NEW CROP FOR WEST TEXAS.

What the Producers Review Thinks Macaroni Wheat Will Do for the Farmers of This Section.

Partial failure of the cotton crop in Southwest Texas is causing some what of a revolution in agricultural pursuits in that section. Besides trying to raise boll-weevil infested cotton a great many farmers are turning their attention to truck, feed for cattle and hogs and to dairying. Others are seeking for a new grop of ome kind, the nature of which they have not yet determined. Along this line it has been suggested that macaroni or Durum wheat, would do well, in at least some portions of this region. It having already been determined by experience that these hard wheats are adapted to this climate, it being very similar in nature to those countries in Russia and Africa, where the best quality and greater portion of these wheats are now grown. The general conditions of which are intense heat, drought and lack of humidity in the atmosphere. The soils will also compare very favorably. To quote from United States Agricultural Department bulletin on this subject, "Macaroni wheats are adapted to soils rich in nitrogenous matter, but considerably alkaline and they invariably give best results in a hot, dry climate." This certainly suits the description of our country in Western Texas. In this bulletin is also published a map, which shows that the macaroni wheat belt lies west of a line drawn almost straight from the Red river near Ringgold, Texas, south to the Gulf and west to the border of New Mexico and O'd Mexico, which would clearly cover all of West Texas.

Experiments in growing macaroni wheats (principally Nicaraguan varieties), have been made at several points in this territory; Bell, Burnet, Kerr and Kendall counties, with good results, but the lack of a market and mills to prepare same, soon caused their abandonment.

Up to within the past year or two most of the mills in the United States have refused to grind this extremely hard wheat, believing that it would require extensive changes in methods and machinery, but from the best authorities this seems to be an erroneous idea, a slight change in the adjustment of modern machinery and some additional moisture, is all that is required to make the best flour or semolina for macaroni.



"Texas is rapidly becoming the early date to lay plans for next breeding ground for the entire live stock industry. Frank S. Hastings, manager of the S M S ranch in Haskell county, is largely responsible for this. Hastings has preached hard and successfully to the cattle feeders of the corn belt that they can purchase calves in Texas, pay freight on them to the feeding pens cheaper than the teeders can raise the calves. He has convinced me that he is right.

> "You see, in our country milk is quite an important item. One calf will consume more milk than it costs to purchase a calf in Texas and ship it to Ohio. With the graded stock now obtainable in this state we get exactly what we want to feed. We will take last spring's calves, for instance, ship them to Ohio, put them on feed at once and keep them on feed and in two years we will have a 1,200-pound or 1,400-pound steer. In Texas the calves would have been permitted to remain with their mothers until the cows weaned them. Then they would have been pastured. In the summer they would have taken on flesh and in the winter they would loose what they had taken on in the summer. It would have been a case of rustle, rustle, rustle for the animals all the while. No protection from the elements would be given them and the only natural result would be a stunted growth.
