The Wool Clip For The Hereford Country Will Run Near 700,000 Pounds

PUMPING PLANTS IN MIMBRES VALLEY

Vicinity in Southwest New Mexico Installing Many Plants. Hereford Has As Good Field for Irrigation.

The following article appearing in the Deming Headlight, a paper published in Luna county, New Mexico, will be of interest to Hereford farmers. The Mimbres Valley is said to be fed by an underground stream and from the log of one of the wells it appears that Hereford has as good if not a better water supply than that valley. The difference in favor of the Mimbres Valley is that the people in that district are putting in plants right along. There are a large number already in that famous valley and they have met with rare success in raising all kinds of crops under irrigation. The valley has much less rainfall than Deaf Smith county and their soil and water does not compare with ours.

The information gives the water-bearing material at about 50 feet in a total depth of 140 feet for a well that has been sunk by a company which will irrigate 1,000 acres.

The article reads:

The Little Vineyards Company, which is reclaiming a large tract of land (about a thousand acres) completed its first well this week. It is equipped with an American Well Works Turbine Pump, 1,500 gallon capacity and a 35 h. p. General Electric motor which is directly connected to the shaft of the pump.

The well is 26 inches diameter to a depth of 64 feet, is reduced to 22 inches at this depth and continues to a depth of 106 feet; is here reduced to sixteen inches and continues this size for 34 feet. A few feet of sump was bored below this point to catch whatever sand the pump fails to deliver to the surface.

The log of the well is, as follows: soil 6 feet, dry gravel 22 feet, clay 17 feet, clay (water-bearing) 2 feet, river muck 2 feet, four feet sand and gravel (water-bearing), 11½ feet of clear gravel (water-bearing), 8½ feet clay, 4 feet of packed sand (water-bearing), six feet of gravel (water-bearing), one foot of clay 14 feet (water-bearing) gravel, 23 feet clay, eight feet of water-bearing gravel, the remainder clay.

There is thus 49½ feet of water-bearing material in this well, and the most of it is excellent water-bearing gravel. In order to catch every available foot of gravel, K. Z. & M. strainer is inserted from the first water to the bottom of the well proper. This strainer has 40 per cent strainer capacity, so it goes without saying that every drop of water which has any remote desire to be used in irrigation, can gain access to the pump and have its desire fulfilled. This strainer is reinforced every thirty-six inches with three-eighths steel bands, which prevents any possibility of a collapse.

So much material was removed in drilling the well from the second and third strata that it was deemed advisable to fill in the cavities thus made with gravel to prevent any possible cave-in which might come from the roofs of the cavities. To this end the upper cavity was filled with gravel, and a feel hole will be

put down to the cavity in the second stratum through which gravel can be inserted from time to time as the necessity arises.

In addition to this well, the company has another well under way on the same tract of land. It is at the present writing seventy-five feet deep, and practically the same strata are being encountered. The first well was put in by Smith & Lane, under the direct supervision of W. B. King, and the second well is being put down by the same firm with R. A. Lane in charge.

The company now has eighty acres of land in crop, most of which is in beans, and there will be 100 acres of this land put into fall wheat. Four and one-half miles of ditch are completed. The Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company has loaned a portion of the money for this development, taking the land as security.

This plant will be in operation this week, and, while of course it is impossible to say how much it will deliver, there is practically no doubt that its capacity will be as great as any of the large wells of the valley.

DISTRICT COURT FOR OLDHAM ON

Contest Case of Linger Against Balfour One of Keen Interest.

Tascosa, Tex., Aug. 7.—The District Court of Oldham county convened here this morning with Judge D. B. Hill of Dalhart on the bench, with District Attorney J. W. Sellars of Farwell and Shorthand Reporter Floyd A. Cooper of Dalhart also present.

Judge Hill first empanelled the grand jury, appointing L. M. Marshall of Wildorado as foreman, and charged them as to their duties, after which the docket was called.

