2004 Streetball Challenge



CRP Managed Haying and Grazing Changes
If you are intending to hay or graze CRP, the rules have changed! There is now only one period of time to hay or graze. That is from July 2nd through October 31st. The cost is 25% of the rental rate times the acres hayed or grazed. These acres cannot be hayed or grazed again until 2007. The maximum length of time grass can be grazed is 120 days. In order for you to get the maximum benefit from the cost of grazing you will need to start grazing on July 2nd or shortly there after. You must complete paperwork in the Farm Service Agency office, 909 W 9th in Spearman, before you can turn cattle on the CRP grass or swath down the grass. For more information, call 659-3036.
