THAT COLLEGE BANQUET

By Far the Most Brilliant Social Occasion Ever Seen in Clarendon. Good Speaking.

As predicted in these columns last week the banquet given by Clarendon College to the business men of Clarendon Monday night was a brilliant occasion. It was a time of good cheer, where the brotherhood of man was amply illustrated, and the trials and vexations of life were all forgotten and care thrown to one side that the spirit of friendship and good will might prevail.

Never before and perhaps never again will the district court room in Clarendon take on such appearances of gaiety and beauty. The ladies of the College Circle had taken charge of the arrangements, and the decorations and table arrangements were beautiful in the extreme. The College colors, white and leaf green, prevailed throughout the color scheme. All furniture had been removed from the court room, and the entire space utilized for the banquet tables, so that it was possible for the entire list of 250 guests to be seated at one time.

About 8:00 o'clock the guests were seated (and there were very few absentees), and Rev. J. W. B. Wilson, the College Financial Agent, in a short address extended a hearty welcome, and turned the management of the program over to the toast master, A. M. Beville. Mr. Beville announced that owing to delayed trains two of the speakers announced for the evening would not be present—Rev. C. N. N. Ferguson of Amarillo and Hon. R. W. Hall. The announcement caused some little disappointment as regarded Bro. Ferguson, but no one seemed to expect Mr. Hall anyway (he having formed the habit of not meeting appointments), therefore it cannot be said that the "Panhandle Orator" was missed. Mr. Beville introduced Rev. G. C. Rankin, editor and preacher, of Dallas, who ably filled the time of all three speakers on the program, and did it in less time, too. Dr. Rankin's address was one of the best this scribe has ever listened to, and we regret our inability to reproduce it in full. It was, of course, along educational lines, and was a plea for the better appreciation of Clarendon College by our citizenship, and when the speaker in closing denominated that institution as "the life of our community," he was given a storm of applause.

Dr. Rankin was followed by a series of short talks from Rev. W. P. Dickey, Hon. T. H. Peebles, W. H. Cook, and E. Dubbs, each manifesting appreciation of the College and a determination to make that appreciation better understood in the future. Then followed Dr. J. R. Mood, the College president, who made some interesting statements regarding the finances of the institution. Dr. Mood's statement, as well as that of Dr. Rankin, showed the totally inadequate facilities of the College, and also laid bare the fact that Clarendon College had progressed as far as it was possible until some arrangements were made for more and better buildings and equipment. Dr. Mood gave a brief outline of the business, showing just what the College was worth in dollars and cents, and the main thought brought out was that the sum of \$1000 per month was paid out by him as president and treasurer.

Just here Rev. Wilson was called on for a statement of his plans for improvement. He spoke at some length, but briefly the idea to which he is working is as follows: Raise \$50,000 in cash from the people of Clarendon within the next two years, and when that is done the amount to be duplicated by the church and the Methodist people of this district. This will give \$100,000, and no sum short of that amount will be sufficient to meet the emergency. He stated further that as a starter towards the \$50,000 the faculty and students of the College had already pledged \$2,500. Another citizen of Clarendon had stated that he would give one-tenth of the whole amount, or \$5,000. The College must have, first and foremost, a large main building with ample class rooms and an auditorium capable of seating at least 1200 people.

The banquet was then spread, and the feast came fully up to the expectations of the guests, while the latter did full justice to the tempting wands set before them by a bevy of charming ladies whose one idea on earth seemed to be to see that each guest was treated as the bright particular star of the occasion. The menu included soup, oysters, celery, roast turkey with dressing, roast chicken, boiled ham, cranberry sauce, potato, salmon and nut salads, ambrosia, assorted cakes and coffee. On leaving the guests were served at the door with a most excellent fruit punch, handed out in cut glass, from beautiful booths presid-

ed over by more beautiful representatives of the fair sex from the student body of the College. The entire program was interspersed with music, vocal and instrumental, and all of a high class.

The Clarendon College banquet, of date Monday, Jan. 28, 1907, will long live in the memories of all present. And incidentally it may be stated as a fact that a more pleasant understanding and a deeper feeling of appreciation between the College and the people has been developed thereby.

\$32,000,000 SPENT TO DATE

Preliminary Work on the Panama Canal up to Jan. 1st, 1907. Has Cost That Amount.

Theodore P. Shonts, who recently resigned the chairmanship of the Panama Canal Commission, in a speech at Kansas City last week, made the following statements regarding the work of the Commission: "The creative period," declared Mr. Shonts, "has come to an end and the period of active construction has begun. As to the manner in which the creative task has been performed we are content to let the facts speak for themselves."

