

A BIG FIRE TUESDAY

SIX FIRMS AND THREE BUSINESS HOUSES DESTROYED.

WILL REBUILD AT ONCE

Property Owners Express Determination of Replacing Shacks with Nice Brick Structures.

The expected has happened. "All things come to him who waits," and for the past seven years we have been waiting and expecting each week to have to chronicle the destruction by fire of the row of frame buildings on Kearney street.

At about 2:30 o'clock Tuesday morning the fire alarm sounded. Those first on the scene, among whom was E. H. Decker, say the fire originated in the rear room of the Clarendon Bakery. The block consisted of three buildings, cut up by partitions into six store rooms, and occupied by Tucker & Tax's bakery, F. A. White's tailoring shop, A. H. Cowsar's meat market, Lloyd Blackwell's barber shop, M. L. Vinson's Kandy Kitchen, and Butler & Caraway's restaurant with lodging rooms in the second story. The buildings were perhaps fifteen years old, as dry as tinder, and burned rapidly. The almost total absence of wind was a favorable circumstance and accounts in part for the fact that no material damage was done to any other

building on the streets, though due credit must be given to the men and boys who worked heroically to save adjoining property.

The fire department had not yet been organized, as all of the apparatus had not been received, and that part which had arrived was not so located as to be all available. About 250 feet of the new hose and one nozzle was all that could be had on such short notice, but it was soon demonstrated that Clarendon is the possessor of a system of fire protection for her business interests of which every citizen should be and doubtless is justly proud. With one line of hose and an ample supply of water, with good pressure, the fire was confined to the block and finally extinguished without material damage to any other property. The brick building occupied by the Citizens Bank was in great danger, being jammed up against the burning house, but so thorough was the work of the boys with the one line of hose that the bank was not only saved but the adjoining wooden wall was even left standing. The damage to the bank wall from heat is nominal.

The losses are as follows:
M. W. Wooten, loss on building, \$800, no insurance.
Dr. Wm. Gray, loss on building, \$700, insurance \$400.
Bromley & Cooke, loss on building, \$800, insurance \$600.
F. A. White, loss \$300, no insurance.
Tucker & Tax, loss, \$1000, insurance \$500.
A. H. Cowsar, loss \$400, no insurance.

Lloyd Blackwell had about \$1000 invested in his barber shop fixtures and furniture, had no insurance and saved about \$350 worth of the furniture.

M. L. Vinson, loss \$200, no insurance.

Butler & Caraway, loss \$300, no insurance. They also lost \$53 in money which was forgotten and allowed to burn.

Curnutte & Wattenbarger, real estate, who were officing temporarily with F. A. White, were damaged somewhat by smoke and water and breakage.

Fred Chamberlain lost about \$25 worth of fruits and vegetables in the Cowsar meat market.

Portions of nearly all the stocks were carried out and saved. Practically nothing was saved, however, from the meat market, tailor shop and restaurant. The small amount of insurance carried was due to the fact that the buildings were considered such poor risks by the companies that, where obtainable at all, the rate was practically prohibitive.

TO REBUILD.

While sympathizing heartily with those who were losers in the fire on Kearney street Tuesday morning Clarendon people will be glad to learn that the frame shacks destroyed will be immediately replaced with modern brick or stone business buildings. Plans, of course, are not yet made in detail but Messrs. Wooten, Gray, Cooke and Bromley have all signified their intention of rebuilding, and that at once. Dr. Gray is now in Ft. Worth looking after the placing of some contracts. It is entire-

ly likely that all three buildings will be two-stories high.

With these three houses under way, in addition to the B. T. Lane 50x100-foot building further down the street, there will be something doing in Clarendon, and a long felt want will be supplied.

The business firms burned out have secured temporary locations as follows: Tucker & Tax in the post office building; M. L. Vinson in the Rutherford & Adair store; Imperial Barber Shop in rear of J. M. Clower's store; Curnutte & Wattenbarger up stairs, Borchers building; Butler & Caraway at the old Tracy stand, having bought Lou Robbins' restaurant. Messrs. Cowsar and White had not located at last report to this office.

As we go to press we learn that Cooke & Bromley today sold their lot in the burned district to Dr. T. E. Standifer, consideration \$750. This sale will not change the plans for building, as Dr. Standifer will immediately proceed to erect a brick.

G. Giles Willingham was up from Giles Monday attending the county democratic committee meeting. He and family had just returned from a six-week's camping trip throughout the country west and southwest of here. He says he saw no crops while out that would in any way compare with Donley county's showings.

