Hansford County Sheriff's Department Receives \$33,634 Grant

Hansford County Sheriff, Gary Evans, received official notification on Thursday, November, 29, 2005, from Governor Rick Perry's office that Hansford County was awarded a federal grant for \$33,634 to purchase law enforcement equipment.

According to Governor Perry's web site these funds for new equipment are awarded under the federal Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program and distributed by the Governor's Criminal Justice Division (CJD)

The grant was one applied for by the Sheriff along with Deputy Tim Glass some time in early summer. The \$33,634 will be used to purchase 4 tasers, 3 digital cameras with docking stations, 4 bullet-proof vests, 3 portable breath test machines and 4 Panasonic Tough Notebooks for the squad cars. The Hansford County Commissioners have approved matching funds of \$3,737 as required by the grant procedures. In addition the officers will be receiving training on the new equipment which is also required by the grant.

Each year the CJD provides more than \$130 million in grants to help law enforcement departments including juvenile justice, criminal justice and victim services programs.

"These grants provide local law enforcement with updated equipment and necessary resources enabling them to better serve their communities and protect our citizens," Governor Perry said.

We study Isaiah 52:7-10, Psalm 98, Hebrews 1:1-12, and John 1:1-14. The Prophet Isaiah proclaims, "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation, who says to Zion, 'Your God Reigns'!




Hand completes basic training







Every year in late October the skies over Gruver are dotted with colorful rockets racing skyward.

Roy Mayhew's 5th grade science stu-dents have been involved in a model rocket program for the past 20 years. This year was no different, on October 27th at 10:30 a.m. the first countdown began. A total of 32 rockets were successfully ;launched and recovered.

The launch is a culmination of a great deal of study and work. Students earn the right to launch their rockets. A study is done of Newton's laws of motion, aerodynamics, and safety. Each student must pass a written exam on model rocket safety.

The rockets are built piece by piece from a kit, painted, parachutes loaded, engines installed, and then the best part, watching it fly into the crisp blue October sky. It is a thrill the students never forget. So, if you are near Gruver in late

October next year, don't be surprised if you see a rocket streaking upward or drifting slowly back to earth.

However, Love has found ways to use his gift beyond competition.


"I donate a portrait for an auction at work to raise money to buy needy families Christmas gifts,"Love said.

Love, who is the chairman of the photography committee for the Pampa Fine Arts Association, said he enjoys seeing people go out to see what has been done by great local artists.


"Going to exhibits can broaden their horizons," he said. "They can really appreciate the hard work that goes into the art."




Pampa artist Larry Love works on portraits of Roy John and Rosilyn Bulls of Spearman. They are the children of Sarah Avila Bulls.
