## **County Schools Post First Day Enrollment Figures**

For the first item in several years, Gruver schools reflected a gain in first day school enrollment figures while Spearman and Pringle-Morse totals reflected slight declines.

Gruver reported 401 students on Monday, August 18, the first day of school. That figure is up 21 from the first day enrollment last year of 380. It was the first time in several years that Gruver has had a gain in first day enrollment.

The Spearman 2003 enrollment figure was 728, down slightly from last year's 751. Pringle-Morse totaled 94 students on the first day of school which is also down slightly from last year's 101 fig-

The breakdown of enrollment figures for Gruver included elementary - 148, junior high 134, and high school 119. This com pares to 2002 totals of elementary 134, junior high 106, and high school 137 last year.

The breakdown of enrollment for Spearman schools included elementary 316, junior high 158, and high school 218. This compares to last year's enrollment of elementary 344, junior high 173, and high school 234.

Pringle-Morse figures included all student in grades pre-kindergarten through eighth grade.

#### **USDA** Accepting **Applications for Grassland Reserve Program**

Financial assistance for the Grassland Reserve Program (GRP) is now available to eligible landowners. GRP is authorized by the Food Security Act of 1985, as amended by the Farm Act of 2002. The USDA Natural Conservation Resources Service (NRCS) and USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) administer the program, in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service. Funding for the GRP comes from the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC).

According to Dr. Larry D. NRCS State Butler, Conservationist, "This voluntary program helps landowners and operators restore and protect grassland, including rangeland and pastureland, and certain other lands, while maintaining the areas as grazing lands.

The program emphasizes support for grazing operations,

plant and animal biodiversity, and grassland and land containing shrubs and forbs under the greatest threat of conversion to other land uses."

To participate in GRP, offers Security and Rural Investment must be private land that includes at least 40 contiguous acres. Participants voluntarily limit future use of the land while retaining the right to conduct common grazing practices; produce hay, mow, or harvest for seed production (subject to certain restrictions during the nesting season of bird species that are in significant decline or those that are protected under Federal or State law); conduct fire rehabilitation; and construct firebreaks and fences.

Applications for participation will be accepted on a continuous basis with the local office of NRCS or FSA. For the current funding cycle, an application must be received by August 1,

All applications received by that date will be ranked on specific selection criteria to ensure only the highest priority areas (lands) are protected.

Once funding has been exhausted, eligible applications will remain on file until additional funding becomes available. Applications accepted after August 1, 2003, will be held for ranking during the next funding cycle.



# Blowin In the Wind

The latest addition to the Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association Park is another windmill, but this time it's a working water-pumping twelve-foot Aermotor over a 495 foot hole.

Mr. Wallace Stanberry, CEO of Transpetco, gave the SPWA \$4,000 to drill a well in the park. With the gift the SPWA con-tracted with Burkett Drilling Co. of Sunray to drill the well. The well was drilled on July 9, 2003, to a depth of 495 feet, cased with 5-inch PVC and gravel packed. At that point, the well was complete and ready for pipe and sucker rods to be installed.

Britt Jarvis of SPWA donated 241 feet of pipe and sucker rods and the SPWA purchased enough to set pipe to 364 feet. Rick Cazares of Panhandle Water Well set the pipe and sucker rods.

The SPWA owned a 12-foot Aermotor, Model 502 mill, and also a 32-foot Aermotor tower. SPWA members J. D. Wilbanks, Orville Latham and Don Reed did repairs as needed on the mill

The DeLon Kirk family donated to SPWA a tank that was made by welding 13 implement wheels together, one on top of the other. The tank was used for years on the Kirk farm before falling into disuse. It was brought to Spearman, and J. D. Wilbanks took the tank to his farm shop, cut off the bottom four wheels, and put a bottom on the remaining wheels. He then made a base for the top nine from the bottom 4 wheels. Both parts were placed on location next to the Aermotor mill to make a storage tank.

The mill began pumping water into the tank on August 12, 2003.

Other donations to the completion of the windmill, all from J. D. Wilbanks, were pipe, cable, anchors, and considerable welding and metal work.

The mill will allow SPWA to preserve the heritage of a work-

ing windmill, to illustrate to visitors how one works, and for water to irrigate the park.

In other SPWA activities, landscaping of the park is well underway. Twelve pinion trees were donated to the park by Bodil Bradley. Three of the trees have died but are guaranteed and will be replaced.

Other landscaping includes an entrance area that has small trees, shrubs, and native rocks. Plans are for yucca plants, plum bushes and other plants. Walking paths among the wind-mills are also planned. Wanda Reed has given generously of her time and talent to the landscaping project. The memorial wall has been on hold, but it is hoped to get it finished soon.

