USDA To Hold Briefing

On Available Programs The U.S. Department of Agriculture will hold an informational briefing January 15, 2003, in Victoria, Texas, to acquaint farmers, ranchers and other constituents with a wide array of agency services and to highlight changes and new provisions in the 2002 Farm Bill.

"This session is an important part of our ongoing implementation of the 2002 Farm Bill and commitment to reach as many people as possible about USDA programs," said Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman. "Stakeholders will have the opportunity to hear from USDA experts on the many programs available to them."

The briefing will be held January 15th at the Holiday Inn in Victoria, Texas from 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The session, organized by USDA Rural Development and the USDA Office of Outreach, will feature presentations on a broad array of topics including conservation programs, insurance and drought relief programs, food and nutrition programs and rural utilities rural business and rural housing programs. Other meetings are being considered and will be announced when details are available.

"We are committed to reaching out to the full spectrum of USDA customers, including underserved customers, minorities and women, to ensure they benefi from USDA programs and serv ices," said Assistant Secretary for Administration Lou Gallegos.

Policies directing the state's largest farm organization were adopted y more than 1,200 delegates from 207 organized Farm Bureaus Approved recommendations on national policies will advance to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting to be held in January in Tampa, Florida.

Addressing the delegates were Donald Patman of Waxahachie, TFB president; Dale Jeske of Alamo, Secretary; and Vernie Glasson, TFB

executive director. The business session covered the final two days of the meeting. The ast order of business was the election of the president, Kenneth Dierschke of San Angelo.

Federal Rule Published Allowing Texas Feeder Cattle To Move Without Restrictions (For Now)

Department Agriculture (USDA) has published it's interim rule allowing Texas feeder cattle to continue to move out of state without additional restrictions, at least until September 30, 2003. Texas ranchers, feedlot operators and private practitioners have waited since June 6, 2002, to learn if, in 2003, they would have to apply USDA ear tags to their 1.5 million steers, feeder bull calves, and feeder heifers destined for outof-state grazing or feedlots each ear. The restrictions also would have required Texas feeder bull calves and feeder heifers to be test-

In a meeting November 27 USDA representatives provided verbal notification regarding the continued free movement of Texas feeder cattle, despite our loss of cattle tuberculosis 'free' status on June 6, 2002. Also, the USDA staff is considering regulation changes that would keep Texas feeder animals moving freely after September," said Dr. James Lenarduzzi, acting executive director for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency. "In the mean-time, the USDA's interim rule ed for cattle tuberculosis (TB) prior makes the temporary delay official,

so the Texas cattle industry can continue business as usual. Dr. Lenarduzzi explained that the


now-delayed movement restrictions on feeder cattle stemmed from the USDA's downgrade of Texas' cattle tuberculosis (TB) eradication status from accredited-free, to modified accredited advanced, after two TBinfected cattle herds were detected in Texas in 2001. Dr. Lenarduzzi said the infected herds were depopulated, and more than 9,300 cattle in 115 other herds have been tested to ensure the disease had not spread.

"As a modified accredited advanced state, Texas breeding cattle must be identified with an official USDA ear tag and have a negative skin test for cattle TB before being moved out of state," Dr. Lenarduzzi reminded ranchers. "This includes young, weaned calves destined for breeding purposes. About 150,000 breeding animals are moved from the state each year, and because these animals have a long life within a herd, it's essential to ensure that they are dis-


ease-free prior to movement. Dr. Lenarduzzi pointed out that strict requirements for identifying, testing and permitting cattle movement will continue in a designated high-risk area that encompasses about 100 herds in Texas' far west El Paso County and a portion of Hudspeth County. "The USDA approved a special 'movement restriction zone' (MRZ) in the two counties in November 2000 because of recurring, low levels of infection in nine dairies comprising the "El Paso Milk Shed" along the Rio Grande. We work with producers in the MRZ to ensure movement requirements are met, so commerce can continue.

Furthermore, the USDA is finalizing the purchase and depopulation of the dairies in the MRZ, where under Texas law, no new dairies will be permitted."
"The Texas cattle industry has

been exceptional in working with us through the regulatory process to keep our cattle moving," said Dr. Lenarduzzi. "Texas ranchers should be proud of their leaders in the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, Independent Cattlemens Association, Texas Cattle Feeders, Livestock Marketing Association, Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Texas Farm Bureau."

