




TAAS Tests Scheduled

All 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students who have not passed the exit level Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test may retake the test July 13 through July 15 at Spearman High School.

There is no charge and no preregistration is required. The writing portion of the test will be administered July 13, the reading portion will be given July 14, and the mathematics portion of the exam will be administered July 15. The tests will begin at 8:30 a.m. each day and there is no time on completing them.

Also, the out-of-school TAAS and out-of-school TEAMS (Texas Education Assessment of Minimum Skills) will be administered at Spearman High School July 13 through July 15. These tests are for those students who are no longer in school but who have not passed either the TEAMS or the TAAS,

Students taking these tests must pre-register. Registration forms are available at the high school Counselor's office. The forms must be received by the testing center in Iowa City, Iowa no later than June 11, 1993.



Home tour was discussed and four members volunteered to share the chairmanship.



LOCAL LAKES IN GOOD SHAPE

The fishing at Lake MacKenzie near Silverton should be good in 1993 according to latest studies by Charles Munger, Texas Parks and Wildlife inland fisheries biologist. Mr. Munger reports "blue channel and flathead collections were very good during recent gill net surveys" He noted that the walleye reproduction is "very limited" but 75% of those caught in the nets were over 25 inches. The hybrid stripers are the last survivors of stocking in 1979 through 1981 and all were longer than 24 inches. Munger noted that the hybrids may not last much longer

Final note from Munger indicates that the population of black bass was extremely high for gill nets, but better data on bass will be collected in the fall

My recommendation - keep the hybrid stripers and catch-and-release the largemouth bass. Atwenty foot rise would work wonders for the fishing at MacKenzie. Now is not a bad time to take a video camera and make a permanent record of the interesting lake features that

will hold fish after the rains come. Lake White River was gill netted in April and Joe Kraai, TPW biologist, reports "good numbers of channel and flathead catfish." According to Kraai, walleye numbers have decreased since 19 and eviare not dence indicates that th reproducing. He also reports a

healthy population of white bass, with one sandy exceeding the current state record of 5.56 lbs. The status of largemouth bass is usually determined in the fall studies.

Good News It is a pleasure to report the results of these scientific studies. Some previous studies were the results of "cove kills" using rotenone. This writer always found it difficult to report that our government employees indiscriminately wiped out all the fish in a cove, in order to give the anglers a lake report. Besides, every fisherman secretly feared that he was fishing in one of those dead water coves.

None of that makes the trip any more pleasant. God would be us understand that the journey is the destination because J with us. That is the ultimate reason heaven will be heaven


