Every detail had been previously arranged for the comfort of the visiting teachers, by the faculties of the public school and the Christian College, and so thoroughly had they planned their work, that every visiting teacher seemed to think his home and hostess the most pleasant.

The discussions and papers on the various subjects in the program were ably handled by the teachers, the result of which can but be felt in the schools throughout the Panhandle.

No ambitious aspiring teacher can afford to absent himself from these teachers meetings. They give inspiration and cultivate a professional spirit among teachers, thus assisting them in approaching the ideal of the perfect teacher.

Teaching, like other professions, has a theoretical as well as a practical side. The teacher who misses the institute deprives himself of that theoretical culture that stimulates him to greater achievements in his chosen profession. It is this ideal phase of his work that furnishes the models for his practical work.

Teachers who see in their work only the elements of labor and pay for the same, soon regard their school work as drudgery and consequently, with dislike. Such a low estimate of the work of the teacher is injurious to the individual teacher and the profession.

In the teachers institute the mind dwells on the ideal, and this ideal stimulates the teacher in his daily work. So it is evident to every intelligent person that the institute is invaluable to every teacher who expects to make it a profession.

For the coming year Dr. Burkhead of Clarendon College as president and Miss Millicent Griffith of Hereford public school as secretary, will preside over the association.

Sixty-six teachers from the various counties of the Panhandle were present at the Hereford meeting, and in their deliberations and discussions, it is but fair to say they reached the "high water mark," for which such meetings are held. The next meeting of the Ass'n will be held in Amarillo some time during the early spring.

THE CARE OF UNSHOD HOOFS.

The United States Department of Agriculture has done a good work in issuing Farmers' Bulletin No. 179, which treats of horseshoeing, a question that is far too little understood, not only by the farmer, but also by many of those who undertake the work of shoeing horses. In fact, there are some shoers who have done this work all their lives, and yet there are many things in regard to it which they have never sufficiently mastered.

In speaking of the care of unshod hoofs, the bulletin says: "The colt should have abundant exercise on dry ground. The hoofs will then wear gradually and it will only be necessary from time to time to regulate an uneven wear with the rasp and to round off the sharp edges about the toe to prevent the breaking away of the wall.

"Colts in the stable cannot wear down their hoofs, so that every four to six weeks they should be rasped down and the lower edge of the wall well rounded to prevent chipping. The soles and clefts of the frogs should be picked out every few days and the entire hoof washed clean. Plenty of clean straw should be provided. Hoofs that are becoming awry should have the wall strengthened in such a manner as to straighten the foot axis. This will ultimately produce a good hoof and will improve the position of the limb."

Edson Gaylord of Nora Springs, Iowa, one of the veterans of northern horticulture, seems to have become quite enthusiastic over the idea of using crab roots for root grafting the apple. We quote the following: "Nearly thirty years ago I had a number of Wealthy trees growing in my orchard. I set five more Wealthy trees that had been grafted on top of as many three-year-old Transcendental crabs. At the same time I had sent me two Wealthy trees that had been started on crab roots. These all grew finely till the winter of 1884-5. The spring of '85 found all other Wealthys on my place killed except these two Wealthys sent me that were grown on crab roots. These two trees are the largest and finest Wealthy trees I know of in northern Iowa. These trees have been bearing unusually heavy crops for many years."

NATURE'S KINDLY WAYS.

Nature always deals kindly with the waste places. Here is a gravel pit scooped out to the depth of twenty feet by a steam shovel to the extent of two or three acres. Unpromising spot this for nature to work on, but the snowdrifts piled in in the water, carrying the rich soil of adjacent farms, and the winds whirled in a harvest of leaves, and the spot, becoming a reservoir for the surplus rainfall, was enriched by the silt deposits, and so the cottonwood seeds blown by the June winds fell here and there in the pit, and in ten years from the time the shovel left, a thick grove of thrifty trees filled up the barren pit, and Nature's benevolence shrouded man's desecration and spoliation as though it had not been.