Also, the SPWA has decided to make a bid for the 2006 Windmillers' International Convention to be held here in June of 2006.

The SPWA continues to add mills to the park. Latest additions to the park besides the Aermotor are a Western Land Roller and a Clipper. Mills are still available for adoption.

The immediate and future plans for the SPWA are to begin restoration of the 18-foot Railroad Eclipse. The massive iron engine, the tower within a tower, and the 18-foot wheel will be a several months project for SPWA members, but they are dedicated to the restoration of the centerpiece of the J. B. Buchanan collection, and someday it will be the major attraction of the SPWA Windmill

#### **Some Facts About Mars**

As you've probably heard, Mars and Earth are about to pass closer than they've been in nearly 60,000 years, and Mars will

appear larger and brighter than at any time in recorded history.

It will be nearest August 27 at 34.6 million miles, but don't wait until then. It already dominates the night sky, shining far brighter than any star. From now through early October it will be a sight to see, especially through a telescope. As you view the red planet, here are some interesting facts to keep in mind.

As the fourth planet out from the Sun (Earth is third), Mars orbits the Sun at an average distance of 142 million miles compared to Earth's 93 million miles. Mars takes 687 Earth-days to circle the Sun compared to our 365 days

Mars' diameter of 4,222 miles is half that of Earth's 7,926 miles and twice that of our Moon's 2,159 miles. With a mass (weight) one-tenth that of Earth's, a 150-pound Earthling would weight 56 pounds on Mars

Surface conditions on Mars would not support life as we know it. Its thin atmosphere is mostly of carbon dioxide with just traces of water vapor and oxygen. Mars has no known liquid water although it appears there have been large oceans in the distant past and there might still be frozen water beneath its surface. With an average surface temperature of -67 degrees (Fahrenheit), Martian temperatures vary widely. Polar winter nights can drop to -207 degrees while summer afternoons can reach 80 degrees

Mars' topography also varies more than Earth's. Its lowest natural point (Valleris Marineris) is far deeper than Grand Canyon, and its tallest mountain (Olympus Mons) soars to an incredible 89,000 feet--three times the height of Mt. Everest, and over twice as high as commercial jet airplanes fly.

Mars has two tiny, irregularly shaped moons--Phobos and Deimos. Since Mars orbits just inside the asteroid belt, these moons are probably asteroids which drifted near Mars and were "captured" by the planet's gravity.

NEXT Two WEEKS: The Moon, at 3rd quarter Tuesday, is between Taurus' brightest star, Aldebaran, and the Pleiades star cluster Wednesday morning. A crescent Moon is to the upper left of Saturn the morning of August 23, then near the Beehive star cluster the morning of August 25, low in the east. The Moon is new August 27. Mars is opposite Earth from the Sun, called oppo-

sition, August 28. PLANETS: (The Sun, Moon and planets all rise in the east and set in the west.) EVENING: Mercury, beginning its move between us and the Sun, now sets an hour after sunset. Neptune and Uranus are in the sky all night and are at their nearest and brightest, but both still require optical aides to see. MORNING: Saturn rises 3 1/2 hours before the Sun. Venus and Jupiter are out of sight behind the

Officially, Ruby is referred to as a Pet Partner, registered by the nationwide Pat Partners Program, which has established guidelines for person-animal volunteer teams to qualify them to enter hospitals, nursing homes, and other facilities. The Program registers teams that successfully complete health and temperament screening and volunteer training.

Erin Bergin is a licensed Social Worker who has been with the District for nine years. Bergin has been interested in the benefits of animal-human interaction for many years, and her now-deceased partner, Jet, was a frequent Manor visitor. Over the years Bergin says she has noticed how residents who never speak or react to humans will pet the dog and begin to talk about their past, which Bergin uses as a way to establish rapport. Some residents who seem unresponsive will smile and reach on to touch a furry friend.

To become a registered Pet Partner, Ruby passed the Pet Partners Skills and Aptitude screening, and a health examination. Ruby also had to be certified by the AKC as a Canine Good Citizen. Panhandle Pet Partners of Amarillo is a local affiliate of the Delta Society, which is dedicated to promote animals helping people. Dogs are not the only Pet Partners. Miniature horses are being seen more often as nursing home vis-

Ruby is one and a half year old bull mastiff. She has been a visitor since she was a puppy. Bergin researched various breeds before deciding on this

large, calm breed of dog. "Many of our residents really look forward to seeing Ruby. Only babies can compete with her for attention. She touches a lot of hearts, and is a great partner with Erin," says Merry Sparks, Manor Activity
