

Texas Wesleyan University Men's Golf Team Ranked 6th

The Lynx will play Boys Ranch on Friday, September 25th for Homecoming. Homecoming festivities will begin at 7 p.m. at Lynx Stadium. The pep rally will be held at 2 p.m. in the varsity gym, and will include the crowning of the Homecoming Queen and King.

After starting the day in a tie for 5th, the Texas Wesleyan University men's golf team took Newman University to a playoff at Abilene Christian's Charles Coody West Texas Intercollegiate on Tuesday, September 15, 2009.

The 6th ranked Rams posted the 5th best single round in program history at 278 in Tuesday's final round. Newman fired a 281 and the two teams found themselves tied at 570 for the tournament.

Newman then prevailed on the second hole of the ensuing playoff. The Rams total of 570 matched the 7th lowest through 36 holes in program history.

Senior Drew Koonce led the charge with a four-under par 67 to take a share of the individual lead at 138. Abilene Christian's Adam Carpenter, a freshman playing his first collegiate event, won medalist honors in the field of 78 individuals, breaking a three-way tie on the fourth playoff hole.

Armando Villarreal shot 69 on Tuesday to finish tied for 10th at 141. Stuart Martin shot 70 to finish tied for 12th at 142 (72-70). Tyler Lackey (74) and Frazer Ogston (72) tied for 53rd at 151 for the tournament.

The Texas Wesleyan University men's golf team hosted the 12th annual O.D. Bounds Golf Classic on Monday, September 21, 2009. The event was held at Diamond Oaks Country Club, and all proceeds benefited the O.D. Bounds Endowment, which supports the golf program at Texas Wesleyan.

The tournament, which featured 35 teams and 139 individuals raised approximately \$20,000, raising the O.D. Bounds Endowment to approximately \$200,000.

The Blue division was won by the foursome of Reed Petrie, Kyle Finkler, Stuart Martin, and Billy Privette with a score of 119. The Gold division was won by the foursome of Mashall Barton, Benny Hamilton, Jack Kell, and Johnny Pilcher after a scorecard playoff with a score of 136.

The Rams will return to action at next week's Rattler Invitational, September 28-29, in San Antonio, TX.

Stuart Martin, a junior exercise science major, is a graduate of Spearman High Schoo where he was a three-time district medalist for coach Doug Bowles, a regional medalist in his senior year and took 5th place in the 2A Texas Boys State Tournament.

During the 2007-08 school year he played in five varsity events as a freshman, finished sixth (225) at the RRAC Championship and participated in the NAIA National Tournament where he finished tied for 58th (74-79-78-75-306).

In 2008-09, he played in six varsity events as a sophomore, tied for 12th in the RRAC Championship, tied for 14th and shot his low round of the season at 70 in the Grand Canyon Invitational and counted three of four rounds at the NAIA National Championship.

AARP Warning: Telephone Scam

AARP Texas warned its members and consumers generally today to immediately suspect anyone purporting to be with the organization and who is asking for personal information about assets over the telephone. Four cases have been reported in Fort Worth to date in which a man representing himself to be with AARP in Houston inquired if the member had \$50,000 in a bank account or the stock market. "Don't fall victim to a scam," said AARP State Director Bob Jackson. "AARP does not ask for this type of confidential information over the telephone. It looks as if someone is using our good name and reputation to bilk unsuspecting people and separate them from their hard earned money." AARP has alerted the Consumer Protection Division at the Texas Office of the Attorney General. Anyone receiving a call like this should file a complaint with the OAG at



HISTORICAL MUSINGS

As we embark on the development of the second

In the seventeenth week of Pentecost, we learn more of the Royal Law, "Love Your Neighbor As Yourself", as we study Numbers 11: 4-6,10-16, 24-29, Psalm 19: 7-14, James 5: 13-20, and Mark 9: 38-50.

