## HEREFORD BOYS WIN AT MEET

Moore and Carter Divide Honors  
With the Fleet Footed at the  
Canyon City Track Meet.

The first track meet held in the Panhandle was pulled off at Canyon last Friday and Saturday. The Hereford College boys, Albert Moore, Albert Carter, Robert Elliott Jr. and Lewis McBride were some of the aspiring athletes who went over and took part in the meet.

Moore was first to score for Hereford College, running a fast hundred on the slowest alley of the course and finishing a short foot behind the first man. The second score was added by Moore also, in the quarter mile. He took the lead after about 40 yards and kept it to the end, finishing some 15 yards ahead of the second man.

Carter finished strong in the same event and took third medal. The half mile race was close and Carter pushed the second man hard for his place. The Hereford Marathon man, Elliott ran a strong race in the same event and finished without showing the least signs of fatigue.

In the Hurdle race McBride held a fast pace and showed great form, but was disqualified by the judges at the finish after he had led the bunch all the way by about five yards. At any rate he showed the country boys how the hurdling stunt is done.

In the final score Hereford showed 10 points to their credit.

Keep your eyes on the boys next year for they declare they are "going for the Grapes."

Albert Moore, who won the quarter mile race, making the distance in exactly one minute, is the son of S. B. Moore, who with his family moved here from Humboldt, Illinois, last summer. Albert is a student of the Hereford College and was a member of the football team last fall in which place he made a splendid record.

## BEST RAIN THIS YEAR

Good Season in Ground—Rains  
Cover All of Panhandle. Farmers  
Happy.

The pessimist will have to revise his weather forecasts. The rains that began last Friday night have covered all Eastern New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle. The first rain covered a wide strip of territory along the Texas, New Mexico line and reached east as far as Hereford where only a light shower fell. But on Sunday and Sunday night the rain clouds from the Rockies came down and emptied themselves in copious rains in every section of the Texas Panhandle. Reports from Texline, Texola, Shamrock, Dalhart, Channing, Clarendon, Friona, Bovina, Texico, Dimmitt, Umbarger, Parrott, Spring Lake, Rhea, Kelso, all report good rains and big rains. Kelso and the western part of Deaf Smith county received a good rain Friday night followed by a better one Sunday night.

The precipitation at Hereford was 1.75 inches Friday and Sunday. Six miles southeast, at the Hay's farm, three quarter inches were reported, at J. F. Dollar's place nearly 3 inches.

At this time Tuesday afternoon it is giving Hereford a slow rain, and from the looks of the clouds a general rain is falling.

H. L. Blood of Elmira, New York State, has come to this county to improve his land near Kelso. He says that he, like many others, has been waiting for the country to build up and thus receive the benefit of the improvements. Not satisfied with conditions he comes to join those who are pioneering. He and his relatives own several half sections in the western part of the county and all will make some improvements. Santa Fe Agricultural Work in the  
Panhandle and South Plains

It will be remembered that Mr. Johnson was the poultry speaker who created much interest in the question of poultry raising on the Santa Fe special train this last winter. Mr. Johnson is a thoroughly competent man and able to assist Mr. Bainer in all lines of agriculture in our section.

We desire to compliment the Santa Fe System in placing these two well trained men in our territory. There is no question but that they will be able to do us much good.

## HOUSE PASSES IMPORTANT BILLS

But the Senate Remains Unorganized  
and Has Blocked Congressional  
Legislation.

Washington, April 24.—Congress today found itself in a peculiar situation. The house is congratulating itself on having passed expeditiously the campaign publicity, the direct election of senators and the Canadian reciprocity bills, but the senate thus far practically is unorganized, its committees have not been named and the upper branch of congress was unprepared to transact business.

The house program today dealt with emergency bills, with a report late in the afternoon on the free list measure by Chairman Underwood of the ways and means committee. A week or more of debate on the latter measure is expected.

Senator Jonathan Bourne Jr., one of the "progressive" senators on the Republican committee on committees, will be given the chairmanship of the committee on postoffices and post roads. This was announced at the White House today by Senator Smoot, who said also that Senator Clapp would get the chairmanship of the committee on interstate commerce.

Senator Crane will retain the chairmanship of the committee on rules.

The Canadian reciprocity bill was referred to the committee on finance without comment.

### Creamery Talk.

Harvey G. Hays was in town Monday again and was talking the creamery and cold storage proposition. He says that he has met with much encouragement among the business men and farmers. The Chester neighborhood, the Frio community, the Nazareth colony and other places are being asked to cooperate. The plan is to organize a stock company of five thousand dollars or more, each share being \$100. With the funds to erect a building with a capacity of 10 cars, but to install a refrigerating plant of double that amount. Then to install butter making machinery sufficient to care for the cream from 300 or 500 cows.

The company would make it its business to buy all the cream, eggs and chickens which the farmers may bring in. And also to buy their garden produce in season.

Mr. Hays is gathering all the data and information which may be needed in starting such an enterprise and it is largely through his efforts that such a move has been put on foot.

