty right now because they are reserved for the large alligators in the winter time. One is full of smaller alligators (around 10, I believe) that are approximately 3 feet long. Their tank is kept heated with fresh water warming in an adjoining tank so that their water can be changed regularly. Right beside the tank is a feed machine. You can put in a quarter and it gives you some feed that you can give to the smaller alligators. They are very appreciative when you do.

There are counters full of alligator jewelry and alligator heads. The jewelry includes necklaces and bolos made from real alligator teeth!

We went outside to where Dean showed us the big daddys! He was gracious enough to us that he fed the alligators out there. It was interesting to watch him feed them. He has a pulley that he attaches a hunk of meat to and trolleys out to the alligators. The alligators then waller around and bite at it until one wins out and gets it

into its mouth and gulp...it's gone! It was interesting to find out that they only eat about six months out of the year.

Our residents and staff enjoyed the trip immensely. When you have time, it is well worth the visit to see the local alligators.

GISD Board Meets

A new junior high principal, high school counselor, and five teachers were employed while no action was taken on the superintendent's contract at the June 18 meeting of the GISD Board of Trustees.

Matt Branstine of Bovina was hired as the junior high principal while his wife Wendy will become the high school counselor. Contracts for employment were also extended to Jose Carmen Acevado for high school Spanish, Eva Spivey for fourth grade, Angie Clawson for elementary ESL (English as a Second Language), Kimberly Irwin BCIS (Business Computer Information Systems), and Julie Babbs for high school math teacher.

After an executive discussion on the Superintendent's contract and an evaluation of performance under such contract, no action was taken in open session.

In other action, the board approved five motions by unanimous 7-0 votes.

Approved were the policy for fixed assets (GASB 34) with assets having a purchase cost of \$5,000 or more to be considered a fixed asset, a revision on the oil and gas lease contract, the salary schedules, and out of district transfers into the Gruver ISD for the 2002-2003 school year.

Also approved were the teaching contracts for Angie Clawson and Eva Spivey, the "No Child Left Behind" goals for schools by President Bush, and the naming of Rob Schmucker as Head Tennis Coach.

Items of discussion in the executive session from 6:42 - 10:59 p.m., was the interview with Matt Branstine for junior high principal, a discussion of personnel, and the action or lack of action on the superintendent's contract and performance of the superintendent under such contract.

In open session, items of discussion were employee resignations of teacher(s) and principal, and the financial report of the oil and gas lease and the investment report and cash position.

Yanke were present with superintendent Laura Blassingame.

Visitors received were Randy Reid, Ann Moore, and Dave Karlin.

Diseased Cedar Trees

Three couples have come from Borger to camp and fish the last three weekends. The first week they came they caught 12 big catfish; the second week they caught 16 big ones, but last week end they didn't do well.

Remember the Fireworks at Dusk on the 4th of July at the Lake. It is sponsored by both the Gruver and Spearman Chambers of Commerce. All entrance fees will be discontinued at 6 o'clock, but donations at the entrances will be welcomed.

Ticks Usually in the spring or early summer I print a warning about being alert to the danger of rattlesnakes, but this is a warning to be aware that ticks have become an item to watch out for, particularly if you have hiked in the taller grass or brushy areas. Having never heard of ticks on people in Hansford County, I was surprised when our daughter Jean Harris told me they were finding a few ticks on their children this year. An article in Tri-State Ag on June 20 gave me more information, but it was a visit with Elvin Wright that illustrated first hand about a tick bite.

