MASS MEETING WELL ATTENDED

Hereford Citizens Loyal and True Meet at Courthouse Yesterday—Business Houses Closed.

In respect to the Mayor's proclamation and the request of the Commercial Club the leading business houses of the city were closed during the mass meeting of citizens at the courthouse yesterday afternoon.

The Hereford Band led the way with lively airs and at the appointed hour, 4 p. m., as many as could conveniently crowd in the district court room assembled. President Knight of the Club presided. The band boys were voted the thanks of the citizens for the favors.

Reports from the various two-by-two committees were not as good as the previous day; in fact, some came empty handed and had nothing to report. The committees who had visited in the country made indifferent reports.

A committee composed of C. G. Witherspoon, L. Gough and the chair was appointed to confer with the Western Union Land Company. Mr. Witherspoon assured the people that the Western Union would do its duty.

Several rousement speeches were made. But the best ones were always closed by saying: "Therefore,

I will double my subscription and make it one thousand dollars." Among those who "doubled" were: A. W. Gregg from \$200 to \$500; J. M. Sypert from \$350 to \$500; F. H. Britain from \$300 to \$500; Wm. Knight from \$200 to \$400; J. S. Mullenhour added \$100; W. A. Basham added \$20; Palmer Lumber Company from \$500 to \$1000. Several new subscriptions were made on the floor, the one first being a \$1000 subscription from R. J. Kibbe, following in a few minutes by a \$1000 from the Hereford Telephone Company. Mrs. Hattie Rutherford sent word that she would give \$1000.

GEORGE SHORT HURT

From Daily Panhandle.
Brother of Ed Short Who Lives Near Hereford Seriously Injured at Amarillo.

A. B. (George) Short the man assaulted in an up-town billiard hall Friday night, lingers at Anthony's sanatorium in a dying condition. Attendant physicians state that the man can not live longer than a day or two longer at most—there being only the remotest possibility of recovery. From the sanatorium it is learned that the pulse of the patient is decidedly lower today.

Ed Short, a brother of the stricken man, is in the city and in conversation with a representative of the Daily Panhandle said:

My brother is thirty years of age and had never been out of the State of Kentucky until six weeks ago, when he came to my home 8 miles north of Hereford. When he reached my home he was put to bed, being entirely exhausted from the trip. He had been weak all his life and for years has suffered from an asthmatic trouble. For years he has been under the constant care of physicians and taking medicine. He was entirely harmless and almost helpless, coming to this state for the benefit of his health.

"After being at my house for five weeks, he received benefit and came to Amarillo to look for employment of some light character, believing

himself to be able in this way to help defray his expenses. He came to Amarillo one week ago, or little less than a week before he was assaulted.

"My brother stated to me that he did not know the man who hit him, that he was not acquainted with him. He further described the manner in which he was hit.

I have not the least hope for his recovery and will stay here until the end."

Later reports indicate that Short may get well.