SPEARMAN - Daniel "Pinky" Sheets, 91, died Monday, December 30, 2002.

Services were at 10:30 a.m. Thursday, January 2003 in Church of Christ with Leonard Harper and Flavil Ayres officiating. Burial was in Holt Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home.

Mr. Sheets was born at Jeffery, in the Holt Community on June 11, 1911. He was the second of 13 children born to Claud and Nannie Archer Sheets. In 1938, he married May Jean Jaggers of Mount Vernon in Amarillo.

He was a man of many talents. Actually, his understanding was so great that they just seemed to do what he wanted. He enjoyed telling his grandchildren of the old days and they loved listening to his stories.

His farming and ranching activities ranged from Quanah to Sofia, N.M. He was happiest when working at the Turkey Track Ranch, where he was in partnership with cousins and worked in different companies for 60 years. At one time Adobe Walls Cattle Co. ran cattle on 90,000 acres of

He was known for his honesty and integrity. During his life he conducted most of his business deals with a handshake and an oral agreement. This was as sacred to him as a written contract. He was a visionary who was instrumental in the development and use of several timesaving work devices we now take for granted. This included the use of grain augers, wire rollers, hay loading machines and portable dipping vats. He and his cousins were probably some of the first to use the helicopter to check remote water, cattle and fences. He was involved in many other innovations in the Panhandle.

After retirement from the Adobe Walls Cattle Co., he and Jean traveled extensively and spent 23 winters in South Texas. He had many friends in this travel circle and some of them traveled together. He visited every state in the United States and on a trip to Alaska, flew north of the Arctic Circle. Their 50th wedding anniversary was spent in the Yucatan where a jungle party was thrown in their honor. He still receives Christmas cards from all over the North America area.

Even though his health had deteriorated, he amazed family and friends in his last few years with his stamina and his continued interest in new adventures. He was blessed with an active mind and common sense. One of his latest projects was a test plot of a special grass never established this far north in Texas to see if it would adapt to Panhandle weather.

His last invention took place in the nursing home. Because nobody would bring him baling wire, he used plastic bags to tie a walker to his wheelchair so he had a machine that allowed him to walk, sit or ride. He was preceded in death by his wife in August 2000.

Survivors include two sons, Jerry of Spearman and Perry of San Antonio; five grandchildren, Tommy, Jeri Ann, Carolyne, Lee and Jeff; eight great-grandchildren, Joshua, Hannah, Mike, Sandy, Jackie, Kim, David and Julie; two sisters, Grace Harmon of Wharton and Francis Cudd of Spearman; and four brothers, Branch, S.B. and Claude, all of Spearman, and Willis of Round Rock.



We start the New Year just below the 30 foot level that we held for some weeks. The last snow had about half the moisture of the earlier one, but Jim says the ground around the buildings and roads is really wet.

A few fishermen have been trying, but they have had no luck. The geese and ducks are still at the lake, but they are in smaller numbers than other years.

Jim has counted four eagles. Three of them have the white heads of the mature eagles, and one still has the dark head of the immature. This coming weekend is set for the official eagle count over the state of Texas. Ordinarily when the Lake ices over, more eagles come into the Park area. Jim said we had been iced over several times except for the areas the geese and ducks kept open, but it had not improved the eagle num-

The New Year brings the need for new Lake Permits. The individual permit is \$15; the family is \$30, and a boat permit is \$30.

Friday night we had a camper on the office side at the hookups and one on the North side, a fishermen camping with out the extras.

Leon Bagwell and Corky Kizziar, both of Gruver, have eaten the seeds of the Devil's Claw plant. Leon learned to do this from older brothers. He said you take your knife and split the dried pod so you can take out the black-eyed pea size seeds. Good years there are four to a side, but if it has been a drouth year, only two to a side are common. The seeds taste like nuts. The process of getting them is tedious, so Leon said no one ever founders on them.

Jim said a lot of these plants grow on the banks of the Palo Duro Creek at the Lake. These illsmelling plants have orchid-like flowers from June to September. The green pods are fleshy, and according to Leon, are sometimes picked when young, sliced, dipped in cornmeal, and fried. He, though, had not tried this.

Note for Kitty Edwards: Charley Laxton has seen a beaver at the bridge. The Edwards family canoes on the Creek side and several times have seen members of the beaver family, but lately they had not seen them and were afraid they were gone.


