



## Another Bank Organized in Donley County Indicates the Rapid Growth and Development of the Panhandle Country

### NEW DONLEY COUNTY BANK

One Organized at Rowe This Week with Capital of \$10,000. Charter Asked For.

For some time there have been rumors of a new bank to be established at Rowe, this county, and this week the deal was put through. The capital stock of the new institution will be \$10,000, and the officers will be as follows:

W. E. Reeves, president; Nat Smith, vice-president; S. B. Daniels, cashier.

The organizers will proceed at once with the erection of a business house, and have applied for a charter authorizing them to do business under the recent state banking regulations. Thus the county grows, and Rowe, from a flag station of a few years ago, is fast developing into a hustling little town. The Banner-Stockman extends congratulations to the good people of the community.

### College Improvements.

The ladies of the College Circle are now busying themselves in devising ways and means for some improvements on the girls' dormitory at the Clarendon College. The improvements will consist of a nice gallery all the way around on three sides of the building, and a fresh application of paint to the entire building. A subscription paper is being circulated this week and the ladies say they are meeting with most excellent encouragement, and the estimated sum, \$500, will no doubt be raised in a short time and work be immediately begun.

### John W. Veale.

Hon. John W. Veale, of Amarillo, authorizes the Banner-Stockman to announce him as a candidate for state senator from this, the 29th senatorial district, and his name will be found in the proper column. Mr. Veale has been a resident of the district, his home at Amarillo, for the past fourteen years, and while he has long been numbered among the Panhandle's leading men, both from a legal standpoint and as a common citizen, he has never before held an office nor asked an official favor at the hands of the people. He is a native Texan, having been born in Hill county in 1857. Moved with his father's family to Palo Pinto county in 1865; derived his education from the common schools of the state, with a two-year course at the old Military Institute at Austin; married in 1884; admitted to the bar in 1885 on examination before Hon. T. B. Wheeler, judge of the old 35th district; practiced law with his father, the late Judge Wm. Veale, until 1892, under the firm name of Wm. Veale & Son, at Breckenridge, Texas, and removed

with his family to Amarillo in the year 1892. Judge Veale is well known over the entire district, and is thoroughly familiar with the needs of the country and the legislation necessary to its advancement. If elected he will without doubt serve his people fairly and with credit alike to himself and them. The Banner-Stockman submits his name to its numerous readers as a man who is thoroughly capable to represent them in the state senate. Consider his candidacy carefully before casting a vote.

### Sol Owens Sold Out.

We note that S. B. Owens, the prominent and prosperous Gray county ranchman, has sold his 28-section ranch to a Mr. Medley, of Roswell, N. M., taking in exchange property near Roswell to the amount of \$101,000. Mr. Owens and family have moved to Roswell. He is one of the old timers in this section and has a host of friends who will greatly regret his departure.

Here a few years ago Saturday was no bigger than any other day, and if all the farmers in the county had come to town on the same day it would not have made a very big showing. Last Saturday a business man told us he stood in one spot on Main street and counted eighty-six farmers' wagons, buggies and hacks, all on Main and First streets.

### PUBLIC SCHOOL LIBRARY.

One is Badly Needed in Clarendon Public School—Let the People Help in This.

A reporter for the Banner-Stockman called at the public school building Wednesday and was shown around by Superintendent Silvey. We particularly noticed the efforts of Prof. Silvey and the faculty to establish a library in the school. The superintendent for several years has made efforts to secure a supply of good books for this purpose, but without any funds to work with has labored under difficulties. By giving entertainments in the various grades from time to time, for which a small admission fee was charged, some money has been raised, and the library now boasts about \$100 worth of books. This number is totally insufficient. Prof. Silvey says he has never seen a set of pupils so anxious for good reading, and whenever a small addition is made to the library the books are eagerly sought after.

It occurs to the Banner-Stockman that the patrons of this school should be enough interested in this matter to donate an amount of money sufficient to supply the library with a generous supply of new books. Each patron and friend of the public free school system should be interested to the extent of a few dollars, and a subscription could be started for the purpose which would very soon enable Prof. Silvey to install a library that would be a credit to his school, already acknowledged the best public school in the Panhandle. Let it be done by all means.

