Railroad Contractors Here.

Last Wednesday several railroad contractors and engineers returned to Texico from their trip west into the heart of New Mexico, over the Belen-Texico Cut-Off line. Among them were Messrs. Shark, John Scott of Scott & Sons, St. Louis; Chas. Lantry, of Lantry & Sharp, who already have the western end of the cut-off under construction; W. R. Stubbs, of Lawrence, Kansas; Creech & Lee, of Kansas City; Griffith & McDonald, of Chicago; Mr. Crook and Ed Johnson, of Davenport, Iowa, and Mr. Wallace, the Santa Fe Engineers. They had been over the line west from Texico to Llano, the crossing on the Rock Island, and some of them as far as Willard, the crossing on the Santa Fe Central railroad between Texico & Belen. They left for Chicago, after informing the Trumpet man that the grading contracts would be awarded to Texico at Chicago on May 20—tomorrow. Then the work will be pushed through at the earliest possible moment, and Texico will soon be connected direct with Belen and on west to the Pacific ocean, putting us on the Santa Fe main line between the Pacific and Chicago.—Texico Trumpet.

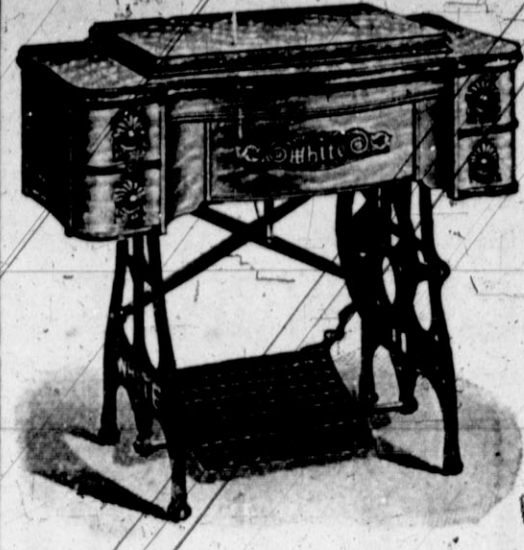

Training Children.

"The thing that is rather distressing to me to see is that sometimes the men and women who have done well in life show a curious inability to train their own children in a way that has resulted successfully to them. I think that all of us know people who; because they have worked hard and triumphed, feel that somehow or other they will spare their children. They will foolishly spare their children the acquisition of the very qualities which have made the parents triumph. Too often you see the man, or, I am sorry to say, the woman, who says: 'I have had to work hard, my sons and daughters shall have an easy time.' He is preparing ruin for the children about whom he says it.

"Of course, you want to give the children all the love possible, but it is not right to mistake folly for affection. When you spare the child that which alone will enable it to conquer in after life, you are not doing it a blessing; you are doing it the greatest wrong in your power. Bring up the boy and girl alike with the understanding that life is not generally easy; that there will be plenty of rough times, and that what they have to show is not a spirit that avoids difficulties and flinches from them, but a spirit which overcomes them."—Roosevelt's speech at Sherman.

The artistic hand of Miss Griffith was very much in evidence. The program was excellent and the decorations were beautiful. Panhandle News

Cattle are dying in Fisher county from eating some kind of poisonous weed. The cowmen are all at sea as to what kind of weed is killing their stock. Death results, in most cases, within a few minutes after the first symptoms make their appearance.

The Denver road last week decided to abandon drilling in their well at Childress, and Superintendent Mann received orders to pull out the casing which had been sunk to a depth of 2160 feet. Red beds is given as the cause for the abandonment; this mixture of sand, clay and salt interfering with the casing to such an extent that it can not be pulled up or down.—Tribune-Chief.

Considerable amount of cotton was marketed here Monday. There is still a considerable amount to be sold. The condition in central and south Texas are very unfavorable for cotton to make a good crop, and with similar conditions prevailing over other cotton producing sections the price should be good this fall. However it is usually best not to hold cotton from one year to another.—Quanah Observer.

The baseball games scheduled to take place between the Clarendon college team and the teams at Hereford and Roswell were called off by the Clarendon boys after ascertaining that they would be forced to make the trip with a team so badly crippled as to make it impossible that they could put up a first-class article of ball. In the Amarillo game they could only muster three men in their regular position, and lost the game through errors.—Clarendon Banner-Stockman.

The members of the Melon and Truck Growers Association last week finished planting the greater part of their cantaloupe seed. A conservative estimate places the acreage at over 2000. The association is now making arrangements with commission firms to handle their melons. This season will demonstrate the practicability of raising cantaloupes for the northern markets. Our soil produces the very best grade of melons, and with a favorable season we will demonstrate that the Panhandle will be a factor in the melon markets of our large cities.—Dalhart Texan.