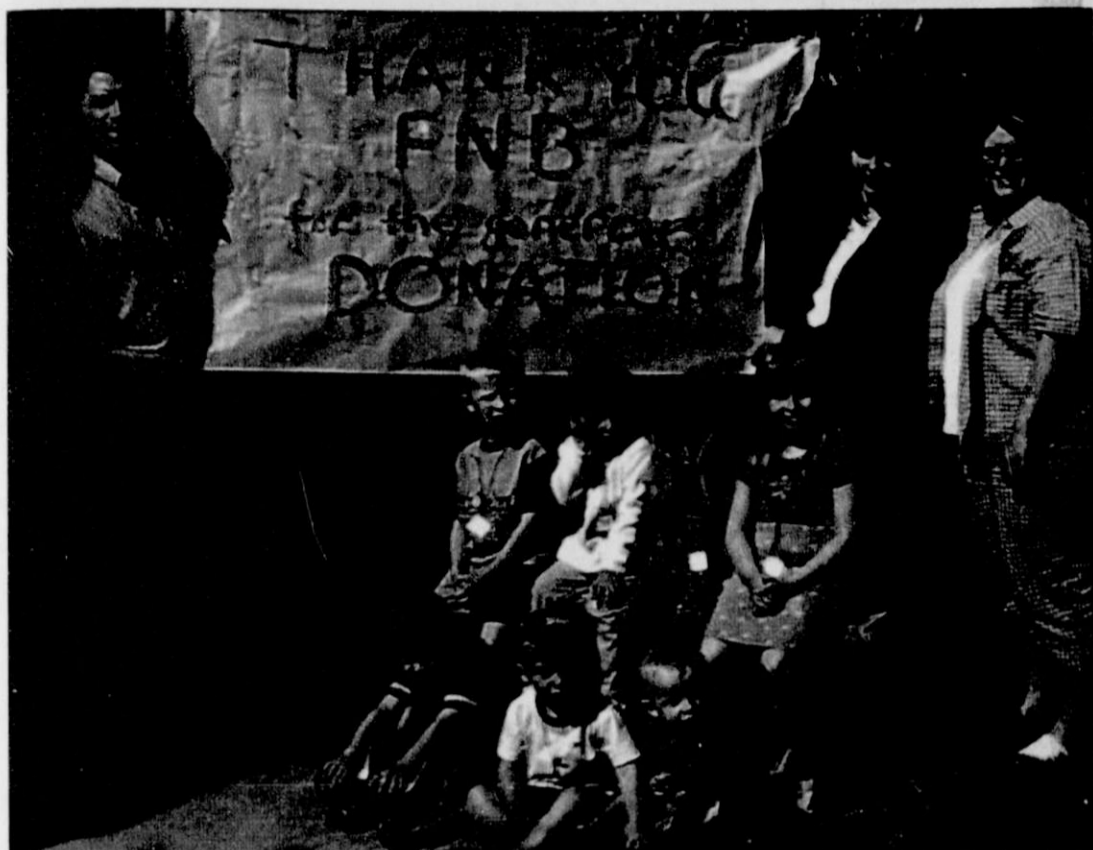
A few days ago when Elvin Wright of Gruver began to experience chest pain and flu-like symptoms, his first thought was that he was having trouble with his second pacemaker after 20 years of wearing the little electronic helpers. He called his cardiologist, but talked to the nurse. She said she didn't think it sounded like his heart and advised him to see his general practitioner.

After an EKG and other tests at Spearman, Elvin was pronounced fit. He then asked the doctor to look at a red spot on the back of his knee. That's when the doctor discovered the source of his problem--a much engorged tick. He carefully removed it with tweezers and then checked to see that he had gotten the head and its parts all out. Next was a prescription for an antibiotic.

Elvin thinks he had gotten the tick while doing yard work. He had cleaned out the debris under a big pine tree and tromped it into a container. The tick bite is different in that you don't usually feel it. People with flu-like symptoms following contact with a tick are advised to get medical help as soon as possible.

Contrary to the use of fingernail polish, petroleum jelly, kerosene, matches, etc., the authorities now recommend tweezers. Using a steady motion, gently pull the tick straight out. If you don't have tweezers, use a tissue to protect your fingers from body fluids of the tick.

Elvin and I have a theory that the influx of deer in the county has brought in the ticks.