The contest case of A. F. Linger vs. Wm. Balfour will be given precedence by the court over all other cases as provided by statute. This is a contest of the November, 1910, election, at which William Balfour was re-elected county and district clerk, according to the face of the returns by a majority of two votes and it promises to be a very closely contested and hard fought case.

The contestant, Mr. Linger, is represented by Messrs. Madden, True-love & Kimbrough of Amarillo, while the contestee is represented by Messrs. Gustavus, Bowman & Jackson, C. B. Reeder and Cooper, Merrill & Lumpkin, all of Amarillo. Both parties have announced ready for trial and the court discharged the petit jury for the term and it seems highly probable that the contest case will take the full two weeks.

POTATOES MAKE BIG RETURNS

Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars From Ten Acres—Not An Impossible Crop.

L. Weaver and others have shown and are showing what might be done with a few acres of sweet potatoes. Mr. Weaver has in 7 acres this year and expects to secure 12,000 bushels in total. His rows are 3½ feet apart and the plants were set 2 feet in the drill. This is 6480 plants to the acre. Counting that he has 6,000 good plants, at 2 pounds to the hill, this would give him 12,000 pounds or 250 bushels to the acre, 7 acres 1,750 bushels. At \$1.50 per bushel, the total money yield should be \$2625.

The trouble with the Weaver patch is that he has wasted a lot of ground. The rows should have been 3 feet apart and the plants set 18 inches in the drill. This would have given 9680 plants to the acre. Counting that a stand of 9,000 plants would be saved on a ten acre patch, then would be 90,000 hills. A low estimate for potatoes, when properly handled, would be 5 pounds to the hill. (Here again Mr. Weaver under-estimates.) A little figuring will bring the yield of sweet potatoes up to the enormous amount of 9,000 bushels on a tract of 10 acres. At a fair living price of \$1.50 per bushel, or 3 cents per pound, this would give the gross income from a small area of 10 acres at Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars. Who can beat this for a potato story?

700,000 Pounds Wool.

Hereford and vicinity keeps growing in her wool account. It was first thought that a half million pounds would cover the clip, but now it is estimated that the total amount will push near 700,000 pounds. A little over 283,000 was loaded in 12 cars this week and was about to be shipped to Boston when some buyers came along and offered a satisfactory price and the lot was sold. A train load of wool out of Hereford is some.

FIVE BRIDGES ON ROCK ISLAND OUT

Traffic in Oklahoma and Arkansas Crippled by Heavy Rains.

Ft. Worth, Tex., Aug. 7.—Five Rock Island bridges in Oklahoma and Arkansas are gone as result of the heavy rains during the past few days, and traffic on the main line and the three branches is hampered. It was stated at the general offices in Fort Worth today that regular traffic will be resumed by Tuesday morning at 6 o'clock. In the meantime the traffic is going on by means of detourages.

City Buys New Pumping Outfit.

For some weeks the city council has been worrying over the pumping problem. The large amount of water being consumed by the patrons of the system has run the monthly expense of pumping up to a big figure. This is due to the double pumping that has resulted from the inefficient outfit first installed. As it is, the water must first be pumped into the ground reservoir then re-pumped into the elevated steel tank. The city has bought a new pumping outfit at a cost of about \$1,500. It consists of a 15 H. P. engine and pumping connections. The water will be taken directly from the well into the tower.

The measure provides for automatic admission of Arizona, after its citizens vote on the recall of judges' provision of its constitution, and of New Mexico after its people vote on the proposition to make its constitution easier of amendment.

CITY ENTERTAINS COTTOLENE MAN

Traveling Man For the N. K. Fairbank Company Shows Honor Won at Badger Fight.

Hereford sustained her national reputation for open hospitality yesterday the same being Thursday, August 10, 1911, when the male citizens celebrated the advent of a stranger in their midst and made good the scriptural injunction, "When a stranger comes to thy door, take him in."

The entertainment was none of your "pink tea" affairs nor a "42" party nor a roof-garden dollar dinner but a real old-time Texas Badger fight, pulled off in that grand style known only to the first citizens of the Panhandle of Texas.

