of the California law was the authority to issue an unlimited amount of law has eliminated that feature and restricts the issuance of bonds or the incurring of any other indebtedness on the district in excess of 25 per cent of the assessed real estate value in the district.

Under the Texas law the district may be divided into three to five divisions, for each of which one director shall be elected by the property taxpayers of the district. The law provides also that an assessor, collector and treasurer shall be elected by the district.

The bonds of \$3,000,000 upon this district are to run for 30 years, with an option at the expiration of 21 years, and are to be paid off in nine equal installments. Annual tax readers to cut out and save the table levies will be made to meet the interest and principal.

### Irrigation Under Pumping Systems

By Ralph C. Ely, Esq.,

The water available for irrigation purposes in New Mexico, will be largely developed along three distinct lines:

from running streams.

Third. The pumping of sub-surface waters.

The first and second appear upon their facts to be closely related, while both the first and second are more closely related to the third than we at first realize.

In order to furnish information derived from personal experiences the writer must of necessity refer to conditions existing in Luna county; and it is undoubtedly true that similar conditions existing in almost every county of the Territory. North of the village of Deming and describing almost a semi-circle there is a system of mountains down the gorges of which surface streams are flowing into several valleys, and in these valleys the waters are utilized for irrigation. > Assuming for the sake of argument that the total lift from the permanent water level to the point of discharge is 40 feet and that a well has been developed capable of reliably supplying 400 gallons of water per minute, there would be 10 H. P. actually consumed in operating the pump at a fuel cost of about five and one-fourth cents per hour. Such an installation would produce twentyfour thousand gallons of water per hour, making the fuel cost a little less than one-fourth of a cent per thousand gallons. Such an outfit will give 4 feet irrigation to about two and one-half acres in every twelve hours run. The engine above mentioned would not require constant personal attendance, and, assuming for the sake of illustration that it operates twenty hours a day for 200 days, it would supply two acre feet

The crude oil engine referred to is much heavier than a gasoline and Very naturally the first question fully as easy to operate. Some crude oils are pretty dirty while others can be used with an engine for several days without bad accumulations. A man of ordinary intelligence and prudence can operate the engine very nicely, but a semi-mechanic armed with a monkey wrench is a dangerous animal. The centrifugal pump is also simple, but it is a high speed machine and somewhat more likely to develop trouble than the engine. I do not think it is subject to as many difficulties as a direct acting pump with cup leathers especially if there is any fine sand in

> The cost of the well depends so largely upon local conditions that it is needless to attempt even to approximate it in this article. Assuming that a plant as is above mentioned is operated for 10 hours a day and it serves 70 acres of land, the cost of the installation complete, including a little building for housing the same, should not exceed \$30.00 per acre.

Before discussing the relative merits of pumping compared with the gravity or ditch system of irrigation let me repeat that the fuel cost of pumping two acre feet over 70 acres of land, making no allowance for the losses by evaporation or percolation ditches, would be \$105.00. 


