Total scholastic census of children over 8 and under 17 years of age September 1, 1905, 798,675.

### MORE ABOUT THE CEMETERY.

**G. R. Jowell Gives Good Advice on Important Subject—Should be Heeded.**

I want, through the medium of the BRAND, to call attention of every one in Hereford and vicinity, who may feel an interest in the subject, in a very special manner to the shameful and too long neglected condition of our city cemetery. The world seems intoxicated on the "paramount" issue of getting gain. We are hurrying and scurrying hither and thither, to and fro, buying and selling, while, if we have not forgotten, we are almost entirely neglecting the loving care of the silent city of our dead. I now, more than ever before, feel an especial interest in this matter, as I shall soon remove the remains of some of my loved ones from their temporary resting places to our city cemetery; and in order to keep green the memory of the departed, what is more befitting than to adorn and beautify the grounds about the silent abodes of their earthly remains with tastily arranged and choice selections of flowers and evergreens? To make a satisfactory success of growing flowers and shrubs, we must have water when needed. And in this connection, I suggest that a well be drilled on the highest point of the ground with a windmill and elevated tank, so as to furnish sufficient pressure to cause the water to flow freely to all parts of the grounds, and with the necessary pipes and hose we could, and I believe would, soon have the grounds in a condition that we would not be ashamed of, as we all must be with the present condition of things. Now, don't say "we can't"—I know that is what you brethren are thinking. Of course you are all too busy money-making to give matters of this nature any attention. I will tell you how it can be done. Just enlist the sisters in the enterprise. Did you ever know them to fail? Let the Ladies Aid Society or similar societies in all the churches perfect an organization for this purpose and we shall soon see what loving hearts and willing hands can do in devising ways and providing means. LAND has been changing hands at a lively rate in all parts of West Texas for the last month, but in no other section have there been so many deals as in the vicinity of Hereford. We can only attribute this condition of affairs to two facts, viz: that, on account of our extensive farming interests, we are prepared "to show" the stranger, and showing is convincing; secondly, that Hereford is fortunate in having the most wide-awake and enterprising body of real estate men, to be found anywhere in the West. We have frequently heard some of our more immediate neighbors remark that if they had our land men, they would have no difficulty in inducing immigration into their respective borders. And when we give the matter serious thought we do not believe we appreciate our land men to the extent which is really due them, for it is to them that we owe, in a large measure, the rapid settlement of the country. If there are those who yet have their doubts about the certainty of cotton's opening in the Panhandle, they should take a few hours off and drive over the country adjacent to Hereford. We would suggest that a visit to the fields of F. J. Axe, O. M. Daniel, W. M. Curfman, J. B. Storm and a few others would furnish evidence which would not fail to be convincing. We know there are good farmers right here in Deaf Smith County who have no confidence in this as a cotton country, but the BRAND fully believes that these same farmers will see fit to change their minds within the next two or three years. We will beat any other portion of Texas this year.

FROM the amount of wheat which is being sown this fall, it now begins to look as if the next enterprise to be added to Hereford's list is a first class flouring and corn mill. Deaf Smith and Castro Counties are far in the lead of other Panhandle counties in the production of small grain and this is by nature the only feasible point for the location of such an enterprise. The question is already being discussed and everyone realizes the urgent necessity for making some kind of arrangement for handling the grain crop from year to year.

## MIND WAS CHANGED.

H. W. Campbell Writes Interestingly of Panhandle Possibilities.

"Few people realize the marvelous farming possibilities of the great Panhandle of Texas.

Fifteen months ago I came into this great broad stretch of beautiful prairie by the request of the Santa Fe Railway, to examine the soil and ascertain its adaptability to general farming. I left Chicago in June, 1904, with many misgivings as I had always known the Panhandle as a strictly grazing country, the home of the cowboy and Texas steer.

On reaching here I found practically the same idea prevalent among the inhabitants; a few days driving over the prairie and visiting a few farmers that were trying to raise wheat, oats, corn, and fruit with a general observation of the soil formation, the grasses together with an inquiry at the local government Weather Bureau etc., changed my mind completely. The government records at Amarillo showed an average rainfall for twelve years of 22 inches. This coupled with the deep heavy loam soils and a clay sub-soil was positive evidence that scientific soil culture could soon transform the plains country into a veritable garden, a land of beautiful houses surrounded with shade, fruit and ornamental trees and fields yielding enormous crops of wheat, oats, barley, corn and vegetables.

