Palo Duro Reservoir yielded
large numbers large numbers of catfish and walleye during the Texas Parks and
Wildlife Department's springgillnet survey. Many blue and channel catfish 8 to 21 inches long were caught, which informs us that our stockings in 1991 were successful. Channel catfish were generally larger than the blue catfish.
Walleye ranged in size from 9 to
17 inches, with the highest concen 17 inches, with the highest concentrations occurring near the dam.
Arkansas strain walleye were Arkansas strain walleye were
stocked in Palo Duro Reservoir by TPWD because of their exceptional growth potential over other strains of walleye.
Palo Duro Reservoir is located about 8 miles north of Spearman in the Texas Panhandle. Although it has not filled to date, TPWD has stocked the reservoir as if it were
going to fill, and fishing has been going to fill, and fishing has been good for patient anglers. Palo Duro
Reservoir has been generously Reservoir has been generously
stocked with a variety of species including: Florida strain and native largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, blue and channel catfish, Ar kansas walleye, yellow perch, blue gill and white crappie. Currently the reservoir covers approximately 100 acres, and small boats can be launched from the shoreline. The reservoir is small enough that a person could spend a day fishing and cover just about all of the best
water. Keep in mind that catch and water. Keep in mind that catch and release of larger fish will benent
the reservoir. The area around the lake has excellent facilities and the scenery is terrific.

Dr. Fromm says swatting at them with your hand may just stir them up, so its best to just move should disrupt a nest or beehive run!" says Dr. Fromm.
Certain flying insects, like the honeybee, can sting just once, but several will strike several times and that means more poison penetrating your skin.

## Men still required to register with Selective Service

WASHINGTON-Responding to recent decision by the President the U.S. House of Representatives for all men to register with Selec ive Service upon reaching age 18 tive Service upon reaching age 18 amendment to the Defense Authoamendment to the Defense Autho-
rization Bill, H.R. 4301, that would have ended registration. The amendment was rejected 125 to 273. Five days before the vote, President Clinton notified Congress that continuing draft registration and providing funding to operate the
Selective Service System is tial to our national security." In letters to the leadership of the House and Senate, the President based his decision on a recently completed review of the program by a Na tional Security Council working group. He concluded that the Selective Service System and peacetime registration must be retained as a prudent military preparedness measure in an uncertain world, as
a link between American society and the volunteer military, and as a symbol of national resolve.
Although there has been no need to draft men for military service during the past 21 years, the nation has maintained the capability to reinstate a draft in a major crisis Since July 1980, draft registration has been an obligation of virtually every man, ages 18 through 25 must register within 30 days of $h$ is 18 th birthday. Each man complete short form to provide Selective Service with his name, date of birth, address, phone number and Socia Security number. Registration forms are available at any post of fice. Most men also receive a regis tration reminder in the mail a few months before reaching age 18 , and they many use it to register by
return mail. The Selective Service System has a telephone line dedi System has a telephone line dediregistration: (708) 688-6888.
Men who don't register are violation of Federal law. Non-registrants can be prosecuted, and they are ineligible for Federal student financial aid, most Federal jobs, and job training. The law applies to male immigrant aliens, 18 through 25 years old, as well as male citi-

Dr. Fromm advises gently scraping it off the skin so the venom will not penetrate. All insect stings will likely pro duce some localized swelling, red ness of the skin, pain and an itching sensation. "The best way to treat most stings is to apply ice for the swelling and a lotion or cream to relieve the itching," says Dr .
Fromm, "but try to resist the urge to scratch the affected area since that of causes an infection"

And one more thing. Interest ingly enough, the smell of some fragrances and trash is a magnet for most stinging insects. They'll get all over it. Like bees honey.
