A CARD FROM BOWMAN

Questionable Campaign Methods Used
Against Him in His Race
for Representative.

CLARENDON, Tex., July 25.
TO THE VOTERS OF DONLEY CO:

My attention has been called by some of my friends in this county, while in Clarendon today, to a circular that I suppose is being sent over the district, entitled, "An Appeal for Justice."

This effort on the part of my opponents and their friends is to my mind manifestly unfair. They wait until it is impossible for me to have a circular answer printed and circulated over the district, for even if I had an answer prepared I could not reach each voter as they are doing until after the election. I have stated my position clearly upon every issue in this campaign, giving my reasons therefor. I can not in this short notice go into detail and give my reasons on the various issues that I have discussed from the stump in many of the counties in the district. My views are known, my opponents have heard them, therefore I ask, is it fair to send out this article, manifestly unjust, on the eve of the election when I cannot reply? Why was not this article mailed a reasonable time before the election? It may be true that "Anything is fair in politics," yet there are

many things that the people of this district will not approve, and many things that I would not do.

Geo. F. Morgan this week authorizes us to place his name before the public as a candidate for re-election to the office of county judge of Donley county. There is little use of saying more. Judge Morgan's long residence in Clarendon and his clean record both as a man and officer have given him an acquaintanceship among the people of the county so wide and strong that it amounts practically to personal attachment. Two years ago George Morgan, then serving by appointment the unexpired term of B. H. White, deceased, came before the people as a candidate for the first time for county judge. He was elected and in the ensuing two years has made a record on which he stands and of which his friends are duly proud. In asking for the second term he does so with a consciousness of duty well preformed, and the fact that so far there has been no talk of an opponent shows in a measure to what extent his services have been appreciated by the people.

NEW BUSINESS BUILDINGS

Work Has Commenced on New Business Houses in Clarendon—Six Now Under Way.

Six new business houses will be built in Clarendon at once. Work has begun on four of them, while the other two will be commenced immediately.

Ground was broken Tuesday by Dr. T. E. Standifer, Dan Foster and Dr. Wooten. These three lots lie together on Main street, Mr. Foster having bought the Dr. Gray lot for \$850. Two of these houses will be 25x70 feet and the third 25x80. Wooten and Foster will use cement blocks throughout, while Dr. Standifer will have a pressed brick front and rear with block walls. All will be one story high.

F. E. Wright, of Gurden, Ark., who owns the adjoining two lots, writes that he will be here in a few days and will at once begin the erection of similar houses on those lots.

Further down the street B. T. Lane is at work on the foundation of his new building. It will be 50x115 feet, one story high, and built of cement blocks. After September 1st it will be occupied by The Powell Trading Company. The building vacated by the latter concern will then be occupied by

Logan & Hayter, a new firm from Seymour.

Clarendon has long needed these new houses. Several business concerns have failed to locate here on account of there being no houses for rent.

The Cantaloupe Crop.

Growers of cantaloupes in and around Clarendon report the crop in first-class condition and some fruit beginning to ripen. It is thought that the shipping season will be in full blast within the next three weeks, and an expert in the handling of such crops has been engaged to oversee the business of the association. The season has been most favorable and prospects now seem good for the growers to realize handsomely on their experiment.