Later arrangements placed me in charge of a model farm and I was asked to make the selections of land; this I did six miles north of Bovina, Parmer county, on the Santa Fe Ry. Work of breaking 200 acres was commenced in April, 1905; the sod was turned two and one half to three inches deep then rolled flat and the surface gone over with the Acme harrow to loosen enough soil to fill the crevices between the furrows and form a perfect or complete blanket over the entire surface. Ample rains came and soaked down through beneath the overturned sod which held the moisture from evaporating. In July we found our soil moist over four feet down. Through the combined elements of air and water, coupled with the heat of midsummer, the sub-soil beneath the sod had become rotted fully five inches down. We then began back-setting or second plowing, going about three inches deeper. To our surprise when we turned this decomposed soil over we found numerous angle worms indicating the extreme fertility of the soil. Fifty acres of this ground is now ready for winter wheat. We shall sow only 25 pounds of Russian Red wheat per acre, as our seed bed is fine firm and moist. On boring down (Sept. 3d), we find ample moisture to a depth of five feet to make the soil into mud balls at any point; while fields not thus treated we found no perceptible moisture from the top down. The amount of moisture this soil holds per cubic inch, owing to its very fine texture and the manner in which it pulverizes and works down is positive evidence of an enormous crop yield. It is impossible for any one to comprehend, even to a small degree the yielding power of the plains country soils when we put into proper physical conditions.

Of all the different sections of unoccupied prairie country, none offers such marked opportunities for the home seekers as the Panhandle of Texas, and none are so grossly misunderstood from the fact above referred to; that it has always been known as a grazing country only. The variety of cereals, vegetables and fruits that can be grown here are almost unlimited. Cantaloupes, melons and onions grown here cannot be excelled at any point. Other advantages notable are universally pure water unlimited quantities, varying from 40 to 300 feet in depth, much of it from 60 to 120 feet.

The climate, from the fact of the plains altitude being 2000 to 3500 feet, is clear, dry and invigorating with cool nights, giving restful sleep.

The markets are exceptionally favorable from the fact of its close proximity to seaboard. Galveston is reached, by three railroads, the Ft. Worth & Denver, with almost an air line. The Santa Fe's great through Chicago and California line will be via Amarillo, across the center of the Panhandle, as the Texico and Albuquerque cut off is completed which is now well under way. From Texico this line will continue southeast to Weatherford, Texas, forming another direct line to Galveston.

Wheat is now selling at stations near Amarillo for 15c per bushel more than in central Nebraska, owing to our low freight rates to the sea board or export markets.

Amarillo almost in the center of the Panhandle and its metropolis and railroad center of no little magnitude, is destined to become the business center of this great country, and offers marked opportunities for many new enterprises that if established under good management, must certainly expand with the rapidly developing country.

Why any man will go to the cold regions of Canadian northwest instead of to this country can only be answered by the fact that they do not know this country or even a few of its many advantages and resources. "Seeing is believing."

### Cotton Pickers Wanted.

On Monday of this week, O. M. Daniels drove through our streets with the notice, "Cotton Pickers Wanted," attached to his buggy. This being the first instance of the kind in all the history of our city, the BRAND editor naturally grew a little curious and finally gathered up sufficient courage to inquire of Mr. Daniel what he meant. The reply was brief and simple and to the effect that the laborers were wanted to gather his eight-acre cotton crop east of town which is hanging thick and white on well developed stalks. Mr. Daniel informs us that he has over a bale opened and that he already has an average of a quarter of a bale per acre matured, the present prospects being that he will make from a third to a half bale per acre if he have a reasonably late frost.

We were also further informed that the crop above referred to received sufficient moisture to bring it up on the 8th day of June, just 105 days before gathering time.

Mr. Daniel authorized us to say that he will pay 75 cents per hundred for cotton picking.

### New Wireless Station.

From the office of Southwestern Manager, F. G. McPeak, for the DeForest Wireless Telegraph Co., comes the statement that Amarillo is to have a wireless station and which will, in all probability, be in operation within 90 days time. This substantiates the statement made by E. H. Zimmerman who is here as a representative of the company, looking after the preliminary work. The establishment of stations throughout the west has proved a complete success and from an experimental stage wireless telegraphy has become practical and in daily use in many sections of the country. In Texas, stations have been established at Dallas, Ft. Worth and Galveston and messages are received and transmitted daily between these points.—Herald.

### Obituary.

Mrs. Myers was a life long member of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, having joined that church in early life in Kentucky, and for some time acted as home missionary, distributing bibles, tracts and other religious literature among the destitute in her section.

Mrs. Myers will be long remembered by the old Confederate Veterans because of her sympathy with them and the cause for which they suffered. A zealous member of the local Camp of the Daughters of the Confederacy, she was ever jealous of the reputation and honor of the Confederate soldier.

For a half century this good woman resided in Caldwell county, and she will be sadly missed and mourned by a multitude of friends.