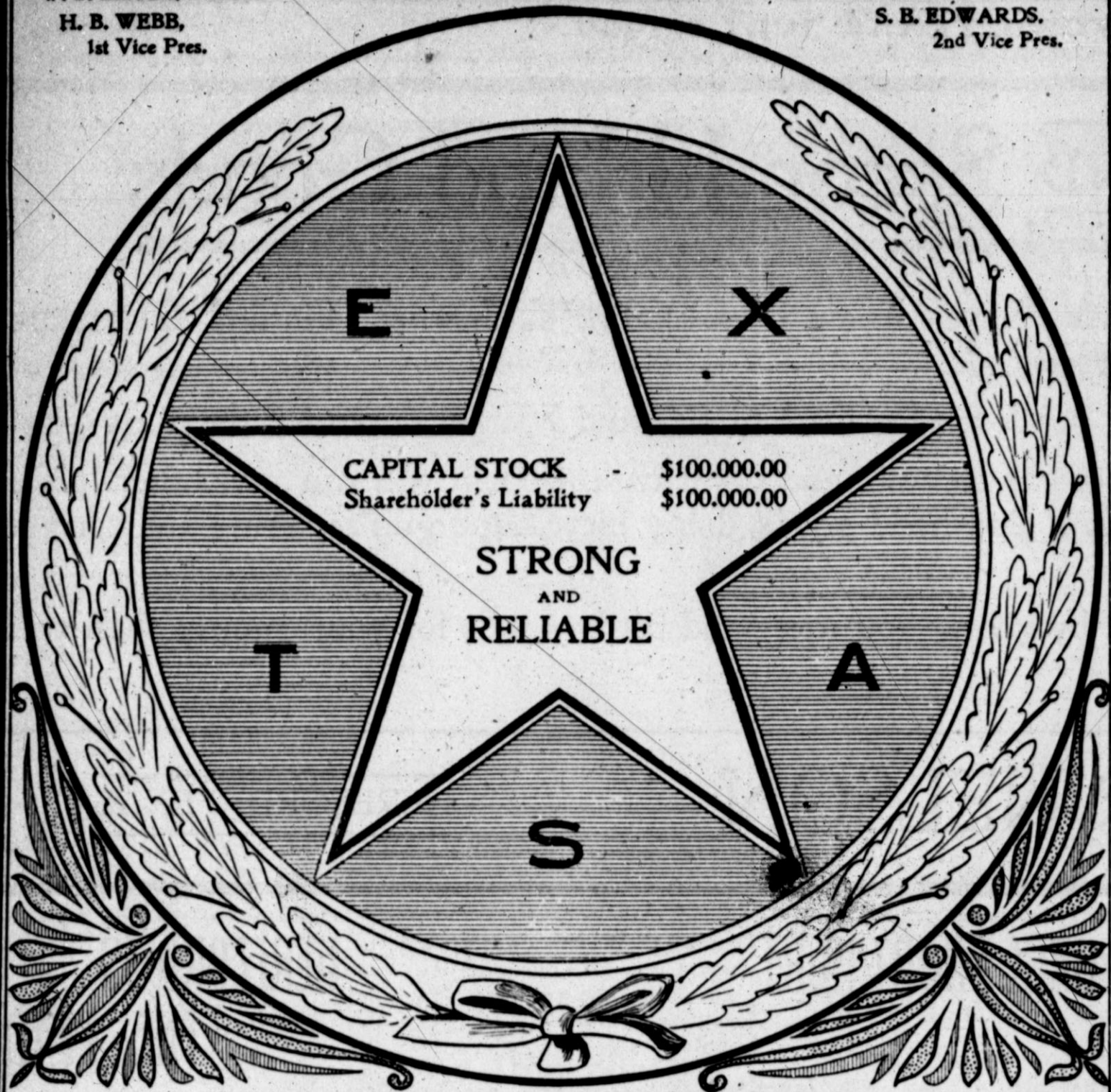

THE SUPREME HOUR.

WHEN a town has been satisfied to move along in the direction of the least resistance like the waters of some sluggish stream, it is hard to awake from the lethargy, reverse the current and work against seeming unsurmountable obstacles. Hereford has grown during the first decade of her life with little or no opposition. Her business interests were too far removed from others to even feel the encroachments. The first notice that any of her merchants made was when the Santa Fe road pushed its bands of steel across Swisher county and into Plainview. The trade from all that territory was cut-off with one stroke. Now the Rock Island on the north and the Santa Fe planning further extensions south will materially effect the trade of the Hereford merchants.

The only method and the only resource left is for Hereford to send out lines of steel to bind the territory. This is the supreme hour for the city. A line north and south and another east and west, intersecting the Santa Fe at Hereford, will make Hereford a center for a large trade territory. The first line of railroad is the Colorado Hereford & Gulf; the second is the Stamford & Northwestern; the one will cost us about \$90,000; the other will be more easily gotten at \$100,000.

This is not child's play. Hereford is offered a railroad on a guarantee. She is asked for no money until the "goods are delivered in properly addressed packages." Can she afford to think even for a moment that these men are not in earnest. Hereford through its Commer-

cial Club has accepted their proposition and if they do not fulfill their part of the contract, it should not be laid at the door of Hereford.

BOTH SIDES.

The Junior Brand offers to those who oppose the railroad bonus proposition space to give their reasons. We believe in fair play. If there is a single reason that can be offered to show that Hereford would not be benefited or that the people would not gain by the construction of another road, The Junior Brand wants it said, and said loud enough that every man, woman and child will understand it.

It may be that the great mass of citizens who met at the courthouse yesterday afternoon were excited and are about to do something rash. It is the duty of those who see the calamity awaiting them, to send up danger signals and warn the people.

The railroad may not be built; the people may be fools for thus "tearing their shirts" about trying to raise the required bonus; it may be that all of us are "paying too much for our whistle;" but if the wind continues to blow and the sunshine continues to shine, the Hereford loyal citizens and patriots are going to be found dying in the last ditch to save the day.

Let those who are furnishing no heat for the BONUS THERMOMETER come forward and rescue the people from the miasmatic wave that is about to sweep over the town and county. It is their duty to do it.

In the language of the president of the club: "Shall Hereford remain to be a station on the Santa Fe fifty miles from Amarillo?"

THAT HAMMER

If you have had your hammer in use, now is the time to put it to some good work; a little knocking may bring down the chestnuts. The scriptures say "Knock and it shall be opened." But be sure that you do the right kind of knocking. Knock for what is right; knock with all your might; but for heaven's sake knock and knock hard. Knock the fellow that "knocks the railroad," but knock him with the hard rocks of argument. If he runs from you, fling this scripture at him:—"The wicked flee when no man pursueth, but the righteous are as bold as a lion."