The people are murmuring against Moses and against God. They remember the spices, the food of Egypt which they ate for free. [Somehow they have forgotten the slavery part.] They murmur to the point that Moses complains to God about the people. Moses is at a loss as to how to deal with the situation. God teaches Moses to delegate and allows His spirit to fall on seventy of the elders who will act as helpers to Moses. The spirit fell upon two elders who were not present at the tabernacle. They began to prophesy. Aaron reports to Moses and wishes to stop these elders from prophesying. Moses answers, "Would that all the Lord's people were prophets." We can learn from this that the Spirit of the Lord rests on all believers and we are all called to service in his name. The Psalmist sings of the "perfectness" of God's law. In keeping God's ordinances there is great reward. He concludes his song with "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my hear be acceptable to you, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer. We keep the "Royal Law" "Love your neighbor as yourself" and this can be accomplished only through prayer and meditation in God's word. James is nothing if not practical. Do not expect a book of theology, James is Christianity in application. He calls for the Church to "Love your neighbor as yourself." James asks that any who are suffering, pray. Any that are joyful should sing songs of praise. If any are sick they should call for the elders of the church to pray over them, anointing them with oil. The Lord can lift up the sick. The Lord will forgive our sins. James tells the faith community to confess their sins to each other so that they might be healed of sin. We can learn from this that suffering in our faith community can be from disease, divorce, disaster, disappointments, and death. How do we as believers minister to those suffering. James tells us, "The prayers of the righteous are powerful and effective." Pray for those in suffering. Lend a sympathetic ear. Act as an example to the fallen. In the words of St. Paul, "Carry one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ. The highest good is leading another to Christ. Jesus warns the disciples not to forbid anyone from healing in Jesus' name. If you offer only a cup of water to the thirsty in the name of Christ, you will not lose your reward. Jesus warns the faith community not to place a stumbling block before the little ones who believe in him. With Middle Eastern exaggeration, Jesus emphasizes the necessity of ridding oneself of anything that would separate us from the love of God. We can learn from these teachings a lesson of tolerance for God's truth is too great for any one man, any one group to completely know. We can learn that we will be "salted" with fire. This means that we will be purified. May the Holy Spirit allow you to be "salty" so that your community will be strengthened in Christ Jesus.







She accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as her Savior and Lord in a tent revival held in Uvalde by Brother Johnny Modrick, a minister of the Apostolic Faith Movement, when she was 13 years old. She almost immediately felt a calling to the ministry and formally started her ministry at the age of 17.

She married Sherman Sutton of Mountain Grove, Mo., on Sept. 30, 1941, in Uvalde. They set out in the ministry together. They worked as gospel workers in revivals, in camp meetings, in convocations, in youth camps, in daily vacation Bible schools, pastoring churches and etc. until their first son, Garry Sherman Sutton was born on April 21, 1948.

They purchased a home in Uvalde and Louise worked as a secretary for the Smith Ortho Co. and Sherman worked as a mechanic and propane truck delivery driver in Uvalde. A second son was born to Louise and Sherman Sutton of May 14, 1949.

They started having church services in their home while in Uvalde. In 1954, they accepted a pastorate in Enid, Okla., and re-entered the ministry full time. Louise also pastured churches in Amarillo, Arnett, Okla., Spearman, Snyder, Stockton, Calif., and Roswell, N.M.

Louise was an active church pastor for 58 years working with the people of the Apostolic Faith Movement. Louise was a faculty member of the Apostolic Faith Bible College in Baxter Springs, Kan., in the late '60s and early '70s and taught Bible Doctrine (Theology) and Evangelism.

She published a four-volume series on Bible Doctrine as a result of her teaching with the Bible College and they are still used in churches today. When she was forced to quit pastoring, she felt the need to continue to minister to others by phone, letter, and particularly by faithfully sending cards weekly to anyone who was in need of healing, comfort, or encouragement in any way for any reason.

She remained faithful to this correspondence ministry until just the past few months when she could no longer see well enough or write well enough to continue. She still ministered to many on the telephone after having to discontinue her card ministry. She was a faithful servant of the Lord for 72 years.

The day Louise passed away she made the statement that she was most thankful that both her sons were serving the Lord and were ministers of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Louise was also a longtime employee of the Contel Telephone Co. which became GTE Telephone Co. and then Verison Telephone Co. She retired from Verison in the late 1980s.

This weekend there were 4 campers behind the dam, but otherwise there was not much activity.

The lake level is so low again that Jim has to "shoot it", as the water level is too low to measure on the scale at the intake tower.

Last week he took his dog Scooter with him one day as he read it. The dog jumped 4 turkeys up at the edge of the water, and they flew off .

Soon though a fifth turkey took the air awkwardly, almost seeming to be walking on the water as it slowly was able to get airborne. Then the sixth tried to fly over Horse Creek but instead went down in the water and began swimming away. Scooter swam after the bird, grabbed it by the wing and tried to pull it back to Jim. It was hard work, and the dog gave up before he got to Jim. When he turned the bird loose, it immediately resumed swimming across Horse Creek to the opposite side. Jim said the turkey made it.

If it had been anyone but Jim telling me this story, I would wonder if I was being gullible to believe it. It is hard for me to imagine a turkey swimming. 




