Postmaster C. J. Lewis has received notice that the government has accepted the proposal of Jackson Collier for lease of his building on Kearney street for postoffice purposes. As yet there is nothing definite as to when the removal will be made, if ever, as there are a number of minor points involved which it will take time to straighten out.

Considerable building in a small way is now going on in the city. Capt. P. R. Stephens is adding several rooms to the residence recently purchased from J. N. Hill. Marian Williams is adding a room to his house. Several new barns are going up, among the builders being Bob Muir, Chas. Burton and J. H. Kelley.

### For Fire Protection.

The matter of arranging for fire protection is still in the balance and another meeting of the business men is to be held this afternoon at the opera house at 4 o'clock. The status of the situation is about as follows:

The water works company offers to put in eight inch mains throughout the business district, with suitable fire hydrants, and guarantees to furnish plenty of water for fire protection with ample pressure, for \$600 a year. The city council agrees to accept this offer and maintain the proposition if the citizens will put up the money to buy suitable fire fighting apparatus which will cost less than \$1000, consisting of one or two hand hose reels, hook and ladder truck, sheds for same, and other incidentals necessary to the equipment of a volunteer fire department. Such equipment will be the cause of a reduction in fire insurance rates of \$2.50 on the \$1000, and the saving to the business district alone would thus amount to about \$300 per year. If the business men will figure the thing out from a business standpoint it will be an easy matter to raise the money necessary and the business part of town will have adequate fire protection by the first of January. A committee is at work interviewing the business men and property owners and will report at today's meeting. Let everybody attend.

**FROM DENVER TO TEXAS.**

**Beautiful Scenery Along the Colo-  
rado & Southern Enroute to the  
Progressive Little City of  
Clarendon.**

(Chas. K. Rhoderick, editor of  
the Middletown, (Md.) Register,  
who lately visited relatives in Clarendon,  
writes the following interesting  
letter from this point to his  
paper:)

CLARENDON, TEX., SEPT. 25.

On Thursday, Sept. 21, we  
boarded the Denver & Ft. Worth  
fast express on the Colorado &  
Southern, for a few days' visit to  
Mr. Bernard J. Rhoderick, brother  
of the writer, and other relatives,  
at Clarendon, Donley county, Tex.,  
525 miles from Denver. This was  
the finest equipped train we had  
ever been on. It was lighted by  
electricity and had every other  
up-to-date convenience.

Our second stop in Texas was at  
Amarillo at 5 a. m. This is a  
hustling Texas town of over 7,000  
people, 58 miles from Clarendon.  
We left at daybreak and witnessed  
a beautiful Texas sunrise at 6:30.

From here to Clarendon the land  
is said to be the best in the Pan-  
handle. The rural Texans are  
tall and lank and some look lone-  
some. Now we begin to see a  
little of the ranch life and the graz-  
ing cattle and horses. We see our  
first growing Texas corn and it is  
the best we have yet noticed.

At 8 a. m. we reached Clarendon,  
a fine little city of over 3,500  
people. They have a fine railway  
station and excellent business  
houses. One entire block is a mas-  
sive brick structure with large and  
beautiful stores. The streets,  
stores and dwellings are lighted by  
electricity. There are two nice  
banks and two newspapers edited by  
enterprising and affable gentlemen.  
The writer paid his respects to  
both offices—the Clarendon Chron-  
icle, edited by Mr. W. P. Blake,  
and the Banner-Stockman, by  
Messrs. John E. Cooke and John  
H. Kelley. We were invited to  
make the Stockman office our  
Texas loafing place. A sign hang-  
ing on the wall read "No loafing  
allowed," but we were informed  
that it was not intended for the  
writer. The town has a \$35,000  
courthouse and many other fine  
public buildings and private resi-  
dences. The M. E. College, has  
about 300 students and the hand-  
some \$10,000 public school build-  
ing has over 300 students enrolled.

Early in the evening of the first  
day here I accompanied brother  
Bernard and family to their ranch  
home, 10 miles from Clarendon,  
to spend a night on the plains of  
Texas. The drive was lovely, the  
roads being better than we possess  
in Middletown Valley. Bernard is  
his own road supervisor and he  
selects his own route through any-  
body's field he wishes and when  
the road gets anyways bad he se-  
lects another route, always having  
a fine road. Everyone at Middle-  
town know my fear of a snake,  
dead or alive, but I proved brave  
here and killed my first rattlesnake,  
which ran alongside our carriage.  
I alighted, grasped the young rat-  
tler by the tail, swung it over my  
head and broke its back, then  
stamped its life out. It measured  
8 inches. Going along we viewed  
a beautiful Texas sunset, and  
reached the ranch home just as  
the shades of evening were falling.  
We sat in the yard coatless and  
hatless until long after midnight,  
conversing. We did disturb the  
neighbors, as the nearest and only  
one was four miles away. We  
were not afraid of "spooks,"  
either, as I'll wager a million that

two miles distant. From the yard  
we sat and watched the Denver &  
Fort Worth trains go along three  
miles away. We could see them  
for 16 miles. We could also see  
the headlight of an engine on the  
Choctaw & Indian Ter. R. R. over  
25 miles distant. We retire amid  
the bawling of the cattle, the neigh-  
ing of horses, the braying of a  
mule and the howling of the coy-  
ote, or prairie wolf, which is quite  
a change from the whirl of street  
cars and the clanging gongs and  
all sorts of noises in our previous  
city life.

In my next I will tell of some  
queer things in this part of Amer-  
ica, including a visit to the famous  
Goodnight Buffalo ranch. The  
promised "Moffett Road" letter  
will appear later.

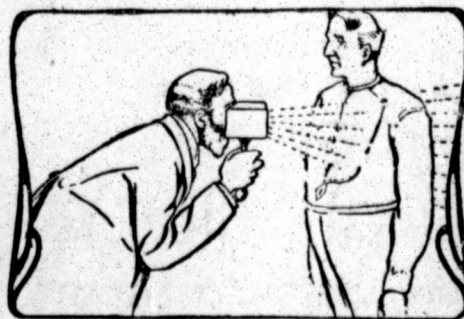