The special election for the office of sheriff and tax collector last Saturday, passed off quietly with no friction at the polls and resulted in the election of R. P. Hutton by a vote of 94 to 86. The full voting strength of the county was not polled, Buffalo Springs precinct holding no election, and the other precincts casting a rather light vote. The race was close and shows that the voters had confidence in the ability of both candidates. Mr. Hutton is experienced in the duties of the office and will undoubtedly give the people a good, clean administration of justice.—Dalhart Texan.

The Call of the West.

There seems to be a popular revival of agitation throughout the larger cities of the East in favor of more emigration to the Western States, especially among artisans and the humbler bread winners. Since the day Horace Greeley gave that historic bit of advice to the young man to "go West," there have been periodical flurries of enthusiasm among working people who are tired of the ceaseless and soul-harrowing struggle for their daily bread, and who cast longing eyes to the Westward where broader opportunity are ever present to help solve the problem of existence.

It is one of the inexplicable mysteries why the toilers of our great cities remain under the "bossism" and wear out their unhappy lives in the almost hopeless conditions that surround them. The spell of the great city is strong and holds many who would be infinitely better off in rural communities. They complain that conditions are well nigh intolerable, yet they prefer to bear the ills they have than to "fly to others that they know not of." In the sordid selfish battle for existence in the big city the poor clerk or artisan has little chance of advancement compared with the opportunities afforded by the smaller Western towns. One man who ran an elevator in Chicago a few years ago broke away from this employment and went West, and is now the wealthiest man in a flourishing town, respected by all, happy and independent. Speaking of his own experience he said: "Had I remained in Chicago I would probably be selling papers or running an elevator in a skyscraper to this day. The opportunities for gaining a competence in the cities are extremely limited, and, altogether, city life is not what it is cracked up to be for the workman. Give me the smaller towns of the limitless West, with their sunshine, the genial good-fellowship of their inhabitants, and the absence of the maddening throng that makes life in a city like Chicago resemble a hades on earth. Any man with a thimbleful of brains can succeed in the West, if he knows how to adapt himself to conditions. He must be a worker, he must be energetic, honest, enterprising, fearless. If he has these qualities the West wants him, and he will win out all right."

It is a fact that almost any young man of grit and ordinary intelligence can make a better living in the smaller towns of the West than in the cities where hundreds of thousands of his fellowmen are straining

in ruthless competition. The ordinary laborer, while not being as well paid in the West, enjoys the advantages of cheaper cost of living. His chances of working himself and saving a little capital to start in business on his own account are good. Above all he gets more out of life in the West, and earns a place in his community that the toiler among the masses in the East never secures. It is more true now than ever that the West needs men. This need is for the young man with the right stuff in him. The young man who has the nerve to leave the drudgery of the mill and factory and strike out for himself will succeed in the West. If he works earnestly in his new home, within a few years he will find that he has a place in the community and has a recognized individuality which the factory hand or the small clerk can never know.—Chicago Tribune.

A Gentle Reminder.

Cleveland, Ohio, May 15.—L. P. Ohliger, ex-president of the closed Wooster, Ohio, bank, pleaded guilty before Judge Taylor in the United States District Court to a count of the indictments charging him with having issued a draft when there were no funds in the bank to meet it. Judge Taylor sentenced Ohliger to eight years imprisonment in the Ohio penitentiary. Ohliger is an ex-Congressman, ex-County Treasurer, Postmaster at Wooster under President Cleveland's first Administration and Collector of Internal Revenue at Cleveland during Cleveland's second Administration.

FUTURE OF THE PANHANDLE.

J. S. Kerr Lectured at Court House.

J. S. Kerr of Sherman, sent out by the A. & M. experiment station to give lectures on horticulture and agriculture, spoke to a small but attentive audience at the court house last night. The speech was full of good suggestions as to organization of Farmer's Unions and Truck Growers' Associations. A united force is what the farmers need and must have if they ever accomplish anything. Mr. Kerr told us what was thought of the staked plains only a few years ago and how the people had been fooled into believing that this country was fit only for stock raising, which was one of the biggest mistakes that could be perpetrated on any section of country, for the reason it has been proved beyond a doubt that the plains is the garden spot of the South and that Hereford is the center of the finest land on the plains, and that the upbuilding of the country depends on the small farmer who has from fifty to two-hundred acres of farm land in good state of cultivation. The man who lives at home and boards at the same place; the one who always has something to sell and buys as little as possible and pays cash for it is the man who builds up the country. Fall plowing is what this country needs; do not wait until planting time to break your land. The Campbell system is the thing for this country; do not only harrow your alfalfa after each cutting but use a disc harrow about twice each year. Take this country,