"In the preliminary work we have spent down to Jan. 1, 1907, about \$32,000,000. Of this about \$4,500,000 has been expended in government and sanitation; about \$7,000,000 in construction of quarters and other buildings, docks, wharves, railway enlargement, waterworks and sewers in the zone and in engineering works; about \$12,000,000 in permanent plants; over \$4,500,000 in miscellaneous material and supplies and over \$1,500,000 in the construction of sewers and water works and street paving and improvements in Panama and Colon. The last named will be refunded ultimately to the Government."

BOY KILLED IN FT. WORTH

Alsie Edwards, a Former Clarendon Boy, Plays With Live Wire and is Instantly Killed.

The following account of the death of Alsie Edwards, stepson of George McMahan, formerly of this city but now of Ft. Worth, is taken from the Ft. Worth Record of Sunday:

Alsie Edwards, the 16-old-old stepson of G. E. McMahan, 1604 May Street, was electrocuted yesterday afternoon while attempting to shut off the current in a live wire that was threatening to set fire to a barn.

Edwards and some other boys had, during the morning, tapped a wire that was on the night circuit and strung another wire into the barn for the purpose of providing light. As the afternoon advanced the night circuit was turned on and the wire began to sputter. Edwards had placed a switch in the barn and while attempting to reach it his hand came in contact with the live wire and he was instantly killed.

FOR EXPERIMENT STATION

Col. Bugbee Wants One for the Panhandle and Thinks its Establishment is Probable.

Col. T. S. Bugbee returned last week from a trip to Austin where he went as a member of a committee from Armstrong and Randall counties to enter the protest of those people to the abandonment of the Santa Fe track from Panhandle City to Washburn, a bill authorizing this move now being before the legislature. Mr. Bugbee did not forget what he is pleased to call his "hobby" while in the Capital City, to wit:—the establishment of a state experimental station in the Panhandle. He put in considerable time seeing members of the legislature on the matter; and calling on Governor Campbell also called his attention to the crying need of such a station in this section of the state. Acting on the advice of our representative Mr. Bugbee on his return home had a number of blank petitions prepared bearing on the subject, which blanks he has mailed out to different counties in the district, same to be subscribed to and forwarded to Representative Bowman at Austin. It is indeed to be hoped that the Panhandle's needs and rights in this respect will be recognized at an early date.

Mr. Montgomery will, we understand, remove to Hall county after he has given possession.

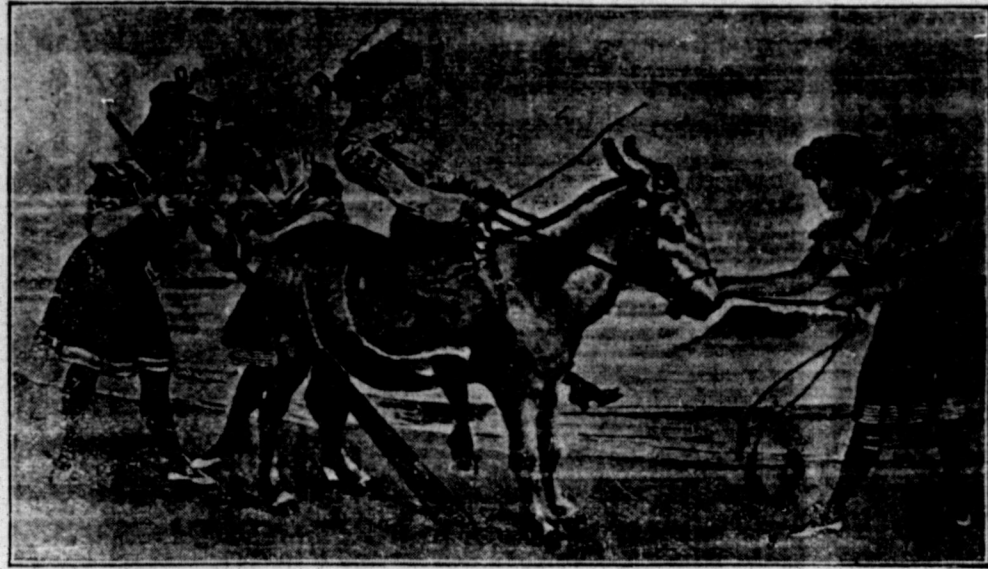

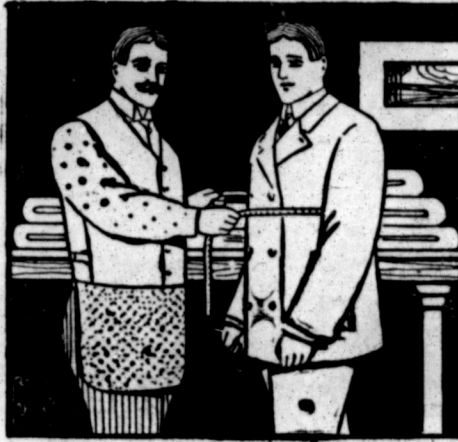

THE BANQUET'S OBJECT.

