## IRS issues new fees

 for installment agreementsDALLAS-According to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), a user fee will be charged for installment agreements effective March 16,
1995. The fee will be $\$ 43$ for new agreements and $\$ 24$ for restruc tured agreements.

impact in meeting our mission statement. We will be allowed to keep up to $\$ 199$ million from collected user fees in FY 95 to pay for the cost of the services.

## Gruver residents to vote on propositions

The Gruver City Commission ballot is the adoption of a $1 / 2 \%$ on the ballot of the May 6, 1995 regular municipal election, for consideration by the registered voters living inside the city, to determine whether the city will implement
two local sales tax changes. wo local sales tax changes.
Each of the Proposed Local mea-
sures under consideration would increase the local sales tax collected in the city by $1 / 2 \%$. The present ocal sales tax equals $1 \%$ in the two combined measures under consideration, and would add an additional $1 \%$ in local sales tax if both are approved. The present state sales tax levied in addition to th local sales tax totals $6.25 \%$.
Proposition 1
Economic Development
The first proposition on the ballot is the adoption of a $1 / 2 \%$ sales tax for community and economic
development. The City Commission feels that the best use of this $1 /$ $2 \%$ would be to fund city projects thereby reducing the property taxes used for the same purpose.
Proposition 2
Property Tax Relief
The second proposition on th ing the city to reduce its property cax rate. This proposition is intended to be strictly a property tax relief measure by allowing sales
tax revenue to be substituted for thax revenue to be substituted for ther shifting more of the tax burden from property to sales of taxable goods and services.
If both propositions are adopted at the May 6, 1995 election, the current $\$ .55$ tax rate would drop to $\$ .35$. This is a $36 \%$ reduction in the property tax rate.
City property taxes on a house valued at $\$ 50,000$ would drop from $\$ 275.00$ per year to $\$ 175.00$ per
