AMARILLO TO INDEMNIFY

Amarillo Makes Handsome Promises in Event Southern Kansas Track Is Taken up.

Austin, Feb. 14.—The bill by Bowman of Potter to permit the Southern Kansas Railway to abandon a portion of its track from Panhandle to Washburn had a go in the house committee on common carriers this morning and Mr. Bowman scored the first fall, as the bill was reported favorable by the committee. However, Mr. Bowman's temporary complacency was marred somewhat by the statement from Duncan of Smith that he would file a minority report.

Mr. Bowman made a strong speech this morning before the committee in behalf of the people of Amarillo. He set out that the citizens of Amarillo are ready to make a bond of \$1,000,000 to indemnify the losses of anyone who may suffer by the removal of the road. In this way they express their confidence that no one will be injured, but that many will be benefitted. The people of Canyon City are afraid that, if the track is abandoned according to request, additional track will be abandoned and the line will take a straighter cut, leaving Canyon City to the east. However, Mr. Bowman, who is speaking for the people of Amarillo alone, and not for the railroad company, expresses the belief that this will not be done, and that Canyon City will never be abandoned. Several citizens of Washburn appeared before the committee in the interest of preventing the removal, and Mr. Bowman's victory is commendable. It will be recalled that a subcommittee recently visited the section and filed its report after looking over the topography. This was favorable, and probably had a good deal to do with the final favorable report.

Mr. Bowman expresses the belief that he will win before the house.

One Way of Looking at It.

You never see a good newspaper standing back on the proposition of helping the town on account of a little thing like pay. The newspaper man is always willing and anxious to boost everybody's game when the good of the town is at stake. Too frequently its efforts are not appreciated and what it does for the good of the public is regarded as a matter of fact. Just why this is so no one has ever been able to tell. The merchant embarks in business, puts his money into the establishment and endeavors to secure all the trade possible. If the citizens want anything which he may have for public purposes, they pay for it and would probably be astonished if the merchant were to give any considerable amount of goods away, even for a public purpose. The newspaper man puts his money into the business and engages in the trade for the same purpose that the merchant does—to make a living—and under the same rules of barter and trade, and yet more than half the people in the town will be asking him to give them that which costs him money and they get up and cavort around if he does not give it to them. And more than that, when they have any money to spend they feel perfectly justified in taking the money out of town for the purpose. Of course, the newspaper will continue to boom the town in the effort to increase its importance, but it must be remembered that the increase in the population of a town does the publisher no more good than it does the merchant. Both are benefited but the editor is expected to do free in the enterprise of locating new people and new firms what every other man in the town would demand pay for doing. Ever look at it in that light?—Ft. Worth Record.

TOO MUCH ANTI-FREE PASS

The Bill Strikes at the Wrong Party and is Entirely too Wide in its Scope.

The free pass, as it is used indiscriminately, is a thing to be limited if not altogether avoided. Legislation to this end is required by an unmistakable and frequently expressed public opinion voting in more than one Democratic platform. The duty of the legislature, therefore, is plain.

But free pass legislation should not go to foolish extremes. There is a reasonable contention that the railroads ought to be permitted to give transportation to immigration agents. It is clearly in the interest of the state to promote the settlement of Texas lands, and it would be no denial of the public demand to allow the railroads to exercise some discretion in this instance, and perhaps in others likewise contributing to the general welfare.

The attempt to deny newspapers the right to exchange advertising space for transportation is no proper part of anti-pass legislation, for the newspapers do not accept passes. They give value received. True, the interstate commerce commission has ruled that advertising transportation is not privileged on interstate travel, but that is a ruling of doubtful validity in law; or, if correct, it is an interpretation of law and of course does not apply to a Texas statute not yet written. That is to say, the principle is bad and ought not to be written into the Texas law. The exchange of advertising for transportation is traffic like any other exchange of commodities or things of value.

The Texas papers ought not to be denied this simple right to contract. In making this plea The Record has no self-interest whatever, for the larger dailies of the state would probably profit by reducing their railway advertising to an altogether cash basis. It is the weekly papers and smaller dailies that would be inconvenienced. But even though they might not suffer in the long run, it is no part of the government's business to interfere in this manner with a publisher's private affairs. If a lawyer may receive a pass as a part of his compensation as a railroad attorney, it is certainly permissible for a newspaper to sell so much advertising space for so much transportation.—Ft. Worth Record.

HORSES STAMPEDE AT SEA.

Million-Dollar Herd Raises a Ruction
Coming from Europe.

If any vessel ever arrived at Hobo-
ken with a more remarkable series of
adventures than those accredited to the
St. Andrew, after that sober plodder
of the Phoenix line had reached her
Hoboken pier, residents of Hoboken
want to know. And such of the ma-
rine reporters as come from Missouri
want to be shown.

The St. Andrew brought to port an
important shipment of horses con-
signed to western stock farms. There
is no doubt as to that. The horses
were there, many of them, and many,
too, heard of the value of the ship-
ment—\$1,000,000 in all, was it? Amid
the thunder of waves this herd was
stampeded, and a reckless, daring
cowboy crew roped and flung the ter-
rified Percherons and brought them
back to their stalls. This, runs the
account, came about on the night of
August 3. It was a terrifying strug-
gle, and when the casualties were
counted it was found that one deck-
hand had a sprained wrist.

It was just before this fearsome ex-
perience that there was enacted on
shipboard the most amazing feat that
has ever taken place since the days
of Munchausen. This is a verbatim
account:

"One of the officers of the St. An-
drew, on a wager, climbed to the hind
truck of the mainmast on July 30
and lowered the iron ball 150 feet to
the deck, and then hoisted it again,
set it in place and climbed down to
the deck."

It would puzzle sailormen to tell
what a "hind truck of a main mast"
is, but there must be something of the
kind. And there must also be sea ser-
pents, for it was related on a type-
writer that on August 3 Capt. Spicl
and Third Officer Cummings were on
the bridge of the St. Andrew when
they sighted one and saw about 16 or
18 feet of its head.

Neither the captain nor his third
officer was on board when an investi-
gator called, but another officer vol-
unteered the information that spar
buoys, when they go adrift, do some-
times look queer.

mously tailed rooster is obtained."

Ink Slinging in Parliament.

I have no wish to make odious com-
parisons between our legislators and
others, but having watched the pro-
ceedings of other parliaments I feel
that we have no reason to fear com-
parison, says M. A. P. For instance,
I once looked on when the parliament
in Vienna was in full blast. There
was a party in the state there which
sought to advance its views by its
members banging the lid of the desk
which each member had before him,
and thus causing an intolerable din.

as the liddites of the Austrian parlia-
ment. Another group attempted to
make its mark by throwing ink pots
across the chamber. I have done some
