Spearman Welcome Monument Dedicated

Editor's Note: The Spearman Welcome Monument was dedicated in a ceremony on Saturday, June 13, 1998 at 10:00 a.m. by Mayor Burl Buchanan and Father Fern E. Couture, Former Pastor of Sacred Heart Parish in Spearman. Following is a brief history of how the monument came to be.

It is always from down deep within ourselves that we look and ponder our roots. This, every person seeks on their journey of life. My roots are found in Vermont. In particular, in the city of Barre, Vermont. There are four mountains surrounding Barre. On the mountain to the East is the village of Graniteville. This mountain is five miles wide and twenty-five miles in depth—all solid rock: granite. The granite industry is the primary source of work in Barre. In fact, Barre is known as the "Granite Center of the World."

There are at least nine different cultures and languages in Barre, all due to the granite industry where people came seeking work from the turn of the 19th Century. Sculptors arrived from different parts of the world - Italy, Spain, France, Germany, Scotland, Ireland, Lebanon, Syria, Greece, Poland and Canada. Over the years these people of different origins, all working together, managed to maintain their language and customs. Many Christians from these various cultures shared their faith together. In my own faith, we celebrated together using Latin. Everyone prayed in their own languages. In fact, in the 1950's and 1960's there were ethnic celebrations every summer in Barre. We shared in each other's cultural customs, food, and in ethnic celebrations - a moment so rich in the "Land of the Free."

My parents came to Barre from Canada. Their background was farming and they were seeking work in the United States. My father was eventually led to seek support for his family in the granite industry. In fact, my father later became an inventor in the industry. I am proud of my background and my heritage. I was born in Northfield, Vermont which is about twenty-five miles west of Barre. We lived on a farm near Northfield, and my father would work the farm and then travel to Barre to work in the granite industry. At the age of five, my family moved to Barre, gave up the farming, and worked full-time in the granite industry to support his large family of nine children.

I am most proud of my origins - an American with Canadian roots! I am also proud of the background of my youth: raised in "The Granite City of the World." I can honestly say that my life is built around "Rock," the rock of ages, the Granite Center of the World, and Christ, the solid rock, forming the foundation of my life raised in the Christian Catholic Faith. These are my roots and origins, of which I

am very proud.

Because of the pride of my heritage, I do all I can to proclaim those roots no matter where I find myself ministering and working as a priest. The Rock foundation of the Christian Catholic Faith and growing up in the surroundings of the granite industry reflect my origins, my heritage, and my life. No matter where we find ourselves, when we have shared the background of our lives, it is easier to identify with each other as we come to know that our lives have been formed and centered on Christ the Rock of our lives.

Every place where I have had the privilege to serve God's people, I have made known my origins and heritage. The granite industry of Barre is part of me and I share it with you now in the same way I shared it with the citizens of Spearman when I was pastor of Sacred Heart Parish.

When stationed in Spearman, I had the pleasure of being a member of the local Rotary Club. For my entry into the Rotary, I had to present the members with a program, and I decided to share with them the background of my life. Naturally the granite industry was part of that presentation! For the presentation I was able to have a granite sign made bearing the symbol of Rotary. It came from my home town of Barre. It was well-received!

Not too long afterward, I presented a similar idea to the City Manager, who was also a member of Rotary. I suggested a "Welcome" sign, made from Barre granite, to be placed on the island in front of Taylor's. Kelvin Knauf, who was City Manager at that time, agreed that it was a good idea and presented the suggestion to the City Fathers. They too agreed, voted on the suggestion, and it was decided to continue with the project. They drew up the specifics and sent them to the Rouleau Granite Company of Barre, people I grew up with!

The new "Welcome" sign is now a reality. Made from Barre granite and placed in Spearman with a depth of meaning for me, personally, because it was my privilege to share my life with you as a person and a pastor. It also has meaning because of its origins and our participation in this community of Spearman. The sign speaks for itself. The sign's beauty, cultural roots, artistic work and solid material (granite) all speak of our lives. The rich privilege of the sharing together the cultures of Spearman.

When we pass the sign that bids "Welcome" let us welcome each other in our hearts. It is a "solid" way to remember each member of the community. In this way, we can extend to all who come to Spearman a warm and heartfelt "Welcome!" Let it signify the warm welcome that is built on Christ. "He who welcomes me, welcomes the one who sent me." This is the solid love and faith of our hearts. Hopefully it will prompt passers by to ask the question, "Where did this originate?" And the answer is yours - an open heart of "Welcome!"

