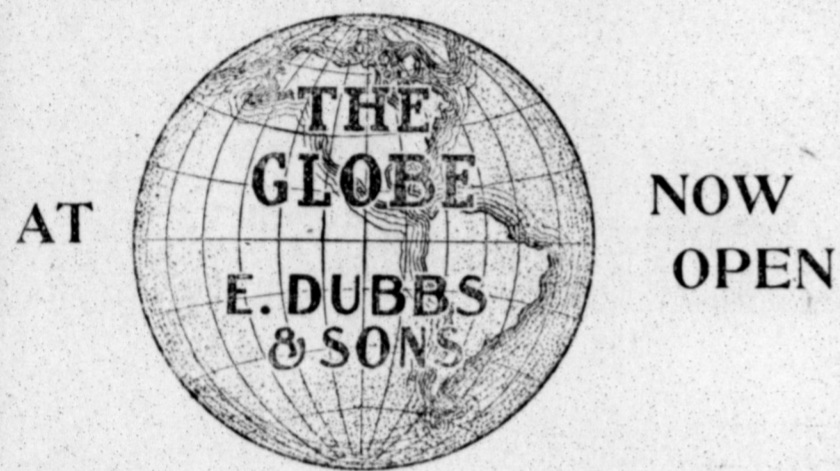

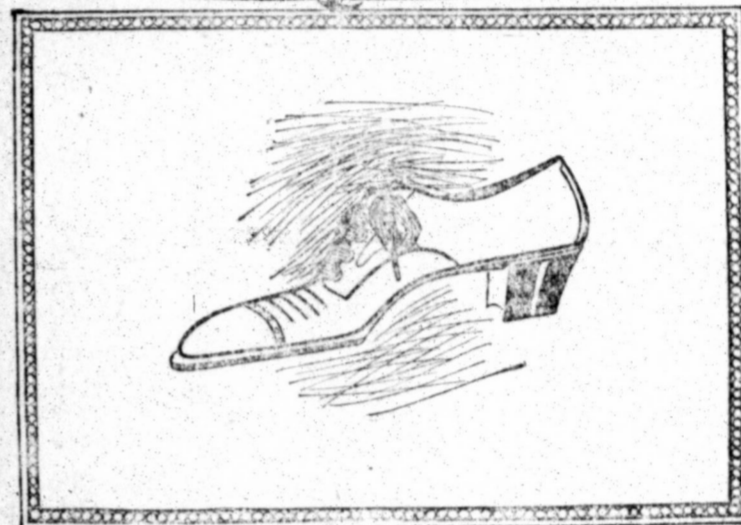

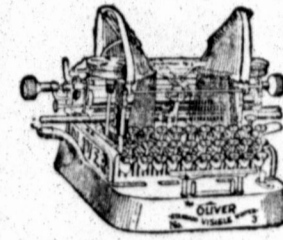

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SYMPATHY OF THE PRESS

Newspaper Men are Kind in Their Expressions of Regret at Death of Dr. Wm. H. Cooke.

Dr. W. H. Cooke, formerly a dentist of Denton, died last Sunday night at his home in Clarendon, Donley county, of la grippe and aged debility, being about seventy-six years of age. He changed his residence from Denton to Clarendon about nine years ago. He is survived by five children, to wit: Mrs. Dr. J. R. Briggs, of Dallas, Mrs. Albert Erwin, of this city, Robert Cooke, a telegraph operator of Ft. Worth and one of the original proprietors of the Denton County news, John Cooke, editor of the Clarendon Banner-Stockman, and at one time editor of the Denton County News, and Mrs. Marguerite McCormick, of Clarendon.

Dr. Cooke was every inch a gentleman of the old-time school, and none knew him but to esteem him; a man of the strictest honesty and integrity, beloved by all who knew him and idolized by his family. We do not believe there is a religious creed among men but what lands in Heaven such a character as Dr. W. H. Cooke.—Denton Monitor.

News was received Monday of the death of Dr. W. H. Cooke, which occurred at 8 p. m. Sunday at his home in Clarendon, Donley county. La grippe is given as the cause of death, aided by old age.

Dr. Cooke was about seventy-five years old and was at one time a well known resident of this city, where he practiced dentistry for many years. He left here about nine years ago and went to Clarendon to reside.