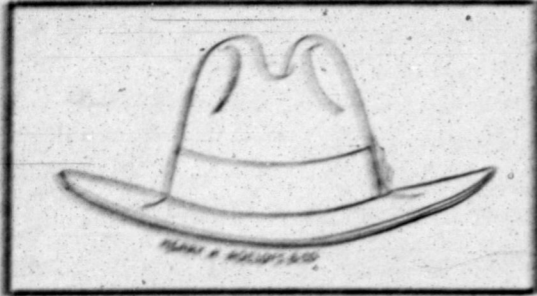

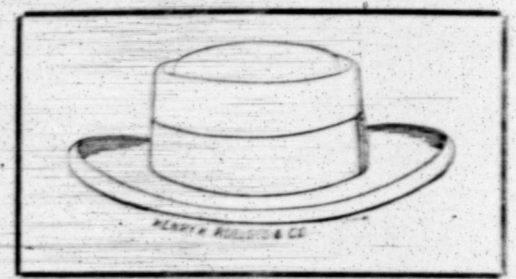

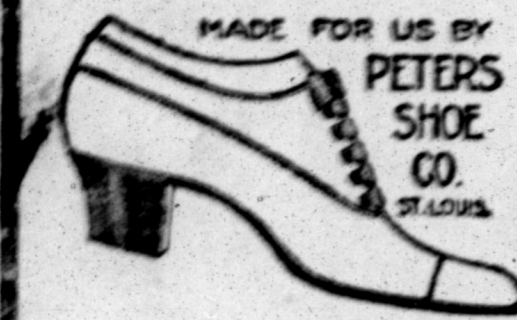

The largest wool shipment which has ever gone out of the Panhandle was made from this city this week by the Wool Growers' Association of Deaf Smith and Castro counties under the supervision of a committee composed of J. P. Carr, J. T. Rutherford and Judge M. F. Barber.

This shipment consisted of about 75,000 pounds and was consigned to a commission house in Chicago where it will be sold at an early date. This product is all first class in quality and will bring about 22c per pound on the market at present.

BOWMAN IN SILVERTON.

Strips the Feathers from Both Opponents in Public Debate and Shows Masterful Ability.

At Silvertown last week the three candidates for representative met in debate. Watkins was humorous (as usual), Gibson was serious and (as usual) was riding his hobby in a dead run, while Bowman, was (as usual) using his think machine and showing the people that he had brains and ability. The Silvertown Enterprise says of the meeting:

Friday morning the school house auditorium was comfortably filled by citizens to hear the discussion between candidates for representative, Messrs. Watkins, Gibson and Bowman, who spoke in order named. Mr. Watkins declares himself against the Terrell Election Law, berring the poll tax amendment and Australian ballot. Is in favor of an Agricultural, Mechanical and Horticultural College to be located some where in this section of the plains, is in favor of reform in the public school system, opposed to any change in the local option law, was severe in denunciation of the lawyers as representatives and seemed to array class against class. His fund of anecdote seemed to be inexhaustible.

Mr. Gibson, for the most part consumed his time in a discussion of the right of the Santa Fe railroad to take up the sixteen miles of track between Panhandle City and Washburn, and this, he said was the main issue in his race, as the precedent was a bad one, the people were opposed to it, and were he elected he should oppose it. Mr. Gibson's peroration to the aged and to the ladies, was a fine piece of oratory.

Mr. Bowman's matter-of-fact way of answering the opposition made him master of the situation. His plain out-spoken statements of his position on questions before the people and his manner of discussing them gave him the closest attention and it was plainly to be seen that before he was half through, the audience was impressed with his courage, zeal and ability. The unprejudiced judgment of those who heard him is that the people will send him back to Austin and test the capacity of the man by the measure of promise.

FOR REPRESENTATIVE.

Tomorrow the people of the 106th representative district will determine into whose hands they will bestow the keeping for two years of their sovereign right to a voice in the making of their laws. It was the denial of this right that caused the revolt of the colonies of America which led up to the Revolution. When we speak of the independence of the United States and our far-famed freedom we mean simply the right of self government and the making of our own laws. In Texas every two years we elect representatives and senators to go to the State Capital and there in our place and stead and as our spokesmen, acting for us and answerable to us, to imitate, discuss and enact, as well as to reform, repeal and amend, the laws which shall regulate us in our conduct, business and property. The importance and responsibility of the position of representative cannot well be overestimated.

There are three candidates seeking the honor of this position: Hon. J. R. Bowman, of Amarillo, elected at the special election in February, asking for re-election; Mr. W. R. Gibson, of Claude, who was defeated in the special election; and Mr. L. B. Watkins, of Moore county.