### Two Accidents.

Night Engineer Thompson and Manager H. Gleason, of the electric light plant, are both tied up in rags this week as a result of explosions of gas generated in the

fire box at the plant. They are burning Beaumont oil, and through some bad quality in the oil gas was formed and the explosions resulted. Mr. Thompson was badly burned about the face and hands on Monday night, while Mr. Gleason suffered the same accident on last evening about dark, his worst burns being about the eyes. While very painful, the burns of neither will prove serious.

### The Convention.

Next week is convention week in Amarillo and the crowds from all over the Panhandle will be there. The seventh annual convention of the Panhandle Stockmen's Association will be in session and reports from Amarillo say the people have made preparations to give the cowmen and their friends a warm reception. Next week's issue of the Banner-Stockman will contain an account of the proceedings of the convention.

### The Beverly Killing.

John Beverly returned Monday from Ardmore, I. T., where he went to attend the funeral of his brother, Jim, who was killed there last week and notice of which we made in last week's paper. He says the killing was the result of some minor trouble about a line fence, the parties being neighbors and farmers. The matter run into a fight and Beverly was getting the best of the argument, using a knife, when the other party broke and ran. Beverly turned his back and started to walk off when his adversary shot him in the back. He lived about twenty-four hours. Jim Beverly was the younger brother of John and Charley, but had never lived in this section and was not known here. His brothers had not heard from him for several years prior to the killing.

### CITY ELECTION RESULTS.

I. W. Carhart, Sr., is Mayor; Messrs. Cooke, Clark, Stocking, Taylor, Fleming, Aldermen.

The city council met Monday and canvassed the election returns of last week. They found the official vote as having resulted in the election of I. W. Carhart, Sr., mayor; F. A. White, city marshal; Messrs. W. H. Cooke, Dr. J. D. Stocking, H. W. Taylor, J. S. Fleming and John H. Clark, aldermen.

All these gentlemen will qualify, or have already done so, except Mr. White, who refuses to accept the marshal's place. The new board will perhaps appoint some one to fill the vacancy as soon as it can meet and get things in working order.

### Fruit Not Killed.

O. W. Weatherbee, who lives on the old Claunch place about 12 miles east of town, and who has perhaps the largest peach orchard in the county, was in town yesterday and to a Banner-Stockman reporter stated that the fruit was not all killed by a big majority. He says his trees show now that they will bear all the fruit they will be able to hold up, and he estimates that he will get 300 bushels of peaches from about 200 trees. He has recently planted out a large number of new peaches and cherries.

CLARENDON gets the next meeting of the Panhandle Teachers' Association.

The called session of the state legislature came to an end last Tuesday night, the purpose of the session having been fulfilled in the correction of the famous "section 120" of the state election law. The full text of this section is corrected is as follows:

Sec. 120. The candidate for any county office who received either a plurality or majority vote of all the votes cast in his county, as provided for in Sec. 111 of this act, shall be entitled to be placed upon the official ballot as a candidate of his party for the office for which he was nominated. Candidates for all state and district offices shall, in the nominating convention, have precedence among them the convention vote of each county in proportion to the vote cast for each candidate in the primary election in such county. In district and state conventions at the end of each ballot cast, the candidate receiving the smallest vote shall be dropped from the list of candidates to be voted for on the next ballot. Each county delegation upon each ballot cast for candidates being voted for shall cast for each of such candidates the vote of the county or his pro rata part of the county vote as long as the name of such candidate is before the convention. Whenever the name of any candidate is withdrawn or dropped from the convention, then the delegation of each county may cast the instructed vote or any part thereof of such county for such dropped or withdrawn candidate for any other candidate whose name is then before the convention, as the delegation may decide. The convention shall continue to ballot until some one of the candidates balloted for shall receive a majority of all the votes of the convention, when he shall be declared the nominee of the party for the office for which he is nominated. Each county in the State or district convention shall be entitled to one vote for each 300 votes or major fraction thereof cast for the candidate for Governor of the political party holding the convention at the last preceding general election. In case at such general election there were cast for such candidate for Governor less than 300 votes in any county, then all such counties shall have one vote. The result of the nominating convention of a district shall be certified by the chairman thereof to the County Clerks of the counties composing

such district, and of a State convention to the Secretary of State, who shall in turn certify the same to all County Clerks.