Miss Willie Franks returned last Sunday from Childress where she had been spending several days with friends.—Hall County Herald.

Scholastic Census Shows Big Increase in Donley County Over Last Year—11 Little Niggers.

The following summary of the scholastic census for Donley county is furnished us by County Judge Morgan.

There are also 11 colored scholastics, 5 male and 6 female, making a grand total of 964.

Of the above number there were enumerated in Clarendon Independent District 434, and in the several rural districts of the county 530, an increase of 43 and 125 respectively over last year, or a total increase of 168 pupils in Donley county during the past 12 months.

DEMOCRATS MET MONDAY

Donley County Executive Committee Transacted Business in Accordance With the Law.

The Donley County Democratic Executive Committee met Monday in response to Chariman Beville's call, and proceeded to business with the following members present: A. M. Beville, Chairman; N. N. Martin, Old Town; W. B. Sims, Lelia; E. E. McGee, Rowe; F. R. McCracken, Whitefish; J. S. Young, Giles; E. R. Reeves, Jericho; Jno. E. Cooke, secretary.

The chair stated the object of the meeting and read from the Terrell election law extracts showing the business to be transacted. The first thing taken up was the question of whether or no a primary election for county officers should be held. It was a short horse easily curried, for it appeared that not one county candidate had made application for his name on the ticket in the required time, thus relieving the committee of the necessity for any action. A discussion brought out the fact that a primary election for county officers was not desired by any appreciable per cent of the people of the county.

It appearing that according to law a primary election in Donley county for state and district officers was mandatory upon us, it was moved by McCracken that such primary be held in the various voting precincts of the county on the date fixed by law, viz: July 28, for those offices only; carried.

The chair, with the assistance of the members appointed the various presiding officers for such primary election, as follows: Giles, G. G. Willingham; Whitefish, F. R. McCracken; Lelia, W. B. Sims; Rowe, E. E. McGee; R O Headquarters, R. E. Williams; Jericho, W. F. Manney; Old Town, J. T. Wilson; Clarendon, W. H. Cooke.

The following test was adopted by the committee for the primary election: "I am a democrat and hereby pledge myself to support the democratic nominees at the general election in November."

The chair appointed a primary executive committee as follows: E. R. Reeves, N. N. Martin, W. B. Sims, E. E. McGee and J. S. Young. It is the duty of this committee to meet in Clarendon on Monday, July 9, to make up a ticket for the primary election.

One of the requirements of the Terrell law is that the County Executive Committee shall at their meeting of this date decide by lot the position the names of the several candidates participating in the election shall occupy on the ticket. This matter was accordingly gone into, and the places drawn by lot. The result is as follows, and shows the ticket as it will be voted on July 28:

FARMER HIS OWN PACKER

Such Should be the Case on Every Well Regulated Farm in the Lone Star State.

There is one thing about this packing scandal that is refreshing. It will be great encouragement for every farmer to be his own packer. When a man kills and cures his own meat he knows what he is eating. No danger of having a ham off a hog that was smothered to death in a car or died of disease palmed off on him.—Denton Record-Chronicle.

Every farmer should be interested in the development of the beef packery sensation. He ought to be able to point to the fact that he raises and cures his own meat and that if the products of the factories happen to be unhealthful he will not have to send for a doctor. But it is a fact that in Texas there are many farmers who not only buy all their meat, but farmers who actually buy their lard. The number of these is decreasing daily. This is shown in more ways than one. But the best proof is the amount of corn that is in this year. From one end of the state to the other corn fields abound. They mean meat for the family. The farming people of Texas always raised corn on the basis that it was necessary for the horses and mules and for bread for the family; but, after that, they needed no more of it. But at present the hogs come into calculation because the majority of farmers find that if they have to buy their bacon and their lard they can not save anything from the value of the other crops. As has been remarked in these columns many, many times, no farmer can make even 15c cotton pay if the family eats out of one end of the cotton bale and the stock out of the other. Next year, the indications are, Texas will buy less of hog products, such as bacon and lard, than at any time in her history, though there will be many thousands more people within her borders than ever before.—Dallas News.

Particularly in the Panhandle should the above apply. There is no country on earth where hogs can be so easily and cheaply raised as this section of Texas. There is no occasion for any Panhandle farmer to ever have to purchase lard, bacon or hams from the big packeries.

CITY COUNCIL VINDICATED.

