asically said, "Parking in space provided for handicap persons is a MAJOR NO NO! if you are not transporting persons with disabilities." As of September 1, 1995, if you park in a space or area desig. nated for handicap parking, and your vehicle does not have license plates or a parking placard issued
to persons with disabilities you can be cited for the offense and punis cited for the offense and pun-
ished by a fine of not less than $\$ 100$ ormore than $\$ 200$. That is if it's the first time you've been cited for the offense. If it is shown in court that a person has previously been convicted one time of this offense, you will be punished by a fine of not less than $\$ 200$ or more than $\$ 300$. If it's
be not less than $\$ 300$ or more than this offense, a fine will be imposed of not less than $\$ 400$ or more than $\$ 500$. Now, if you appear before a judge and it is shown that you have been convicted four previous times for this offense your fine is going to you will be charged court costs. If you're thinking about changing Grandma's "soul food" recipes into a low-fat version this holiday season, don't skimp on flavor, say

she said. "If you want the taste, use lean you want the pork taste, use lean ham, and save the de-fatted stock to cook your veggive you tasty, low-fat vegetables without the salt."
If dessert is on the menu, Reeves says try making it more nutritious by using low-fat ingredients available in grocery stores, such as fategg substitutes. A sraham cracker pie crust is a good substitute for high-fat pastry crust. high-fat pastry crust.

"By making healthier food choices, you'll be giving your family the best gift this holiday seas
good nutrition," Reeves said.
To substitute the fat with healthier options, Reeves recommends you use: poultry without the skin and extra lean ground beef instead of high-fat meat; turkey thighs instead of ham hocks; vegstead of butter; low-sodium bouil lon and broths instead of salty ones and; low-fat or skim milk instead of whole millk.