## A Deserved Roast.

Clarendon needs a little of the spirit of Amarillo imbued in its sleeping veins of contentment. At the recent city election the citizens of the town did not take enough interest in the outcome to select a ticket and the voters, the few who did drag themselves around to the polls, voted for whom they liked. In many instances it seems that they did even know the initials of the men they desired to vote for. For mayor only thirty-five votes were cast while only twenty were cast for a city marshal. This is indeed a strange thing for a town with a future for better things before it. In Amarillo, with no party interests at heart or questions to arouse political conflict the voters went to the polls and cast their ballots for the candidates of their choice, thus showing their confidence in the future of a live city and one that has already taken the initiative in everything tending for the growth and betterment of the Panhandle. Wake up, come to town occasionally and learn the ways of the world.—Amarillo Herald.

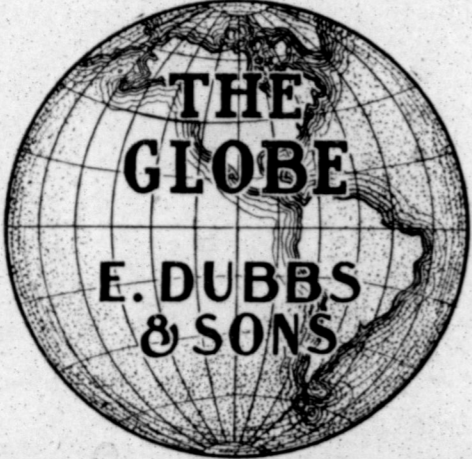

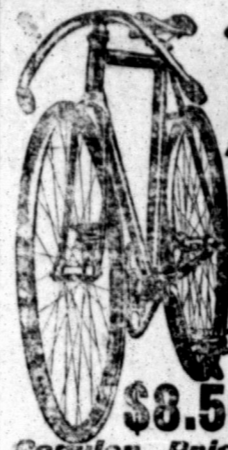

Cousins delivered an interesting and instructive address on education and educational law which was an appreciated feature of the program. Following the address of Mr. Brawley a reception was tendered by the Mothers' Club to the visiting teachers and their friends at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Nobles on Polk street, about two hundred of the teachers and their friends attending.

During the two days session of the association many papers of high merit were read which showed the result of close study and attention on the part of the teachers. 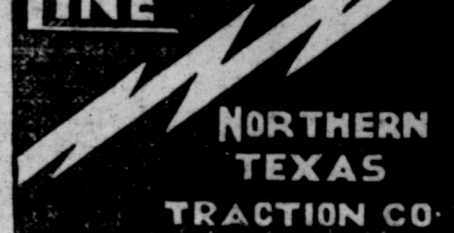

**Children Learn and Recite Thousands of Bible Verses.**

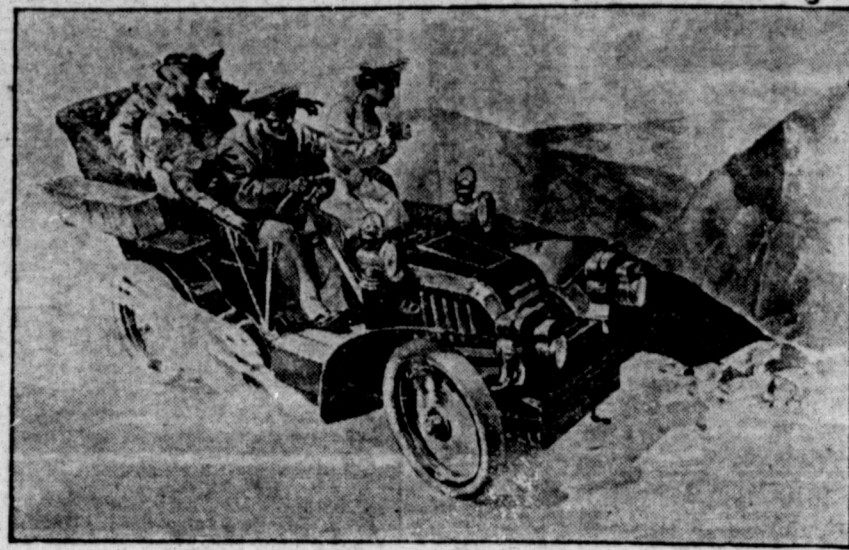