This was the second fete of this kind during the month and as the first was rather a tame affair, special efforts were made to avoid the least hitch in the program.

The honor guest of the occasion was Mr. J. P. Berry, the Panhandle representative of the N. K. Fairbank Co. who was in the city advertising and especially pushing their famous product, "Cottolene," Nature's gift from the Sunny South. Mr. Berry is a congenial, jovial young man, scrupulously perfect in his dress and manners, and on this occasion was on his usual dignified demeanor. So the business men, the merchants who sell Cottolene,

and were anxiously to see what his stay in the city was number will as to business nor lacking in pleasure.

The fight was heralded by a trumpeter who rode down Main street on a Texas Mustang pony. The citizens understood the call and in a few minutes about 200 of the leading male inhabitants assembled at Purcell's livery stable.

Chas. Purcell had captured, a few days ago in the breaks of the Cap Rock, the largest animal seen in this part of the state in many moons. He had a vicious looking head as big as a cabbage and a little tucked-under tail like the handle of a jug, which meant, to the old hunter, a bad badger and a good fighter. The dog was an old scarred veteran of many hard fought battles, whose heavy set jaws and blood-shot eyes, told only too well the story of his nature and bull-dog life. Mr. Purcell had him in good trim for this fight. The badger was caged under a box and also tied with a strong rope, while the dog was charging viciously and impatiently against his chain. The managers were using every endeavor to keep peace among the spectators who were betting heavily, some for the badger, others on the dog. The bets were two to one in favor of the badger but the offers found a quick call on the other side at that figure. Over \$2000 was placed on the side, J. F. Barker holding stakes. In the squabble both sides wanted to name a man to pull the badger out. Finally a committee composed of City Marshal C. L. Sullivan and Geo.

Muse was appointed to choose a disinterested party, all the local sports having either taken sides or bet on the fight. The honor of "pulling the badger" was tendered to Mr. Berry, the stranger at the gates, who gracefully accepted the position and promised to give both sides a square deal.

The game was on. The bull-dog tugged hard at his chain, the badger gave out growls of vengeance that sent cold chills down the backs of the citizens who had bet their good money on the dog. Everything was made ready with Mr. Berry holding tight the rope, feet strongly braced, waiting for the word. The clinking of money ceased, the jabbering conversation faded away, a hushed death-like suspense fell over the crowd, when the manager shouted: "Ready? Pull!" and a mighty shout went up from the husky throats of the citizens. The fight was a great success, the badger winning in the first round.

After the flush of victory, the guest of honor, raised his hand as if to speak. Silence prevailed and Mr. Berry of Cottolene fame delivered a short address at the close of which he thanked the male inhabitants for the fine entertainment which he had come 1600 miles to witness. The fight was the topic of conversation at the grocery stores for all the afternoon. "It was great," Mr. Berry said, "but hereafter I will let the Gold Dust Twins do the work."