Clementine and the late Gus Renner were recognized on Monday with a plaque designating the dedication of the Station Master's House in their honor. Loan Deficiency Payments

With low grain prices, it is possible that Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP) may be available in Hansford and surrounding counties. LDP's are activated when the Posted County Price (PCP) drops below the County Loan Rate. The PCP changes daily so interested producers should keep in contact with the county office (659-3036) to see if LDP's are in effect. To be eligible a producer must maintain beneficial interest in the commodity, the commodity must have been grown on a farm participating in AMTA, and an acceptable acreage report must have been filed.

Loan Deficiency rates cannot be locked-in. Any bushels receiving LDP payments are ineligible for the loan. Once approved Loan Deficiency Payments are irrevocable.

Forms for application are available at the Local FSA office (711 W 7th Spearman, TX) These forms CCC-666 and CCC-709 need to be signed "prior" to losing

beneficial interest in the crop. Form CCC-666 needs to be filed for farm-stored or warehouse stored commodities on or after the harvest date and prior to losing beneficial interest. The LDP rate would be the rate in effect the day of approval. Producers must have beneficial interest on the date of filing for LDP.

Form CCC-709 would need to be filed prior to harvesting the crop to be eligible for LDP. The CCC-709 is filed for commodities that are field direct, high moisture, or farm processor direct. The LDP rate would be the rate in effect on the date of delivery. This would include grain fed on the farm, or carried directly to a feedyard, etc. Commodities harvested prior to filing CCC-709 are not eligible for LDP if beneficial interest has been lost.

Winning a Power Struggle

"For he who is least among you all—he is the greatest." (Luke 9:48)

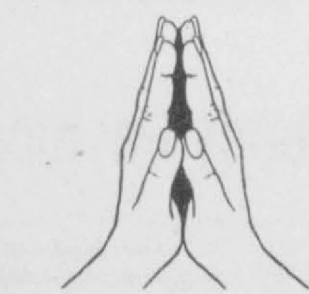
When was the last time you locked horns with someone? It may have been your spouse, your boss, your teammate, your friend, your neighbor or your co-worker. Were you trying to win an argument, get your way or prove a point? How can you win such a power struggle?

Jesus teaches that the way to win a power struggle is to let it go, to submit, to give in. Rather than insisting upon our own way, we can show deference to others. The world calls lowly, humble, powerless people "doormats." Jesus, on the other hand, says they're the greatest of all.

Abraham Lincoln was once confronted by people who wanted him to be harder on the South for their part in the War Between the States. He said, "Have I not defeated my enemies by making them my friends?"

Henri Nouwen writes, "What makes the temptation of power so seemingly irresistible? Maybe it is that power offers an easy substitute for the hard task of love. It seems easier to be God than to love God, easier to control people than to love people, easier to own life than to love life. Jesus asks, 'Do you love me?' We ask, 'Can we sit at your right hand and your left hand in your Kingdom?' The long painful history of the Church is the history of people ever and again tempted to choose power over love, control over the cross, being a leader over being led."

If you want to win a real power struggle, try winning in your own struggle with power. Choose love rather than control and you will find yourself walking in His steps.

Out At The Lake

Jim had a meeting in Amarillo today, so I did not get a fishing report.

Earlier in the year I wrote of hearing as a child about Clara Cator riding her horse sidesaddle among the running buffalo. She had come from England with her younger brother Bert and a companion, Jennie Ludlow, to join her brothers, Jim and Bob in 1879. By this time the buffalo hunting big brothers had given up hunting the buffalo, built a Stockade, and were ranchers.

In Clara's letter to Mrs. Delon Kirk in 1938, she writes of these early days in Hansford County.

Her words on riding with the buffalo: "I had exciting rides after the Buffalo for my wild mustang Dick, himself a wild horse, was not afraid of Buffalo and would run right up to them, until my brothers warned me of the danger of them turning and killing my horse."

On raising mustang colts, she wrote: "I raised several wild colts caught from a herd of mustangs and fed them milk from a bottle and as they knew no other mother they always had a great love for me, and I loved them, never had trouble in handling them, always exercised great patience and could always talk and pet them out of the notion of

bucking. My mustang Dick ran away with me one day when riding with a party of friends. Tie rope came unfastened and fell just long enough to hit his heels. He was very much afraid of rope. He gave one jump and was gone, bucking and screaming. The first time I ever heard a horse scream. I had no control over him. After running and bucking he was exhausted and stopped with his legs all spraddled out and so I thought it best to jump off for I had no breath left.

When down I found my saddle was right on his neck. My hat had long gone and my hair was all wild. My lungs hurt, but I was not near as frightened as the others were. Had my saddle turned and my foot hung, I would not be writhing (sic) this."