That a cold storage plant and creamery in connection would be a good proposition for the business interests of Hereford is certain. It would bring to Hereford all the farmers in wide crich of territory, because they would know that whatever produce they start to town with they would not have to haul it back.

### Window Lights Broken.

During the rain at Clovis last Sunday night, hail smashed several thousand window lights in that city. The passenger coaches that made up the Merry Widow Monday morning still showed signs of the hail, the windows on side of all the coaches being more or less battered out.

## FOREST RESERVE IN THE PANHANDLE

To Take Question Up at Once With Secretary of Agriculture Wilson and Board of Engineers.

Washington, April 24.—The Congressional Red River Improvement Association, composed of members of Congress whose districts touch Red River, met in the office of the Committee on Public Building and Grounds today for the purpose of perfecting organization for the Sixty-Second Congress. Representative Morris Sheppard was re-elected president, and Representative Charles D. Carter of Oklahoma secretary.

It was decided that the association would appear in a body before the Secretary of Agriculture at an early date to present the matter of a forest reserve on the headwaters of the Red River. Representative Shepard was requested to arrange a date for the interview with the Secretary, Representative Stephens of Texas was designated to be principal spokesman of the association, when the interview is held, the proposed reserve being in his district.

### PANHANDLE CITIES INTERESTED.

Representative Stephens was also requested to notify the people of Amarillo, Canyon City, and other places immediately interested, in order that they might have an opportunity of being heard before the Secretary. It was also decided that the association should call in a body at the office of the Chief of Engineers, Gen. W. H. Bixby, and again urge the establishment of separate engineering district for Red River, the date of the interview with Gen. Bixby to be arranged by Mr. Sheppard.

The question of establishing a National forest reserve at the headwaters of the Red River has been urged by Representative Stephens for years, he having had a bill to that effect pending in the past several Congresses. This project, which has a bright prospect under the provision of the Appalachian forest reserve bill, is of especial interest to the people of Amarillo, and especially of Canyon City, which place is located at the mouth of the picturesque canyon where the waters from the Red River watershed are gathered for the formation of the stream. It is the leaching of the gypsum sands of the treeless, alkali plains of this watershed that gives the Red River its murky color, and the foresting of these plains, it is expected, would not only check the disastrous floods,

but would tend to clear the waters of the stream.

### PROVIDES FOR EXTENSIVE REFORESTING.

The provision of the Appalachian forest bill, under which the Red River flood control work might be undertaken, is Sec. 6, which reads as follows:

"That the Secretary of Agriculture is hereby authorized and directed to examine, locate and recommend for purchase such lands as in his judgement may be necessary to the navigable streams, and to report to the National Forest Reservation Commission the results of such examinations provided that before any lands are purchased by the National Forest Reservation Commission, said lands shall be examined by the geological survey and a report made to the Secretary of Agriculture, showing that the control of such lands will promote or protect the navigation of streams on whose watersheds they lie."

### Texas Industrial Notes.

"It is too far from the farm to the table," said Col. B. F. Yoakum and the railroad builder is right. Texas is a state of magnificent distances, but when we trace our products from the farm to the table the journey makes a trip from Texarkana to El Paso and return look like a walk across the street. Our cotton is shipped to the European factory and returned to America for consumption, completing a circuit of 10,000 miles on its useless journey to the factory. Our iron comes from Pittsburg, traveling half across the continent when the hills of east Texas are bursting with the finest iron ore in the world. Our farmers, in many instances, must travel 150 miles to a railroad while our banks are glutted with money seeking investment. Bring the factory and the railroad to the farm and we will all sit down at the same table and break bread together.