Many of our readers who accepted the hospitality of the College Circle last Monday night did not, nor do they yet, realize the significance of this social entertainment as bearing upon the future prosperity of our town. This banquet marks an epoch in the history of our city—an epoch of learning that in its far reaching influence will prove of incalculable benefit to the entire Panhandle. ARE you qualified to vote?

WE rise to ask: What has the railroad committee done? Are we going to pass up this proposition without an effort?

No, Harry, we haven't an office full of type setting machines; if we had they wouldn't be "simplexes." What we don't know about type setting machinery would fill a large book, perhaps, but we could have told you where you might have bought two or three second hand ones at a bargain, and we are not an oracle, either. But you did hit us in one tender spot, for we would gladly welcome most any kind of an old typesetter just now. Good luck, old man, and may you continue to prosper.

BARRELS of good Panhandle money go to Austin every year as a tribute from this section to the state's treasury. As yet the Panhandle has never seen a cent of this money come back in any form of an appropriation. In fact the Panhandle has ever been modest in this respect and has made no claims. But the time has come when this great section, but now in its infancy of development, needs assistance. We must have a state experimental station. It is our due, and we must have it. By the way, we would like to know what our representative at Austin is doing to secure this plum for us? If we mistake not Mr. Bowman made this matter a plank in his platform when he sought the office, and we would like to know in behalf of the citizenship of the district what he is doing or has done. As yet we have seen no record of a bill introduced. Perhaps the petitions now in circulation in this county and in other counties of the district will bear results.

There is to be a fight in the state senate over the free pass bill. One bone of contention is the feature of railroads paying for advertising in newspapers with mileage books. Some of the senators are very much opposed to railroads and newspapers having such agreements and are going to force a bitter fight on that issue. Must be some country paper has opposed the senators in the past and now is their time to get even. —Childress Index.

The country press of the state is responsible for the anti-free pass agitation. They have for years been hammering away, endeavoring to have the "pass evil" abated. The result just now seems to be that the papers themselves will do the only ones effected by the crusade, Legislators and others still carry their "annuals", while the newspaper men are denied the privilege of accepting mileage in exchange for advertising. In proof of this note the following news special from Galveston:

Since the beginning of the year no transportation has been issued in exchange for newspaper advertising from the general passenger agent's office of the Santa Fe in Galveston. A request for transportation by a newspaper man does not meet with a favorable reception. In common with other lines, passes have been mailed to city and county officials and to legislators, but the newspaper people are out of the deal.

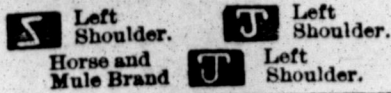

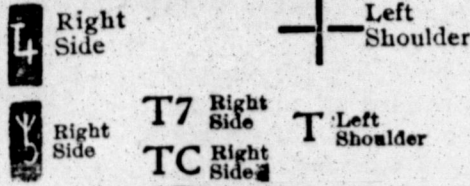

IMMIGRATION TO THE PAN

**During Past Eighteen Months 1450
Immigrant Cars Were Unloaded
Along the Denver.**

A statement prepared by the
freight department of the Fort
Worth & Denver of carloads of em-
igrant movables unloaded at points
on that line, which includes only
such cars as were hauled by the
Fort Worth & Denver, and does not
take into account those brought in
by other lines at junction points;
nor does it include emigrant mov-
ables which were destined to points
on its connections; such as the Pe-
cos Valley at Amarillo, the Rock
Island at Amarillo and Dalhart
and the Frisco at Vernon; nor does
it include those destined to points
on the Wichita Valley.

This statement shows that from
July 1 to Dec. 31, 1905, 418 cars
were unloaded; from Jan. 1 to
June 30, 1906, 395, making a
total of 813 cars during the road's
fiscal year. From July 1, 1906, to
Dec. 31, same year, 637 cars were
unloaded at stations on its line.
A comparison with the same
months of the previous year shows
an increase of 229 cars, or over 50
per cent. In addition to this move-
ment, which is principally from
Texas, there has been a heavy
movement from the North, espe-
cially to the plains country, which is
unloaded at points along the
Southern Kansas, Pecos Valley and
Rock Island lines east of Amarillo
and Dalhart.

The immigration to this part of
the State has been unprecedented
and shows that the people of Texas,
who are largely in the majority in
this movement, realize that the
Panhandle country affords better
opportunities than are afforded
through the older settled portions
of the State, where land values are
higher and crop conditions are no
more certain than they are in the
Panhandle.
