Nearly Two Hundred Acres Will be Planted in This Luscious Fruit in Donley County.

The farmers near town have taken the matter up with a vim since the Banner-Stockman first broached the subject, and some sixty acre are already guaranteed in this immediate locality,

It is estimated that 40 acres will ship a carload each day during the season, thrrefore it is easy to be seen that with a favor able season the demand for cars fo this purpose will net the railroad handsome profit during the coming summer.