Dr. Cooke is survived by five children, Mrs. Albert Erwin of this city, Robert Cooke, of Ft. Worth, John E. Cooke, editor of the Clarendon Banner-Stockman, Mrs. Marguerite McCormick, of Clarendon, and Mrs. J. R. Briggs, of Dallas.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at Clarendon.—Denton Record and Chronicle.

Dr. William H. Cooke, formerly of this city and the father of Mrs. Albert Erwin and John E. Cooke, died at his home in Clarendon last Sunday.

Dr. Cooke was at the time of his death over seventy-five years old and had for many years been practicing dentistry and stood high in his profession.

He was a member of the Baptist church since childhood and of the Masonic order since early manhood. Besides his wife five children survive him; three daughters, Mrs. J. R. Briggs, of Dallas, Mrs. Albert Erwin, of Denton, and Mrs. Marguerite McCormick, of Clarendon; and two sons, Robert F. Cooke, chief clerk in the superintendent's office of the Texas and Pacific railway at Ft. Worth, and John E. Cooke, editor of the Banner-Stockman, of Clarendon.—Denton County News.

Dr. W. H. Cooke, the well known Clarendon dentist, died last Sunday. He was well known for several years by many Memphis people. He was father to Editor John E. Cooke of the Banner-Stockman.—Hall County Herald.

Relatives in this city have received news of the death of Dr. William Henderson Cooke, which occurred on March 17, at his home Clarendon, Texas, of pneumonia.

Dr. Cooke was aged 75 years at the time of his death and was active

in business affairs. He was well known in McMinn county which was the home of his birth, his boyhood and early manhood. He was a son of Rev. H. C. Cooke, well known in his day as one of the pioneer ministers of East Tennessee and was a Baptist by profession.

Dr. Cooke went to Texas many years ago and achieved success in the practice of his profession, serving for a number of terms as president of the Texas State Dental association. He leaves many boyhood friends here who will regret to learn of his death.—Athens (Tenn.) Post.

(Commenting on the death of Dr. Cooke the Bonham News says:)

Dr. Cooke is remembered by all the citizens who lived here prior to 1890. He moved to this place in 1879, and remained here until 1890 or 1891. He practiced his profession here, and was a good dentist as well as a good man. His oldest son, Robert Cooke, was an employe of THE NEWS for a number of years. In a private letter to the editor telling of his father's sickness and death, he says:

"Strange to say, on the night before he died he thought he was editing THE BONHAM NEWS, and spoke of you and Jim. He seemed to think that you were away, and that the editorial duties fell on him. I can not imagine how such an idea got into his head."

Dr. Cooke was a prominent member of the Masonic Lodge, and at one time Master of the lodge at this place. That body conducted the funeral services, and buried him with the honors of the lodge on Tuesday.

Mrs. W. H. Kantz, of Ector, is a sister to the deceased.

Dr. Cooke was of a most pleasant disposition, a good provider for his family, faithful to his church, a kind and considerate neighbor, and to know him was to be his friend. We cannot but feel the deepest sympathy for his companion, knowing they were greatly attached to each other, and also extend our sympathy to the rest of the family.—Clarendon Chronicle.

We yield with the trusting "Even so, Father, for it seemeth good in thy sight," while on the thorn that pierce our hearts to the depth, there blooms the fragrant flower of christian comfort, and through our tears, falling thick and fast, there blooms the sweet splendor from that Star of Heavenly Hope which lighted his way through the long years of his life to his glorious "Home of the Soul."

He leaves behind him a wife and five children who are bowed down under such a weight of sorrow and sadness that time alone can assuage. In their bereavement they have the tender sympathy of a host of friends.

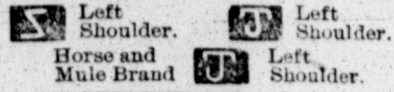

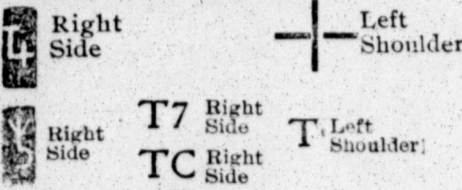

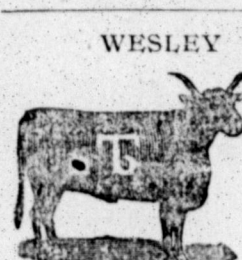