Mr. Bowman is a young man, well educated, of pleasing address, and a public speaker of far more than ordinary ability. He was raised in Collin county, where his father yet resides, and is of good parentage, upright and truly gentlemanly. He has practiced law in the Panhandle and resided at Amarillo for the past four years, and is thoroughly conversant with the needs of the district. In the opinion of the Banner-Stockman he is the proper man for the place, and will reflect more credit on his constituency than would perhaps any other man whom we could choose for this position of honor and trust. In his race he has been honest, open and above board in every detail. Has plainly stated his position on the various issues, and has accorded to his opponents all of courtesy and all of fairness. He has run a clean, gentlemanly race, and has been as fair to the voters as he has to his opponents, answering every question and stating all his positions clearly. In the last week or so we understand that his opponents have double-teamed on him and adopted the slogan, "Anything to beat Bowman." They have played politics on him to the extent that at the last moment, when it was too late for him to circulate an answer over the district, they issued a circular, headed, "An Appeal for Justice," putting it out broadcast over the district, in which his position on a certain issue is warped and his motives impugned. On those who have heard Mr. Bowman's views as expressed in public debate this circular will have no effect, but there may be some voters in the district

who have been unable to meet him or hear him in his speeches and to such of these as the Banner-Stockman reaches we would say that there is absolutely nothing in this circular put out by his opponents except a very cheap grade of political clap-trap. If Mr. Bowman is sent to Austin he will represent the district strictly on the principle of the greatest good to the greatest number of the people, and his abilities are such that he will be given that respectful consideration by his colleagues which will redound to the good of his district. You will make no mistake in casting your ballot for "Dick" Bowman, "of and for the Panhandle."

Homes For Students.

Proposed Amendment to the State
Constitution Relating to Certain Ex-
emptions from Taxation.
Joint Resolution to amend Section 2
of Article VIII of the Constitution of
the State of Texas, relating to certain
exemptions from taxation.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of
the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article
VIII, of the Constitution of the State
of Texas, be so amended that the same
shall read as follows, to-wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be equal
and uniform upon the same class of
subjects within the limits of the au-
thority of levying the tax; but the
Legislature may, by general laws, ex-
empt from taxation public property
used for public purposes; actual places
of religious worship; places of burial
not held for private or corporate
profit; all buildings used exclusively
and owned by persons or associations
of persons for school purposes and the
necessary furniture of all schools, also
the endowment funds of such institu-
tions of learning and religion not used
with a view to profit and when the
same are invested in bonds or mort-
gages, or in land or other property
which has been and shall hereafter be
bought in by such institutions under
foreclosure sales made to satisfy or
protect such bonds or mortgages; that
such exemption of such land and prop-
erty shall continue only for two years
after the purchase of the same at such
sale by such institutions and no longer,
and institutions of purely public
charity; and all laws exempting prop-
erty from taxation other than the
property above mentioned shall be
null and void."

Section 2. The Governor of the State
shall and he is hereby directed to issue
the necessary proclamation for the
submission of this amendment to the
qualified voters of the State of Texas
at the next general election for State
and County officers.

Section 3. The qualified electors for
members of the Legislature of the
State of Texas shall vote upon this
amendment on the — day of —, at
which election all persons favoring
said amendment shall have written or
printed on the ballot as follows: "For
amendment to Section 2, Article 8 of
the Constitution exempting from tax-
ation endowment funds used exclusi-
vely for school purposes." And those op-
posed to said amendment shall have
written or printed on the ballot as fol-
lows: "Against amendment to Section
2, Article 8, of the Constitution ex-
empting from taxation endowment
funds used exclusively for school pur-
poses."

Section 4. The sum of \$5000 or so
much thereof as may be necessary is
hereby appropriated out of any funds
in the treasury of the State of Texas,

expenses of such publication, procla-
mation, and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State
Constitution Authorizing the Levy
of a Tax to Pay Jurors.

