

NPEC sends crew, equipment to assist in repair of damage caused by Hurricane Rita

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HANSFORD COUNTY LIBRARY

Five linemen and 3 trucks left early Monday morning en route to the Southeast Texas town of Kirbyville to assist in power restoration efforts at Jasper-Newton Electric Cooperative.

North Plains Electric Cooperative (NPEC) personnel left early Monday with a heavy load of supplies and equipment to travel almost 700 miles to render aid to a sister cooperative decimated by Hurricane Rita. Jasper-Newton Electric Cooperative is headquartered in Kirbyville about 70 miles north of Beaumont. It serves 21,000 meters in Jasper, Newton, Angelina, Orange and Sabine counties, some of the heavier hit counties. As of Monday, all meters were reported without power.

NPEC General Manager Randy Mahannah made the crew available on Friday, when Texas Electric Cooperatives, the statewide association of electric cooperatives, asked for volunteers. "I felt it was important that we offer help in a catastrophic situation like this. You never know when the table will be turned and we will face a major ice storm or tornado and be the one asking for aid." Mahannah added, "Although almost half of our line crew will be helping in Southeast Texas, members should expect the same good service they are accustomed to. However, new services may be delayed somewhat due to shortages in material not only from Hurricane Rita but also Katrina. Absent personnel assisting with Hurricane Rita may also cause new constitution delays." NPEC is one of several Panhandle and South Plains electric cooperatives providing assistance to the area.

The NPEC crew drove 15 hours on Monday and was able to stay with a crew member's family on Monday night in Jacksonville. The crew reported to the Jasper-Newton Tuesday. They will work for ten days and will be relieved by other NPEC personnel for another 10-day shift, if needed. One southeast Texas co-op official estimates 3 to 4 weeks for complete restoration in the hardest hit areas including Jasper, Newton, Sabine and Orange Counties. NPEC crews will remain in the area as long as they are needed.

NPEC is a cooperative distributing electricity in Hansford, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts and Wheeler counties. Formed in 1944, it serves 5228 meters and maintains 3468 miles of electrical line. It is owned and controlled by the members it serves.

Words from Faith & Grace

Faith must be active in producing the fruits of love. We, as Christians, must be like "little Christs" to our neighbors. This weeks lessons are found in Isaiah 5:1-7, Psalm 80: 7-14, Philippians 3:4-13, and Matthew

Isaiah sings a "love song", which in truth is a "juridicial" parable [a realistic story about a violation of law, told to someone who has committed a similar offense, with the purpose of leading the unsuspecting hearer to pass judgment on himself.] The Lord is about to judge Israel because Israel has forgotten justice and righteousness.

The Psalmist also sings, but his song is a plea for God to restore His vine [Israel] from their oppression.

Paul reminds the Philipians that he is a "Jew's Jew". He was a Pharisee; he observed the law; he had Jewish parents, he was of the tribe of Benjamin, he had persecuted the early church; yet, he counted all this as rubbish when he came to faith in Jesus Christ. Paul reminds the Philipians that righteousness comes through faith and not through circumcision or "keeping" the law. Paul uses words which mean "to strive toward the goal" as a runner completing a marathon. Paul says he has not 'completed" himself in Christ, but is striving to do so. Christians, your faith is developed over time, trial and prayer. We rise from the waters of baptism as infants in Christ, we must "strive toward the goal" of being adults in Christ.

Jesus tells another juridicial parable in which if we read the "you" as meaning "the Chief Priests, Scribes and Pharisees", we will understand who Jesus was talking about. The landowner in Jesus' Parable is God and He has done everything possible to create a wonderful vineyard (Israel). He has left tenants (the Chief Priests, Scribes and Pharisees) to tend His vineyard. He sends His servants (the early prophets) to collect His crop, the tenants beat the servants, and kill some. He sends other servants (the later prophets) to collect his crop and the tenants treat them as badly as the first servants. Then the Owner (God) sends His Son. The tenants seize the Son, throw Him out of the vineyard, and kill Him. Jesus' audience declares that when the Owner comes, He will kill the wicked tenants and give the vineyard to others. The hearers have passed judgment on themselves! Jesus tells the Chief Priests, Scribes and Pharisees that the Kingdom of Heaven will be "taken" from them and given to a people that produce the fruits of the kingdom.

May the Holy Spirit through God's grace strengthen your faith so that you are able to "strive toward" the goal of completeness in Jesus Christ and produce fruit for the kingdom.

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



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
City manager discusses problems with rising gas prices

In the past few weeks I have been allowed to write about the coming increase in utility bills due to Spearman's natural gas contract coming to an end in December. A number of citizens have approached me to say that they have made plans to modify in some way their heating of their home this winter. This forward planning is quite good but lets not try to save a buck, yet compromise you and your families safety.

Just this week there was the report of a family that had a gas powered generator running in the house. This unsafe act lead to the deaths of five people. If you plan on having an insert install in your fireplace or adding a wood burning stove, please be safe. Have the item install according to the directions, by yourself or a qualified contractor. There should not be a shortcut on safety. Be sure that your homes smoke and carbon monox ide detector is working. Have escape plans made and understood by your family members for what to do in an emergency, and conduct a drill. We don't want to test our emergency service providers' skill in an inci-

dent that with some forethought could have been preventable.

Medicare Prescription Benefits Update

November 15th marks the offi-Medicare prescription drug program. Since June, 2004 qualified medicare recipients have been bengram was a fill-in while Congress Special events included a trip to developed the long-term plan. That plan has been adopted and is ready to be put in place. The drug benefit plan is very complex and can be confusing, so I tried to focus on the key points:

-Seniors will be receiving paperwork soon. The paperwork needs to be filled out and sent in by December 15th, even if you have filled this out within the past year.

-Qualified seniors who failed to get paperwork in by december 15th will incur a 1% penalty on each month's premium. Therefore, it is imperative the forms get fill out and sent in.

-Medicare will determine if, and each patient. This may vary from 10% to 90% coverage on prescrip-On Saturday morning there was tions, depending on yearly income and assets.

-Co-pays can possibly vary from pharmacy to pharmacy. Co-pay amounts will be the same at any "Preferred Pharmacy". Whether or not a pharmacy is considered "Preferred" is determined by

Pharmacies" will be in the packet once the patient is approved.

-All seniors currently on Medicaid will automatically be changed to Medicare. Those prescriptions will have a \$1 or \$2 Copay (previously) \$0 Co-pay).

Approximately 75 different prescription cards will be available. Determining which card to choose can be rather tough. I, along with 32 other pharmacist across the panhandle and eastern New Mexico sorted through each plan and found the one most beneficial to the patient. Oddly enough, we looked at the plans on our own, reported back as a group, and all selected the same plan with the best Co-pay. Health. Member Health's customer service phone number is 1-800-544-7447.

Member Health will be sending a representative to Gordon's Drug for one day, between November 15th and December 15th to enroll patients and answer questions. Enrolling with Member Health at Gordon's Drug will not lock a patient's prescriptions in there. Patients can have their medicine filled at their pharmacy of choice. The date and time for enrollment will be announced in a few weeks. Again, all questions should be directed toward Medicare or Member Health.

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
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
