Radford's subject was "The Relation of the Business Man and the He emphasized that men with money can do more to abet the prosperity of the business man and the farmer alike by spending less toward educating the farmer in the sciences of tillage and cultivation, and more toward aiding the farmer in getting better returns on his products.

When cotton brings a good price, he said, it spells prosperity both for business man and the farmer; therefore the business man, in working solved. for higher prices, would work for his own prosperity.

"Collectively" said Radford, the farmers do not need the advice of business men on how to produce a crop. As a class they understand scientific methods. The real problem of the farmer is how to sell his product. If the business men and merchants want to do something to solve that problem, let them lend their cooperation, finances and influence to finding or creating a satisfactory market for cotton. If there is to be any effective co-operating between business men and farmers this is the channel through which will flow the results that will rebound to the interests of both.

"Cotton is a gold product. It means more to the South than gold does to Alaska. Yet all our ability to pay is based on gold, though the price cotton brings determines about ninety per cent of our ability to meet our credits.

'Cotton should be our basis of credit; the south's money should be held in the south and used to finance the cotton crop. The price of cotton should be fixed by the best intelligence among farmers and business men. It should not be fixed by gamblers with the co-operation of our business men. Business men should lend their money and their influence to the farmer instead of cashing exchange from other sources.

Deep Well at Spur.

Spur, Tex., Sept. 19.-An artesian well is being drilled at Spur and the driller last week passed the 2,300foot mark. As Spur has an altitude of 2,300 feet, the bottom of the well is just reaching the sea level. After having passed through about 1,500 feet of solid rock, almost without a seam, a change has taken place in the last hundred feet to sandstone, more or less porous, and there is already an inflow from this stratum which forces itself to the surface. Some of the strongest artesian flows, inexhaustible under pumping, do not reach the ground level, and it is evident that there must be a presure of 800 pounds to the square inch in the Spur well to send the water to the top. There has been no other deep boring in this vicinity or for some seventy-five miles in any direction, periment is being watched with widespread interest.

Should Automobiles Give All the accident at all events. Road?

The following article has appeared in a number of newspapers in Texas. Evidently the writer was not acquainted with the common law:

"Some complaint, has come regarding the giving of half the road in case of ar automobile coming up behind a team. The parties claim that when they come up behind a fellow with a team he stubbornly refuses to give any of the road, no matter if there is plenty of room to turn out. Now the law recognizes the rights of both the man with the team and the man with the auto and these rights should be respected. The law says that when a man is overtaken by a faster vehicle, the man driving the slower vehicle shall turn out and give half of the beaten path."-Ex.

A careful reading and study of the following extracts from the common law will put the automobile drivers right:

"A public highway is open for use by the entire public, or any part thereof, simply for passage, in any reasonable manner.

"Automobiles are a reasonable means of using the public highway. Their owners are, however, subject to reasonable and proper regulations concerning registration and license, and travelers by automobile have equal rights and liabilities with other forms of travel.

"The law of the road requires conveyances on meeting to keep the right of the traveled part of the road, and each should try to avoid a serious drought in 1912.

"A horseman or light vehicle is ordinarily bound to avoid a heavier vehicle, and should wait where dangerous. On the other hand, it is the duty of heavy vehicles to keep well to one side to allow ligher vehicles to pass.

"Unless there is a statute or municipal regulation to the contrary, one overtaking and passing another may pass on either side, using proper caution, and keeping a safe distance behind when not passing. The leading team may travel anywhere it pleases, using, however, due care.


"It is not the duty of the driver of a wagon to look out for persons who may approach the wagon from the rear or the sides.

It is clear that if an auto wishes to pass a wagon or other vehicle, that it is not the duty of the wagon to give any of the beaten road, unless there is not sufficient room for the auto to pass.