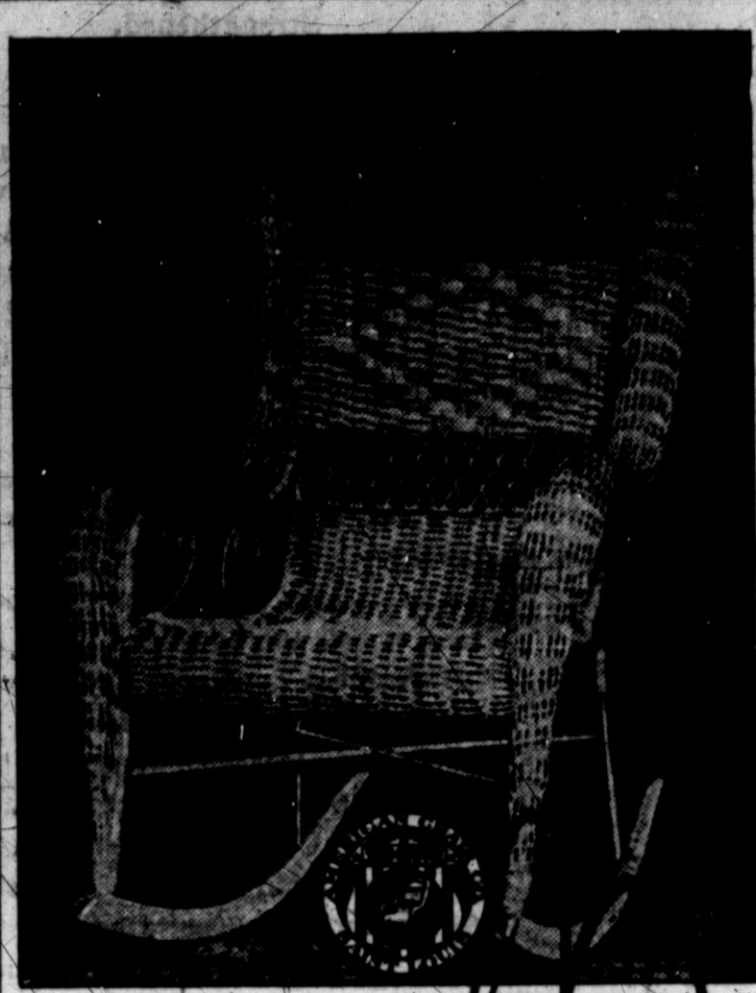
Uncle Sam has sheared his sheep and he finds the nation's fleece of last year worth approximately \$250,000,000 per annum. Uncle Sam makes a good shepherd, his flock having increased \$63,325,000 in value during the past decade. 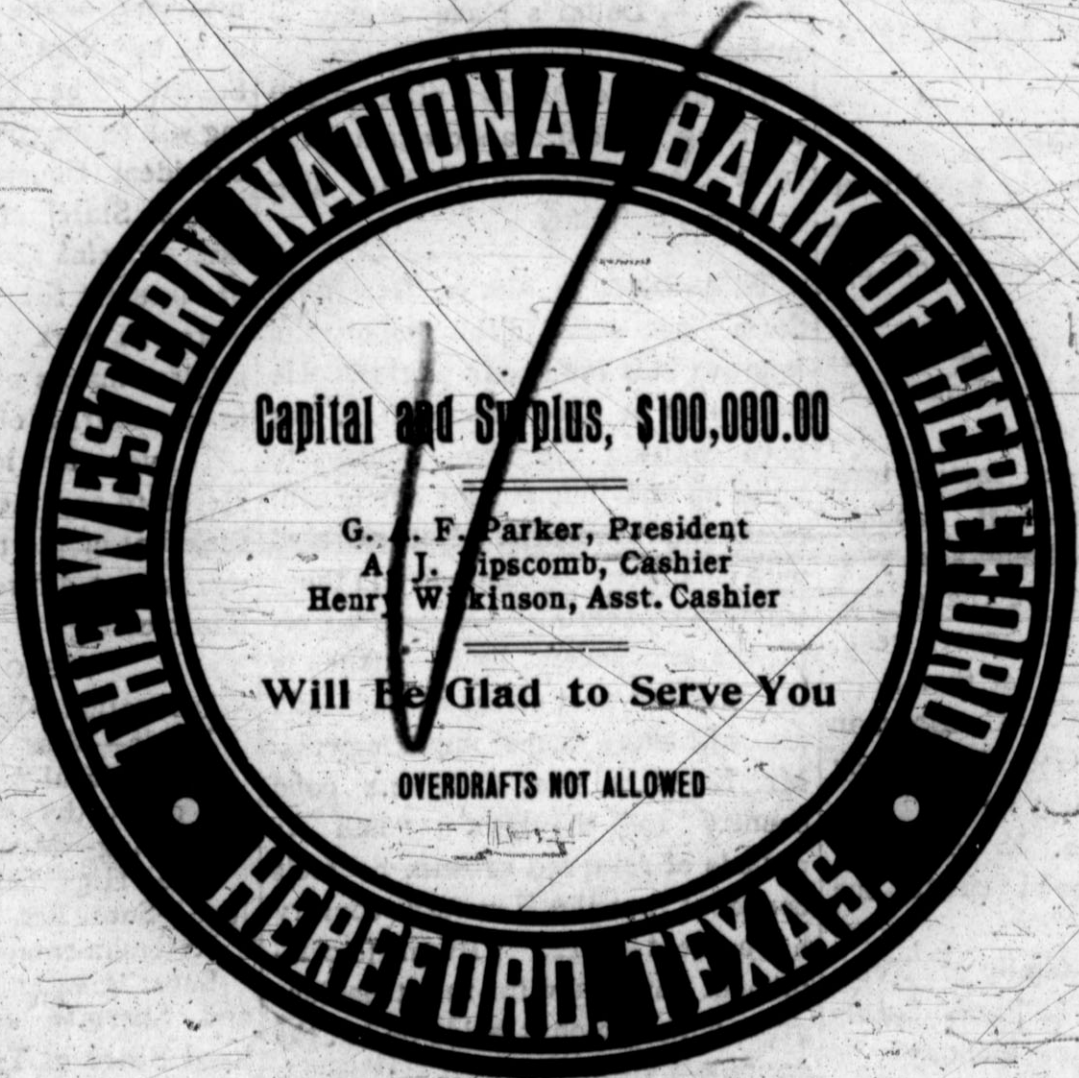
