

A Rise in Cattle—When?

It seems to be the general opinion that cattle are going to be higher. Locally, in the Panhandle, steers are going to be short; not only aged steers, but all ages are short. There are less yearlings being wintered than for many years. But this is a big country and there are lots of cattle in other sections.

One reason of the local shortage is the demand and the sale of the best quality of steer calves for the past five years. Steer calves have been sought after at prices that come within a dollar or two of yearling steers, hence the producer has sold and the steer calf is the only product which the producer has been able to sell at home, saving the commission and yardage and expenses of shipping. This demand may continue; it depends on whether or not the feeder makes money. Panhandle steers are always in demand, the big Northern commission men to the contrary notwithstanding. While of late years our steers have not the weight formerly, they are in demand, for the weight made by the finished steer of about 1350 pounds is now much more desirable than the 1500 to 1800 pound beef steer which was formerly in demand, and there is never a surplus of any of the best brands of Panhandle steers of any age. Many have been contracted for spring delivery. While of course a rise in prices would greatly benefit our part of the Panhandle, prices for our cattle product cut no figure with the beef trust, the commission man, the commission man's favorite, the stock yards companies, railroad rates, or the rate of interest. The commission man and the stock yards company care nothing about prices to the producer. Both get as much out of a car load of cattle selling for \$1.50 per cwt. as they do out of a car selling for \$6 per cwt. It is a well-known fact that the commission

men have been known to bear down prices on feeders. They buy and sell; commission both ways. Outside of a few who are indirectly interested in the ranch business the commission man is a "bear" and will be until the commission charges are regulated by the value of the product sold.

The beef trust and their various and sundry sycophants will make their profit off the consumer just the same whether the producer gets good value for his product or is ruined by low prices. This has been proven by the present sheep situation. The packer and his sycophants "get there just the same." Owing to the prolonged and disastrous drouth in Australia and the consequences—rise in the price of wool and mutton—the sheep market got away from the trusts, and a similar condition, or a great demand and a shortage may make a similar condition in the cattle trade. But when?

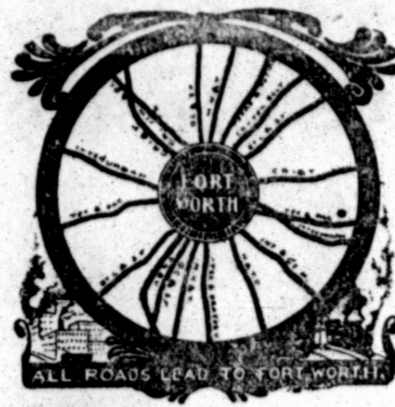