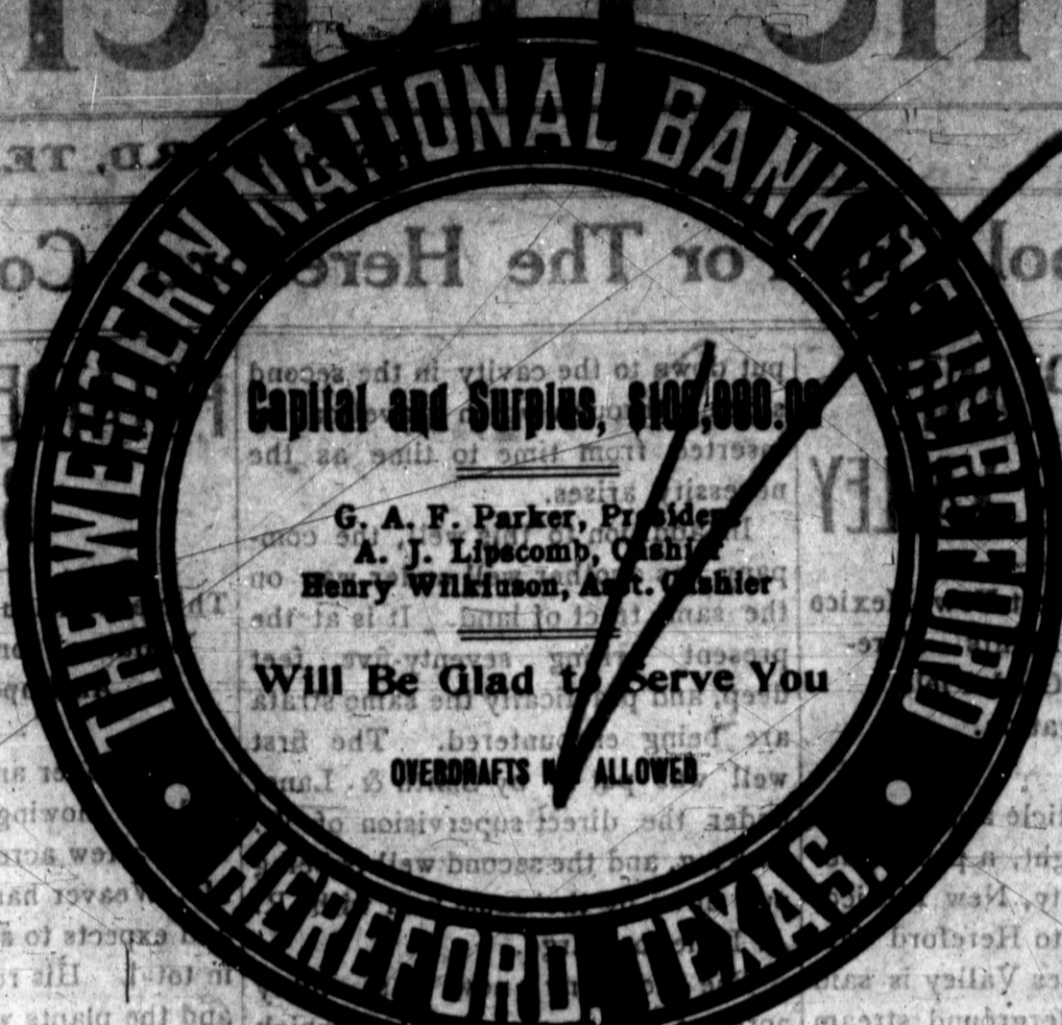
A citizen of Cochocton, Ohio, made a visit to Texas recently and his town paper got this out of him when he returned:

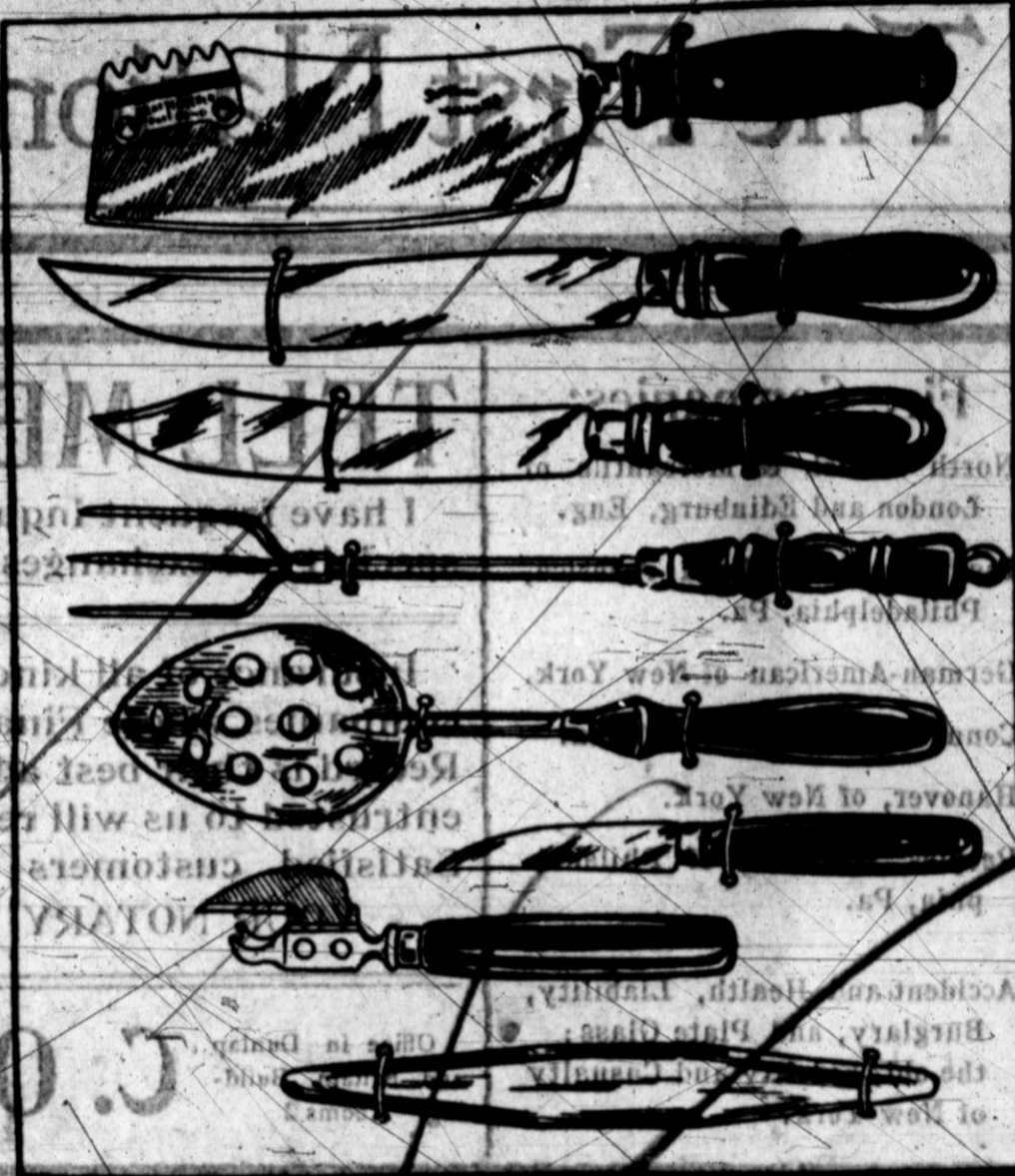

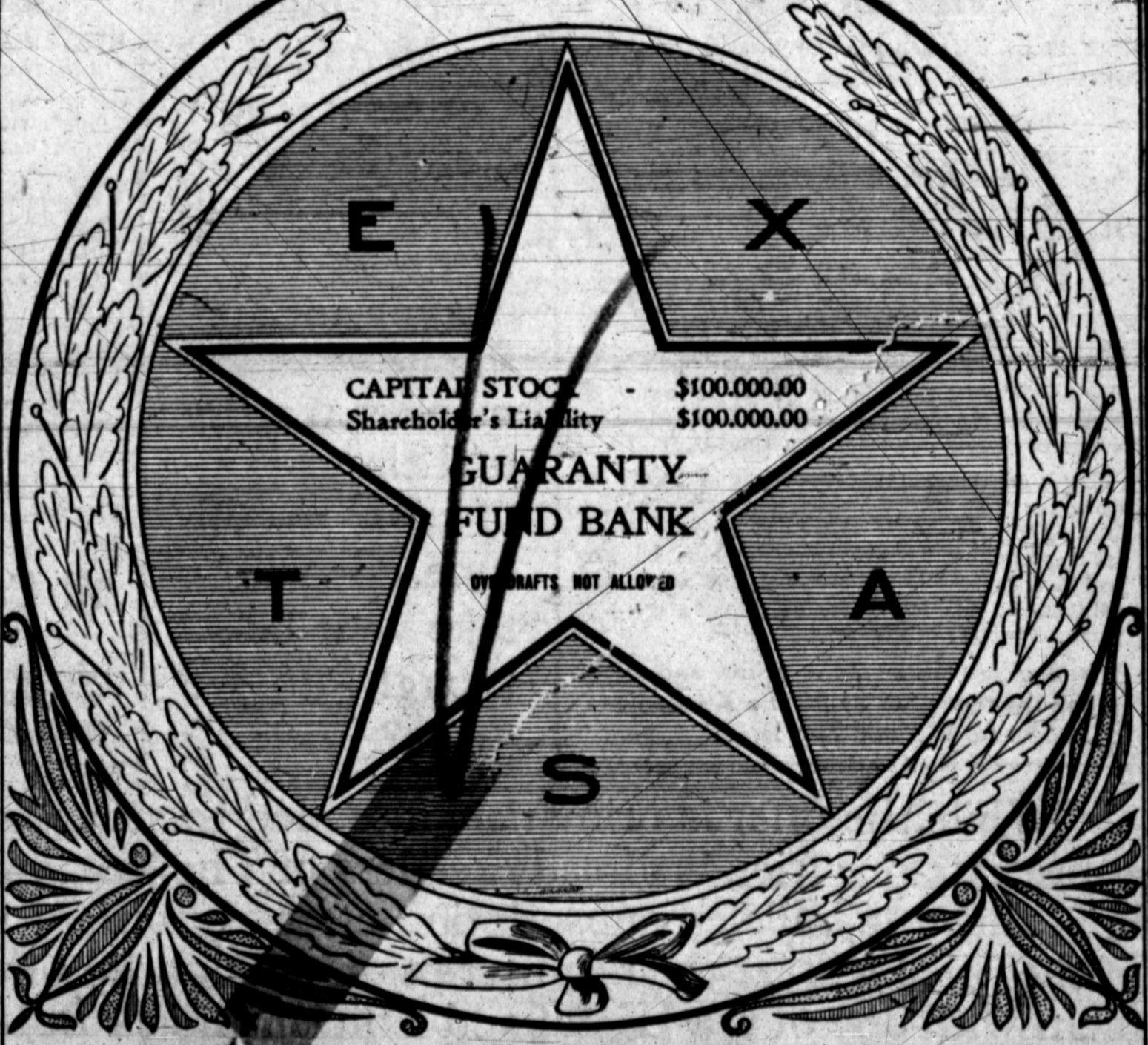

Texas Industrial Notes.

The Sinton Townsite Company has brought in an artesian well on the public square of that place at a depth of 930 feet. The well flows seventy gallons to the minute.

The bond issue for \$600,000 for building good roads in Dallas county carried by a large majority.

The Lometa State Bank has filed an amendment to its charter increasing its capital stock from \$20,000 to \$40,000.

One hundred teams are at work graveling the roads in the Ennis district. A government engineer is superintending the work.

The Purifield Oil Company of Texas with headquarters at El Paso has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$15,000. The incorporators are F. J. Hall, F. N. Hall and T. Bailey.

The Texas Candy Company of Marshall has put in an ice cream plant at that place which is now successfully operating.

The Thompson Tucker Lumber Company of Houston has filed an amendment to its charter increasing the capital stock from \$800,00 to \$1,300,000.

The citizens of Angleton have contracted with the Hurray Gin Company for building a gin at that place in time for the fall cotton crop.

The city of Cameron is having all roads leading out of the city macadamized for a distance of five miles.

Several car loads of watermelons were shipped north from Mineola this week and the largest crop for many years is reported for this section.

The articles of incorporation of the Master Builders Association of Texas were filed with the Secretary of State this week. The headquarters of the Association will be at San Antonio.

Williams Found Guilty.

The jury in the case of the state of Texas versus John W. Williams, returned a verdict of guilty and assessed the punishment at nine years in the penitentiary, for the alleged killing of John R. Armstrong at Bovina early in November, 1908. The jury received the charge of the court late Monday and was unable to arrive at a verdict until Thursday forenoon. This case was first tried at Canyon at which time there was a hung jury. Coming then to Amarillo a conviction resulted, the jury assessing the punishment at six years. The defense took the matter

to the court of criminal appeals which tribunal reversed and remanded the trial court, leading to the finding as recorded yesterday.