Some months ago the city council of Clarendon made a contract with the Clarendon Water, Light & Power Company for a system of water works for fire protection for the business section of the city. The contract was made after due deliberation; the council was composed of five of the best business men in town, and the stipulated price per annum is considered by all who are in anywise posted in such matters as very reasonable indeed. Yet there were some who opposed the movement. The Banner-Stockman favored the contract; in fact worked for the consummation of the deal, and is glad to take some little credit for the final solution of the problem.

The early morning fire of Tuesday entirely vindicates the city council in this matter. It was demonstrated, under the most unfavorable situation and combination of circumstances, that the water company has given the city a square deal in every respect, that Clarendon is the possessor of a system of water works for fire protection equal to that of any town of the same size in the state. When it is known that with no organized fire company and no apparatus at hand except about 250 feet of hose and one nozzle, Clarendon citizens, working without system, succeeded in doing the work that was done on this occasion, it is only left the Doubting Thomases to agree with us that the contract made by the council with the water company is the best piece of business they have ever done.

With a regularly organized fire department, and necessary equipment, both of which we will shortly have, Clarendon is practically safe from any extensive conflagration.

With four stone and brick business houses in sight and chances good for one of the best crops in the history of Donley county things begin to take on the hue of the rose to the Clarendon citizen.

It is desired to have a big parade on the morning of the 4th of July. All citizens are requested to participate, having their carriages, buggies or other vehicles decorated for the occasion. The attention of the ladies especially is called to this feature of the day.

R. H. Jones, county commissioner from the Rowe precinct, has signified his intentions of not standing for re-election again and the people of that precinct are now casting about to find a good man for the place. In the opinion of the Banner-Stockman no better man could be settled upon than Capt. E. E. McGee. We hear his name mentioned frequently, and while he has not yet agreed to make the race we believe his deep interest in the affairs of his home county will cause him to accept the office if he is assured that his services are needed. There is no better citizen in the county than Capt. McGee, and no one who would make a better commissioner.

F. R. McCracken was here from his ranch in the extreme northern part of the county Monday attending the democratic committee meeting. He brought his usual good reports from the farming interests.

MASS MEETING AT ROWE

Citizens of the Community Meet and Discuss the Proposed Removal of the Town.

The meeting then adjourned.

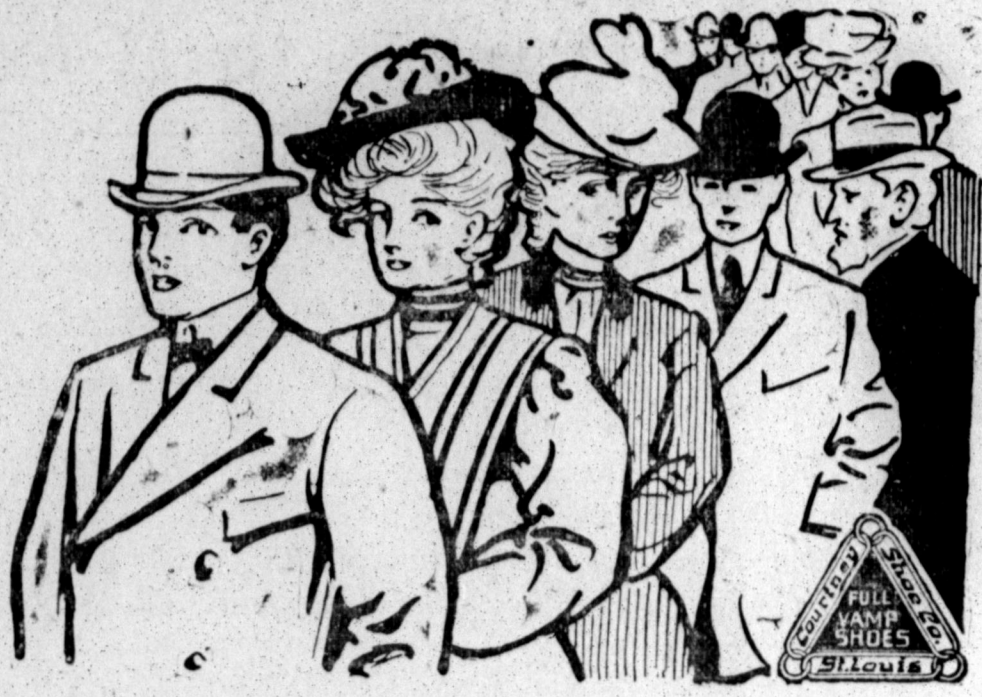

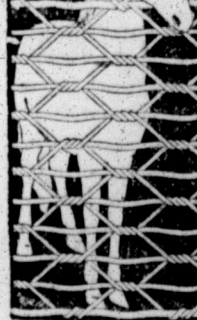
