Three Monster Fuel Oil Engines With Modern Equipment For McDonald Company.

The largest shipment of irrigation machinery ever consigned to Panhandle farmers arrived in Hereford Monday of this week. Some idea of the size of the outfits may be gained from the fact that it required the full capacity of one car to contain the three engines and their accessories, and their weight was billed at 42,000 pounds. The equipment consists of three monster fuel oil engines, manufactured especially for the Mc-Donald Company and to be used on Hereford farms. One engine is rated at 40 H-P, one at 50 and one at 70, and they look every bit of it. The smallest will weigh 10,000 pounds. These engines were manufactured at Grove City, Penn., and each is completely enclosed with a dust proof casing. The starting device consists of a small gasoline engine which operates an air-compression, delivering the air to a steel receiver. The air is then used to start the big engine and keep it going until the firing device begins its work. On these engines there is no sparker, nor carborater, nor electric fixtures used. A simple feed pump, automatically controlled, is all. When installed these engines will constitute the most modern irrigation plants in the Southwest. Three more of these engines are due to arrive and will be here this month.

At noon March 1st, 1912, Capt. John H. Boyd died at Clovis, New Mexico. On Saturday, March 2nd, his remains were escorted to the station at Cloyis by the Masonic Fraternity and shipped to Hereford, where an impressive service was held by Rev. R. H. Purcer and Rev. ] M. Sherman at the Baptist church, after which the remains were laid to rest in the Hereford cemetery.

Capt. Boyd was born at Laurens, S. C., March 30, 1846. As a mere boy, he enlisted in the Confederate army and served with credit throughout the war. Soon after the war he moved, with his young wife, to Washington county, Texas, but in 1869 located in Johnson county where he was a prominent figure in every movement for the betterment of the country for nearly forty years, In 1882 he was elected sheriff of Johnson county, a position in which he won a statewide reputation for efficiency, uprightness and sound judgment. After holding this office for eight years, he refused to make another race and retired, as he thought, to private life.

At this juncture, however, he was made mayor of Cleburne and, at the close of this term of office, was elected a member of the twenty-fifth legislature from Johnson county.

During this session a warm friendship sprang up between Capt. Boyd and Hon. T. M. Campbell, and when the latter was elected governor, Capt. Boyd was appointed superintendent of the Rusk penitentiary. After holding this position for one year, during which he worked a revolution in the handling of the men at that institution, he, at the earnest solicitation of Gov. Campbell, left Mrs. George A. Stambaugh, died at Rusk and took charge of the State

They uncoupled the engine, mail and baggage cars from the passenger coaches and after hauling them down the track a considerable distance and proceeded to loot them. When they attempted to enter the express car, the express messenger hit the foremost of the two robbers with a hammer, killing him instantly. Mrs Harris was one of the earliest residents of Hereford and a charter member of the Christian church here and always ready to aid in any of its work. In those days when there were but few members and the church was cared for by them, no one did so much to keep it neat and attractive as she. Modest and unobtrusive in her life and acts, only to those who knew her well was revealed her rare character. During the long months of suffering she bore the terrible pain with fortitude and tried to spare those who cared for her every unnecessary effort. One who knew her longest said of her when she was near the end : "She never wronged any one and never thought of self"-a truly great sum mary of a life. At two o'clock Saturday afternoon the funeral service was held at the Christian church, and a beautiful and comforting sermon was preached by her pastor, Rev. Shore. Later, all that was mortal was laid to rest in Hereford cemetery beneath a mound of beautiful flowers, the living tribute of many



From a general stock farms have been opened up by Northern and Texas farmers, meeting with indifferent success, a few succeeding and many failing.

Only about six years ago was there any considerable farming in this section, the Hereford country. The three past years failed to bring the usual average of rainfall and in consequence, many of the farmers have suffered loss. But two years ago, a few men, who believed in the ultimate success of this country and believing that there lay hidden under the surface a reservoir of water which could be utilized, began to set on foot a move to test the supply. All the arrangements were soon made, and a test well was sunk. Then another and another, until now some 20 wells have demonstrated the feasability of irrigation by pumping. in many other sections of Texas,

Oklahoma, Kansas, and other states, where, at times, the rainfall fails, they have no such dependable source of water, which may be used either as the principal or supplemental supply with which to grow crops. It is different on the Plains, where the water is of easy and cheap access, and where the rainfall is not altogether lacking. When it rains the pumping plant stands still and uses no fuel. At the present time there is an abundance of moisture in the ground and no irrigation is needed, but wells are being contracted for every week, for when the long June days come and the rain clouds lift their wings in flight, with a good well the farmer can defy the rain gods, unstop the bottles and pour out an abundance of water on his thirst-