Legislative News Letter.

It has been a strenuous week in Austin. Many a little stream with a swollen torrent has emptied its burden into the whirlpool of dissatisfaction and a tidal wave of master thinkers has flooded the Legislature with advice, threats and offers to go on the pay roll.

Those who hunger and thirst for power have been beating the political tom tom and sending shrieking vibrations through the Legislative halls, but it is a good experience for our solons, as it will fit their nerves for the strife below. In the Legislature, it is just one thing after another. Our Legislators are a jolly lot of good fellows, and with the exception of the call "to arms" that occasionally echos through the Legislative halls, they are as happy as a lot of young colts in a pasture, but if they tried to please everybody, they would please nobody and lose their jobs in the bargain.

There are as many kinds of Democrats in the Legislature as there are breakfast foods on the market and one hardly dares to get outside the Capitol building without a picture of Thos. Jefferson in hand, lest he become lost in the jungles.

The political map makers have been working overtime. Many members whose districts have never been dimmed by the smoke of a factory and who have constituents that have never heard the shrill whistle of a locomotive are trying to embarrass fame by writing their names on a re-districting bill that will give either one or the other of the numerous contending factories in Texas an advantage. Some men can't be great without being dangerous.

The introduction of an amendment to the Appropriation bill increasing the contingent expenses thirty thousand dollars was interpreted by the members to cover the expenses of a proposed investigation of the last election and precipitated a bitter fight in the Legislature and finally passed both Houses on a majority vote, but in case it should not meet with the approval of the Governor, the measure will doubtless be lost, as the necessary two-thirds vote to offset a veto was not shown on the ballot. We investigate everything in Texas except our undeveloped resources.

The Governor submitted a message to the Legislature showing a deficit of a million dollars inherited from the Campbell Administration. A tax levy of one cent on the one hundred dollars will net the state, on the present basis of assessment, approximately \$200,000 and it will, therefore, require a tax levy of five cents on the one hundred dollars to take care of the deficit. The Waters-Pierce wind-fall will be absent this year and to absorb the deficit and care for the necessary expenses of government, will require an estimated tax levy of sixteen cents for purposes of general revenue. Our revenue system is in rather a chaotic state and the Legislature may conclude to investigate it.

The Governor has asked the Legislature to repeal the law creating an Automatic Tax Board which transfers from the Legislature to the said Board the power of fixing the tax rate. The Governor intimates that this Board has been playing "ping pong" with our tax rates.

Summing up the work of the Legislature to date, the Appropriation bills have been introduced in both Houses and are making reasonable headway; numerous re-districting bills have been introduced and are for

Castro County Clippings.

From The Dimmitt Plainsman of Friday, August 4.

S. H. Roush and A. D. Frederick of Spring Lake were in Dimmitt early in the week. They report an enormous crop of wild plums in the sand hills this year. Recently these gentlemen made a trip to the sand hills and returned with enough plums to make 150 quarts each of preserved plums. They estimated that Spring Lake people have gathered 200 bushels of plums for perserving purposes this season. The wild plum districts of the sand hills is from 20 to 30 miles long and 10 to 12 miles deep. The district runs east and west and lies south of Castro county line. The plum bushes are 18 inches or less to 24 inches high and they are heavily fruited with several varieties of plums. There are yellow plums, red plums, blue plums, free stone plums, clingstone plums—all kinds of plums—and they are sweet and fine. The people of three or four counties visit this district constantly and gather immense quantities, yet there are hundreds of bushels going to waste.

B. G. Ramey visited the J. O. Lindsey orchard fifteen miles northwest of Dimmitt last Saturday. He brought back some samples of fruit that show the extent of the crop this year. Mr. Lindsey has about 40 acres in orchard. Apples, plums, cherries, grapes, all bore big crops this season. There are two varieties of grapes—Concord and Lindsey. Mr. Ramey showed The Plainsman a six-inch sprig on which were twenty-five plums. The crop of plums is very great.