Joint Resolution amending Section
9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of
the State of Texas, providing for the
levying of a tax of not exceeding fifty
cents on the one hundred dollars
valuation, to pay jurors.
Section 1. Be it resolved by the Leg-
islature of the State of Texas: That
Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitu-
tion of the State of Texas, be so
amended as to hereafter read as fol-
lows:

Section 9. The State tax on prop-
erty, exclusive of the tax necessary to
pay the public debt, and of the taxes
provided for the benefit of the public
free schools, shall never exceed thirty-
five cents on the one hundred dollars
valuation; and no county, city or town
shall levy more than twenty-five cents
for city or county purposes, and not
exceeding fifteen cents for road and
bridge, and not exceeding fifteen
cents to pay jurors, on the one hun-
dred dollars valuation, except for the
payment of debts incurred prior to the
adoption of the amendment September
25th, 1883, and for the erection of pub-
lic buildings, streets, sewers, water
works and other permanent improve-
ments, not to exceed twenty-five cents
on the one hundred dollars valuation,
in any one year, and except as is in
this Constitution otherwise provided;
and the Legislature may also author-
ize an additional annual ad valorem tax
to be levied and collected for the fur-
ther maintenance of the public roads;
provided, that a majority of the qual-
ified property tax-paying voters of the
county voting at an election to be held
for that purpose shall vote such tax,
not to exceed fifteen cents on the one
hundred dollars valuation of the prop-
erty subject to taxation in such coun-
ty. And the Legislature may pass local
laws for the maintenance of the public
roads and highways, without the local
notice required for special or local
laws.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby di-
rected to issue the necessary procla-
mation for submitting this amendment to
the Constitution to the qualified voters
of the State of Texas, on the first
Tuesday after the first Monday in No-
vember, 1906, at which election all
voters favoring this amendment shall
have written or printed on their bal-
lots, "For the amendment to authorize
the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The
voters opposed to this amendment
shall have written or printed on their
ballots, "Against the amendment to
authorize the levy of a tax to pay
jurors."

Proposed Amendment to the State
Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per-
Diem of Legislators.

House Joint Resolution authorizing
the submission to a vote of the people
of the State of Texas of a proposed
amendment of Section 24, Article 3, of
the Constitution of the State of Texas,
fixing the salaries and mileage of
members of the Legislature, and pre-
venting the accepting, for themselves
or for others, by members of the Leg-
islature of free passes, franks, rebates,
privileges or advantages from certain
persons and corporations.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Leg-
islature of the State of Texas: That
at the next general election of the
State of Texas, or at any previous
election, in case an election for the
Governor shall be had or ordered by the
Governor for other purposes, there
shall be submitted to the electors of
the State of Texas, for their approval
or disapproval, the following amend-
ment to the Constitution of the State
of Texas, as provided for in Section 1,
Article 17 of said Constitution, relat-
ing to proposed amendments thereto,
it being intended to amend Section 24,
Article 3, of said Constitution, relat-
ing to the pay of members of the Leg-
islature, so that the said Section shall
read as follows:

Sec. 24. The members of the Leg-
islature shall receive from the public
treasury such compensation for their
services as may from time to time be
provided by law, not exceeding one
thousand dollars for the year succeed-
ing their election, payable in equal in-
stallments, on the first days of Janu-
ary, February March and April of the
year succeeding their election, and five
dollars per day for each day of every
special session held during the second
year of the term for which said mem-
bers shall be elected. In addition to
said compensation the members of
each house shall be entitled to mileage,
going to and returning from the seat
of government, which mileage shall
not exceed three cents per mile, the
distance to be computed by the near-
est and most direct route of travel by
land, regardless of railroads or water
routes; and the Comptroller of the
State shall prepare and preserve a
table of distances to each county seat,
now or hereafter to be established, and
by said table the mileage of each mem-
ber shall be paid; but no member shall
be entitled to mileage for any extra
session that may be called within one
day after adjournment of any regular
or called session. It shall be unlawful
for any member of the legislature
during his term of office to accept
any free transportation over any
railway line or lines in this
State, and any member of the Leg-
islature violating the provisions of this
Act prohibiting the acceptance of free
transportation shall forfeit the office to
which he has been elected. And it
shall be unlawful for any of such
members to accept, receive, have, use
or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for
themselves or any other person, any
free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or
advantage not accorded to the general
public from any railroad company,
telegraph company, telephone com-
pany, sleeping car company, or other
corporation acting as a common car-
rier in this State. Any member of the
Legislature violating this provision
shall forfeit his office. And the neces-
sary laws shall be enacted to carry out
the provisions of this Article.
